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A Change in Perspective by Carl Turlin



In the last issue, I described my feelings after my quartet, *Homeward Bound*, came in last place in the Cedar Rapids quartet contest. If you don't recall, I was pretty down in the dumps about the results, especially considering all the preparations that we made.

I realize that lots of guys sing in quartets: some sing together just for the fun and camaraderie; some perform in their community; some do that and also get into the competition. In competition, quarteters sing on stage and consequently get some numbers from the judges that describe how the judges evaluated them in the three categories of Music, Singing, and Presentation.

Bearing in mind that these are my own thoughts and not those of my quartet members, or anybody else that quartets, with their own unique experience of that, I'm beginning to see my very short experience as a quarteter as a window and a mirror. First, the window of this experience allows me to see that the really good quarteters are guys who not only know the words and music of some songs and can sing them in the same rhythm but, also, that they have mastered certain techniques that they can repeat consistently under the stage lights and not just in front of a familiar, comfortable audience.

As a mirror, in examining our performance and the feedback from the judges, certainly got a way to go to master these techniques, and then use them to tell a story musically that the audience really appreciates and is touched by

our sound. As *Homeward Bound* continues to sing and critique our sound, we get a little better at each rehearsal. Sometimes, we make a quantum leap, when each of us matches our sound on a key phrase and we hear it ring! Sometimes, we have a rehearsal when it just doesn't go well and we know it, so we work on it independently before our next get-together. I've decided that that's how I'm going to look at our experience at Cedar Rapids. For very correctable reasons, it did not go well. But, we CAN sing better and we CAN perform better. We can learn how to do those things as part of our art. Our quartet continues to meet at least weekly, while we continue to practice on our own at home. Don't know if we'll join in the competition this Spring or Fall but, whether we do or not, we learned from the Cedar Rapids experience and we're going to sing better because of it, whether it's at a gig in our community or back on stage in front of the judges!

Our Caroling Caravan III will be here before we know it. Dec. 13 is the day, unfortunately only one week after our Harmony Spectacular, but the way the calendar fell this year, we could see no way around that. Last year we had our most productive day ever for Bellringing, and we raised over \$6,200. That makes it a greater challenge for this year, but I'm sure with our great Heart of America Spirit, we'll pull it off. We'll start as usual at the Doubletree Hotel, be there ready to sing at 9:30 AM sharp. HOA Financial Corner

Finally! At last! They said it would never happen! An article about Gift Annuities!

I'm sure you have been waiting breathlessly for the article about

Gift Annuities I have promised for some months.

So, what is a Gift Annuity? It's one of the favorite ways to contribute to a charity, get a tax benefit, and perhaps save some tax on highly appreciated assets.

To create one, a giver agrees to donate cash, stock, or other assets to a charity. There is no maximum limit to how much you may donate, but most Gift Annuities have a \$5,000 minimum. In return, the donor receives a fixed payment, called an annuity, for life. The donor receives an immediate charitable tax deduction and the payments are partially tax-free.

The rate of return is a fixed rate based upon your age – the older the donor, the higher the annuity payment the donor can lock in: the American Council on Gift Annuities suggests yearly annuity payments that range from 5.3 percent of the donation at age 50 to 11.3 percent at age 90 and over. Most charities follow the council's schedule of uniform gift annuity rates.

Ordinarily, the rates are somewhat less than a commercial annuity (one you would purchase directly from a life insurance company) although that is mitigated by the tax benefits. In our very low current interest rate environment, however, the rates can be very competitive.

This is a very popular way to support your favorite charities, and we certainly hope that the *HOA* is included on your short list. You can learn more about Gift Annuities and/or establish one with *HOA* as the recipient through our association with the Truman Heartland Community Foundation. TEN YEARS AGO: DECEMBER, 1998

Does anybody recall the "Quartet Follies" shows that our chapter used to put together? The idea was that by using only quartets on the show, the guys who weren't in any of the quartets and would

have had to perform with the chorus if it was on the program could themselves sit back and enjoy a good variety of foursomes without having to worry about changing uniforms, waiting backstage and not being able to see and hear the quartets on the program.

So I decided to contact **Dale Neuman**, whom I remembered had been involved closely in many, if not all, of the quartets-only shows. As you might expect, Dale responded quickly and thoroughly, and the result is an unusually interesting "Ten Years Ago" segment.

Dale says, "We had tried to hold a 'Quartet Follies' show about once every four or five years, as a money maker! So that means they started back in the mid-1980s, and the first show (featured), as I recall, Four Under Par and the Rural Route Four. Another show had the Merry Mugs and Chordiac Arrest, and yet another had the Bob Gall-Dan Henry-Manley Vance-and-Jim Bagby quartet." (Apparently this one had a lot of talent but no name!)

Dale adds the following paragraphs: "In what proved to be the last in our 'Quartet Follies' series of comedy quartet shows at the Folly theatre in downtown Kansas City, 'Quartet Follies IV' took place on September 12, 1998. It featured four quartets: '4's Company' (then the current Region 7 Sweet Adeline champs); *Most Happy Fellows* (1977 International champs); *Expanded Sound* (200 pounds of fun from St.Louis); and *Seattle Sound* (1997; semifinalists).

"The *Most Happy Fellows* did their 'Wizard of Oz' set, and the others did what they all did well—made everyone laugh with abandon. We had some dressing room issues with so many quartets (some with fairly large singers and one with four women). And we got a price break from the Folly when the hot water heater didn't work, and the *Most Happy Fellows* had to take cold water showers to remove the body paint that was part of their costumes. Without that extra \$500 discount, we would have been even more in the red on this event, as ticket sales fell far short of expectations."

TWENTY YEARS AGO: DECEMBER, 1988

I'm sure there aren't many guys in the chapter who remember **Pete Peterson**, but I'm equally certain that the memory of his contribution to the administration of our chapter, the Central States District, and the Barbershop Harmony Society endures in the memories of those who knew him. Pete passed away at the age of 76 on October 25, 1988, and our *Harmonotes* editor allotted a page and a half to the eulogy prepared by **Jim Bagby** and delivered by Chapter President **Rod Rule** during the memorial service for Pete.

To quote from Jim's eulogy, "Pete Peterson...joined the Kansas City chapter 38 years ago because of the singing and the fellowship. But he soon found an even stronger attraction—the need for people who had a talent for administration while everyone else was doing the singing." I joined the chapter in 1982, and I can't remember ever seeing or hearing Pete sing as a member of the chorus or a quartet. Indeed, looking at the picture we included with Jim's eulogy, I can't remember whether I ever saw Pete smile!

Jim tells that Pete soon became the chapter secretary and the chapter treasurer and moved on up the line to chapter president in 1958. He was instrumental in the formation of the Central States District and in 1961, became the CSD president and then the district's International board member.

Says Jim, "Although Pete was effective as an officer, he will be remembered even longer for his service to the contest and judging program... As district contest and judging chairman, or as chairman of a judging panel, Pete had the job of announcing the winners or qualifiers at the end of each contest session. He was often kidded about his tendency to get carried away when he got in front of a microphone while the contestants were sweating out the results. But every member of the judging panel who ever served under Pete will attest to his efficiency and attention to detail."

Jim continues, "Pete received virtually every honor our chapter and the (CSD) can bestow and also earned his Senior International Judging Certificate. He was "Barbershopper of the Year" at the chapter and district levels, won the "Sam Cohen Award" in 1971, and the district "Award of Merit" in 1985.

And Jim tells how Pete considered that one of his proudest moments came in 1978 when he got to announce that the "Heart of America Chorus," after years and years of trying, had finally won the CSD championship! As Jim tells it, "That meant our first trip to international competition, which was the following July in Minneapolis. And we well remember who returned to the chapter to handle all the tickets, housing and logistics for that trip—Pete Peterson!"

FORTY YEARS AGO: DECEMBER, 1968

Editor **Don Thorne** doesn't have much stuff in his December 1968 edition of *Harmonotes*, although he does include his "swan song" — or perhaps his "swan editorial" — in which he announces his yearend resignation as editor of the *HOA* chapter bulletin. Except for the period from January 1964 until July of 1966 (during which **Warren Edmonds** took over the job), he reminds his readers that he's been the editor since September of 1960. Don announces that **David Ritz** would take over the job on the first of January, 1969.

Into Every Life...

You know those great *Tone-Henge* singout experiences we talk about all the time? Well, this wasn't one of them. It started with the preparations. They were sure they wanted a 40-minute program. We told them that was too long to hold

an audience, but they were sure 40 minutes was what they wanted, so we gave it a try. Sounded even less viable when we saw the setup in the room. The room is shaped like a rectangle, about 30 feet by 100, and we were to sing from the middle of one of the longer sides. Think about how you can engage the left 1/3 and the right 1/3 of the audience – *get the picture?*

We're announced with a five second intro – the intro that we had carefully crafted and delivered to them had gotten lost somehow. OK – we'll come on and sock it right to 'em. Or – maybe not. There was no floor mike set up. After walking on and greeting the crowd, we had to turn our backs on them and sort through the jumble of equipment to piece together an ersatz floor mike. Kind of a slow start to the show, but we got it rolling. By the end of our second number we were realizing that the sound system wasn't doing much for the people who weren't close to us. Some of the outlying patrons said they could hear our singing, but not our gags. Mull that one over – remember, this is *Tone-Henge* – worst-case scenario. Turns out the sound system is getting to no one but us – the speaker is directly behind us. Not that much is coming out anyway – the mike has a pickup range of approximately 1-1/2 centimeters.

So here we are, in this setting, trying to hold an audience for 40 minutes with *Tone-Henge*-quality singing and gags that the audience can't hear. Taking us toward the final part of the show, in which we had scheduled a Christmas sing-along requested by the sponsors, and led by their program director. This individual appeared to be well prepared – she had printed up word sheets for the Christmas songs and handed them out, and she had an instrumental backup ready to roll. The one problem was that she hadn't really listened to the backup before the show. When she started it up it turned out to be in racehorse tempo – for a room full of senior citizens – but that's OK because it was coming out of the same sound system, so they couldn't hear it anyway. We wound up doing the singing – pretty much ALL of the singing. The audience was too exhausted to do much of it.



Well, at least we got paid. 🎔

Dennis J. Taylor (1925-2008)

His name was Dennis and his family called him "Junior," but he was known to his friends in the Kansas City Chapter as "Denny." He was a strong believer in his family and friends and often gave them encouragement with "Atta boy" He was a man who seemed to never go anywhere without a smile.

Dennis Taylor was born in a log cabin in Cuba, MO, graduated from high school in Morganville, KS and served a four-year hitch in the US Army Air Corp during WWII. His love of flying served him well and he retired after 39 years flying commercial aircraft for TWA.

He joined the Kansas City Missouri Chapter in 1948 and over the years served in several chapter offices including president in 1964. He sang in at least three quartets including *Innerurbans, Crosstowners* and *CrackerJacks* before teaming up with long time friends **Bob Gall, Frank Leone** and **Dan Bowser** in 1960 to sing tenor in the original *Merry Mugs*. He was forced to retire from the quartet in 1966 when a work promotion and his flying schedule interfered with his singing. Denny sang less in the following years, but Barbershop harmony continued to be an integral part of his life. He visited the chapter from time to time and though his memory was not as sharp as it used to be, his love of Barbershop never left him.

He made many friends in his 60 years as a barbershopper and member of *HOA*, and to a man they would agree that he added brightness and fun wherever he went.

Dennis Taylor, friend, quartet man and barbershopper, died November 17, at the age of 82 from complications of Alzheimer's. 23 members of the Kansas City Chapter came together to sing at the 1 p.m. memorial service, Nov. 20, at the First Presbyterian Church of Independence, MO. They included:

A Celebration of Life: Dennis Taylor by Jim Porter


was among the 23 chapter members who attended and sang at the Celebration of Life for **Dennis Taylor**, November 20.

The long-timers among us remember Dennis, but I have not been around long enough to have had that privilege. For an hour on the Thursday before Thanksgiving, I had the chance to know about him, laugh and celebrate with his family, and praise God for his life. I trust there will come a day when I'll have the privilege of meeting him again, in Heaven.

The church, a grand old edifice complete with stained glass windows just steps from the Truman museums in downtown Independence, was comfortably full for the memorial service—probably 300 or so. Ironically, the Presbyterian Church is just down the street from the Baptist Church where the funeral for **Bob Gall**, the bass who sang with Dennis in the *Merry Mugs*, was held.

Dennis came from a large family (7th of 10 children) and had several children and grandchildren of his own. This was not a time of grieving, it was a time of celebration of a life lived to the fullest, and full of love for and by family members and friends. His son Mitchell offered the eulogy, an upbeat presentation lasting a half hour that had the audience laughing and smiling throughout. He covered Dennis' life story from his birth in a log cabin in Cuba, MO, in 1925, through his early years when he served in the armed forces and fell in love with flying, his career with TWA where he met, fell in love with, and married the boss's secretary, his career as a pilot of the big jets, to his present passage to Heaven, where all believed was his destination. One of the laughs came when Mitchell noted the first date between his father and mother was a barbershop show in Joplin, MO, from which they did not return home until 6 AM. He noted his dad was hearing the music of heaven, and wondered if it might be barbershop, but was not all that sure!

It is always an honor and a privilege to be invited to sing and be a part of a service like this. ♥

We did not want to use chapter funds to support our activities. The last part of our meeting was devoted to selecting and/or appointing people to responsibilities and taking up a collection to establish an operating fund. David Hokanson will take care of the money and arrange places for us to rehearse. Bob Howard and Marty Oldehoeft are in charge of uniforms. Mike O'Dell is our librarian. Don Fuson is our tech and communications expert. Jim Davis will be our community PR and promotions person. Tony Strub is the group contact person to schedule performances. Jon Gathright, Keith Schweer and Rich Huyck make up the music team and Jim Bagby will be our director. Our first step before beginning activities was to go to our chapter board of directors and seek their approval. John Erwine presented our plans to the board and after questions, answers and in-depth discussion The New Harmony Handful was given the go-ahead to start operations.

We developed a small repertoire of religious songs and during the summer we sang at five churches and this fall at the funeral of **Dennis Taylor.** We are currently working to expand and diversify our repertoire which by the way does not include songs from the current repertoire of *HOA*. We are now beginning to look for opportunities in additions to churches to entertain audiences with barbershop music and promote *The Heart of America Chorus*. The board agreed to recruit non-*HOA* golfing foursomes for the 2009 golf tournament to increase income. ♥



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
