

Even as you read this, we are busy identifying a date for our first recording session for the new chorus CD. The CD project will most likely turn out to be one of the most important projects HOA has undertaken. This is a very expensive undertaking, but such an important milestone to HOA's return to the "Elite" that it deserves the best effort of the entire chapter. We are still looking for financial help on this project. I plead to the entire membership if anyone knows of ways to underwrite the cost of this project, let me know. Being the important project that it is, my budget for the year will reflect funds to support the major part. This may entail us to have a deficit budget.

The next activity on the horizon is *Singing Valentines*. All the groundwork has been done and we await the 14 or so quartets needed to sign up to support this project. We already have a valentine order from the web. The money gained from Singing Valentines will go a long way to support the CD project.

Our annual chapter show is fast approaching. All the songs to be performed on the show are available on learning media (Tape, CD). Thanks to the music team for recording all the songs and especially to **Mark Fortino** for the use of his recording facilities. I did some of the CD duplication for the basses and can attest that the quality is excellent. Please get your learning media early, learn your music early and pass your audition early so we can present the finest show ever.






TUNE IN TO IN-TUNE

This is an open letter to every member of the HOA family who ever shows up at the meeting hall—if only one time a year:

Most of you have heard me say, formerly in jest, "when we get organized, we'll publish a weekly sheet that tells you what songs we're going to sing." Since we've now had that tool for years, it's no longer amus-



ing that some folks repeatedly forget to check the schedule when they arrive. And the result often is a meeting that doesn't run as smoothly as it could.

The sheet, prepared with a lot of work by PVP **Jerry Garrard**—after consultation with numerous chapter leaders—is called *In-Tune*. It's on the table every Tuesday. If you are one of the early arrivals for a pre-meeting rehearsal or confab, you might get there before Jerry,

but go back and check later. It's always there by 6:45 or so.

Every song we plan for the chorus to sing is on there, as well as all chapter activities for the night, listed chronologically. If you take a minute to read through at least the schedule, you can be sure you have the music you'll need for the night.

Librarian **Phil Veltkamp** does a dandy job of laying out the new music, and digging up copies of older tunes. He sure should not have to come around and pass it out to those who got to the risers without it. And when that happens, look how much time is wasted. Wouldn't you rather be singing? (Say "yes.") Plus, we're too busy and active for those kind of delays.

It's also a good idea to look for the major announcements and considerable information contained in each *In-Tune*. Your attention to that will shorten the announcement section of the meeting, which we're trying to hold to no more than five minutes. A chairman or officer or planner can simply say "see the top item on the back page."

In-Tune also should be shared with your spouse so they keep up with dates, plans, events, attire, deadlines, etc. For the over-achievers, there's a section (which the Music Team is rightfully urging me to expand) about what's coming up in the following meeting or two.

So help us all out by reading and heeding the *In-Tune*. Thank you, and end of sermon.

DO YOU HAVE A CANDIDATE FOR OUR MARCH NOSLO3? by Jim Bagby

The signup sheet is out for the children's chorus that will perform with HOA on the March show. Yes, you read about it in the last *Harmonotes*.

Since "kiddy chorus" is not a very flattering term, we're gonna call this exceptional group "New Offspring Singers Limited '03."

To recap, we're looking for your (well-behaved) kids or grandchildren or relatives ages 5 through teen who can sing—especially ones who can do harmony. The group will sing "Daddy Dear," in unison, with us for one number. Then they'll do 3 parts on "Coney Island Cha-Cha," without the men; we'll ask folks like the **Mathieu** brothers, who qualify as offspring, to do the bass part.

For your planning purposes, we'll have part tapes available for the singers, especially in order to help the out-of-towners. But they must have the songs learned, we assume with your help, and be here for the first live rehearsal about 6 p.m. on Friday, March 14. The second rehearsal will be about 9 the next morning (both at the Music Hall).

NOSL03 will sing on the first half of both the afternoon and night shows. We're asking that backstage, they be accompanied by a parent/guardian/supervisor who's not a performing chorus member. Maybe you can trade off with another overseer, or we'll get some volunteers to help with the whole group.

After they sing, the young performers have four options:

- 1. They can leave;
- 2. They can return to the fourth-floor rehearsal room to play or hang out;
- 3. They can stay in that room until intermission, then join your family in regular seats out front;
- 4.At intermission (not during the show) they can go to upper balcony to occupy unused seats.

tackled every other job in the chapter.



the results of the 1992 "Bush League" quartet contest which was won by *Pitch, Pitch, Pitch*, with **Rod Rule** (tenor), **Tom Urbaniak** (lead), **Rich Huyck** (baritone) and **Don Young** (bass). With all that talent in one foursome, none of the other quartets had a chance!

Our editor also accepted the blame for getting a bit behind on the announcement of the "Barbershopper of the Month" over the preceding months. Phil Youngs was honored for his efforts as 1992 show treasurer, a position he had occupied for several years prior to that (and still may be doing it, for all we know). He always works hard at the job, but at the time was not a regular attendee at chapter meetings, so PVP Jerry Meier posed for the Harmonotes picture and later delivered the certificate to Phil. Other recipients of the BOTM award were John McConnell, who each year has applied his talent and experience as a mortician to the job of making up our chorus members for our show and contest performances; Gordon Coleman, who chaired the "Entertainment '93" coupon book sale, and Dave Upp, who accepted one of the most thankless jobs—chair of our first ever HOA Christmas Show. Our editor averred that, "Dave should have got an award for agreeing to take the job in the first place!"

Twenty Years Ago - March, 1983

1973 chapter president **Al Moritz** announced "something new"—an invitation to individual members to send "open letters" to *Harmonotes* (editor, **Joe Costigan**) about "goings-on, policy, or anything else relative your chapter that you think is important." Those of you who knew **Warren Edmonds** will not be surprised to know that his was the first letter to be published and occupies the last two full pages in the March 1973 issue. Warren was, at one time, editor of *Harmonotes*. We won't try to provide you with the gist of his letter—it's too lengthy. But you may be assured that Warren had the best interests of his chapter at heart. (*Continued on page 7* ∞)

Thirty-Five Years Ago -February, 1968

You old-timers may recall that this was the year that the threat of a strike, among the employees of the headquarters hotel in Pittsburgh, forced the international board of directors to change the dates and the location of the 1968 international convention to Cincinnati. I believe the St. Joseph chorus, then known as the *Pony Expressmen*, was the CSD representative that year. (I believe that was the year they shut off the air-conditioning in the auditorium while the choruses were performing because the noise bothered the judges. Am I right?)

Harmonizer editor **Don Thorne** reported on the passing of **Joe Stern**, founder and charter member of the Kansas City Chapter of SPEBSQSA and music director of the *Heart of America Chorus* almost from its inception until 1954. Joe also served as Society secretary/treasurer of SPEBSQSA from 1941 to 1942 and conceived the idea of an official publication, the first mimeographed issue of which was published in November of 1941. Joe's name appeared as "editor, publisher and officer boy." An extremely talented barbershopper, Joe was the composer of "Kansas City My Home Town," which was adopted in 1950 as the official song of Kansas City.

Fifty Years Ago - February, 1953

The Kansas City Chapter was meeting on alternate Monday evenings in the English Room of the Hotel Phillips. Harmonotes editor Austin Thames described the meeting of January 26 with some 80 barbershoppers, including members from the Independence and Kansas City, Kansas, Chapters. LaVerne Cable was the HOA Chorus director. Quartets on the program (it was that kind of meeting) included the Gamboliers, then current Central States champions, with new tenor, Owen Fuller; the Chordialaires (members not named) the Hy-Powers, with members Saglimber, McPherson, Phelps, and Turner; and the Rudy Fick Royalaires, with bass Bob Fraser singing for the last time before departing for a new job in Chicago. There was also a group called *The Four Tones*, with J. Stern, J. Poindexter, P. Francks and A. Piano. Figure that one out, if you can.

Also on hand at the January 26 meeting as a "special guest of honor was a fellow **Perry Payton**, who was welcomed "with hearty applause and pleasing smiles." Anybody remember him? If you do, let me know. We have e-mail access now at jedexter@mailstation.com.

There was an item to the effect that "Barney Wasson, a young old member returned from service in the Field Artillery." I also found this: "Did you notice the brand of cigarettes given to the chapter last meetings?" There must be a story there somewhere. Oh, where is Frank Leone when I need him!

There is a great deal of talent available to us in our Society and we're going to take advantage of it. Our first coaching session of the



We're in the final stages of setting a schedule with SINGING coach **Bill Biffle** for 2003. In addition to the Retreat, Bill will be coming to Kansas City on five other occasions. The first of those visits is scheduled for Thursday, Feb. 27, which is one of our extra show rehearsals. We have visits planned for April, June, August, September (Retreat) and November.







Those guys are so good they make whoever sings with them sound better than usual. You can relax and just sing your part, no need to worry if they will get their parts right.


There is something special about an overtone you create with these guys. So do not be so bashful
