



A MUSICAL REFLECTION

I've had a number of experiences in my life that will stay with me forever. Three of the most memorable are related to my life as a barbershopper.

In the late 1970's the new minister of our church commissioned his wife to start a choir. She played the organ and was adept at talking people into doing things so my wife and I joined. It was the first time since high school Glee Club that I had uttered a vocal note outside the bathtub. I did the best I could but after about a year I decided I should take some voice lessons. I found a small music school in Independence that taught various subjects in music—sight reading, theory and voice. It was just the thing **Brenda** and I were looking for.

Through the fall of 1980 and into the spring of '81 we learned the basics of music and singing. In one of the sessions I recall my instructor saying, "I'm working with a barbershop quartet. Two of them are brothers named Yoder." We chatted a little about them but then went back to work and nothing more was said. When May came and the term ended, each student was required to do a recital piece to demonstrate what we had learned. I sang my song, as did the others, and then up stepped the Rural Route 4: Jim, Calvin, Willard and Everet **Roth**. When the recital was over, the quartet invited me to sing a tag with them and I was hooked. It's been 20 years since that afternoon and though I've long forgotten the song I sang, I can still see the recital room, four guys in red plaid shirts and funny looking overalls, and the small audience in the dozen or so chairs lining the room beaming from ear to ear as the Rural Route 4 sang about their windup music box.

Ten years later, I received the Barbershopper of the Month Award. What a feeling that was. It stayed with me for days.

Now, 19 years after joining the Society, I've been voted Barbershopper of the Year. I can think of a hundred guys who could stand in front of me on this one. I can only say thank you. I can't think of anything I've had more fun doing than singing with the Kansas City Chapter and Heart of America Chorus.

Some things you do as a Barbershopper are tax deductible. If you itemize your deductions, you may be entitled to include some



expenses for barbershop activity. If you had verifiable out-of-pocket expense in connection with a chapter duty as an elected or appointed officer or board member, or, if you sang in one or more local shows, such expenses as travel (14¢ per mile, or actual cost) telephone, postage, parking, etc., for which you were not reimbursed are deductible.

Expense of travel to chapter meetings is not deductible unless you hold an office directly involved in conduct of the meeting. A different rule applies to travel away-from-home. Transportation, meals and lodging may only be deducted if there is no significant element of personal pleasure, recreation or vacation in the trip. If golf games, sightseeing, and similar activities heavily overbalance singing and participation in meetings as a duty for the away-from-home expenses, these expenses would not be deductible. The cost of tuition at schools is specifically barred as a deduction as well as dues. If you use these deductions, here is the procedure. With Form 1040, use Schedule A, under "gifts to charity, other than cash or check," enter the total of your out-of-pocket expense. (Remember the words "non-reimbursed" and "verifiable.") If over \$500 attach the appropriate schedule and categorize expenses by groups (lodging, transportation, etc.), captioned "Expenses incurred in connection with contributions of services to an organization classed as exempt under Section 501 (c) (3)." Then state the name and location of your chapter and the full name of the Society. Your chapter should have a list of events that are applicable to this expense tabulation. Your cash contributions to the chapter or the Society or to Harmony Foundation Inc. (for the General Fund to support our service projects or to the Endowment Program) are directly deductible. Include this figure in Schedule A, under "gifts to charity, cash or check." Be sure to retain verifying records such as appointment books, calendars with notes, etc. ~

JACKSON AND HOPKINS? SOUNDS LIKE A LAW FIRM.

As Alexandria prepared to win its third gold medal at Miami in 1995, the *Harmonizers* and their fans had a mantra: *once* in a lifetime.

The slogan, visible on buttons everywhere, came from the verse to their contest ballad, the 1938 Kahal-Fain classic, "I'll Be Seeing You." But it was not a verse anyone had heard.

The *Harmonizers* had it written by the multi-talented **Eric Jackson**, and arranged by veteran **Rob Hopkins**—arguably the most talented barbershopper in upstate New York. The rest, you could say, is history—with this happy footnote: now that verse is in the possession of HOA.

Jackson may be best-known as instructor of the creative interpretation class that's one of the most popular courses in Harmony College history. He is the prime mover behind the "Lifeblood" experiment. He's a championship level chorus director in the powerful Mid-Atlantic District, an administrator, musician, creator and much more. If you look in the dictionary under "one enthusiastic idea per minute," it says: *Eric Jackson*.

HOA and many groups have done Hopkins' creative and singable arrangements. He's a longtime key member of the Society C&J community, including past chairman, as well as a former Society Board Member (our terms overlapped by one year). Rob is a quartet man, chorus director and judge, as well as top arranger.

Twenty Years Ago - February 1981

There's also a note that Fred Whisman and his wife, Jean, host a Sweetheart Party at the Afterglow on Saturday, February 14, Valentine's Day.

Bill Wall and Al Moritz were responsible for designing and building a shell and engineering a "black light" number with audience participation to be featured on the musical program. Frank Leone arranged for green jackets, and son **Steve** developed the choreography. I recall attending this show (I was a member of the Lawrence chapter), and I believe Dan was the chorus directorat least for the "black light" number. It was something like follow-the-bouncing-ball" numbers they used to feature in movie theaters many, many years ago. Very impressive!

He will also be coming in for four Tuesday night sessions during the year, on March 6, June 19, Sept. 18, and Dec. 11. We should be loaded for bear by the time CSD contest comes around, with our new contest numbers *I'll Be Seeing You* and *Sweet Georgia Brown*.

In the more immediate future is our Chapter Show March 24 at the Music Hall. The chorus songs will be Wonderful Day Medley, Kansas City, God Bless America, Chanukkah Medley (that's right—nothing in it that demands it just be sung in December!), It Had To Be You, Ain't Misbehavin', Ballpark, Puttin' On The Ritz,

Please Mr. Columbus, and I'll Be Seeing You. Rehearsals for the show chorus begin Jan. 30; eight Tuesday nights before the Friday night tech rehearsal and Saturday shows, Thursday night rehearsals March 8 and 15, and Saturday afternoon at John Knox on Feb. 24, before our concert there that evening. SHOWTIME!

As those who have been attending our Tuesday night meetings are aware, the 2001 annual show at the Music Hall on March 24th will include a host of new and exciting numbers by the HOA Chorus. What they and others may not know is that our featured quartet will be the *Gas House Gang* who will present their full show package. *12th Street Rag* will also have a major role in the show. This will be our 55th annual show and, musically, should be among our best. What we would also like to see is that it be better attended than have those in

recent years. To that end, we have decided to go outside the nine dots in several ways. The show will be structured around a theme and may feature a local media personality as MC if we can get all the details in place. While there may be room for some chapter quartets to make cameo appearances, the featured quartet will do more than in the past. We are not asking members to sell program ads since we are

not using a conventional program. We are, however, asking each member to therefore work harder at selling tickets. (And there is nothing wrong with going to those who have bought ads before and this time asking them to buy tickets for themselves, for friends or for their business associates.) Another way to help is for members to purchase tickets, give them away to someone other than family members and take the cost as a tax deduction in support of HOA.

Paul Winans is our ticket chairman and the direct ticket phone line is 816-537-0038. It is equipped with a digital answering system. Flyers are being mailed and the marketing team is busy getting PR out into the community. But as in years past, the most productive sales will be those that are done by members. I and a number of members of the show committee personally send letters to friends, neighbors and

former ticket purchasers with a reminder about the show and an offer to get and deliver tickets for "the best seats in the house" to them from the ticket chairman if they so wish. One member even gives his personal guarantee that if his customers do not like the show, he will refund their money. No one has, as of yet, taken him up on the offer. Paul will have member order forms as well as a process for taking tickets out on consignment. The tickets are \$18, \$13 and \$8. Only the \$13 and \$8 tickets may be taken out on con-

signment and ALL CONSIGNED TICKETS NOT SOLD must be returned by March 7th or the member will be expected to pay for them.

Jim Davis is coordinating the production and John Warrior will be our stage manager giving lighting and sound cues to the stage hands employed through the city. John has asked that we find him one or two "under-

studies" to learn and help with what he does. He has done this for almost 20 years in a row and worries that should he not be able to do it sometime, we would be at the mercy of who knows who? So I am asking any members who might like to work with John Warrior to let me know. Or if you have a family member or neighbor or work associate who enjoys stage management and would like to help, please let me know ASAP so that we can put them in touch with John.

There will also be an Afterglow but whether it is a cast-only-party at the Music Hall (like we have done the past several years) or an available-to-the public event at a nearby hotel (like we used to do until attendance dropped below that needed to meet costs) is still being debated, More on this later.
