

NOTES FROM IRAQ

Dear Friends and family,

All is well, now into my 2nd month. I suppose I've gotten into a routine,

and that's good.

Life is pretty basic here. A typical day starts about 0600 with a short hike out to the portolet before physical training (PT). For PT, I usually just go for a walk or jog. The gym is small and extremely crowded, so I tend to avoid it. When I get back, a quick shower and change and it's off to breakfast. I get to work at the palace around 0800 and start working on whatever is on my desk for the day. Lunch is around 1300 or so, followed by a walk around the palace grounds for 30 minutes or so. The afternoon is more of the same back in the office. On certain days we have staff meetings where we update the staff on our projects. At 1600 or so I call home because it's about 0700 in Kansas, right about when everyone is getting up for school.

We go to dinner chow around 1800 and either call it a day afterwards or go back to finish up important issues that needed to be done by the close of business. Most nights we're out by 2000. Then it's a 1-mile hike through the rocks and mud back to the hooch where I get ready for bed. I'll either watch a movie, do a crossword, or read a little, and then lights

out.

There's not much variation with that except on Sunday morning when we go to church before lunch, and on Mondays and Fridays when I go to chorus rehearsal. Also, on Saturday nights, we watch a DVD, eat pizza, and drink non-alcoholic beer as a group up in the office. It's pretty fun and relaxed.

As I mentioned, there is a men's singing group called the "Hard Corps Chorale," that has been together for about a year. There are between 20-30 men actively participating right now. It all started with a group of guys learning some Christmas songs for a Christmas party. They did a great job, so they decided to continue getting together twice a week to sing.

Over the past year, they've sung at promotion ceremonies and other festive occasions. I first heard them sing the National Anthem at the Transfer of Authority (TOA) Ceremony and they were great. Their director is leaving in a month and I will be their new director. It's a lot of fun, definitely the most fun I have all week. In addition to learning some traditional a capella music, I'm teaching the group some barbershop tags. Everyone seems to like the barbershop a whole lot more than the traditional stuff, so when I take over I'll likely change the repertoire around accordingly.

Occasionally we have visitors to the base camp. A couple weeks ago, a few senators and members of congress stopped by to say hello. I'm actually impressed that they would come all the way out here to see us.

Anyway, that's it for now. I miss you all, take care. ♥

It just proves my theory that the #1 recruiting tools are singing well, having fun, and setting yourself up so the best singers can find you and will want to sing with you.







TEN YEARS AGO: APRIL, 1995:

This issue of Harmonotes is full of reports of near calamities that nearly side-tracked the performance of the 1995 HOA annual shows, plus stories of how the valiant HOA show committee and chapter members themselves pulled together to produce another annual show that chapter President Dale Neuman and Show Chairman Jim Davis were in agreement was a gratifying success. although Jim acknowl-

edged that poor ticket sales would affect the bottom line for the show. The first crisis arrived in December, when the appointed show chairman revealed that job conflicts would prevent him from finding the time and energy necessary to do an effective job. So Dale called upon Past Chapter and past show chairman Jim Davis to take over the chairing of the show committee. Jim was able to count on the fact that many of the key committee assignments were already in the experienced hands of members who had performed the jobs very capably in the past.

Then, on Feb. 16, what could easily have side-tracked the oncoming show completely occurred unexpectedly when our music director, Jim Bagby, had to undergo quadruple bypass surgery, which was expected to put him out of commission for several weeks. But according to Dale, "But he wouldn't let us see it that way and was back coaching less than three weeks from the day of his by-pass surgery." Fortunately, as often occurs with HOA with its abundance of musical talent, there were four experienced chorus directors-David Krause, Darrell McCune, John Forting and **Don Newman**—who, with only a month's notice, were able to step, as Jim so aptly described it, "so magnificently into the directing role." By the way, Jim was able to occupy a front seat during the matinee and provided a valuable critique of the performance, especially as it was affected by poor sound conditions in the Music Hall.

But wait, there's more. And this involved the actual performance of the musical groups that participated in the program. On Friday afternoon, the day before the show, as Dale describes it, "**John (Warrior**, our perennial technical advisor, who's always there to play a critical role in the show production—Ed) was informed that the computerized light

board had 'blown up' and was inoperative, meaning he would have to rework his cues and do most of the raising and lowering of the lights by hand. I (we) owe a lot to John, and although work and family commitments don't allow him to sing with us as he would like to do, he still manages the show and then does his job so well, we hardly know he's there."

As I write this—on Tuesday afternoon prior to the weekend show—I'm hoping that, with the splendid show you guys have put together this year, it'll come off without a hitch. Thank that's too much to ask? We'll see. I'll be there for the matinee performance.

TWENTY YEARS AGO: APRIL/MAY, 1980

In an anonymous article (probably written by Editor Joe **Costigan**), there is an announcement that the Central States District's 1980 "Barbershopper of the Year" Award had been presented to our own **Ron Abel** at the recent spring district convention. The article goes on to reveal that "Ron has been in our chapter for 18 years and a member of the Society for 22 years. He started barbershopping in Des Moines, where he sang with the Jax of Harmony (district champions in 1972-Ed). After he moved to Kansas City, he continued quartet singing with several foursomes including the Suburban-Notes. He has served the chapter, the Missouri Division, and the district in several official positions. He was the Kansas City BOTY in 1975, and continues to serve on key committees as well as keeping us 'pitched' right at every performance." Now, if my fifth grade arithmetic doesn't fail me, Ron has been an HOA member of 43 years, and with the Society for 47 years. Wonder how many other HOA roster members can beat that mark.

FIFTY YEARS AGO: JUNE, 1955

The closest I could get to the May 1955 issue of *Harmonotes* was the June edition, and I didn't find much of great importance, but here are a few tidbits that you might find interesting.

It appears that the *Harmonotes* editor fifty years ago at this time was the late **Bob Gall**, who also happened to be the chapter secretary. Assuming he wrote the following article—there's no byline—Bob announced that the guest quartets for their 1956 show would be the *Confederates*, who went on to win the gold at the international contest in Memphis, TN, the following summer; the *Big Four*, who are not further identified; and the *Hawkeye Four*, who later became the 1955 CSD quartet champions. I can recall seeing and hearing the *Confederates* on a Kansas City chapter show back in the 60s.

Member **John Goldsberry** brought four young lads, who called themselves the *Gloom Chasers* and who were students at Kansas City Junior College (wonder what they call it now). The boys' names were **Ross Arnold, Jim Evans, Ralph Sheets,** and **Ronald Turner**. Anybody recognize any of those names? Wonder if any of them every joined HOA?

At the recent Past Presidents' Dinner, **Milt Grafrath** described his visit to the chapter in Hawaii. He reported that the chapter president was an Hawaiian, and the chorus director was Chinese. Milt commented that the membership of that chapter experienced frequent membership turnover because of so many members who were U. S. servicemen.

And apparently **Bob Gall** didn't really enjoy putting out the bulletin all by himself. On the next to the last page of the June 1955 issue is an announcement of action taken by the chapter board of directors: "Editorship of *Harmonotes*, so capably handled in the past by **John Westbrook** and staff, will be assumed by the entire Chapter Bulletin and Roster Committees as a group: **Bob Gall, Mike Michel, Bill Hamm, Dan Jacobson,** and **Ed Eichman**. An editor-in-chief will not be designated at this time. **Dan Jacobson**, however, will function as production manager, while less experienced staff members are learning the ropes." Why do I sense that there's more than meets the eye here? Can anyone shed any light on this matter?

KEVIN TRITSCH WINS THE HARMONY FOUNDATION RAFFLE by Jim Porter

It was our first Thursday practice before the spring show, and the men must have sensed something as they showed unusually high interest in the drawing, only a week after **Ron Abel** claimed the latest \$1,000+ jackpot. There was not much in the jackpot, and all the marbles were in the bag, but this did not deter **Kevin Tritsch**, one of the many fine young singers who have joined *HOA* in the past few years. He defied odds of about 300 to 1 and plucked the white marble out of the bag. Kevin's prize of \$54 was a modest one, but he was all smiles as he won in just his second chance to draw a marble since joining the chorus.

There is still time to have another big winner before International. It could be YOU!




