Joe Stern Award to Dan Henry by Bruce Wenner, Chairman, HOA Awards Committee

The Joe Stern Award for Lifetime Achievement and Service is the rarest and most coveted award that can be earned by one of our members. It was approved by the Board in 2004, to be presented only to a chapter member whose career barbershop achievement and service would make Joe Stern proud of him. That is a tall order: Joe Stern was a founding father of our chapter, and was also extremely important in the early days of our international society. He did it all. In addition to his key administrative work at both the chapter and international level, he was a firstrate ambassador for barbershop singing, including songwriting and arranging.

The Board recognized that this is a lot to live up to, so the award would not be presented very often. Indeed, up to this year there had been only one recipient, the late **Gil Lefholz**. This year there is a second recipient Since this recipient was out of town at the time of the Installation Banquet, the award presentation had to wait until he got back to town. So—at our chapter meeting Jan. 15, the Awards Committee presented the Joe Stern Award for Lifetime Achievement and Service to **Dan Henry Bowser**.

Dan has had a long lifetime of achievement and service. He became a barbershopper in 1949 in Topeka, and has been a very important member of *HOA* since he moved to Kansas City in 1959—that's almost 50 years of accomplishments with *HOA*. Dan has done it all for our chapter. His chapter officer stints include that of chapter president in 1965. His quartets, the *Merry Mugs, Hubbub*, and *Tone-Henge*, were all chapter

quartets and have supported the chapter in chorus performances, bell-ringing, and singing valentines. When the chapter needed a director, Dan stepped in (although loudly protesting that he is not a director!) and tided us over until **Jim Bagby** moved to town



and was able to take over the job. Dan is a real handyman, and he has consistently helped us by creating props we use on shows and in contest—the latest is the train we used in "Runnin' Wild."

Dan's service to barbershopping extends to well beyond the chapter. He has served as an area counselor, and was on the faculty of the Society's COTS—Chapter Officer Training School. Dan was a prominent radio DJ for a number of years, followed by his work as Greater Kansas City's favorite TV weatherman. Without being

intrusive, he let people know about his involvement with barbershop and introduced them to our music. Listeners and viewers love Dan, and some of that love comes our way and makes us more visible and attractive. Dan is a terrific ambassador for barbershopping.

There are two areas in which Dan has reached the absolute pinnacle of success. First, he was the baritone and comic genius of the *Merry Mugs*, quite possibly the most entertaining quartet ever seen in the Society. They performed all over the world, including their work as trailblazers for barbershop quartets in the USO tour, entertaining servicemen all over the Pacific during the Vietnam War. They made such a hit that the USO was sold on using barbershop quartets, so they paved the way for invitations for other quartets.

Second, for many years Dan was the premier emcee in the entire Society. He was always invited to emcee the most prestigious contest sessions at the International Convention, and he always won the hearts of the huge audience. Even today, as he walks through convention attendees, he is constantly stopped by his fans who want to visit with Dan Henry. He also donated his emcee talents to *HOA* – just having Dan Henry at the mike has sold us a lot of show tickets.

In summary, Dan is very talented man who has been sharing his gifts with all of us for over fifty years. He has been recognized as the *HOA* Barbershopper of the Year in 1966, and the CSD BOTY in 1970. This year, Joe Stern would be pleased to know that the Joe Stern Award for Lifetime Achievement and Service has gone to Dan Henry Bowser. ♥

HOA Chorus Puts 100 Men on **Stage in Nashville**

Does that headline get your attention? Read on and become a part of making that come true.

This idea came to me today as I was driving to attend the funeral involving the Fortino clan. I made it a priority to attend as Mark is one of my favorite barbershoppers and has been ever since I first heard him sing lead in a quartet called After Class. (Old story I'll gladly share sometime if you're buying) Anyway, the service was a true blessing to me in many ways. Seeing and visiting that wonderful family and listening to, perhaps, the best cantor in the midwest, Mark Fortino. Over an hour service with more singing than talking. Sounds like a good plan for a barbershop show or meeting. As I talked to Mark, John, etc., I realized that having these guys in our chorus is worth anything it takes to make it happen. What if we could get all of those men and boys in that family on stage with us at International? What if our choices to make that happen allowed many others to join us? I have some ideas to make that happen I'll share soon.

I misspoke about one of my goals last Tuesday. My new goal is 100 on stage in Nashville. And, unlike what I said Tuesday, it's mainly my job, not yours. Of course, I'll take all of the help I can get, but I think, if it works the way I envision, this will happen. And, if you do bring guests to be a part of that please don't just bring bodies. They must be able to sing a bit. The hardest thing I ever had to do as a barbershopper was to tell one guy, one time, who I voice placed back when we met on the Plaza, that I didn't think he could do what we do. He couldn't match pitch. Don't put us in that position as I still remember how that hurt me more than him.

Next item. Those songs we worked on Tuesday I now know well enough to direct. Since I was hired last Sunday and didn't know most of them I was not prepared enough for last Tuesday. Now, I will be. And, I will know lead, at least, to the songs Jerry and Carter are directing and be able to coach them a bit or direct them as needed. So, in other words, I will be prepared for Tuesday as I promised. Will you be?

Your job is easier but that's why you pay me the big bucks. Learn those seven songs, notes and lyrics, flawlessly. A great barber-

> shopper, Dave Stevens, once said, "You can't beat right notes." Your musical leadership will take you from there. And, we'll learn a new song, "Danny Boy." Warm up on the way in. Concentrate on no muscle in the sound. Start in your head voice, work the passaggio and bring it down two oc-

taves with no tension. (If you don't know passaggio don't be embarrassed to ask!) ♥

A Trip Into Barbershop History

Does anybody remember **Bert Phelps?** The CSD Archives contain a copy of a letter written May 24, 1968. The letter is written at the request of Society Historian **Dean Snyder** by Bert Phelps. In the letter, Bert outlines the accomplishments of his quartets—the *Kansas City Barber Pole Cats*, the *Kansas City Serenaders*, the *Lions Club Serenaders*, and the *Hy-Power Serenaders*.

• The Barber Pole Cats were organized in 1936 as the Kansas City Real Estate Board Quartet. The quartet attended and joined at the first meeting of the Kansas City chapter.

- Bert's quartets finished second at international FIVE TIMES —1941, 1942, 1943, 1946 and 1947. They were also international finalists in 1944, 1945 and 1948 and won the CSD championship in 1948.
- With other Kansas City chapter members, the quartet flew to New Mexico, then part of CSD and helped start chapters in Santa Fe and Las Vegas.
- Helped charter chapters in Topeka and St. Joseph.
- The Kansas City Barber Pole Cats had numerous name and personnel changes between 1936 until they retired in 1957, but only one baritone—Bert Phelps.
- Were part of an international finalist recording by Wurlitzer in 1947.

Bert's personal accomplishments include:

- Along with Joe Stern, helped organize the Kansas City chapter in 1938.
- Served as the Kansas City chapter secretary for 10 years.
- In charge of publicity and public relations for the Kansas City chapter from 1938 to 1968.
- Was a member of the international contest and judging committee and with Huck Sinclair and Frank Thorne, was responsible for making scores available for contesting quartets.
- President of the Kansas City chapter in 1952-53.

Dean Snyder said this about Bert Phelps, "...you and Joe Stern stand out in my historical recollection as the foundation stones of our Society in your part of the Nation." Somehow, Bert has escaped induction into the CSD Hall of Fame, but I want to feature Bert's memory in the History Room this year. We have the 1947 recording of the *Kansas City Serenaders*. and I played it in the History Room in Kansas City.

Does Bert have any relatives or close friends in the area? **Pete Tyree** says he still talks to **Bob Turner**, who is pictured standing to Bert's right in the photo at left. I would have liked to invite them to the History Room. ♥

TEN YEARS AGO: FEBRUARY, 1998

I found in the March 1998 issue of Harmonotes --- remember, our bulletin was published on a bimonthly schedule during that year --- an item

by co-editors Dale Neuman and Todd Anderson about a presentation made by chapter board member Jim Davis at the February board meeting regarding our chapter dues as part of the annual chapter budget.

Jim began by noting that "in the last several years, the Kansas City chapter's budget had been slightly over \$100,000 a year to support and fund all of its activities." He then noted that out of the total amount paid in dues each year by each member (other than seniors and students), only \$11.00 came back to the chapter.

He then asked the question, when was that amount last established? No one present, including those whose membership dated back to at least 1972, could remember. That made it apparent that there had been no increase in chapter dues for at least 26 years. Jim made the point that each member (again excepting the old-timers and those who were eligible for the student discount) was contributing no more than roughly \$.92 a month to the administration of the chapter --- and "the wonderful hobby we practice."

Out of curiosity, I attempted to determine what the current dues are for a new member --- not a student --- of the chapter. I found it difficult to find somebody who knew what I needed, because as you know, we write one check to the Society that covers Society. district, and chapter dues in one lump sum. The district and chapter dues are rebated to those organizations.

But thanks to the efforts of my pal, Ron McIntire ---another old-timer --- and Harvey Shapiro. the newly-elected chapter treasurer, I've learned that if I were to join HOA today, my annual chapter dues would be \$35. Quite an increase, huh? Do you think that's appropriate for the amount of pleasure we get from singing with one of the finest choruses in the Society? That's just a tad less than \$3 a month. Remember, that probably won't pay for the gas you need to get to the four meetings each month.

TWENTY YEARS AGO: FEBRUARY, 1988

The men of the *Heart of America Chorus* were looking forward with pleasure to a planned coaching session on Feb. 6 with **Greg Lyne**, past music director of the *West Towns Chorus* of the Lombard, Ill., chapter, international chorus champions in 1987. Three years later, Greg led the *Masters of Harmony*, of Foothill Cities, Calif., to the 1990 gold trophy, with a repeat performance with the same chorus in 1996. We all expected this to be a very constructive session by such a talented young man, which it was.

As far as I can ascertain, Greg was one of only three directors ever to win the international gold with two different choruses. **Lou Laurel** did it with the *Border Chorders* of El Paso, Texas, in 1963, and again with the *Phoenicians*, of Phoenix, Ariz., in 1972. And **Jim Miller**, as everybody should know, accomplished the dream of every director several times with the *Thoroughbreds*, of Louisville, Ky., beginning in 1966—twice with **Joe Wise**—and then moved to Cincinnati, Ohio, and turned the trick with the *Southern Gateway Chorus* in 1992.

FORTY YEARS AGO: FEBRUARY, 1968

Does anybody remember that the 1968 international convention, originally to be hosted by Pittsburgh, Pa., had to be rescheduled a week later at Cincinnati, Ohio, because the headquarters hotel in Pittsburgh was under the threat of a strike by the employees' union, and the hotel couldn't guarantee that rooms for conventioneers and activities could be reserved? Editor **Don Thorne** reminded those of us who had planned to attend the convention to rearrange their vacation plans. However, he assured us that tickets already purchased would be honored, and that hotel reservations need not be changed. I seem to have a very vague recollection of being there with Joyce, the only time I've ever been in Cincinnati.

The Feb. 1968 issue of *Harmonotes* contained the announcement of the death of **Joe Stern**, a charter member of the Kansas City chapter. Editor Don Thorne reminds everybody that Joe had served four terms as chapter president. Wonder how many other presidents can match that record?


Joe served as the international secretary/treasurer in 1941-42, and during that year conceived the idea of a national publication. (*Continued on page 11*)

The first mimeographed edition was dated November, 1941 and bore the title of "Barbershop Rechordings." Joe's name appeared as "editor, publisher, and office boy." After three issues, the name was changed to *The Harmonizer*, which today is the official publication of our Society.

Joe sang with the quartet known as *The Vaudvillians*. He teamed up with **Percy Franks** as the *Four Hands of Harmony*—a piano duet. Joe directed the *Heart of America Chorus* from its inception until 1954.

Joe's song, "Kansas City, My Home Town," was adopted in 1959 as the official song of the city of Kansas City. To quote from an editorial that appeared in The Kansas City Star, "He was an honorable man." And, as Editor Don Thorne pointed out, "And no man could ask for a better epitaph." ♥



A TIP OF THE HAT!

The Tip O'The Hat is recognition to both members and non-members who have made a recent contribution in time and effort to the betterment of the Kansas City, Missouri Chapter.

A big Tip 'O The Hat to **Don Fuson** who engineered the setup of the Installation Awards Dinner, to **Carl Turlin** and **Monty Duerksen** for their work collecting "this is your life, **Jim Bagby**" stories, to Monty Duerksen who presented them, to **Al Higgins** who arranged for the venue and dinner at the DoubleTree hotel.

OLD BUSINESS:

Spring Show Update - Carter Combs

List of possible songs for the Spring Show was emailed to the general membership. BMI & SESAC Licenses were sent and approved by CSD and the BHS for March 29, 2008. JCCC has allocated the center section of seats for ticket sales by *HOA*.

Singing Valentines-John Erwine:

Russell Stover and Tobler Candy have declined to donate candy hearts and flowers this year. Help is being solicited to cover these expenses and other sources for candy and flowers. Singing Valentine Quartets are signing up. Singing Valentine Prices will remain the same as 2007. A "value package" is being considered that might include a "Happy Together" CD.

<u>Director Search Update - Doug Brott:</u>

Good response and feedback has been received from the chorus on the four candidates that auditioned for director. An open discussion by the general membership will be conducted following the Jan, 15 rehearsal. A final decision will be made by the 19th.

NEW BUSINESS:

Board Organizational Proposal - Doug Brott:

All major projects will be assigned to a VP. The VP will be assigned an At-Large board member as a Director for the project and a committee will be assigned to the team. A project notebook would be required to notate contacts, budgets, timelines, etc.,

Sunshine Guidelines – Doug Brott:

The following Sunshine Committee guidelines were adopted.

- · Death of a Chapter Member: A \$100 donation from the Chapter to the charity of the Family's Choice or the Harmony Foundation (if the family does not specify charity) and *HOA* members sing at funeral if requested by the family.
- Death in the Family of a Chapter Member: A \$50 donation from the Chapter to the charity of the Family's choice or the Harmony Foundation (if the family does not specify charity) for any immediate family member of an *HOA* member: wife, significant other, mother, father, sister, brother, son, or daughter. For any other family member, a condolence card will be sent to the chorus member and family.
- · Serious Illness (hospitalization) of Chapter Member or Immediate Family: Get Well card and encourage calls and visits from chapter.
- · Wedding of Chapter Member: Request donation from members and presented as cash gift (or check from the Treasurer).

Continuation of Duties by Dale Newman: The Board will allow Dale to continue to review city, county, state, and federal tax issues, certify the chapter non-profit status to all who require it, license the trailer, handle all US Postal Service permits, receive all items "returned to sender", and other matters that requiring the use of his files.

<u>Director Emeritus Name Tag:</u> The Board agreed to have a name tag made for **Jim Bagby** that reads "Director Emeritus."

Bank Change: The Board agreed to change from the current Bank of Blue Valley to the Bank of Lee's Summit for convenience.

Proposed Co-Marketing/PR VP: The Board agreed to find a way to make Past Marketing VP, **Dick Korek** a VP of Marketing and Promotions. In the interim, the Board agreed to appoint Dick as Assistant VP of Marketing and promotions so he can continue his duties and train **Brad Dawdy**, the 2008 VP of Marketing/PR. ♥
