Obviously, our big push to improve is about raising expectations for all of us, as leaders and as chorus members. You have to do homework and come prepared to sing without music, knowing notes and words, or come prepared to sing silently. We'll practice that singing silently thing early on Tuesday.

In addition, besides passing your audition you must really learn all notes and words and demonstrate you can sing them with quality to your section leader. They will let you know if you need to record some things and what that might be. In general, it's their call to qualify you for the show, any contest, etc. So, just passing the audition process is one simple step. You must also qualify on the music particular to a certain event along with any choreography, etc.

And, we also have an attendance requirement. At least 65% of rehearsals. I know that sounds very low to most of you (I hope). That's the bare minimum. We certainly expect that most of us will be there much more often than that percentage. And, honestly, some guys can get by with that % while others probably can't.

Section leaders will probably begin the process this Tuesday, if they haven't already, of evaluating their guys to be sure they can qualify for the show. And, that minimal attendance thing starts now also. Please let your musical leadership know if you have any questions, and let's get ready for an A level show!



The Power of Music

I'm sitting here at my desk watching an 83-year-old gentleman with significant memory loss singing along with "My Wild Irish Rose" on the stereo. He knows his name, and a good many old tunes—and that's about it. Once every two weeks, I go to the local nursery home to play for the Alzheimer Group's Sing-Along Hour. When I enter the room, three of the 21 residents might actually look at me the rest are in a misty world. But when I begin to play "Let Me Call You Sweetheart" or "Let the Rest of the World Go By," those tunes become my one and only connection with them, and most of them begin to sing.

What is it about music that makes such a deep impression? Is it the melody? The lyrics? The emotion? A combination of things?



On one occasion we did an experiment with the Alzheimer's exercise class. Everyone was asked to imitate the instructor as she raised her hands high. No one responded. She repeated the maneuver a number of times.

as animated as possible speaking first in a soothing tone of voice, then in a lively voice. No response again. Then we passed around rhythm instruments. Tamborines, bells, sticks, etc., were put into the hands of the residents. Then with the accordian, I would simply play a waltz beat with the bass keys—oom pa pah—and immediately 75% would respond. Faces would begin to lighten up, and rhythm instruments would begin to shake. As I'd begin the melody, "Casey would waltz with a strawberry blonde," and the instructor would ask everyone to imitate her and raise their hands in the air and shake the instruments, again approximately 75% would respond, doing what they were asked

I'm sure you've recognized this effect on seniors when you sing in the homes. Can you explain it? Music is such an effective catalyst.

At the other end of the stick, I've gone into many classrooms noisy with active, challenging kids, asked everyone to come and sit down on the mat for a few songs, and had little response because no one was paying attention or could hear what I was saying. But if I begin playing a song on the guitar, and singing the instructions,to come and sit down on the mat, I have everyone's cooperation. And some schools no longer have a music program!



TEN YEARS AGO: FEBRUARY, 2000

Harmonotes was published in an interesting format—four pages that measured five-and

a-half by eight-and a half inches. But it contains a lot of good stuff. Here's something that old **Dan Henry Bowser** had put together:

"The Heart of America Chapter has and incentivebased membership drive underway this year. offers wonderful rewards, ranging from bumper stickers all the way up to the grand prize of a full package for two persons to International 2000 in Nashville! It includes round-trip airfare, hotel for three nights and your contest registrations! This board-approved plan is really quite simple. For each guest, new member, or inactive current member that YOU get involved with, YOU accumulate points which lead to great rewards. This drive is broken down in four quarters of play for the year, which allows more of YOU to reap the rewards! The first quarter of play ends on March 31, 2000. The reward for the first quarter is GREAT! Tools are being provided by the membership team to assist with your efforts, and if you want some free 'prospect names,' call Grant."

Grant Hunget was the 2000 Membership Vice President. Wonder how successful this plan was. I was a member at that time, and I seem to remember it turned out with 17 new members that year. But how many of them are still with us?

TWENTY YEARS AGO: FEBRUARY, 1990

This edition of *Harmonotes* was typewritten on 18 eight-and-a-half by eleven-inch pages. Must have been a lot of work for the editor. It says he was the "International Editor of the Year for 1988." Wonder who he was.

At this time, our chapter was hot and heavy about acquiring it's own meeting-place building. We had been meeting at the Unity Temple, which was an excellent place for our meetings. But it wasn't our own building. According to Chapter President Bob Howard, we needed "additional rooms that could be utilized for vocal coaching, director's classes, quartet practice, woodshedding, section rehearsals and business meetings." Chapter Board Member John Pennington was chairman of a search committee, and this edition of the chapter newsletter had a front-page article by John, who was finding it quite a project to find a suitable place. John came up with a half-dozen problems that made it difficult to find and acquire the perfect place to live. Maybe that's why we're still meeting at the St. Peter's United Church of Christ at 110th and Holmes in Kansas City, MO.

FORTY YEARS AGO: MARCH, 1970

Editor **Dick Ham** was having a heck of a time finding enough material to fill out a decent edition of *Harmonotes*. This issue consisted of only three eight-and-a-half by eleven pages. On the third page, he was forced to resort to the following, the lyrics from the song, "Down By The Old Mill Stream," which he took from the "PROBEMOTOR," the official bulletin of P.R.O.B.E., the organization of Public Relations Officers and Bulletin Editors. Are you ready for it?

"Darn body oat meal stream Wear a first mate shoe, With hair eyesore blue, Dress tin gingham, too.

"It was there anew Add chew loft meat, too. You wear six team, Marvel itch cream, Darn body oat meal stream."



Summary of January 2010 Board Meeting

FINANCE REPORT - Harvey Shapiro

As of 12/31/2009:

- Operating/Social fund was \$13,827.12
- Restricted Fund was \$6550.32
- The Board agreed that 2010 Treasurer Elect Jim Porter could begin the process of finding a new bank to conduct chapter business. The Board did specify that the accounts must be free of service charges save checking supplies.

VP MARKETING/PUBLIC RELATIONS - Brad Dawdy

Cards and flyers for the Singing Valentine's program will be available January 19, 2010.

VP MUSIC & PERFORMANCE - Mark Fortino

New HOA Performing Chorus Standards:

- The Performing Chorus members will have three weeks from the time the sheet music and the learning media become available to learn a new song before the song is sung for the first time.
- Members will be asked to learn no more than one song in any three week period.
- To maintain membership in the Performing Chorus, a member must attend at least 65% of the chapter meetings.
- To maintain membership in the Performing Chorus, a member must record both new contest songs and review it on his own and will promptly record and turn in any passage or entire song to his section leader upon request.
- The Music Team will do its best to give the members a list of two songs that they need to focus on for the following week.
- Only members of the Performing Chorus will be allowed on the risers. Guests may be be on the rises after undergoing an initial voice placement by the director or other member of the Music Team.
- The Music Team will not approve a new or dual member application before qualifying the person for the Performing Chorus.

Singing Valentines Quartet Standards:

- Quartets with all four members in the Performing Chorus, regardless of the part they are singing, are automatically approved as Singing Valentine Quartet.
- If one or more members of a Singing Valentine quartet are not in the Performing Chorus, the quartet must be approved by the Music Team by auditioning in front of the chorus or a member of the team. The Music Team reserves the right to make exceptions to this rule.

The 2010 Presentation Team will be led by **Jerry Meier** and assisted by **Craig Wilcox**.

A new chapter web page explaining the *HOA* Performing Chorus audition process and links to audition sheet music and learning media downloads are forthcoming.

- Church Fee Negotiations:
 As of January 1, 2010 the rent for the rehearsal hall will revert to the regular price of \$120 per week.
 Annual Resolutions:
- The Board agreed to authorize **Dale Neuman** (Board Member Emeritus) to carry out the Chapter's legal business to include but not limited to maintaining: Jackson County Person Property Tax exemption, the license on the *HOA* trailer, business pursuits license, USPS non-profit mailing permit, and the State of Missouri Tax Exemption; seconded and passed.
- The Board agreed that, in accordance with legality issues that may arise if ever an insurance claim is filed, every member in good standing with the Kansas City Chapter (A048) is hereby authorized to accept funds on behalf of the chapter which shall be turned over to the chapter treasurer as soon as possible.
- The Board agreed to designate Assistant Director **Jerry Garrard** as the 2010 Annual Show chairman.
- Harmony Festival 2010 **Mark Fortino**The first committee meeting for Harmony Festival 2010 will be held soon. The most probable Festival date is June 19, 2010.

filled with lasting memories.




Maybe this is the thing that keeps us

Harmony Foundation Report


