## We Shine the Spotlight on Three New members!



#### TEN YEARS AGO: JULY, 1998

We found this very short, concise blurb in the July 1998 edition of *Harmonotes*. There's no by-line, but I sense that the author was **Mr. Jim Bagby**. "A group of seven heart patients have made their

second successful VLQ performance for the St. Luke's Hospital Health Enhancement Center. Jim Bagby and six of his rehab cohorts—none of them Barbershoppers —sang June 2 at the group's annual picnic. A similar group had sung for the exercise group's holiday open house. Most of the singers are part of the same afternoon workout class, and they practice for 15 or 20 minutes afterward—still in their sweats!"

Jim has informed me that this group, the *Cardiac Carolers*, also known as *Cardio Jam*, are "alive and well—or at least active." He says they sing only twice a year at the Health Enhancement Center Open House and at the summer picnic. When I inquired about potential *HOA* members, he reminded me that **John Erwine** "was hooked almost as soon as he sang his first chord" with the rehab mini-chorus. And he assured me that another member of that group, **T. Max Graham**, is in the process of joining *HOA*. Jim also told me the group membership now includes 12 to 15 singers, if they're all available, and many of them come to our annual show.

Jim also admits that if the group were judged according to Society standards, they probably sang at a "D" level at the beginning, and they're up to "mid-C" by now when they sing at their best. "The *Cardio Jam* audiences (virtually all cardiac program members and their families) think we're great, and we don't appear before any other audience. So everyone has a great time." Well, isn't that what barbershopping is all about? What more could you ask?

#### TEN YEARS AGO: AUGUST, 1998

According to 1998 Chapter President Jon Gathright, Gordon Lankenau's initiation and first official meeting as *HOA's* new musical director was on August 11, 1998. And 1998 Music VP Rich Huyck provided an interesting biographical sketch of our new arm-waver, "Gordy's family moved to Kansas City in 1974. Dad Floyd, Gordy, and brothers Ross and Wayne joined *HOA* and became active and productive. Gordy sang in a high school quartet at Shawnee Mission Northwest and later sang with the popular *Prairie Crooners* quartet. Gordy went to KU and earned a music education degree (voice emphasis) and also became assistant director of the *HOA* chorus in the mid-80's. He also directed the *Northland Sweet Adelines Chorus*. His teaching career took him away from Kansas City for a number of years. It was a happy confluence of events that Gordon and his lovely wife, **Becky**, were able to fulfill their desire to relocate to the Kansas City area, obtaining a music teaching position at Tonganoxie, Kansas, at the time that **Jim Bagby** made his decision to retire after a long and successful tenure as director of *HOA*. Jim leaves big shoes to fill, but Gordon has the knowledge, energy and skills to continue *HOA's* pursuit of excellence."

#### **TWENTY YEARS AGO: JULY, 1988**

The regular chapter meeting on June 14 was high-lighted by the visit of two members of the British Association of Barbershop Singers (BABS). The occasion was the 36th wedding anniversary of **Maurice** (pronounced "Morris") and **Margaret Lewis**. They were accompanied by **Dick and Pauline Beckford**. Maurice and Dick were members of the *Crawley Barbershop Chorus*, one of the first barbershop groups to be formed in England. Both singers took advantage of the opportunity to sing a tag with the *Rural Route 4* during their visit.

#### TWENTY YEARS AGO: AUGUST, 1988

A highlight of this year's Golden Anniversary convention in San Antonio, Texas, was the presentation by International President **Jim Warner** of a Society memento honoring each of the Society's only three active 50-year Society members. One of the three honorees was our own **Orval Wilson** (deceased). An active quarteter in his early days, Orval was a member of the *BMA Gamboliers*, 1957 CSD quartet champions, and competed several times at the International level.

The other two 50-year honorees were one-time Kansas City Barbershopper **Huck Sinclair**, then in Chicago; and **Glenn Howard**, of Cisco, Illinois, who had attended every one of the 50 international conventions.

#### FORTY YEARS AGO: JULY, 1968

Editor **Don Thorne** was looking forward to the 1968 international convention to be held in Cincinnati, Ohio, even though he admitted that he would be unable to attend this one. But he reported that a bid would be submitted to the board of directors for the 1972 convention to be held in Kansas City. Also on the agenda was the probability that our own **Bob Gall**, currently first vice president, would be elected president of the Society. And on top of all that, our own **Dan Henry Bowser**, was to be the master of ceremonies for the Saturday night finals. And there's still more!

## Keaton's THE GENERAL Coming To Kansas City's Music Hall


"The General," a silent Hollywood movie from 1926 starring Buster Keaton, will be shown at the Music Hall in Kansas City on Sunday, Sept. 7. The program begins at 2 p.m., and admission is free to the public. The film will be accompanied live on the Music Hall "Robert Morton Theatre Pipe Organ" by *HOA* member and past president **Marvin Faulwell** of Lee's Summit, Mo., (shown at right) with percussion provided by **Bob Keckeisen** of Topeka, Kans.

The Music Hall organ began life in the Lowe's Midland Theatre in downtown Kansas City and was used to accompany silent films of the 1920s, just as it will be used to entertain movie lovers attending the Sept. 7 program.

"The General" is considered by many to be Kansas native **Buster Keaton's** best film. Oddly enough, it's not a straightforward comedy. It's an action film, set during the American Civil War, with clever doses of romance and comedy added. The plot begins when Union spies steal an engineer's (Keaton's) beloved locomotive, "The General." He pursues them single handedly and saves his ladylove in the process.

During filming, Oregon timberland stands in for rural Tennessee battleground, and this film is loaded with dangerous stunts performed personally by Keaton. Today, movie studios are unlikely to allow a star as valuable as Keaton do his own stunts.

Since 1985, Marvin Faulwell has specialized in accompanying classic silent films—over 115 different films in his career. Faulwell was staff organist at the Granada Theatre in downtown Kansas City, Kans., during its organ program years. He has been organist for the Kansas Silent Film Festival in Topeka since its inception twelve years ago, and is also organist for "Silents in the Cathedral" held every Halloween season at Grace Cathedral, Topeka.

On June 1, 2005, Faulwell's first DVD went on sale: "The Phantom of the Opera" (1925 version with Lon Chaney). The performance was recorded on the Music Hall organ. Percussionist Bob Keckeisen is also featured on the DVD. In addition to his love of playing, Faulwell restores and installs organs, including a three-manual, 20-rank Wurlitzer in his home in Lee's Summit. ♥

#### **Operations Report: David Miller**

## Recap of Results - Nashville 2008 by Jim Porter

#### **<u>Chorus Competition:</u>**

Other than the showdown between the *Masters of Harmony* and the *Ambassadors of Harmony*, the big news this time is the second coming of the Westminster-inspired youth movement. The Elizabethtown, Ky, chapter brought 31 mostly young — but not all — singers to Nashville and placed 10th with an 85.2 score. Last October in the Cardinal District contest, they scored only 79.7, just a whisker behind the *Heart of America's* 79.8. Elizabethtown is about 30 miles south of Louisville, an area with a rich barbershop tradition and a large pool of talent. (Ed. Note: only director **Aaron Dale** lives in Elizabethtown; other chorus members are drawn from across the district.)

In general, the judges saw improvement among the top 10 choruses. The average score of the top 10 was 88.6. The top-10 average from October was 86.7, so there was a significant improvement. Every one of the top 10 posted better scores in Nashville than in their respective districts.

In the second 10, the average score was the same in Nashville as for the districts last fall, 81.3. (One of these was the Swedish chorus, I do not have their scores from the fall.) None showed any substantial gain and only three showed any gain at all. *Spirit of Phoenix* and *Brothers in Harmony* fell back more than *Heart of America* did. This has been true also in past years; the judges in International have sometimes given higher scores to the top choruses, but have not given higher scores to the other competitors.

In the lowest group -21 and below - are some choruses that are showing substantial declines, such as the *West Towns Chorus* (Chicago area) and *Heralds of Harmony* (Florida), both down over two percent from the fall. The overall average for this group is 77.7, down from the fall (78.3). The *Vocal Agenda* (Batavia, N.Y.) and *Senate-Aires* (Oregon) both gained - about one percent - from their fall performances.

The present system of judging and scoring has been used for 15 years now, and valid comparisons can only be made over these 15 years. That the field is strengthening is clear enough. Adding 12 wildcards in the past three years has certainly made for a stronger competition. *HOA* in 1998 had a score slightly lower than this year's score and placed 15th with it. The following table shows how the field has strengthened. The table shows the average total percentage scores of the indicated group of choruses over the five-year period.

The *Vocal Majority* posted the best score ever in 1997, winning with 2,881 points (96.0 percent). They topped this year's 2,849 only one other time, 2000 with 2,866. *Masters of Harmony* won with 2,865 points in 1996. The only other chorus to post a score over 2,800 was Northbrook in 1997, 1999, 2000 and 2001, when they won gold. The *Ambassadors* have the best-ever third-place score, 2,761 in 1996.

#### **Quartet Competition:**

Among the top 10 quartets, CSD's quartet *Crossroads* scored the biggest improvement from the spring preliminaries, where they posted 85.2 percent, the sixth-best score. In Nashville, they won two of the three sessions and posted 89.1 percent to take the silver medal.

Every one of the top 20 quartets posted a better score in Nashville than they did in their respective districts in the spring. Overall, the top 20 average in Nashville was 84.8 percent, compared to 83.0 percent in the spring. Other quartets with a gain of three percent or more are *Storm Front, Lunch Break, Ringmasters* (SNOBS) and *Vocality. High Definition* showed a gain of 1.3 percent.

Among quartets 21 and below, *Speakeasy* showed the biggest improvement from Denver last year to the spring prelims. In Nashville, their 79.3 percent did not match their spring score of 80.2 percent. The average score for these 31 quartets was 77.9 percent compared to 77.5 percent in the spring competitions. Up-and-coming quartets in this group (gains over 2 percent) include TKO, **Wes Yoder's** *Jet Set, ThunderBox,* and *Inflagranti* from Germany. Seven others had gains of 1-2 percent over their spring performances.

One might wonder how much of a difference it makes to have an entertaining package. Choose any quartet—or chorus, for that matter—that either had an entertaining comedy routine or more elaborate costumes than the norm, and you will see their presentation scores are higher than their other scores—but not by more than 2 or 3 points per judge. Overall, Presentation judges tend to give higher scores. In the chorus competition, the average PRES score of all choruses was 83.8 compared to 82.7 for music and 82.1 for singing. In the quartet competition, PRES scores averaged 81, while music and singing both averaged 80.4. A well put-together package with costumes and props appears to be worth one percent to a chorus.


Reviewing 15 years of the quartet competitions, the field has strengthened in this time, especially among the quartets that place below 20th. More stringent qualifying standards together with a larger pool of talent is likely the reason. The differences are not great, but are significant, as noted in this table:

The only quartet ever to score over 8,400 points was *Platinum* in 2000, winning with 8,453 (93.9).
