SOUNDS LIKE SOUNDS LIKE TREBLE IS GETTING READY FOR CONTEST





Sadly, we were told that the *Rural Route 4* had "no plans to continue singing beyond 1994." We know that never happened, don't we?

The May 22 show at the RLDS Auditorium that was coproduced by the St. Charles Chapter showed a profit of \$8,957.48. Not bad, but not as good as we had hoped.



This is the Barbershopping Season: international convention, followed rapidly by Harmony College and the fall contest looming around the corner. Whatta hobby!

Montreal was another exhilarating experience, and one we got to enjoy a little more since I made an uncharacteristic decision to be a little less busy at my 40th Society convention. It was Joann's 38th. (My first was 1962, in Kansas City, and her's was San Antonio in 1964).

No, there's no test later. But here are a few of the most memorable highlights from the week, which began with our arrival on Monday. The district C&J vice presidents met for a good part of Tuesday. We were joined by Society geek **Scott Hogue** about improving how contest entries, forms, etc. are handled.

That's when we learned that Scott's laptop had been stolen from his room. He was able to retrieve and/or re-create all the big screen ads that had been stored there. But he could recapture the program that was to allow the contest scores to be displayed on the big area screens at the end of each session.

My personal high for the week was singing in the lobby with two of the *Four Rascals* and *Randy Loos*; we did three of the old **Lou Perry**/Rascal arrangements, and I still hear the sounds. Later in the week, I also got a chance to sing a little bass with the three surviving Vikings, who were honored on the 50th anniversary of their 1953 championship. In case I've never told you, the biggest joy of being a member of the AIC is the heroes we get to sing and associate with.

In non-competition venues, the *Four Voices* joining the *Voices of Lee* for "All Rise" was almost as electric as it was in Nashville two years ago. A totally memorable and moving experience, providing one of those rare, unanimous, everyone-up-at-once standing ovations. Another most enjoyable performance came from our current Senior champs, the *Barons* of the Cardinal District, with old friend **Ken Buckler** on bari. And *Freestyle's* Saturday night mic testing, with *FRED*, *Four Voices* and Lord knows who-all involved, was brilliant.

The best chorus song I heard all week was St. Charles' "Kid Named Joe." Others said the same thing. The VM put an exclamation on their 10th gold with a wonderful "Puttin' on the Ritz." But Toronto's "little guy-impossible" set was worth going for. So was Greendale's GI Joe masterpiece and Cambridge doing a memorable mother-in-law parody that was the best thing BABS has ever sent over.

In the quartet competition, I thought *Power Play* led all the way after "Sunshine of Your Smile" in the first round—but *Metropolis* actually led (by 4 points) after their masterful "Afraid of the Girls/They Go Wild' in the first set. *Power Play* wrapped it up with "The Best Times I Ever Had" (about bumbling dad/bass John) and "Love at Home" in the finals. Great champs. And kind of the same appeal on stage that *12th Street Rag* exhibited in shooting up to their all-time high of 15th. Boy, was I proud to say "Yeah, I know those guys!"

Cheers made big impression with "Brother, Can You Spare a Dime?" and *Uptown Sound* was lovely on "If I Love Again." *Gotcha* again ripped Nellie, with **Jim Kline** taking up for us old-timers on the bass tag hanger that's still echoing around the Bell Centre.






