HOA Financial Corner

This month's topic was to be Gift Annuities, but there is a more important event to report. You will hear about Gift Annuities at a later date.

Heart of America has established a relationship with the Truman Heartland Community Foundation.

The Truman Foundation is considered one of the top 10 foundations in the Kansas City area in terms of total assets, gifts and grants. They provide creative charitable solutions and resources. *HOA* is a 501 (c) 3 organization and is therefore a charitable organization, which is why donors can give to us and take a tax deduction for their gift

Kansas City has several foundations to which we have made application for grant funds. To date that effort has been unsuccessful, but we intend to continue that process. Those foundations offer monetary assistance but usually do not offer any other kind of assistance.


Truman conducts an ongoing program of needs assessment, particularly in Jackson County (our home) that sets them apart from other foundations. They will identify resources to create successful strategies. They will help donors with the sometimes-complicated process of setting up contribution accounts such as Gift Annuities and Charitable Remainder Trusts. They will help match us with donors interested in contributing to our organization.

We established the relationship with Truman by setting up a foundation account, officially named the "*Heart of America Chorus* Foundation Fund", which will earn us a net of 3.8% per year. The money is kept in a money market account at Truman, but remains our money and is totally liquid. Establishing this account puts us in the "Truman family" and provides a place that donors can use to contribute to *HOA*, using any of the various methods available for charitable contributions. It's working. Very recently we have had a bequest (an amount named in a will) of many thousands of dollars naming our foundation as the beneficiary.

This is a great start on our quest to become financially self-sufficient. 🎔

Dear Heartbeats,

In 2007, I was privileged to win the coveted Orval Wilson Scholarship to Harmony University. The week started with Jim Henry giving the keynote speech, a speech that is now known throughout the barbershop world, and generally considered one of the finest barbershop addresses ever given. That was the first event of the week. How on earth could we ever top that?

Every day the singing started at 9 a.m. sharp. We joined in with about 500 other barbershoppers by learning a tag, and then we would all sing a song we had learned prior to heading to St. Joe. There were guest directors every day, and everyone did a great job in getting everyone singing beautifully, some with their eyes still closed from having too little sleep the previous night.

2007 was the first year of the Harmony University "Honors Chorus" directed by **Jim Henry**. (In order to qualify for the chorus, you had to submit a short learning tape or file, to be judged by Jim. If you qualified, you were sent the music and learning CDs so you would know all of the songs without music when you arrived in St. Joe).

As a daily part of our curriculum, we sang for two hours every afternoon, and it seemed like the class lasted 15 minutes. In one week, Jim took 28 singers from all parts of the world and molded them into a pretty darn good chorus, plus we learned SP on two of the songs, ably taught by **Cindy Hansen**. Most of these guys were from small choruses, and I think Alex Scott and I were the only two guys in the chorus who had ever been on the international stage. The excitement that these guys generated during our practices and the dedication that they put into those practices were something to behold. Without a doubt, the "Honors Chorus" was the biggest of many special highlights of my Harmony University experience. Add to that special vocal technique classes taught by **Nick Papageorge** and tag classes taught by the one and only **David Wright**, and it was all frosting on the cake.

Thirty-nine years a Barbershopper, and I had never before attended Harmony University. What a thrill it was, and it certainly was everything that you hear guys rave about forever.

Thank you, *Heartbeats*, for allowing me the opportunity to be "drenched in barbershopping for an entire week. \clubsuit

TWENTY YEARS AGO: APRIL, 1988

The men of the *Heart of America Chorus* were looking forward to the "50th Birthday Party" of the Kansas City Chapter of S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A., Inc., to be held at the Ranch Mart Auditorium in Leawood on April 11. Entry Fee Deadline Changed! by Kent Miller

We have decided to change the entry fee deadlines on the golf tournament. As I pen this, we are all concentrating on the show, which of course should be our primary concern, but that will leave one week for us to contact our golfing

So, to lessen the pressure on everyone, we have changed the schedule to:

Entry Fees:


\$90 per player if paid by April 19, 2008.\$100 per player if paid after April 19, 2008 up to and including the day of the event.

The tournament is open to anyone (not just barbershoppers) so we welcome anyone who would like to participate. In addition, *HOA* is issuing a challenge to all area chapters to field a team in our tournament and compete (in addition to all of the other prizes) for a traveling trophy that will be passed from chapter winner to chapter winner each year. We will hold this "tournament within a tournament" if we receive applications from at least three chapter foursomes (including *HOA*). The teams must be made up of members of your chapters.

The tournament is scheduled for Saturday, April 26 at Falcon Lakes Golf Course (Falcon Lakes is located north of Bonner Springs about 5 miles north of I-70 on KS-7 in Kansas). Many who played in our tournament last year deemed it one of the best scrambles in which they had participated, probably because besides having barbershop singing in abundance, we had over \$1,400 in prizes which were given as hole prizes, door prizes, and raffle prizes.
