
However, responsibilities of a director for a chorus such as HOA have requirements that sometimes makes one reevaluate whether time enough to do the job is available for a hobby such as this.

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




All in all, I feel like the last two years have been a learning and growing experience, not just for me, but for the chapter and chorus over all.

WHO'S THAT GUY? by Dick Irwin

In future issues of Harmonotes, we will place the spotlight on one of HOA's members. By doing so, we hope to learn more about our barbershop "family"! This month: HOA's incoming President for 2002...

John Stucker - Bass

Our member-of-the-month was born in Leavenworth, Kansas, over 60 years ago (a lot over we'd guess). He has lived in Leavenworth nearly his entire life, with short visits to the U.S. Air Force. **John Stucker** currently holds the position of chapter secretary. He has served in many different capacities with the Kansas City chapter over his 23-year membership. John is also a certified contest administrator for our Society.

As a child, John attended grade school only 4 blocks from home, was in junior high school (that's what they called them way back then) only 5 blocks from home, and graduated from high school only 6 blocks from home. I guess the older he got the more his parents trusted him to get farther from home. He had a cousin who graduated as valedictorian two years ahead of him, a sister who graduated as valedictorian one year ahead of him, and he, well, he just graduated. After high school, John joined the Air Force because he didn't have a clue what he wanted to do with his life.

He spent eleven weeks in basic training, then returned to Leavenworth to get married. John and **Jane** have now been married for more than 46 years. (John, that's nearly as long as I've been around!)

The Stuckers have two sons, **David** and **Matthew**. David used to sing with HOA back in the 1970's. The first time HOA went to the international contest in Minneapolis, MN, David was a student in Manhattan, KS. He would drive back and forth to rehearsals (about 4 hours each way). On his way he would stop in Lawrence, KS and pick up **Gordon Lankenau** (yes, our director). John visits his other son, Matthew, in Larned, Kansas (I never "larned" where that place is, John) quite frequently to play golf and visit with Matthew and his wife. Matthew is a game warden with responsibilities covering three counties.

John received some intensive electronics training in the Air Force. It has served him well over the years as he worked in a TV repair shop then eventually as a government employee at Fort Leavenworth. He retired from federal service after 34 years but was only able to stay "retired" for about six months. He worked for about three years as a government contractor, doing the same job he did prior to retiring. Then, he signed on with a friend and worked for about three more years. After this last contract expired, he decided it was time to concentrate on his hobbies.

Those include bowling (he used to carry a 205 average), skiing with the Kansas City Ski Club (he loves making as many trips as possible to Colorado in the winter), golf (a sport he says he took up way to late in life, but he's making up for lost time), and, of course, barbershopping. He started in barbershop with the Leavenworth chapter in 1968 (the year I graduated from high school, John). After about 10 years he visited HOA and has been making the 50-mile drive ever since. He became a certified secretary in the 1980s and when the categories were refined in 1993, he recertified as a contest administrator.

John admits to having many special memories in barbershopping. Probably his most exciting moment was the first district contest that HOA won in 1978. "We were in the Music Hall, had sung last and were strung out when the news filtered back that we had won. Total chaos!!"

He also recalls a very moving moment at Harmony college, "There were 700 plus folks in the auditorium during Harmony college. **Joe Liles** had just introduced his latest arrangement, *Battle Hymn of the Republic*. There was not a dry eye in the house."

CHAPTER SHOW PREPARATIONS? ALREADY?

Yep. Your Music Team is hard at work putting together the chorus part of the March 9 Chapter Show. Current repertoire numbers in the program include *I'll Be Seeing You, Sweet Georgia Brown, Puttin' on the Ritz, Gee But It's Great To Be In Kansas City,* and *It Had To Be You.*

Some good new numbers too. We've pretty well learned *I'm Beginning To See The Light*, that rocking uptune performed so well by our 2001 Champs *Michigan Jake*. This is a **Rob Hopkins** arrangement, with a new verse written by **Eric Jackson**—sound familiar? (Hint: if you don't make the connection, I'll be seeing you.) Another that we've seen now, and heard from our section leaders (both in front of the chapter and in the fall CSD contest, now registered as *New And Used Parts*), is the gorgeous **Irving Berlin** ballad *How Deep Is The Ocean*, another Rob Hopkins arrangement—we're gonna stay with this guy!

A couple of the new show songs are actually old show songs—not real old, just not from last year. Armed Forces Medley is in your hands now, with four service songs and America the Beautiful to finish it. We plan to stage it as we did some 5-6 years ago, with a uniformed jarhead/swabbie/dogface/jet jockey marching out for the appropriate segment, and we'll use a different director for each segment—for the math-challenged among you, that's five. Also back after a hiatus of some 10 years is Battle of Jericho, complete with soloist (then and now) David Krause. The bad news is that this is not the **Jim Clancy** arrangement done so spectacularly by the *Vocal* Majority. The good news is that this is not the Jim Clancy arrangement done so spectacularly by the *Vocal Majority*—that one would require much too much rehearsal time to prepare, and we have a much more accessible one by **Jim Massey** that works very well. Other possible new ones are a demonstration number called *How to* Build a Chorus, and a Mills Brothers Medley, arranged by Ed Waesche (another of our favorite arrangers over the years, including Sweet Georgia Brown) and as performed by the '78 Champs Blue Grass

Student Union. The latter is 12 pages long—that's the bad news—the good news is that quartets will be used for a substantial portion of it, so the chorus won't have as much of it to learn.

The taping went so well in the contest preparations that we're going to do it again in the show preparations. Each section leader will be designating the numbers he wants to hear, and we'll want to hear a first tape at least by Jan. 22. Feb. 5 will be the last chance to tape on the risers—if there's any fine tuning left it will be done off the risers with our section leaders. As in the fall, the section leaders will make every effort to help get every man on the risers, and we know you will respond to that with maximum effort, as you did for the CSD contest. Let's give PLATINUM an act so good they won't want to follow it!


"The New York people have opened up to the rest of the world so much. I have never seen such a caring for people as there was when we were there.

Hundreds of organizations have contributed to New York's recovery effort, but one sticks out in Hoover's mind.

"I know everybody believes in the Red Cross, and it's a great organization," he said, "but some of the most generous people I met there were from the Salvation Army."

"The Salvation Army gave us food, gave us clothing, gave us everything we needed 24 hours a day at every outpost we had. They gave us things to send back to our family. They had ministers and people there talking to you. I would say to the people of Topeka, 'Do not ever walk away from the Salvation Army this holiday season without giving something."

A LOOK AT THE PAST IN *HARMONOTES*

Ten Years Ago -December 1991

Two major upcoming events dominated HOA planning at the end of 1991. Of immediate interest was the 1992 annual show, scheduled for Saturday, March 7. Show Chairman Manley Vance announced that we would present a show that featured "a minimum of talking and MCing" for "a very fast paced evening of barbershop entertainment." Jim Bagby would serve as producer/director. The afterglow would be handled by Stan Ackers, and Ed Sundermeyer would serve as ticket chairman. Meanwhile. the chapter board had decided that the contest set for the International

WE NEED TO CHANGE by Dale Neuman, C.D. VP for Member Services

Some of you are already asking yourselves "what do we need to change and why?" since you are thoroughly engaged in and enjoying this wonderful hobby of singing and service. Well, unless you want to try to sing four-part harmony with only three or two or even one part present-something that Ev Nau so cleverly demonstrated can't be done at the recent Leadership Forum and again on his 5,500 road trip on behalf of membership development-without changes, that is the future barbershoppers face.

Let's consider the "why" question first. The Society has been doing research on its membership base for several years and has employed firms that analyze such things for organizations and make projections based upon demographic trends in society at large as well as within the organization itself. Those data were then given over to an actuarial firm to make additional projections about the size and composition of SPEBSQSA over the next 30 years—if current recruitment and retention trends continue. Guess what? From over 35,000 men several years ago, we are down to under 32,000 in 2001. And, it is predicted that we will be below 30,000 in 2003; around 28,000 in 2005 and it goes down from there to a membership of about 18,000 by 2020.

Now many things will change over the years that cannot be anticipated in these estimates. But there is no reason to believe they will be changes that will improve the numbers UNLESS they are changes that we make and steps we take to do so.

The "why" question was easier than the "what" question. I can only suggest some things to consider. Each existing chapter will need to work on different approaches to recruitment-currently. one-third of our "first year" members nationally are over 60 when they first join. We need to also bring in the fathers and uncles of the *Harmony* Explosion crowd. Existing chapters will have to recall the grand old tradition of sponsoring new chapters—even in their own backyards if that is what it takes to provide a place to sing for men who love to sing. A basic theme of this year's Forum was that one size does NOT fit all. Chapters have different missions and different cultures. Men need options in those as well as in meeting times, places and driving distances.

If everybody meets on Tuesday nights, then we miss those who can't make Tuesdays or nights or both.

HOA membership is down from these former "golden years" as well. From numbers around 170, our rolls now have held constant around 147 for three years. But, since only 60 to 70 of these are active, what does that say about our future?

One project that came out of a brainstorming session held among the Membership folks at the Leadership Forum is United We Sing. This is a program to promote group-based and mass community "sings" around a packet of patriotic music to be made available through the Society. Chapters and quartets would be present to "lead" the singing and could, if they wished, demonstrate the barbershop style on another song or

There will also be "show closer" materials also developed around the theme with appropriate music available to chapters to use. We already have plans to do something similar on our March Show and I hope our Marketing Team is looking for some community sing opportunities to do the other part.

THE GLOBAL MUSIC EXCHANGE BARBERSHOP CHORUS TOUR OF CHINA · OCTOBER 27 - NOVEMBER 13, 2001

When **Don** and **Donie Peck** were attending the Mid-Winter Convention in Jacksonville, Florida, in January they were excited to see a brochure for the planned Barbershop Chorus tour to China sponsored by Ed Pio Travel. They had been thinking of a trip to China for some time and this seemed just what they were looking for. They signed up on the spot.

The tour to China begins in San Francisco on Oct. 27, when we meet our group of 114 (62 singers) from 19 states, Canada, England and Scotland. The name badges that we are issued allow us to start off on a friendly first name basis.

We board an Air China wide body Airbus jet at 2 p.m. Enroute we cross the International Date Line losing a day, and arrive at the huge modern air terminal in Shanghai in the evening.


Our group is split into three bus groups, each with it's own China Government Tour Guide, as well as a local guide for each city. Our guide's name is **Zhang** ("call me John"), who is very knowledgeable, speaks good English, and keeps us well informed and on schedule for the entire trip.

On our way to our beautiful hotel, we get a good look at Shanghai at night—a city of 16 million people, with its skyscrapers lit up in a dazzling display, while our guide tells us about the city and our schedule for the next couple days. We collapse into bed.

After the first of many great Western style breakfasts, we head for the Jade Buddha Temple, followed by a 15 to 20-course lunch, then a visit to the Yu Gardens and Palace with its ancient Tea House and Rockery (very fancy giant rock gardens).

Most all our lunches and dinners are served family style at a table for eight with a giant Lazy Susan in the middle where plate after plate of various Chinese foods are presented. Forks are optional but most of us work hard to master the chopsticks.

In the evening we attend a great acrobatic and gymnastics show. The following morning we have a city tour before flying to Wuhan, located at the junction of the Yangtze and Han Rivers. We have our first rehearsal after dinner where we meet our director, **Kenny Hatton**, Gold Medal lead of the *Blue Grass Student Union* and director of the *Louisville Thoroughbreds*. There are 44 SPEBSQSA, 3 Harmony International, 7 Sweet Adelines, and a few choir members that make up our chorus of 65. We have 29 leads that Kenny has to keep shushing till we get the



message not to drown out the rest of the singers. We have all worked hard to get ready with music and learning tapes provided us back in July. The toughest part was learning the correct pronunciation of the words to the songs we were to sing in Chinese.

Much credit is to be given to **Brian** and **Holly Beck** and **Jerry** and **Kim Orloff**, who were tireless in their efforts to provide us with arrangements and parts tapes. Brian and Holly worked many hours with an interpreter to get the phonetic words and arrangements for five songs that we sang in Chinese. Brian is a two-time gold medal winner with *Dealer's Choice* and *Side Street Ramblers*. Jerry Orloff has 154 "Man of Note" awards. **Val Hicks**, a well-known arranger, added color to every performance.

In the morning we visit the beautiful Yellow Crane Pavilion in Wuhan before heading out via deluxe motor coaches through Shashi City to Jinzhou where we board our 4-star "Star Dipper" cruise ship. On our way we have passed through the Chinese countryside with it's many small planted fields, peasants working with hoe, shovel and water buffalo. We also visit a museum where the contents of the tomb of an early emperor are on display. This was centuries ago, and they believed in preparing for the next life and they must take everything with them to befit an emperor's lifestyle, and I do mean everything! This emperor must have loved music, as he took along a large set of tuned bells, measuring about 25 feet long and 10 feet high. The details and quality of the work is extraordinary.

In the morning aboard the "Star Dipper" we pass through the locks at the massive 230 feet high Gezhouba Dam at Yichang. Continuing we pass the first of the Three Gorges, Xiling (She-ling) Gorge, the largest of the Three Gorges. Our cruiser then passes through the world famous new Three Gorges River Dam construction site. This dam will measure one and one-half miles wide and 600 feet high and will be the largest electric generating facility in the world when completed in 2009. We pass through the Wu Gorge before docking for the night at Wushan.

Lunches and dinners on board ship are served cafeteria style with many, many dishes from which to choose. Some of my Barbershop friends will be glad to know that beer, as well as water and green tea, is served with the meals.

In the morning we board small rapid-running boats for a trip to the Daning River and the Three Lessor Gorges. We pass under a 175-meter high (576 feet if my math is right) suspension bridge that will be completely covered by water in 2009 when the water in the new dam reaches its maximum level. This is a stunning area of dramatic mountainside caves, bamboo forests, wild monkeys, clear water rapids and ancient plank walkways built into the cliffs many centuries ago. Our local guide explains that even though this area will be flooded, there will still be mountaintops and cliff walls and many new sights to see in future years.

After re-boarding our cruiser, we continue upstream through the Outang Gorge, the last of the Three Gorges. All along the riverbanks we see large billboards pointing out future water levels (135 meters in 2003 and 175 meters in 2009). All buildings below these levels will be removed and new cities, villages and fields are being built above these levels. This is a tremendous undertaking and controversial, but China must have the electric power which this dam will generate for future growth.










BUSH LEAGUE 2001:

All participants, HOA members and guests experienced a fun evening! Bush League—the tradition continues!


