Magic Moments a Big Success at its First Year at Yardley!



WOW! Magic Moments truly occurred many times on the *HOA* Spring Show stage. I'll give you a brief overview from the Show Chairman's point of view. Starting with the staff at Yardley Hall.

The staff was absolutely professional. They all had a great eye for the stage and were conferring with John Warrior and me the entire day Friday-Tech Rehearsal/Setup day. Working all kinds of magic with that stage stuff they do so well. Then in comes **Rick** from XS Lighting with his "let's add some emotional responses to some lighting" as he offered several GOBOs for us to choose. Looking for Disney shapes and having Mickey Mouse silhouette embedded in my mind he pulled out "Cinderella's Castle." From that point on it was one lighting wow after another with "Raising of The Flag at Iwo Jima" and "Bald Eagle" it just made sense to create that visual image as the flag flew in. So then, we called two sources to confirm how to hang the American Flag vertically. Rule is: Always have the stars in the upper left corner - we learned that in Scouts, but two or three heads agreeing are better that one. Once we painted the mental picture with the stage crew, they knew exactly how to get the

effects we were looking to achieve. Prior to this there were two things causing a breath of fresh air aka Magic Moment. That was when I walked on the stage at 11:15 a.m. and saw **John Warrior, Chuck Ames** and **Mike Schumacher** staring at the hanging *HOA* quartet shell with a look of completion on their faces. Then to hear the Sound Man turn on the system and have Barbershop Music start humming through the hall. I quickly turned to see none other than Val Putzier's grandson, **Anthony Putzier**. Anthony worked some Sound Management Magic with **John Fortino** later on while the chorus was filling the stage with some wonderful singing during our tech rehearsal.

As you already know, there were very few cues remaining to be worked out and most of them were timing issues. So, with the dynamics of Yardley Hall's built in acoustics to tackle and with the upfront planning and preparation from John Warrior and the stage crew, I decided two things. 1) Let's let the guys see the Show from the \$28 seats without any bodies on the risers, so they know what will be happening around them. 2) Now that we've built there confidence with the visual effects, let's get them on stage so we can retune the house to manage the 'Wash of Sound' that has become the benchmark of *HOA* presentations. So, we swapped our Tech Rehearsal schedule with our Sound check schedule on the fly. (*Continued on page 2* ••)

The chorus sang two hours straight with show-like intensity so our sound crew could tweak the appropriate frequencies and maximize the architecture and enhancements of the sound system. **John Fortino, Mark Fortno** and I worked together with our new best friend, **Anthony Putzier** to tweak the hall making it our own. When we were done, Anthony said, "I've never heard this hall sound like that!"

The chorus and crew went home and the show moved forward flawlessly in our minds eye while we slept. The next morning came; we ran a few staging timing concerns and created the momentum needed for an awesome performance.

By the time you read this article, we will have already had our after show chats and our other Magic Reflective Moments. But I'll tell you what, transitioning from the Music Hall to the JCCC Carlsen Center's Yardley Hall, was no easy feat. I bet there were people attending from Australia, now that I know the way Dick "Big Picture Man" Korek thinks.

Between show meals from Joann Bagby are always a great place to reflect on the matinee as we look forward to our evening show. This year, there were very few words mentioned about notes, words, timing, etc. One fun quote that rings in my memory was **Chris Smith** saying, "Jim, you did that one cut-off just perfect!" HOA Strategic Plan in the Works

Our 2006 survey provided us with a lot of important and helpful information about the priorities, feelings and concerns of our membership. In order to take full advantage of the information, the music team and the board have

made some adjustments and are currently doing some planning for the future.

The board has initiated a strategic planning project designed to look ahead five years. Taking into account our chapter's mission statement, our survey information and where *HOA* is today, we want to make plans for what *HOA* could look like in 2012. The strategic planning committee is made up of six board members and two non-board members. Our first meeting was held on March 10 at which time we agreed on four strategic initiatives. Unde,r each initiative are listed a number of projects needed to achieve the strategic initiative.

After receiving the approval of the board our job will be to recruit people to be responsible for each initiative and each project. We will then establish what we will need to see in five years that will tell us that we have achieved our strategic initiative. The person in charge of each initiative will report to the board every 90 days beginning in September of 2007.

As expected, The *Humdingers* and *Tone-Henge* supplied the entertainment aspect of the show. What can we say about *Quadio* and *12th Street Rag*, except THE EXAMPLES OF OUR BEST QUARTETS! It was an honor for us to share the stage with you!

Most important, the Harmony Explosion champs were audience favorites. Our own stand-outs, "Raising The Bar," have already established their abilities to take command at performances, wowing audiences with good singing and their appealing personalities. Tie all of this up , then add the most

spectacular experience...an extraordinary thrill...singing "It's A Small World" with *HOA* and *12th Street Rag*...set up by our young pro, **Anthony Fortino.** ♥

This is not going to be wordy or long. I would like to remind all that if you would like to save on your yearly dues, the same program as last year is still in effect.



ca Chorus is the place to be these days. I can't recall a time when we've had as many major performances so close together — John Knox in mid-February, our annual shows a month later and the Trenton outing two weeks after that. And all of them two hours or more. That's a lot of singing!

In fact, HOA did 15 songs at the John Knox Pavilion and 16 in Trenton (counting the mini-chorus performances of "Apron Strings"). It's easy to count because Ron Abel always makes me my own pocket-size lineup card, neatly typed. And he's done that ever since I began directing, as Dan Henry would say, back in 18-ought-something.

Ron probably would remember the year because he just completed his 45th consecutive show on the front row on the HOA chorus. And he did a handful in Des Moines before he transferred to the Kansas City Chapter. I bet no one in the district can match that record. No wonder this guy is my hero.

Speaking of Trenton, it was a treat to have 12th Street Rag volunteer to be our headliners. They sang better than ever on our March 17th shows, where they set a modern chapter record by appearing for the 14th consecutive time (some think a version of an Eddie Schlieb quartet may have made more shows back in the '40s and '50s). But that bested the 13 times the Rural Route 4 sang. Say, maybe we oughtta invite those old guys back...(who said that??)

Speaking of quartets, as the guy in charge of continuity for the spring shows at Yardley Hall, my hat is off to all our chapter foursomes for filling their spots with timely good singing. One of the highlights of the feedback we kept hearing was how well both the matinee and night show moved, with no dead spots or extra Mighty Fine, Command talking. Performance, Tone-Henge, Quadio and 12th Street all nailed their assigned time slots and left the audience wanting more. That's show biz at it's best! That allowed our headliners, the Humdingers/Dapper Dans to take their full 30 minutes and do the dancing/chiming/silliness they do best. I thought the western set they did at the afterglow was some of the best singing I heard all night.

But the highlight of our annual show, especially, for me was the great singing of the chorus. There were some numbers that lifted me off the floor. There were others that we all knew we could have done better. But the ballad in the afternoon, and "Runnin' Wild" at night, and "Don't Blame Me" on both shows (Bruce Wenner asked me if was gonna milk it into an eight-minute production; I was enjoying it that much), the energy you poured into "Harmony" and the fervor of the finale reminded me once more why I have the best job in Kansas City.


Let me share with you one more experience of the kind that serves to keep the barbershop blood pumping no matter how many hours we spend in this hobby. And sometimes those hours are dumped on us not by our own design. On the fourth weekend in March, I judged the Dixie District spring prelims - or tried to. An airline that shall remain unidentified but begins with the letter D conspired to keep me from reaching Knoxville until 11:30 Friday night - long after the first round of quartets had competed, and 12 hours after I'd left my

house. It's too gruesome to go into detail here. I had an early flight home Sunday, so got three hours sleep Saturday night, then drove early Monday morning with CSD President Don Fuson, who'd overseen the arrangements, 300 miles to Humboldt, Iowa, to be clinician at a Youth In Harmony event hosted by the Fort Dodge Chapter.

About 60 junior high and high school boys and girls showed up in a non-airconditioned music room for their first exposure to barbershop. There was no teaching quartet, so I drafted Don, two Fort Dodge barbershoppers and a music teacher -- two of whom had never seen either of the songs I was teaching. They got about 10 minutes practice and bravely ventured out, doing a surpris-After three hours of ingly good job. rehearsal, we put on a concert for an enthusiastic audience of about 150, probably mostly families of the kids from four different schools in the area. We were joined by the Fort Dodge and Algona choruses, plus Call Street and Jurassic Lark quartets from Algona and Des Moines, respectively. I emceed and had sweated out two shirts by the end of the day. And with no more sleep than I'd had, I was wondering how I was gonna stay awake on the four-and-a-half-hour drive home. Don said he's not good driving late at night. Oboy.

But after the concert, Don and I were teaching a half-dozen of the boys a tag, and they ripped it. "Man," one of them said, "I love this barbershop!"

Don and I were both on a high all the way home. **Y**

Let's start with the better news.



Ouadio Looks Ahead



Dorthea Durley's Last Valentine by Jim Porter



t was just another gig for Eu-Four-EA (Carl Turlin - lead; Bruce

Marston - bass; Don Fuson - bari; Marlin Weidler - tenor) as they headed to Research Medical Center through the snow on Tuesday, Feb. 13, to present one of 20 Singing Valentines they were to do in two days. When they got there, they found the recipient, 83-year-old Dorothea Durley, sitting up in a wheelchair in her room with her daughter Debbie (who ordered the valentine) and a nurse in attendance. The quartet presented the songs, the rose, the box of candy and the love. Other nurses soon were on hand to hear the presentation. Dorothea was able only to offer a few weak responses during the time and afterwards as the nurses posed her, her daughter and the quartet for pictures. The group then went on their way, not sure if the ailing woman was even aware that they were there, but thinking that they did see a little smile on her face as they sang.

It's been said that comatose people are far more aware of their surroundings than people might think. Dorothea wasn't truly comatose, but according to those in attendance, she brightened up noticeably after the quartet left, and gained strength in the days that followed. Doctors were giving her only a few days to live, but she lived on nearly a month, passing away in the hospital March 2. In the ensuing chaos of planning for the funeral, Debbie and her husband recalled how her mother had rallied and strengthened after that Singing Valentine was given, and decided to invite the quartet to return for the funeral and sing again those songs that proved to be such a blessing. Her husband, Dave Baker, therefore contacted Bruce Marston on Saturday, March 3, and Bruce readily agreed to contact the others in the quartet and come to the funeral on the following Wednesday. Carl announced the event to the chorus family and asked simply for a quartet to make themselves available for the funeral.

Then Bruce realized the challenge-getting three other guys to agree on short notice to take the day off Wednesday, travel together to Sedalia, sing a 15-minute set of songs at the funeral around noon, then return. Carl Turlin agreed reluctantly, aware that if substitutions were made it would be difficult to put on a good performance with little practice beforehand. Don was just returning from Seattle, and Marlin had work and other commitments that just could not be set aside. Bruce came to Tuesday's practice with heart in hand asking for others to step in as bari and tenor so that they could properly honor this family in their time of mourning.

Bruce had contacted the family and described his problem. They all agreed it was a problem that God could solve, so they committed it to prayer. How would God answer that prayer?

The bari spot was filled when Ron Abel agreed to stand in, but no one among those who sing tenor in quartet performances was available. But, when Bruce and Carl approached Jim after practice broke up at 9:45, he felt something urging him to say yes. After all, he had left his appraisal work that afternoon with no job pending. There was no work to go in for on Wednesday morning! God must have had that in mind all along.


Jim therefore cut a CD with the two songs in tenor on it, played them as he drove to pick up Ron and then go to Bruce's home for practice and warm-up, and was able to do the songs while holding music. Bruce had contacted the family and told them they were coming, and said they might need to hold music as they sing. "No problem, thank you and God bless you!" The quartet then agreed to do the two songs mentioned, plus "Roll is Called Up Yonder," which Jim learned tenor for a couple years back for a Spring Fling quartet. After an hour, all realized that it would work OK, so it was then off to Sedalia, all four in Carl's small SUV, arriving an hour early, time for some more practice.

The funeral service was in the large salon of a funeral parlor, and the quartet did their set as the last event of the service. A soloist sang "Precious Lord," so that song was dropped by the quartet in exchange for "Battle Hymn of the Republic" (sung in unison). The group started with the Singing Valentines set. The daughter and her husband, right up front, heard it, and Debbie broke into tears and had to go out briefly. All in the audience of 100 or so listened attentively and somberly. The words of "Love At Home" never sounded as appropriate as they did at that time. "When the Roll is Called Up Yonder" reminded all that Dorothea was in a better place and we all could also look forward to that time ourselves. There wasn't any applause afterwards, but there was a whole lot of hugs and hand shaking. Dave Baker was so grateful that he pressed a bill into Bruce's hand as we were leaving. It was a \$100 bill. The quartet used it to enjoy lunch together and fill Carl's vehicle when they returned. The balance became a contribution to the chorus from the family.

Guys, so much of the time it would seem that our singing is just for ourselves, and it really doesn't matter all that much. This time, it touched a whole family and provided a blessing of inestimable value to a dying dear old lady. It is things like this that remind us that truly, it's great to be a barbershopper. It is even greater to know that God used you to answer a prayer by a stranger to bring some joy into an otherwise very somber day.

Rest in peace, Dorothea Durley. I never met you in this life, but I'll be looking for you in the next.♥

"Carrie Jacobs was born in Janesville, Wisconsin , in 1862 and experienced a number of misfortunes in her early life. Her father died when she was 12. Her husband, **Dr. Frank Bond**, died prematurely. A serious fall in 1895 left her an invalid with a young son. After a career attempt as an artist, she turned to songwriting to survive. Popular music publishers turned down her 'art' songs, but she had early success with children's songs.

"To succeed as a songwriter, she started her own publishing business in a bedroom, financed by a song recital. Her first book, 'Seven Songs,' contained 'I Love You Truly,' a standard at weddings for many years, (and) which survives today as a Valentine's Day ballad. Her most popular song was a big hit in 1909, 'A Perfect Day,' selling five million copies. Carrie Jacobs-Bond received many awards and is recognized as an outstanding American woman composer. She retired to Hollywood and was interred at Fairlawn Court of Honor in 1946, following notables like the sculptor of Mt. Rushmore." ♥

What You Can Personally Do to Make Your Chapter More Attractive to Potential Members

Happiness is when what you think, what you say, and what you do are in harmony. – Mahatma Gandhi

Do you think that growth in your chapter will lead to happiness? Do you say that growth in your chapter will lead to success? Do you do that which will cause growth in your chapter, thus leading to happiness?

Sounds great, but I think we will all agree, the shortest word is the biggest challenge: Do. What can each of us do to help cause growth in our chapters. Here are some ideas:

Keep a positive attitude about your chapter. Look for the things that are unique to your chapter and then tell others about them.

- **Take pride** in what your chapter can offer a prospective member. Regardless of the type of chapter you may have, there are things unique to it that are positive in the eyes of a prospect.
- Think about what your chapter can offer folks in your community that no other group can. Start talking that up to guys you meet.
- Make up your mind that you will work hard at singing better, so the guest next to you will want to join. Gaining a new member is better done by creating a desire to join before asking the question, "Want to join?"
- Help make your chapter membership plan a success. It truly is not the other guys' job in your chapter to do "membership things." We all must participate in making the plan a success.
- Try to be the guy who challenges any degree of apathy that may exist in your chapter.
- Meet with some other guys whom you know feel as you do about your chapter's need to grow. Talk about the need for new voices in weak sections in the chorus, the need for new leadership to get things done in the life of your chapter.
- Maintain a positive attitude toward chapter growth. Think about the happiness you can bring to new people, the fun of being around new personalities with new ideas and new synergies. Focus on guys in your community who would bring new energy to your chapter.
- Help your chapter make a decision to grow. Many chapters have had success simply because they made a "group decision" to grow. Want some inspiration? Look to Beatrice, Neb., a town of approximately 12,000 that had a chapter of around 50 guys. They made a group decision to grow. In one year, they grew to more than 100! Why? The membership bought into the plan and they were focused on the goal. Their growth came from some fun and unusual ways to get attention and meet prospects. (See The Harmonizer, March/April 2006, page 14.)
- **Recognize** that we not only need some younger members, but we also need singers of any age. Break into teams of two or more to go after younger guys, newly married guys, mid-50s guys– solid 60s guys and super 70s-plus guys.
- We all know you can not depend exclusively on your circle of friends to supply you with new contacts. Start asking people you don't know, because there a lot more of them. Make it fun! Wear a badge, button or something musical. Then use an opening line like, "I'm trying to find other singers. Who do you know that might like to sing?"
- Finally, establish a personal goal of recruiting one new member this year or one each quarter. Five this year? Do that, and you get your dues paid for 2008. Bring what you think, what you say and what you do into harmony and we will grow. ♥

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
