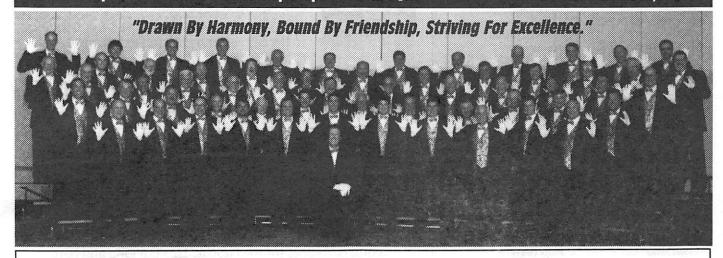

# RADIO DAYS 2001 - A SUCCESSFUL SHOW!

From every musical and performance perspective, our show was a great success. I have received nothing but compliments on its content and quality. Thanks to everyone in the chorus, the Music Team, the *Heartbeats* (the lunch was great as usual!) and our extended HOA family, our Sweet Adeline and community volunteers and the members of my committee who made it all happen. I have been show chair a number of times before and this was the easiest time I ever had!

I wish I could also report a record-breaking financial result but that did not happen. We will not know final numbers either for attendance or for net proceeds for some time as we are still processing paperwork and auditing tickets. Our budget was based on an projected sale of 1,000 tickets per show and we fell short of those targets. We got a late start and we missed the calendars of a number of groups that plan in November for their activities the next year. We also need to get our mailing list more up-to-date. We did do a fairly extensive audience survey. We got several hundred responses which **Kent McClean** and I will analyze and report to the Board on for future show planning purposes.

At the risk of leaving someone out (and with apologies in advance should my occupationally-driven professorial absent-mindedness still plague me in retirement), I would like to specifically thank certain folks who took on tasks and did them well. Thanks to **Dick Korek** who conceived and created our brochures, advertisements and show program. He then bought and placed the ads and found a sponsor to pay for printing the program. Thanks to **Dan Henry Bowser** for helping with the voice-over radio spots Thanks to **Jim Davis** (and **Monty Duerksen**) for creating the radio days scenario that worked so well. I appreciated the Music Team's willingness to work with our ideas in doing something a little different this year as well as their extraordinary efforts at having us so well-prepared musically for every part of the show. (A special thanks goes to Sheri Watts for the neat "Ritz" package and her frequent visits to rehearsals to help us make it happen.) Mike Schumacher who could have said no when I asked him for help getting the ushers, ticket takers, and others we needed to get people into their seats—since he had already done that a number of times—did in three days what I had been unable to do in three weeks. And that was a bigger chorus that we had for any performance in the past year.

However, we are unlikely to achieve what we want to this fall with that number on stage. **Mike Schumacher's** guest and recruiting program is going well, but we need the singers and performers back from the missing half of our chapter (yes, we do have about 150 members). Wouldn't you like to sing again with 80 or 90 guys in the competition chorus?

Let's PERSONALLY encourage the AWOL and backsliders to rejoin us for the May 1 Spring Fling, and for the next **Tony DeRosa** coaching session, and for the September retreat and the October contest in Topeka!

## **MORE MAYO!**

For those of you serious about improving your vocal quality and range, breath support and other fundamentals, one of the best tools around still is **Paul Mayo's** tape.

This veteran west coast vocal instructor demonstrates on one side of the tape a dozen exercises, each with a specific purpose. The other side of the tape is the exercises with proper sequence and number of repetitions; all you gotta do is sing along.

The tape is available from the Society; if you'd like to preview it, **Jim Bagby** has one to loan. If you want an endorsement of the value of the Mayo experience, ask **David Krause**, or anyone who's been exposed to Mayo at *Harmony College*.

#### THE TENOR'S CREED

by Earl McGhee

- 1. I will remember that I am a Tenor and that Tenors are unique among men. I will conduct myself accordingly.
- 2. During chorus rehearsal, I will allow myself to be shushed by the Director, but at the performance, I will drive my high notes to the far corners of the room.
- **3.** I will show a certain respect for the Bass, for few men could sing with their knuckles dragging upon the ground. I will not get mushy about it.
- **4.** I will always remember that the Baritone really thinks that those strange notes are hauntingly beautiful. I will respect his intentions, but I will not get mushy about it.
- 5. I will not forget that all Leads really wish they could sing tenor, but I will not let my pity for them become obvious.
- **6.** I will be very selective about the Lead, Bari and Bass that I will consent to sing with in a quartet. I know that I will always be in great demand, for they are many and we are few.
- 7. I will practice until no one can tell when I go from natural voice to falsetto, for I know it drives the others crazy.
- **8.** When pickup quartetting, I will insist upon trying to sing the bass part, for I know it causes the real Basses great pain.
- 9. Whenever, in a show, my quartet manages to create an overtone, I will let a sly smile play across my face that says "Yes, I really did hit that note".
- **10.** I will hold my head high, remembering that I am a Tenor and that humility is for those who can not afford arrogance.

#### **LEAD'S CREED**

- 1. We will not flaunt in front of others the fact that we have the best voice in the group (unless the music calls for it, which, come to think of it, it usually does).
- 2. We will do our best to stay in tune, but won't worry too much about that since the other guys have to follow us anyway.
- **3.** As consummate gentleman, we will continue to let the Basses feel like they're the most important part of the group, even though without the melody they would have nothing to harmonize.
- **4.** As we focus on shaping and caressing the song, if we forget a word (or all of them), we won't worry too much since the other guys have to follow us anyway.
- 5. We will never allow a baritone to sing louder than us, even when we're on the seventh. The melody must be heard!!!
- **6.** We will be sensitive to the Tenor's need to feel special. We won't overdo it, though.
- 7. In a chorus, although we will do our best to follow the Director, we realize that we have to take advantage of all of the opportunities in a song to show off our wonderful Lead voice. After all, that's what the audience has come to hear, right?
- **8.** We will do our best to cover the fact that the Baritone has a weak, emaciated instrument, otherwise he'd be singing Lead.
- 9. When in doubt, pitch it up!!!
- **10.** When a Coach/Director advises us that we were under pitch, or too loud, we will always nod appreciatively, all the while knowing that we were just doing what the Composer/Arranger originally intended (even if the Coach/Director IS the Composer/Arranger).

#### THE BARITONE CREED

- 1. I will not sing a single note that isn't right in pitch,
- **2.** I won't contribute harmonies that have a single glitch,
- **3.** I won't be last to learn the music leave that to the lead,
- **4.** I won't be late for practice 'cause my part has such a need.
- **5.** I'll fill in cracks and crevices the basses leave behind,
- **6.** I'll use some sweet finesse in every seventh that I find,
- 7. I'll monitor the volume so the chords will really ring,
- **8.** I'll make a thing of beauty every note that I will sing.

#### THE BASS' CREED

- 1. I will always remember that Basses are God's chosen people and will strive to convince others of that truth.
- 2. Whenever the notes fall within my "Power Range", I will sing in a manner that conveys the message "I am a Bass! Hear me roar!"

- 8. I will not step on the Lead's pickups and will tune my voice to his, even though he is prone to drop pitch. For I am a Bass and I can reach it.
- **9.** I will frequently remind the Bari that his proper function is to make the Bass sound good.
- **10.** I will do all of the above in a spirit of humility befitting one of God's chosen people.

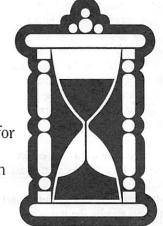

Ed also reminded us of another paid performance for the Shawnee Mission Medical Center at their annual employee recognition banquet at the Marriott Hotel on April 25. These two events would each bring us a check for \$1,000 which was to go to the transportation fund to help pay for the trip to the International Convention in Louisville, Kentucky, later that summer.

#### Twenty Years Ago - April 1981

There's an article about the *Prairie Crooners* (author unknown), describing how they were "dabbling in TV." "Two weeks ago, we recorded a lead-in for a new locally produced show called, 'Thursday Night Blue Light Specials.' Bogden Candy sales netted the chapter \$1,236.95, presumably to go toward travel expenses for Detroit. The number one candy salesman was **Frank Leone** with \$398.40.
