





# TONE-HENGE REHEARSED!

Back in the days of my youth (we're talking circa 1803) every back yard had chickens. Not infrequently this toddler would witness the demise of a fowl



that would involve beheading by one method or another. Immediately upon losing its cranial peninsula, the unfortunate remains would run with fluttering abandon in all directions, and only after some lengthy time, would succumb to the inevitable. Although gory, the display included just a glint of humor. The phrase, "running around like a chicken with its head cut off," has to be at the top of the list of things that require no further description.

I'm working toward an analogy here. *Tone-Henge* is, arguably, not headless, and only some of the music we produce can be described as gory, but the "running around like..." is most certainly applicable. Not that the scurry is aimless and without definite purpose, but it can behead a rehearsal date quicker'n an axe can fall. So here's the good news for us chickens...

Tone-Henge actually rehearsed!! The gettogether had to be scheduled after the Salvation Army tree-lighting ceremony, but it actually happened, starting at 7:45 p.m. on Nov. 13, 2002, and ending at beer time, which, if memory serves, could have been 10:00 p.m. (...could have been, but it was more like 8:15) Anyway, this prelude to a date in Hastings, NE has been accomplished! Tone-Henge was delighted to play "secondbanana" on the Hastings show to our own "12th St. Rag," leaving the musical wizardry of 'Fortinos and Company' to offset any audience animosity toward four old fowl.

### **USING LEARNING TAPES**

#### LEARNING NOTES AND WORDS USING A RECORDING

These days we often work on notes and words by listening to a recording purchased from the Society or recorded at a rehearsal. Sometimes chorus organizations also provide auditory learning aids. Here are some pointers to make this learning method as productive and useful as possible.

#### PREPARATION: CULTIVATE FAMILIARITY

 Care about doing the best you can do. The intention to do well increases the quality of your attention. Attention to the task is a major determiner of success.

 Listen to the selection all the way through in order to get a sense of the whole. Listen for the song's structure, its melodic line, its harmonic pattern, its word meanings, its word sounds, and its emotional content. Imagine body expression that matches what you hear.

 Find an efficient way of returning to the song's beginning point: one song per tape, counting the time to rewind, taping in both directions, etc.

#### REPETITION: ESTABLISHING NEURAL PATHWAYS

 Listen without singing until each note as it comes, is not surprising but expected.

 See the rise and fall of the notes as you hear them. Move your hand up and down to the notes' rise and fall. Watch the music if appropriate.

 When each note is expected before you hear it, start to sing along softly so that the recording predominates. Continue this way until your voice matches the words and notes of the recording. Repeat until every word sound, note and breath is the same.

 Attend to tempo, quality and volume so that the recording is leading your learning and your voice is "inside" the sound of the recording. Follow rather than lead.

 Now start turning the balance control to begin eliminating your part and hearing more and more of the other parts. If your player has no balance control, use a headset and place the earphone away from your ear.

#### **MAKE TIME YOUR FRIEND**

 Work in a time frame of 10-15 minutes at a time. Stay within your attention span time. Work at it often. Several times a day works well, but don't miss a day if you can help it.

 Recognize that your brain is working on this task unconsciously as well as unconsciously. You will notice progress between session.

 Decide to use as much time as you need. Some are faster, some slower at this skill. Take the time and be content with it. You will probably get faster at it over time.

#### OTHER OPTIONS TO CONSIDER

- Listen to small sections and memorize them one at a time.
- Use the repeat function of a CD player or Mini-disc player.
- Deal with subsequent changes to the original by understanding and accepting the reasons for the change and relating the change to the original.
- Eventually, sing your part while audiating the other parts. (Hearing them in your mind.)
- From time to time, sing with the music to give yourself a visual check.
- Cultivate patience with yourself to persist and achieve success.
   Set aside any frustrations you might feel and choose to be aware of your own progress.

**HOA BUSH LEAGUE 2002**

The "umteenth" annual HOA sponsored Bush League Quartet contest is rapidly approaching. It will be held around 8:27 p.m. on Dec. 10, at our normal meeting place—St. Peter's United Church of Christ located at 110th Street and Holmes in Kansas City, Missouri. You are encouraged to either attend or bring three other guys with you and join in the competi-

tion. Our basic rules seem to change a little bit each year, so please read on

and find the guidelines for this year.

Any non-registered quartet in the Central States District is eligible to compete. Competing quartets shall be composed of four males, no more than two of which may be from a registered quartet. You may have a third person from a registered quartet, but at least one of those in a registered quartet must sing a part different than he sings in his quartet. The fourth person may not currently be in any quartet, nor have competed in district quartet contest for a period of four years. Sound confusing? *It is.* 

The competition will consist of one song, and one tag, either a regular Society arrangement, a parody, a chorus number or other suitable arrangement. Patriotic and religious songs are not eligible (that means you may sing them but you will be disqualified). Uniforms are not required, but encouraged. We will have judging in the three standard Society categories, Music, Presentation and Singing. Quartets may sing the tag and the song in whatever order they prefer.

You are eligible to be in as many quartets as you desire, however each quartet must conform to the rules stated above. Appropriate prizes will be

awarded.

To increase participation, we will add one new competition category that will be called the "76'er" division. Rules are similar to the other quartets except that the total ages of all quartet members cannot exceed 76, and one member must be under 18 years of age. We will call this our "open division" meaning that nonmembers can comprise some or all of the quartet, (let's spread the word to our Harmony Explosion Quartets)!

Both singing divisions will be interspersed during the competition. Singing order will be assigned when you check in the night of the contest.

#### Thirty-Five Years Ago - December, 1967

Dave Larsen (many of you old-timers should remember him) submitted a full-page article describing his first year as an HOA member. Says he was brought to his first meeting as a guest of his next door neighbor, Bob Coe. He was impressed by what he heard (he had thought you had to be a member of a quartet in order to qualify for chapter membership) and joined the chapter on Sept. 16, 1966. He sang with the chorus for the first time on that year's Logopedics Spectacular. The guest quartets were the Four Rascals and the Salt Flats. What a combination that must have been! The Salt Flats appeared again on his first chapter show, along with the Four-Do-Matics (didn't they have neat names for their quartets back in those days?). He goes on to describe his administrative activity in the chapter—how his enthusiasm for barbershop rubbed off on his wife, Nancy, who joined the Indianapolis Chapter of Sweet Adelines, and even joined a quartet! Yes, barbershopping can be contagious. Hope they never develop a shot for it!

Here is how all of the HOA women can help participate:






John Stucker is shown presenting Mark Fortino (L) with the Oct. 2002 Barbershopper of the Month!

# A MESSAGE FROM SOCIETY PRESIDENT ROGER LEWIS

The Society's vision statement:

"The Society is to be an ever-growing fraternity of Barbershop-style singers, leading the cause of encouraging vocal music in our schools and communities."

The Society Board"s dedication to our vision is one of the key reasons we commissioned a study of Harmony Hall, east and west, by a Task Force. We are not a "Historic Building" restoration society, nor a preserver of old buildings. Our focus is preserving a style of music for ourselves and future generations, and sharing our art

form with our communities.

But that was not our only concern. Our wonderful old mansion is badly in need of repair. Just to repair the moisture related and mechanical problems would cost us more than a million dollars. Another \$600,000 is needed to restore it to it's former splendor. That doesn't include some needed future expenditures, such as a total rewiring of the mansion to accommodate new technology.

Even if we moved toward restoration, the house is very inefficient as an office. Only 40% of the building's square footage can be used for office space. The kitchens, pantry, hallways, beautiful stairways, bathrooms with showers, and even the living room take lots of space that cannot be used. Simply put, it's a house, not an office.

As we've grown, we've had to house our staff in separate locations-and therefore purchased our Sheridan Road property. Having staff in two locations creates management and communication problems that we would like to eliminate. Often, Darryl must feel like he manages two separate "businesses," and each has its unique culture.

Managing the day-to-day problems of the building is a diversion from our core business. Yes, one or two people take care of this. But a leak in the roof over the Old Songs Library would immediately call every staff member into service. (DELETE: like a Chinese fire drill.) If a water pipe would burst, as one did across the street in July, we would

lose priceless, irreplaceable property.

The blue ribbon Task Force that we commissioned early this year (Ed Waesche, Chair; Alan Lamson; Dan Waselchuk; Jim Warner, and John Schneider, staff liaison) presented the board with a number of options. Included were opportunities to trade both Harmony Hall and Sheridan Road properties for vacant land in the Racine, Wisconsin, area on which we could build. The board chose to list Harmony Hall (east) for sale as a first step.

Following this first giant step, a number of options will open. We can make arrangements to house the entire staff at Sheridan Road. We currently rent out a large

portion of the building to other tenants. Building added office space there is also a consideration. At that point, we can decide to continue the process; use Sheridan Road as our permanent home, or continue to search for suitable office

Concurrent with the listing of Harmony Hall, as you read in the post from HQ, we will have an architectural study done on Sheridan Road to determine the cost and space needs if we move staff there. At the same time, the Task Force will investigate other opportunities in the Wisconsin/ Texas corridor (Ed Waesche's term) that might include Dallas, Houston, St. Louis, Atlanta, Kansas City, etc.

There may be an "angel" Barbershopper or a benefactor somewhere who might offer property at a low cost to purchase or lease on a long-term basis, much the way we acquired Harmony Hall in 1957. It is simply good business on the part of the board to investigate any such opportunities.

As I'm writing this from the Sweet Adelines International Convention in Nashville, I do not have many of my hard copy notes with me, so I hope I've covered the situation as the Board sees it. I'd certainly entertain questions or input.

My thanks to the Harmony Hall Study Task Force, who presented us with a study far beyond expectations. I'm continually amazed at the depth and breadth of talent we have in the Society. A huge thanks, too, to our Society Board, who have the intestinal fortitude to make tough decisions.

Thanks to you, our members and supporters. We're beginning a new journey, aren't we?

From top to bottom: Old-time member **Maurice Smith** was in attendance. Maurice has traveled too much over the years and could not remain active


with HOA. However he hopes to return upon retirement!
