



REFLECTIONS of "REFLECTIONS"

Backstage Saturday morning at the Music Hall, I've finally found my way to the myriad of dressing rooms with others who knew exactly where they were

going and what lay ahead for them. Me, I didn't have a clue. Although I thought I had some notion of what would be happening since I'd printed the information sheet containing the day's schedule, I really didn't have a clue. Others calmly arrived and went about hanging their clothes on the overhead sprinkler pipes. It was only moments before a cribbage game popped out of nowhere. I was concerned about doing everything right and on time (and according to my wife, by the rules), and here was this card game in a corner aisle. Someone else was calmly reading a novel, others working crossword puzzles. I'm nervous. Where is the make-up room and will I get there at the right time for row 4? Do I dress first or get made-up first? How should the bright red hanky be folded? Am I mentally prepared? Of course what I was experiencing is normal for a new guy, I'm sure. From my instrumentalist competition years in high school and college I thought I knew exactly what I was in for, as I tried to fit into the slow-motion activities of the morning. There was confidence, perhaps some anxiety, certainly experience. But there seemed to be something else. Then suddenly it was time. Warm up.

What is this guy getting me into? I'm invited with others to visit the *HOA Chorus* a couple of times. He convinces me to attend a Christmas Show and a couple of Annual Shows, which were absolutely terrific. I think I was a

After all, I was used to the more laid back, twice-a-year-funloving-antics of the Cardio-Jams that head arm waver formed several years ago where we "work out" together. Then after many months of temptation, wavering, and "Oh, Boy's," it was too late. Someone cashed my check and I was warmly welcomed as one. Jim **Bagby** had "bagged" me as a new HOA member. Then came the challenge of learning the words, music, correct breathing, word sounds, pitch, resonance, "on the breath," focus, lift

As I'm in a smiling forward-poised position waiting for the curtain to open, full of excitement, uncertainty, hope, nervousness and just hoping the heck I don't mess up, I think of last night. Friday night was the technical run-through. It was a time for last minute performance brush-up and working out lighting and sound issues. Making sure all the signs worked right for "Dixie," and that Elvis was properly clothed. It was as I found, also a time for sharing. Everyone was thanking everyone. Pretty normal, don't you think? What wasn't normal is what happened next. There was a deep personal sharing from a number of directors and program members. A very emotional sharing of their feelings relating to song choice, our performance feedback to those emotions, cooperation of efforts and meaningfulness to ones' individual needs to give and receive. Not a sound. Not a dry eye. How can I not give all? How can I not live up to that expectation? What if I don't? I have felt it almost weekly before, but it is really now, tonight that I know, understand and appreciate the total love and commitment to excellence that everyone has to this...hobby; from the directors, to the section leaders, to everyone on the board and staff, to those on each side of and front

to back of me in this HOA Chorus.

The cribbage table is cluttered and vacant. The curtain goes up and the next thing I know is that it's time for the intermission. The performance was a blur. The crowd seemed pleased. The adrenaline is still pumping and I'm wondering how we did. How I did. Before we mounted the risers, all were gathered for one last warm-up, one last refresher of difficult parts, one last act of confidence in us as a performing group. There was time for recognition. There was time for the concern of a missing member due to sudden illness. There was time for prayer. Then there was time for those in front of the curtain. The reason we were here; the family members, friends, guests and everyone we were here to share that intimate Friday night experience with. And the missing nights from home, proving that we really are having fun and deeply want to share the end result with all. And let's not forget, each

Intermission seems to drag on for a lifetime. We would rather be on the risers, for sure. The TV in the Green Room is hovered around in an attempt to catch some of the guest quartets. It's noisy from the ringing hallways, there aren't enough chairs, and we can see and hear just enough to wish we were out front to catch it all live. But adrenaline or no adrenaline, it's time to get off my feet for a few minutes. The cribbage table is alive again. Another chapter read. Another puzzle solved. Then, finally, we are under the lights once more. For those who have performed before in the chorus, you already know. But for me, I wasn't expecting the emotion of the moment as it happened. When the tears well up, the lump in the throat grows too large to swallow and you have difficulty concentrating on the head arm waver directing Auld Lang Syne, then I wonder. After all, we sing it each New Year's Eve and most recently many times each week. Then comes America The Beautiful. Need I say more? Now the show is over. All over. Now I know. How good can a new guy feel? A new guy can feel like it's too soon to dismount the risers. There is still so much more to sing. A new guy can learn that he perhaps never really "listened" to the words and meaning of a song before. A new guy can feel like we did what we came here to do; have a good time and make a whole lot of others feel the same way. A new guy can feel like the program selection for tonight was absolutely perfect and related to the audience well. I think a prayer was answered. I think a new guy thinks it's okay to cry.

My reflections? You know what they are. The same as each and every one of you have experienced: satisfaction, gladness, accomplishment, you name it. That feeling of something else I saw Saturday morning while wondering around the dressing room. What we all experienced Friday night and Saturday just before each curtain opening; one of unity in purpose, one of love of song, one of love of life; one of something we made happen during the short time the curtain was up with expectant beaming faces looking into ours. I don't know how I did. I do know how we did. The cribbage table is now cluttered and vacant. The book isn't finished. The puzzles aren't all solved. But, I know what we did. We,...Will Never Pass This Way Again. ♥

work with **Ron McIntire** to make sure that what was on the web site information would transfer into Ron's database.


Phil Veltkamp - providing the printer, scanner, paper and other supplies for the headquarters hotel.





20 More Reasons To Sing In A Quartet taken from LiveWire!

What I've learned about quartet singing through the years...

- 1. It's fun.
- 2. You have total responsibility for your part, not the responsibility for the other guys in the chorus section.
- 3. You can really ring chords! Yes, choruses can produce overtones, but not the lock and ring of a quartet.
- 4. You don't have to go through a board of directors or a music committee to decide what you're going to sing.
- 5. You don't have to go through a board of directors or a music committee to decide for whom you're going to sing
- 6. You don't have to go through a board of directors or a music committee for any other darn thing, like moves and such.
- 7. Yet, if you get good, the chapter will ask you to sing on the show.
- 8. If you're good enough to sing on the show, your family and friends will be more adoring than if you simply sang in the chorus.
- 9. Your section has unison sound!:)
- 10. You don't have to watch a chorus director.
- 11. You don't have to pander to a chorus director, or look to him or her for inspiration, and all the other things choruses must do with chorus directors.
- 12. You learn more about blend and balance from playing a tape recording of your quartet than you could ever from a chorus director.
- 13. If you also are a member of a chorus, then you make the chorus better for having learned to sing in a quartet.
- 14. You don't have to be a member of a chorus if that's vour preference.
- 15. You'll be popular with the Singing Valentines Chairman.
- 16. You'll sing Valentines very well.
- 17. Resolving decisions about when, where and what the quartet will sing only requires convincing the tenor. :)

- 19. You get to choose your quartet costume. (After convincing the tenor, of course.)
- 20. You get three really good friends.

That's only 20. My quartet-preferable friends on the harmonet will probably add several. And my chorus-preferable friends will probably castigate. Well, so let it be.

Recognize This Formula? P = P - I by Jim Bagby, HOA Director



One of the Presentation Category coaching formulas is: P equals P minus I.

I could walk around the block and let you ponder what those might stand for, if you have not encountered it before, or we could just save some time: *Performance equals Preparation minus Interference*. In other words, the end product is a reflection of how hard you worked and polished, less what nerves, distractions, technical difficulties or outside forces (on either side of the stage) got in the way.

I suggest a successful show is decided in a similar fashion. The audience, which is the only criteria that really matters, wakes up the following day and weighs the total enjoyment of a performance by how the highlights compared with the lowlights.

SO: on March 25th, how good was the headliner? How good was the chorus? Song selection? How about the emcee(s)? Chapter quartets? Novelty acts? Sound system? Lighting? Pacing? Length? Staging? If any of those were not up to par, were they distracting enough to affect the final grade? If you listen to the post-mortems in the past couple of dozen years or more, the only review from our MEMBERS is always: "best show ever." We've generally passed any semblance of objectivity, and the reason is probably easy to discern—we only listen to families and friends who attend the show. When was the last time they rushed out to the lobby, or phoned the next day to tell you "Wow, Bill, whatta rotten show!" (OK, maybe a wife will give us an honest evaluation in private).

Well, I obviously can't claim to be totally objective, either. But I think I can look at our original P=P-I formula, as a PRES judge and 35-year *HOA* show participant, and at least be honest about the key components.


Gotcha! gets a solid A as headliner, and are great guys to boot; hard combination to beat. All our chapter quartets were solid, and most improved on the night show. 12th Street could have,

of course, headlined. Tone-Henge got a great reception (we won't talk about the afterglo). I've already said I think the chorus has never sung better on a show. Period. Can we perform better? Yes, and we will. The variety of songs was huge (Mike Neff can brag about "Happy Together" for years). We could have used an easy beat for the 2nd song and I didn't have one. The show pacing was the best in my memory, particularly at night, so obviously the chapter spokesmen did their jobs well—which really makes me happy! The show ran almost 2:30, and 2:20 would be better, but...We got mostly great reviews on the sound system, which is tough to do in the Music Hall. By the night show, the lighting and tech went very well. The junior high and senior high quartets were smash hits. Add all that up and there's minis-

Add all that up and there's miniscule "I" to subtract from "P" or from success. So I could not, grading as objectively as possible, give the show less than an A for entertainment value.

So my thanks to all the 91 *HOA* members who were on stage by the rousing finale. And read the article in this issue by Show Chairman **Jerry Garrard** to see who gets the rest of the credit.

A LOOK PAST IN HARMONOTES

TEN YEARS AGO: APRIL, 1996:

There's a large picture on page 3 of the April 1996 Harmonotes of almost all of the people who participated in the near record setting third annual "Singing Valentines" campaign. I can count 49 individuals. but Coordinator **Monty Duerksen**, who refers to himself as the "Immediate Past Cupid Impersonator," reports in a separate article that the entire group, which



fielded 17 quartets, consisted of 12 tenors, 11 leads, 12 baritones, 14 basses, five headquarters people, and six drivers. The photo caption revealed that 339 "Singing Valentines" were delivered, resulting in gross revenue of \$13,540.08 and a net profit of \$10,591.52. Wouldn't it be something if we could make quartets and operating personnel available to sell "Singing Valentines" on each of the 365 days out of the year? Whoeeee!

This issue of *Harmonotes* is replete with favorable comments for what must have been an incredibly successful annual show. Even your editor reported that a quick check of the audience from where he sat in the orchestra seats just before the curtain went up revealed only a few single empty seats. Chapter President **Don** Young congratulated Show Chairman Mike Schumach**er** and his committee for a performance that returned a profit that was roughly \$5,000 greater than was expected. And Music Director **Jim Bagby** referred to the show as "a landmark performance," although he threw in a quote by John Wooden, "arguably the most successful coach in college basketball history," who cautioned his players, "Don't measure yourself by what you have accomplished, but by what you should have accomplished with your ability," and went on to suggest "we treat the 1996 show as a stepping stone---and keep stepping." Lastly, Show Chairman Mike Schumacher had this to say, "Under the guidance of our wonderful music team---Director Jim Bagby, Assistant Directors Darrel McCune, and **Raymond Schwarzkopf**, and special guest directors Dan Henry, Steve Leone, and David Krause---our chorus proved that we're definitely capable of great things."

TWENTY YEARS AGO: APRIL, 1986

Rather than dig my April 1986 issue out of my Harmonotes collection, I thought I'd repeat an item we had included in the "Ten Years Ago" segment of the "Look at the Past" column in the April 1996 issue. This ought to be of interest to you members who joined the chapter during the past 20 years.

Marv Faulwell was the chairman of the show committee for the 1986 extravaganza, and *The New Tradition* was our headliner quartet. Here's how we described a near disaster while the program was in progress: "We seem to recall that that was the time when our guest quartet, *The New Tradition*, insisted on arriving on Saturday morning rather than the day before our show, but didn't show up until after the matinee curtain had gone up! (They had changed into their Marx Brothers costumes on the plane enroute from California.) This entailed a last-minute revision of the program (our three chapter quartets, the *K.C. Connection, Special Touch*, and the *RR-4*, had to stretch their performances by as much as 20 minutes...) so as to keep things going until the headliner could go on."

When we asked **Rich Huyck** for elaboration on his remark about the "longest show," he responded with the following:

"I dug out a video of the 1986 show. At 2:05 p.m. on that day, **Steve Leone** announced to the audience that *The New Tradition* quartet was delayed because of equipment problems with the airline. Steve said that they were expected to be at the Music Hall in time to appear on stage a little after 4 p.m. *The K.C. Connection* was called upon to fill a 20-minute slot prior to the intermission. *Special Touch* and *Rural Route 4* were already slotted for 10 and 20 minutes on the show and they expanded their programs to fill the time. One member of TNT (I think it was the bass) arrived just before intermission. The other 3 members got to the Music Hall fairly close to 4:10 p.m. and they were on stage right after *RR4* finished."


So that's how it was. At least the folks in the audience got their money's worth of barbershop harmony that afternoon.

FORTY YEARS AGO: MAY, 1966

In going back forty years ago for material for this segment of my column (yup, the April 1966 issue is missing from my collection, so I must go to May), I've often been amazed by the apparent degree of contention—put on, of course—that existed between Editor Warren Edmonds and everybody's pal, Dan Henry Bowser.

For example, in the May 1966 issue, Warren reported that Dan had been picked as the "Barbershopper of the Year" for 1966 and that the award was presented to Dan at the annual Ladies' Night at the Muehlbach Hotel's Terrace Room. But Warren wasn't at all congratulatory in his remarks. He even went so far as to suggest that the selection committee members had all taken LSD prior to their deliberations and relied on the resulting "dream." And a fellow member by the name of **Doc Waterman** "was so mad at the outcome that he poured the bottle of formaldehyde he won for selling show tickets all over himself. No one can say Doc isn't well preserved now."

And the sad fact is that despite the degrading remarks Warren directed toward Dan in nearly every issue of *Harmonotes*, he never once permitted Dan to retaliate with remarks of his own. And we all know that he would have done a heck of good job, don't we? Oh, well, Warren did go so far as to report that the crowd at the function gave Dan a standing ovation. And maybe it's just as well that Warren announced his resignation as chapter bulletin editor elsewhere in the same issue.



F&CAL POINT: **Up Close And Personal!**

You know, it's not unusual to find a dedicated barbershopper who possesses talent, skills, and training in areas other than his singing ability that can be put to good use in the operation of a barbershop chapter. An example in our case is veteran *HOA* member **Marv** Faulwell, whose performance on the massive pipe organ at the Music Hall prior to the opening curtain of our show last month was a significant contribution

which certainly enhanced the overall success of the venture. Our subject for this month is another member who has the education and experience in a field that serves the chapter well when needed. But more about that in a moment.

Phil Youngs was born, raised, and educated in Bethany, MO. After graduating from Bethany High School, he went on to Northwest Missouri State University at Maryville where he graduated with a degree in financial management, which qualified him for a position in investment banking at UMB where he's been employed for 36 years. Oh, and by the way, it was at NWMSU that he met his lovely wife, Leslie. They were married upon graduation and moved to Kansas City, where they raised their two children, a daughter and a son who, tragically, was taken by cancer at the age of 28. With pride in his voice, Phil tells how their daughter, who is a William Jewel graduate, sings with the Kansas City Symphony Chorus.

Phil described—in a 45-minute telephone conversation how his first exposure to the barbershop style of singing came when he was in the seventh grade and he and his dad attended the annual show of the Bethany chapter. He recalls vividly the hilarious performances by the *Merry Mugs* and the *Hawkeye Four*, plus the *Kippers* (he wonders if **Ken** Gabler is still singing "Easy Street"). He retained an interest in our hobby until he finally joined HOA in 1977. And that's another story.

Right now, I want to describe Phil's interesting musical background. He played the trumpet and drums and organized a pep band when he was still in middle school. He gained more band experience, including another pep band, in high school, and also sang in high school choirs and played the piano as accompaniment for vocal groups. I recall that he once played a bit on the piano—I believe it was The 12th Street Rag—on one of our shows several years ago. He says that his dad liked to sing, especially barbershop, but was so active in the community, he never felt he had time to join the Society.

And as with most barbershoppers, Phil joined the Kansas City chapter under unique circumstances. It seems that Leslie, who was teaching English at Raytown High School at the time, had a student in one of her classes by the name of **Kim Lefholz**. Way ahead of me, aren't you? Well, be patient. Inevitably, the subject of barbershop singing came up in their casual conversations, and Kim remarked to Leslie that her dad, name of **Gil Lefholz** (sound familiar?) was a barbershop singer and a member of the Kansas City chapter of SPEBSQSA. And in time, as a result of interaction between Leslie's students and their familys (that would include Mr. Lefholz), the Youngs and the Lefholzes became acquainted. And Mr. Lefholz, ever on his toes, recognized the possibility of picking up a highly talented prospect for chapter membership. The invitation was issued and received and the bug bit, and Mr. Youngs began what turned out to be a 28-year membership with *HOA*.

But wait, there's more! It wasn't very long after Phil became one of us that he was presented with the opportunity to demonstrate his versatility in matters financial by becoming a member of the chapter board as our treasurer. In that capacity, it was his responsibility to receive and dispense funds generated by chapter activities, which included the annual show. Not only that, whenever our chapter was selected to host one of the two annual district conventions, Phil automatically assumed the same functions according to CSD policies. And as you've probably already guessed, this became Phil's job as a member of the local steering committee during each of the two international conventions hosted by HOA in 1974 and 1989. So weren't we fortunate to have a banker who could take care of the money situation in each case?

Many of us who have sung with the *Heart of America* Chorus in district and international contests cherish those memories the most of all our barbershopping experiences. For Phil, the first time HOA beat St. Joe and won the Central States District trophy in 1978 particularly stands out, followed by the trip to Minneapolis the following summer to represent CSD at the international level. He took his dad with him so he could learn all about barbershop contests. He was especially moved by the church service on Sunday morning after the contest in Salt Lake City in 1986 (that was when the *Rural Route 4* won the gold medal).

Finally, there's an item on the questionnaire that we send to prospective subjects for this column that asks whether there's something about him that would surprise people if they knew it. Here's how Phil answered it: "They'd be surprised to know that I still have my 1968 Honda motorcycle. Leslie and I dated on it while we were in college. I didn't own a car until we graduated and moved to Kansas City." I'm surprised he's still all in one piece after riding the darn thing for 38 years!

His reply was, "Well, you've heard of 007, haven't you?" I said yes, and he went on, "Well, I was 006, I wasn't as good as he was. Probably should have been 002." I was laughing so hard I never did find out how he got the monicker.



Clarence Bond

It's good to know that 86-year-old ex-HOA member Clarence Bond hasn't lost his sense of humor. Born, raised, educated, and still living alone (his wife, Lolita, passed away two years ago) in Kansas City, KS, Clarence attended Wyandotte High School and Kansas City, KS. Community College. He took an interest in vocal music, mostly chorus and choir, from the seventh grade through junior college. However, most of this music was of the gospel genre, and Clarence doesn't remember when he acquired an interest in the barbershop style.

Nor does he recall the circumstances surrounding his joining the Society and the Kansas City chapter back in 1981. He became inactive in 1992, but not until he'd played a part in the organization of the Harmony Handful, the mini-chorus that was formed to respond to requests for a music program that couldn't be supplied by the HOA chorus itself. He was a Harmonotes contributor for the activities of the group.

He does recall (who could forget it) singing "That Old Gang of Mine" with the chorus at the international contest in Detroit in 1981 when HOA finished in sixth place, "just ten points short of fifth place" and the medals. Clarence told me that after HOA had sung the song, some of the judges were crying. (It always leaves a lump in my throat, too.)

And Clarence clearly remembers singing with the Harmony Handful for the Sunday morning church services at the convention in Detroit and again in Kansas city in 1989. The Rural Route 4 were on the same program in each case.

So Clarence is living alone, enjoying good health and his retirement after 40 years of working as a railroad switchman. He amuses himself by playing the electronic organ, and is learning how to play the Auto Harp. (That's a stringed instrument that can be strummed like a guitar with buttons to press to give you the chords—so I'm told.) And you'd be surprised (I was) to find that this 86-year-old ex-barbershopper is still singing solos on Sunday mornings at the church he attends. About every four or five weeks. Just goes to show, you're never too old to enjoy making good music. Hang in there, Clarence.
