If a final public performance had been scripted for a chorus director, I can't imagine how it could have been any more complete or satisfying.

How about his *Heart of America Chorus* rising, literally, to produce the performance I've been dreaming about of "All Rise" and the first standing ovation (of several to

come) on the evening show? Mark Fortino was as brilliant as he was inspired, and you guys matched him, in sound and emotion.

Getting to stand in front of the massed chorus once more was a delight, especially for "Joy to the World" and "Pretty Little Jesus," where **Grant Hunget** and the tag transported us into another level of holiday rapture. It was truly one of those moments, as **Dan Henry** says: "Take me now, Lord!"

It's an abundance of riches, talent and ego when one also gets to sing with two quartets on the show (well, talent may be stretching things a bit in the case of *Tone-Henge*—but we do have a great time!). The occasions that the *Rural Route 4* get together are rare, so performing for the "home" folks is a real treat. And getting that kind of reception on both the matinee and night show was something we won't forget. It was the first time in years we'd done "Mary Had a Baby;" I suspect we enjoyed it as much as the audience—although it's getting to be a real challenge for the aging baritone!

The *RR4* got more goosebumps when we had the privilege of closing out the super afterglow put together by **Jeffi** and **Carter**

#### Salvation Army Caroling Caravan II by Mike Mathieu

t seems like few short ิล months ago that we had our first attempt at "Caroling Caravan

I," but on Dec. 15, it will be the sequel, version number II. The format is similar to last year, basically because "if it isn't broken, why try to fix it?"

One small change we did make was the replacement of one location this year with one that we hope will generate more income for the Salvation Army. Other than that change, the locations are identical. Bob Burdick has made all of the contacts and the arrangements are complete.

At 9 a.m., we assemble and warm-up at the Doubletree Hotel on College Boulevard. At 10 a.m., the bus must leave for our 10:15 performance at the Atriums. From there, we'll head to the Forum for an 11:15 performance. Then at 12:15, we'll perform at the Grand Court. After that performance, we'll eat our sack lunch, while en route to a 1:30 performance at the Town Village.

At 2:30, we'll sing at Kingswood. And our 3:30 performance at Silvercrest at Deer Creek will be the last one of the day.

A bus will be provided, and it'll be much less expensive than last year. Because of the short time that we're on the bus, we have decided to rent a school bus rather than the elaborate coach that we had last year. The cost is slightly more than 10% what a coach would have cost us.

If you're unable to make all of the locations, please feel free to join us at as many as you can. Our plan is to have as many as possible meet at the Doubletree, leave their cars there, and at the end of the day, the bus will return to that location for the final drop-off.

Our uniform will be black pants, black comfortable shoes, long-sleeved white shirt-preferably with no button-down collar-red necktie and red vest. We're still working on the details of the bust-up party, and if you're interested in hosting the affair, all volunteers are welcome

If you know of anyone who usually makes contributions to the Salvation Army, encourage them to give the donation to you, and we'll be able to add it to our collection total for that day. Last year we raised \$4,800, and this year we hope to exceed that total. We've taken flyers to all of our locations, and made the residents aware of the fact that we will be asking for donations to the Salvation Army.

All retirement homes have said that we may bring guests to our performances, so if you know residents at any of the locations, please feel free to stop in and listen to one of our sets.

If your company offers "matching gifts," please submit your request for that matching gift right away, so the gift is received before the "Bellringing" deadline has arrived. That match will also be added to our fund-raising total, but only if it's received prior to the deadline.

Thanks for being a part of this great fund-raising effort that has been such a fulfilling part of the Heart of America Chorus for almost sixty years. I'll have a complete schedule and information sheets available both on-line and at our meeting site, beginning at the meeting of Dec. 4. A large part of our performances will be out of the green and white Christmas books, so if you have not been able to be with us on a regular basis of late, feel free to come and refresh your singing skills and join in the fun. ### Get Your B.A. in S.P.! by Carter Combs, VP, Music & Performance



**B** arbershoppers who have been around for —ahem—a few years hear "S.P." and immediately

think "Stage Presence." Based on recommendations made by our own Kansas City Chapter president, **Joe Stern**, **Stage Presence** has been an official part of our contests since 1942. This judging category has been reworked several times since then and was renamed "Presentation" in 1993.

All the judging categories now emphasize and reward the concept of "believability." That means making all aspects of the performances work together to tell a vocally and visually consistent story. In Stage Presence, we use moves and facial expressions as our "blunt instruments." Our audiences react to both those overt actions and to our much more subtle body language throughout our performance. In other words, Stage Presence 101 is "Believable Body Attitude."

The term "S.P." is also often heard currently when working on moves for a song. The choreographer or presentation coach will often say something like "do blah-de-blah, then back to SP." In this context, it's a reference to both "Singing Posture" and "Standard Position." This is our default stance—how we appear the majority of our time on stage and so must be executed extremely well by every member of the ensemble.

How we position our body must not only look good, but should also assist in our vocal production. Let's build the singing posture, working from the ground up. **Your feet** should be about shoulder width apart, at a comfortably open angle, with your outside foot slightly ahead of the other. This provides maximum support and balance, serving as the firm foundation.

**Your knees** should be kept loose so you can easily flex, dip or sway while providing stability for the upper body.

**Your hips** should be horizontal and parallel to the floor. Resting your body on one hip by placing all your weight over one locked knee gives the impression of sloppy laziness and contorts the torso.

Your torso should sit comfortably over your hips to allow free movement of your diaphragm. Resist the temptation to "improve" your physique by sucking in your gut. This looks artificial and limits breath support.

**Your chest** should be lifted slightly, as if being pulled up by the breastbone. This expands the ribcage and allows maximum use of the lungs.

**Your shoulders** should be pulled back slightly, which also expands the ribcage. Your arms can hang loosely down your sides, and your hands should be kept comfortably open and loose. This is visually critical, as it opens the body, representing and welcoming honesty.

Your neck rests squarely above your shoulders without tension. Your head sits easily on top of the neck, with jaw parallel to the floor. Do not thrust your jaw forward or pull your head back. The goal is to provide an unobstructed, relaxed passage for air to flow to and from your lungs. **Your face** should be mobile. Keeping the same expression for very long indicates to your audience that your mind and emotions are not engaged, so they quickly lose interest. The observed tilt of the head and facial expression are key indicators in body language, which are the subject of entire books, so we won't delve into that this month.

Now, allow your body to press just slightly forward. This will put your weight over the balls of your feet, allowing you to lift one or both your heels off the floor.

Executed properly and consistently, this stance supports optimal vocal production. An added benefit is that your body language radiates confidence and competence. As with any other skill, this SP should be practiced at all times, during all rehearsals and performances.

So you can achieve a better Body Attitude by using proper Singing Posture, resulting in a Believability Adjustment in your Stage Presence. In short, get your B.A. in S.P.! ♥

### **The Songs We Sing**

**Jimmy McHugh** was born in Boston on July 10, 1894. He had an early interest in music, instilled by his mother. This enabled him to promote himself and his work and helped him to land a job working for the Irving Berlin Music Company in Boston. Shortly thereafter, he moved to New York and began working for the Mills Music Company. After heading the

professional office to exploit the music of others, he finally became a full-time composer.

It was during this period that he discovered his first longtime collaborator, **Dorothy Fields**, from St. Joseph, Mo. She became the most successful female songwriter of the twentieth century and, with McHugh, created such hits as "Don't Blame Me," "On the Sunny Side of the Street," "I'm in the Mood for Love" and "I Feel a Song Coming On."

McHugh's other principal collaborators included **Frank Loesser, Johnny Mercer** and **Al Dubin**, all throughout the 1940s. Although motion pictures dominated his output, he did also find time to score three Broadway musicals: "Keep Off the Grass" (1941), "Star and Garter" (1942) and "As the Girls Go" (1949). Song hits during this period included "A Lovely Way to Spend an Evening" (written for **Frank Sinatra**), "South American Way" (written for **Carmen Miranda**) and "It's a Most Unusual Day" (written for **Jane Powell**).

Up until his death in 1969, McHugh was a very visible presence in Hollywood and New York, often receiving honors and awards as well as attending every major Hollywood event with his steady date, **Louella Parsons.** ♥

**HOA** now has a financial committee made up of members who are in some way associated with financial planning for individuals and businesses. Your board of directors has been discussing the Heart of Amer-

ica Foundation—formed by **David Hokanson**—which I'm confident few of you knew existed. I wasn't aware of it until a few months ago. The board asked me to form a committee to investigate and report on the Foundation.

The current committee members are **Mike Mathieu**, **Harvey Shapiro**, **Don Young**, **Dave Stockard**, **Duane Lawson** and me.

Although the committee was formed specifically to deal with the Foundation, we have decided to expand it to include other financial considerations for members of *HOA*. Some of the items we will discuss will be:

- Gift annuities
- Deductibility of member expenses

As a teaser, I learned at COTS that all expenses a member incurs by going to contests—travel, lodging, meals, etc.—are tax deductible as a charitable expense, if you itemize deductions. I was skeptical about this, but it was confirmed by my CPA. His only caution was that you must have good records of your expenses. I'm getting more information from the Central States District treasurer, and it'll be the first topic in the next *Harmonotes*.

### The Law Was on Singers' Side

This "About Town" article, written by **G. Fred Wickman**, appeared in the Dec. 13, 1998 *Kansas City Times* 

**R**emind **Orval H. Wilson** about barbershop singing Downtown during the Christmas holiday season ad memories come rollicking back.

Let Wilson, a charter member of the *Heart of America Barber Shop Chorus*, tell you all about it. Let him tell you how members of the chapter here of the *Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing n America* would wheel that borrowed piano (from Jenkins Music Co.) along Walnut Street through crowds of holiday shoppers and office workers.

The singers' destination was the northeast corner of 11th and Walnut streets, near the Emery, Bird, Thayer department store. The guys would sing so nicely. And they would pass the bucket for the Salvation Army.

Wilson remembers his buddies going into the street with their collection buckets. Wilson was a cop then. He would show up and gruffly threaten to arrest the lot of them. And then Wilson would join in the singing in his police uniform.

And the piano player: Sometimes that was **Percy Franks**, who Wilson said would take off his shoes once in a while in the December chill and play the piano with his feet. Walnut Street, of course, was jammed in those days. People would lean our of windows to listen and send messengers down with money.

Relive those days, which began in the early 1940s, with a modern twist. The *Heart of America Barber Shop Chorus* will perform at 11 a.m., noon, 1, 2, 3 and 4 p.m. Saturday at the Ward Parkway Shopping Center.

When not singing, the group will be ringing—bells, that is—to remind you to donate a little something to the Salvation Army. Not a bad way to spend a Saturday. Listen and then give.  $\clubsuit$

#### TEN YEARS AGO: DECEMBER, 1997

Elsewhere there is a listing of the names of the newly elected chapter officers for 1998. I note that **Rich Huyck** was to become the music and performance vice president. Rick would be succeeding **Ron Abel**, who had held this position for the past eight consecutive years. Must be some kind of record.

#### **TWENTY YEARS AGO: DECEMBER, 1987**

The big news in this issue of *Harmonotes* was the appointment of **David Krause** as the new director of the *Heart of America Chorus*. Action was taken at the Nov. 9 board meeting and would take effect immediately. Nowhere else was there an explanation as to why **Steve Leone**, who had been the music director for the past four years, was being replaced. During that period, the *Heart* 

of American Chorus won the CSD chorus championship in 1984 and again in 1986.

*HOA* President **Marvin Faulwell** announced that an *ad hoc* committee had prepared a proposal for the establishment of a competition chorus. This action was taken because of the "need to free up Tuesday meeting time for more fun singing and less contest rehearsal, plus the need to demand a higher level of performance from the competition-oriented members." The committee report covers almost the last two pages of this edition of *Harmonotes*. Marv was soliciting opinions from the membership. The proposal would be considered at the meeting of members of both the 1987 and 1988 boards in December.

Guess we'll have to wait for the January 1988 *Harmonotes* to find out what happened to the proposal.

#### FORTY YEARS AGO: DECEMBER, 1967

New member **Dave Larson** describes in an entire page in this issue how he became a Barbershopper. He said he'd been visiting with his neighbor, **Bob Coe**, a member of our chapter, and the conversation went to music and, specifically, barbershop harmony. Dave reveals the he knew about the Society, but thought a guy had to be a member of a quartet in order to be eligible for membership. Wonder how many other good singers are misled that way. Dave was accepted for membership in August of 1966, and was immediately elected to the chapter board of directors. And his wife joined the *Sweet Adelines*. Many of you know Rick from previous quartets and CSD functions, but did you know how involved he actually has been during his barbershopping tenure? Well, check it out. As a third-generation Barbershopper, Rick brings a lifetime of singing and performance experience to *Quadio*. He has won the Central States District quartet championship with three previous

### "My Space" Revisited

Well, it seems like every year or five, a director calls for us singers to own our "box," which is defined as that space on the risers that only one of us

occupies. Several years ago, that vocabulary was front and center in our rehearsals and was accompanied by the concept of a "ball of energy" that would wash over the audience as they witnessed our artistry and our intensity, especially when supported by our hand movements.

Since I signed on as a Barbershopper in 1999, I've been in both the hero section and the front row several times. No matter where I stand, the terminology of "my box" still rings true to me. Another way to put it would be that I own that three-dimensional space where I stand. Nobody else emotes or sings or gestures in the space that is my box within the chorus. When the camera pans the chorus or zeroes in on me, the guy in my box has energetic artistry, no matter whether it's energetic softness or energetic intensity. My body and hand motions express the emotions in the lyric, and no matter what any other guys are doing in their boxes, the guy in my box is representing the best that this guy has to offer to the story in the song!

That idea brings strength to us singers as it focuses on the accountability that is ours as an interpreter and performer of the song. I guess it comes home to me when I think of every row as a front row, every guy as an up-front performing and interpreting artist, no matter in what row we stand!  $\heartsuit$

Today, my oldest brother Mike plays it all down. The whole family never placed any major value on anything from that era. (We even recall our dad changing the oil on our family car, using his old Dodger jersey to wipe off the dipstick.)

I know what you're thinking: "Wow! You're nuts! Getting to play catch with guys like Stan Musial or Red Schoendienst? Those kids didn't realize how incredibly fortunate they were to have that opportunity!"

You're right. From today's perspective they didn't begin to understand how good they had it. A unique period in history!

I can draw the same analogy with HOA. Jim Bagby has been an HOA member since 1971-25 of those years as director. But I'll wager many of you have considered each Tuesday evening just another day at the office. All this time you've taken the field with a "Musial-level" barbershopper and it's become a non-event. Take that from a guy who can't attend rehearsals. Stand on the outside, looking in, and the perspective is vastly different.

Guffaw all you want, but the idea of singing a tag with the likes of Jim has always been huge to me. Here's a guy whose vast musical gifts have allowed him to enjoy every aspect of barbershopping. He knows what it's like to get a gold medal hung around his neck. He's directed you guys-an internationally-ranked chorus. And now he turns the page on another chapter of his life, only to find himself in the International judges chair. How many others do you sing with it that have those credentials? And I'm scratching the surface, trust me.

I just hope you don't grow older and realize all too late how good you had it. Those who are wise enough to know will certainly tell him.  $\mathbf{\nabla}$
