# I WAS A CHORUS NARCISSIST (BUT I'M BETTER NOW)

When I first joined the chorus I was placed in the bass section. Bass was a part that I had very little experience with, having sung melody most of my life. The newness of the part caused me to listen very closely to myself, to the exclusion of those around me. It didn't help that I knew in my heart of hearts that I was a natural lead trapped

in the bass section. How could anyone deny me my right to the melody? Why, can't everyone hear the quality flowing from my mouth? But a strange thing happened to me.

When **Jim** stopped the chorus and asked "What do you hear?" The only honest answer I could give was "Myself, and, oh yeah, I could sort of hear my backup singers." Yes, I was an arrogant cuss. But only being able to give that answer was also unsettling. When I played trombone in jazz bands I prided myself on my ability to listen not only to the band as a whole but each section and even each individual instrument. I was able to blend and tune myself to the sound of my fellow musicians, to play my part in creating an awesome ensemble sound. I thought, "Why can't I do that now?" I came to the conclusion that I just don't hear voices the same way I do instruments. For quite some time I used this rationalization to justify my laziness. I don't think I ever heard the baritone part during my first two years as a barbershopper. No wonder I couldn't hear overtones!

It is true that our voices are not as distinct as the tones emanating from the bell of a brass instrument, but they can be heard just as clearly. It simply takes an adjustment in attitude.

If, like I was, you are new to vocal ensemble singing then a little more effort will help too. Yes, we all concentrate on our own sound when we are learning a new song, just as we should. But once we have the words and notes learned it is time to make music, not merely sounds. In order to do that, we must listen. The Count Basie Orchestra had the tightest sound of any big band ever. Did they accomplish that because Basie was a precise director? No, they were tight because they listened to each other. Basie just gave them the downbeat and then he played the piano for the rest of the song.


Gradually over the years I began to listen more, but only recently have I made a wonderful discovery. I really can hear all four parts throughout a song. Did I unblock my ears? No, I unblocked my mind. It is amazing what you can hear when you open your mind. Suddenly the lushness of the chords comes through. I'm no longer guessing if I'm singing in tune, I can hear it. I automatically relax and employ the principles that Bill Biffle has taught us. My singing is effortless. The quality level of my singing goes up. My goodness, even my stage presence is better. I'm not working any more. I'm having fun! I'm making music! I'm a musician again! Glory be! I'm not simply singing, I'm a singer! There is a difference you know. You, too, can discover that difference. Learn your words and notes. Then relax and listen. You will be amazed at what you hear, from your chorus and your own voice.

### A LOOK AT THE PAST IN HARMONOTES

### Ten Years Ago - August, 1992

As usual, following an HOA trip to International, there was a good bit of comment regarding the successes and failures incurred by the chorus during the venture in Pittsburgh. Chorus Manager **Jim White** reported a "justifiable grumble" about the poor seats that HOA got in the auditorium, explaining that "seats were assigned by the international office in the order that requests were received," and promising "we'll take a close look at this next time to see whether something can be done to improve our lot."

Otherwise, Jim had nothing but good things to say about the New Orleans convention. And of course, Music Director **Jim Bagby** flagellated himself by insisting on taking the lion's share of the blame for our 12th-place finish in the chorus competition. You're reminded, Jim, that there were 92 singers standing up there on the risers who must each accept his share of the blame for our not doing better. (Wouldn't it be exciting to be able once again to take 92 guys to contest? Wonder what happened.)

Congratulations were conveyed to **Matt and Jill Moore** on the birth of their first child, a son, **Jacob Andrew**, on July 4. (He must be in the third or fourth grade at school now. How time flies!)

We had 20 guests at our guest night on July 21. HOA Played host to **Chris Einess**, **Lud's** son, plus three barbershoppers from the Sedalia Chapter, two (**Byron "Bemo" Myers II** and **Vince Perry IV** from St. Joseph, who later became HOA members), one from Ames, Iowa, and a member of the Orlando, Florida, Chapter who heard about us through listening to recordings of our International contest performances.

### <u> Twenty Years Ago - August, 1982</u>

There's not much of real interest in the August 1982 edition of *Harmonotes*. Just a general critique by **Bruce Wenner** (it doesn't say but appears he may have been Music Vice President) and Music Director **Jim Bagby** of our 8th-place finish in the International contest in Pittsburgh, a dissertation by Coach **Lance Heilmann** on attitude and preparation as being essential for participation in International competition, and a lengthy reflection on the overall success of the logistical aspects of our trip to Pittsburgh by **Clyde Menson**, thanking those who helped make it so—**Keith Schweer** (hotel room reservations), **John Stucker** (convention tickets), **Nile Abbott** and **Merlin Barcus** (transportation from hotel to airport in Pittsburgh), **Walt Bogdan**, (reception sticks for the banquet tables Saturday night), **Dennis Yeager** (for his support and assistance as *Harmonotes* editor), and the *Heartbeats* for their "everpresent support.")

HOA was then meeting at the Ridgeview Christian Church on Sni-A-Bar Road in Raytown. **Jerry Fullerton** was chapter president, and **Dennis Yeager** was *Harmonotes* editor (whatever happened to Dennis?).

### Thirty-Five Years Ago - August, 1967

Editor **Don Thorne** describes how the *Missouri Pewkes* (it's true, that was their name! And it was pronounced just like it was spelled!), an HOA quartet, took second place in some kind of contest that was held in the meeting of the Honolulu Chapter in the Hawaiian Village Hotel on July 11. Although there were 10 quartets on the contest program, one might suspect that this was a pick-up international chapter affair something like our annual "Bush League" contest. Quartet members were **Don Thorne** (tenor), **Bill Wall** (lead), **Ed Eichman** (baritone) and **Joe Costigan** (bass). If you're wondering what all those guys were doing in Hawaii at the same time, Joe sheds a bit of light on the matter when he reveals in a separate article that several HOA members and their families apparently took the Society tour to the islands following the 1967 International convention in Los Angeles.





Matt Bostick, Jim Bagby, Dick Shores and Jim Davis delighted their audiences during their 1998 performances at the Raytown Community Theater.














## ST. LOUIS SHOW A REAL DELIGHT by Jim Porter

Now that I have a job that required I drive 200 miles every day, what to do on a Saturday to relax? Why, drive to St. Louis and take in a barbershop show, of course!

We made the decision to do it only a week ago, and visited the AOH Website http://www.aoh.org to check for tickets. You can buy tickets there on-line, and a great number of their ticket sales come from on-line orders. However, we saw that the matinee was sold out, only single seats were available. Rather than order on-line, we called **Rose Manion** (mother of the Henry's) and explained our predicament. As we wanted to make a round trip without staying over in St. Louis, the matinee was the thing to do. Besides, *Expanded Sound* was scheduled for the matinee, but NOT the evening show. (They have a new baritone, **Tom Hegley** has been replaced by **Ed Coco**) Rose said she could get us a pair of tickets in the nosebleed section, top of the balcony, limited view. We took 'em and drove across the state Saturday morning for the show.

In the "it pays to know someone" department, Rose Manion did us a huge favor. She gave us a pair of tickets on the left side, 6th row, next to **David Wright's** wife, **Sandy**. The view from there was a bit one-sided, but we heard every wonderful sound that came out in the next three hours. The 1,200-seat auditorium was truly packed. I asked Sandy how they were able to sell out, and she said that between the well-developed mailing list the chorus has maintained, the availability of on-line ticket sales and the chorus' growing reputation, they have no trouble.

The Ambassadors led off with their contest package. They had around 100 on stage—it was pretty much what we saw in Topeka, but they've made several changes in the package, so there'll be fresh laughs for those who watched them in Nashville. It is all very effective, and the hall was filled with their sound as we enjoyed this delightful package.

Jambalaya was next, and they are truly a lively, entertaining group. It's hard to think these four are from Sweden, as they sing and speak in English, and seem quite comfortable before American audiences. It is also clear that they are delighted to be in the same show with the Ambassadors, and to have the fellowship that comes from being a barber shopper that reaches across oceans and cultures.

Then it was the Gas House Gang's turn. These four remain the best in the business, no doubt about it. They did a couple new songs, and another take on their Jamaican set, which is always good for a hearty laugh as Rob jumps in with his "Day-o!". We've seen it several times before, but it's still a hoot!

Then, here come the Swedes, all dressed in their fearsome looking Viking costumes (recall the contest in 2000, where that was their costume), entering from the rear of the auditorium, coming down the aisles looking and acting like *Hagar the Horrible* (that's a comic strip, for those who think they've outgrown that), then coming onstage to do their set. This segment wasn't their contest set, it was their entertainment package. All in all, these fellows may sneak up on some in Portland. (As you read this, you'll know)

That was it for the first half. No Expanded Sound. No explanation, either. Sandy Wright let us know that Ed Coco

was beset with severe back pains and could not even stand up, forcing the quartet to scratch. According to **Bill Benner**, these problems have been going on for several days. It's serious enough to raise concern that an operation may be needed.

After the break, *Cheers!* came out and put on a dynamite performance. **Kevin Keller** has found his quartet at last. Lead **Chuck Sisson** already has one gold medal, and the others are rising to his level. **Opie Lancaster** was one I knew for a time while with St. Charles, but he's started a new chapter in the Peoria area, so these four are Illinois District people, except for **Kevin Keller.** This group has the distinction of owning TWO district championships, and it seems to me they have what it takes to make it to the Saturday evening show in Portland.

Then the Swedes came out and did their contest set. Now, they all looked like **Emeril Lagasse** as they build a package around Swedish meat balls and had a great time lobbing celery sticks around, plus, of course, one quite large stuffed chicken (*Big Chicken*, get it?) that landed in front and provided an obstacle to step over as they did their thing. I give 'em credit, they policed the area for celery when they were finished. The audience loved it, and I'm sure the audience in Portland will love it as well.

Then the Ambassadors came out for their closing set, adorned in their formal attire (yes, they too have black tuxedoes). Jim Henry took his position in front and picked up a piece of celery and wondered out loud why it was there. The group then did a set that included the "Short People" song where Jim plays the fall guy surrounded by eight of the biggest guys in the chorus. One song in this set was a David Wright arrangement for "Stars and Stripes Forever". Be listening for it next time you hear the Ambassadors in a show. You'll like it.

The curtains closed and some who had a heartfelt need to be first out of the parking lot bolted for the doors. Their loss. In a couple of minutes, the curtains re-opened, and everyone was there, 150 strong, shoulder to shoulder. "It looks like a bunch of cooks and maitre'd's", my wife exclaimed. They launched into "I'm Sitting on Top of the World" together, then closed the show by singing "Friends". I had to really stifle myself from singing along with them. When they reached the first chorus, the syllables sounded strange. We realized that all were singing the song in Swedish for that chorus. At the key change, they went back to English to finish the song. The message of the song was so appropriate at that juncture, as it was clear that these two choruses had found true friendship across the miles as they shared the joys of this hobby with one another.

In the time after, we thanked Sandy for making our day that much more special. We let her know that HOA was also learning "Friends" and that I hoped our two groups could get together in Wichita and sing the song together. She thought that would be great. We spent a while renewing acquaintances with several of the *Ambassadors*, then headed for home, delighted with what we had seen and heard and glad we made the choice to go. Two plays of the *Ambassadors* "Applause" CD got us to Columbia, and we then drove into the sunset toward Kansas City.
