As one of the originators of the Ozzie, whatta thrill it was to see **Mark Fortino** receive the music award. As awards chairman **Bruce Wenner** noted, this honor is so special it's not bestowed every year. And for his countless, dedicated hours of work to make "From the Heart" a reality, Mark was truly deserving—aside from all the many things he does for our chapter.

But I suspect the music team would agree that other than **John Stucker** and **Dan Israel**, no one was more responsible than Mark for birthing our first HOA CD. At the same time, we owe a great debt to **Vince Perry, Dale**

Neuman and the music team under the continued leadership of **Keith Schweer** for making the project such a success.

It's also a pleasure to congratulate another key member of the team, **Jerry Garrard**, for taking home the John Cross Award (pretty elite group preceding him!) and **Al Higgins** for his well-deserved choice as Barbershopper of the Year.

If I sound wound tighter than usual, it's because we've just completed lining up the clothespins for a March show chorus of 82 members. By the next *Harmonotes*, it's inevitable that some of those signees will not have qualified, or been attrition victims for other reasons. But that's such a major jump in numbers from where we were a year ago, I have to be gratified and encouraged that we'll again put 90 on stage before long. Do I hear 100?

In addition, a conservative estimate is that there are a dozen more members unable to be on the March show whom we expect to join the Louisville competition group. And that does not count any new members we bring in between now and the start of Louisville preparations—which will be in full swing by early April. Take at look at Keith's article for some of the coaching and scheduling already planned.

Speaking of planning, don't forget we have, tentatively, extra show rehearsals set for Feb. 19, 26 and March 4 (all Thursdays), plus the tech rehearsal at the Music Hall on Friday, March 12. And under our new 2004 attendance policy, every member is expected to make every meeting/rehearsal unless you've told your section leader in advance why you can't be there. Call that common courtesy, as well as dedication...

Speaking of the new lineup, it includes five of the aforementioned Fortino clan. It's the first time, as far as I know, that HOA has had five members of one family in the chorus. And with the addition of grandpa/papa **Ron**, along with **John** back active and bringing son **Jonathan** (joining **Mark** and offspring **Anthony**), it's the first time for three generations in the chapter since **Walter**, **Calvin**, **Willard** and **Wes Yoder** sang with us in the mid-1980s. That IS something to celebrate.

Speaking of Yoders, Calvin and Willard plan to be with us in Louisville. Remind them of that when you see 'em with the *RR4* on the March show.

Finally, it's gratifying to see the initial response to the tape-and-improve-on-your-own program. Our progress and success are, first and foremost, individual responsibility. And if you'd like an exercise that will really help your vocal and tonal center skills, sing along with the learning quartet on "Auld Lang Syne." Match their attention to pitch and intervals—always open and on top of every note, with resonance, freedom and quality. They start in G and they finish smack-dab in A-flat, which is what we must do to pound (as **Joe Connelly** would say) that marvelous tag.

So sing AND listen. We're gonna' do a lot of pounding this year.

SALVATION ARMY BELLRINGING 2003

Our Bellringing campaign for 2003 proved to be the best one yet for the Heart of America Chorus. Much like the old phrase that says, "give until it feels good," this year we "Rang until we felt great!" The extra efforts by some of our members, and the overall effort at our Metro North performances are to be applauded. I would like to single out some of those efforts.


The Bellringing Advisory Council, of which I am in the 13th year of a 3-year term, historically rings bells on the day after Thanksgiving at two Wal-Marts. Being out of town this year, I was replaced by **Jim Bagby, Gordy Coleman, Jim Davis** and **Dale Neuman**, who each volunteered for a two-hour shift. Thank you all for going the extra mile.

Then the *Gentlemen of Note* donated fees from performances they did during December. Their generosity alone amounted almost \$500 in donations to get the ball rolling. It's amazing that in addition to all the time donated by those guys, they also just sign over their performance fees. They also spent over a half-day at the *Mike Murphy* Radio Days promotion at KC Masterpiece.

Next we had our chorus MetroNorth performance on Dec. 20. We had a good turnout, and a vast majority of the members stayed for all six performances. It is a test of our endurance, but proves rewarding in many ways. On Tuesday, Dec. 23, I asked if anyone would be interested in singing and ringing, since it was our regular meeting night but there was no official meeting. Rob Mathieu, Dick Irwin and Dick Korek joined yours truly for over two hours of singing and ringing at Wal-Mart on 75th and I-35. Donations were great that night, as the closer to Christmas, the higher the generosity gets. Still being in the spirit, and getting excited about hitting our quota, I took my equipment out of my trunk and rang at a Hy-Vee on 69 highway and 119th Street on Christmas Eve day for about three and a half hours

When we got our sub-total, we were still about \$113 short of our goal as of the meeting on Jan. 6. **Jim Bagby** said to me, "pass the bucket, we'll get that shortfall." So we passed a cardboard box down the risers and collected another \$196, which was rounded up to \$200.

In 2003 we raised \$3,566.55 total. This year we raised \$3,450.91 at MetroNorth, \$213.89 at Wal-Mart, \$338.90 at Hy-Vee, \$200 by passing the bucket at our meeting, and various other member's checks, plus matching gifts from some checks brings our 2003 sub-total to \$4,649.70. I believe at MetroNorth I stated a goal of \$4,700. Truly a great effort by all involved. Over \$600 more than we have ever collected. We should win a "Grand Award," which is a brass bell for \$1,000 over the previous year. The effort is commendable and a huge thanks to all for that effort.







understand that we have 82 (including **Jim**) signed up for the March show. That's terrific. We may lose a couple before the show, but that's still a nice increase over last year. Hopefully, we can continue to build on that for Louisville and beyond.

We are still working on our coaching schedule for 2004. Here's what we have so far:

March 2 – Bill Biffle to continue singing improvement program

March 16 or 23 - Rosemary Calderon to give us

our staging package for Look Me Up When You're in Dixie

One Tuesday in April - David Wright or Dwain Brobst

May 8 (Saturday) – Don Kahl returns home for an all-day singing coaching session

Tuesday in June – Bill Biffle Tuesday or Saturday in June – Dwain Brobst

As you can see, this is a work in progress, but we want to do all we can to improve our singing and performance skills as we approach that Saturday in July when HOA returns to the International contest stage in Louisville.

Recently, at the suggestion of singing coach, **Bill Biffle**, we have instituted a "self-coaching" program for the chorus. The idea is that each member records himself singing, either at home or with the chorus. Then, at home, you listen to and critique yourself. Following is a partial list of things you might listen for:

- Pleasant, resonant, supported tone
- · Consistency of tone quality as vowel or pitch changes
- Continuity of sound (singing all the word sounds and singing to the ends of the phrases)
- · Overdoing diphthongs
- · Singing in tune (not sharp or flat)
- · Singing in a way that blends in with the rest of the chorus
- · Singing correct vowel sounds that match with the rest of the chorus
- Accurate, on-time attacks
- · Basically, are you singing your best?

Being sure to use a decent quality tape, not holding your recorder too close or too far away, being sure your battery is fresh are all things that can help assure a good self evaluation.

If every member of the chorus will participate and conscientiously work to improve his individual singing skills, the results could be amazing. If you have any questions or are not sure how to go about coaching yourself, please talk to one of our directors, your section leader or anyone else on the Music Team. We want to help you sing your best, because it is only through individual improvement that we will realize overall improvement for the chorus.

The 2004 HOA Board met for the first time on Jan. 12. Officers present were Marty Oldehoeft-President, Steve Caruthers-Executive VP, Charles Ramirez-Treasurer, Dick Korek-Marketing VP, Keith Schweer-Music VP, Ken Neujahr-Membership VP, Chuck Ames-Operations VP and John Winfiel-Secretary.

Board Members At Large present were Thom Tisdall, Dick Irwin-Immediate Past

President, Bob Howard and Rich Huyck.

Music VP **Keith Schweer** reported that he is still working on the coaching schedule for 2004. **Bill Biffle** is confirmed for March 2. He hopes to have **Rosemary Calderon** here on March 16 to teach the new staging package for "Look Me Up When You're In Dixie." Keith reported we would have a "Self Coaching" demonstration on Jan. 13. He

also reported that extra rehearsals are scheduled for Feb. 19 and 26, as well as March 4. The deadline to turn in qualification tapes is Feb. 19 and the qualification deadline is Feb. 26. The music team is asking that every singer attend every rehearsal. When someone has to miss, they would like that person to call his section leader in advance.

BEWARE THE EFFECTS OF WINTER DRYNESS ON YOUR VOICE

WELCOME TO THE WINTER OF 2004!

January-February are historically the coldest months of the year in the northern hemisphere. To survive and be comfortable we heat the spaces we occupy. This obviously is necessary, but there is a downside. Warm ambient air can hold more moisture than cold air, so when cold air is heated without adding more water vapor, the relative humidity decreases and the resultant dryness makes an impact on our respiratory system.

YOUR NOSE AND THROAT are passageways for air to go to and from your lungs. Air rushes in through these passageways delivering oxygen. Then air is blown out, which caries away the carbon dioxide that the body needs to get rid of. These channels serve two other important functions: they filter and moisturize air. Tiny hairs in the nostrils help sweep out foreign particles and prevent their entry into internal

organs. The mucus
lining the walls of
the nostrils and
the throat traps
and collects the
rejected filteredout material.
When you inhale
air that may
contain smoke,
dust or
other

pollutants and also is very dry, the challenge to the nose and throat is intensified. The passageways, more precisely the mucosal cover lining them. serve to moisturize incoming air. The flowing air picks up moisture from the mucus by evaporation. The good news: cells in the lungs work better if they receive air with optimal relative humidity. If the mucosal cover is moist, the passageways can accomplish the task. The not-so-good news: if this cover isn't moist enough, air rushing through further dries out the coating in the nose and throat, leaving it more viscous or thicker. The residual mucosal material will not flow over the underlying membranes and keep them moist. Dry passageways not only are uncomfortable; they also function less effectively.

WHEN YOU VOCALIZE, i.e. you make any sound, outgoing air goes through the larynx or the vocal apparatus (what we used to call the vocal cords). If the air is dry, it picks up moisture from the surface of the larynx. This loss of moisture is NOT good because the sensitive membranes dry out. You feel the discomfort and because a dry membrane doesn't vibrate like a moist one, the vocal quality is distorted and the voice sounds boarse

A protective coating lining all these passagewaysnose, throat and larynx-crucial to comfort, vocal quality, and good health.

Some knowledgeable vocal experts believe pathogens love compromised surfaces such as a dry passageway. Bacteria that cause respiratory infections find such places quite hospitable and the surfaces of their structures, especially Streptococcus, are such that they adhere, almost like Velcro, to anyplace they can attach themselves to. Some bacteria have become increasingly resistant to antibiotic therapy and can present a treatment challenge to physicians. It's not possible to avoid these micro-organisms altogether because they are so pervasive. But they are harmless unless they thrive and invade body organs and systems.

A healthy passageway is lined with a moist

mucosal coating, a physical barrier that helps prevent pathogens from gaining a foothold: the surface is smooth and "bugs" find themselves on a slippery slope. They can't stick around and multiply. There is no absolute way to avoid respiratory infections, but spraying supplemental moisture and lubrication does supplement and "repair" the physical barrier and will reduce the body's vulnerability. A couple of analogous situations where an efficient coating or barrier protects a vulnerable surface: A silicone cream rubbed onto the hands protects the skin from caustic substances. Sometimes water is the enemy. A garden tool, e.g. a shovel blade that has been cleaned and coated with a film of oil, resists corrosion because the oil forms a barrier that keeps air and water away from direct contact with the metal so it doesn't oxidize or rust.

WHEN IT'S COLD, heating and circulating air reduces its moisture content. In hot weather, air conditioners lower the humidity. So the air we breathe, much of the time, is drier than what our bodies would prefer. Some of us may not notice, but most people can discern dryness within closed areas such as bedrooms and offices. Airplane cabins are classic.

Dry air can compromise comfort, vocal quality and vulnerability to illness. When nasal, throat and vocal apparatus tissues dry out, the nostrils and throat get an uncomfortable scratchy / itchy feeling and, because dried out membranes in the larynx do not vibrate like moist ones, the voice sounds hoarse. We sometimes call hoarseness, or any impaired vocal quality, "laryngitis," descriptive perhaps, but not necessarily a correct diagnostic term because laryngitis

literally means an inflammation in the

larynx.

The real world is filled with factors that can negatively impact our throat comfort and vocal quality. The environmental air we breathe, in large measure, is beyond our control. To some degree we can add moisture with humidifiers and we can filter out some of the undesirable elements, but we can't spend all of our hours in confined areas that are engineered to our specifications.


We can choose to limit vocalizing, but most of us have jobs which involve using our voice. We can learn proper technique and we can avoid abusing our voice by not shouting, speaking or singing longer or more aggressively than we should. MOST IMPORTANT, WE CAN DRINK PLENTY OF FLUIDS SO OUR BODIES ARE KEPT SYSTEMICALLY HYDRATED. Adequate fluid intake is good for many parts of the body and for many reasons.

Many things can cause a vocal problem; dryness possibly is one of the easier ones to remedy. However, if hydration methods do not produce results in a few days or if there are signs of infection, a physician should be consulted.

Sometimes, no matter what we do, the accumulation of "vocal stressors" such as dry air, smoke, dust and extended vocalizing produces discomfort and impaired vocal quality. When exposed to these situations, the body simply is unable to keep up with the increased demand for additional moisture and lubrication. The result is we become uncomfortable and we are hindered in our ability to do what we must do or want to

do. Supplemental moisture can be very helpful.
