

The Saturday before that, Pastor Jody was taken to the hospital with chest pains and remained in the hospital through the day prior to the sale.

Consequently, the church secretary Melanie, found herself organizing the last minute details in between her two part time iobs. She and I kept in close communication and the HOA guys and *Heartbeat* gals pitched in early both mornings to be ready for customers. Not many showed on those two days, so we decided to continue the sale the next Saturday, Oct. 6. With the information on both Facebook and Craigslist, we were able to draw folks in who might otherwise have not known about our sale.

Donations included several televisions, scanners, shelving units, many clothes for all ages, lots of books, cd's, vhs tapes, woodcraft items, kitchen goods, and a large desk and entertainment center. The volunteers went beyond the call of duty helping folks bag-up and load-up, with one group of HOA guys even delivering a desk to a customers house and setting up his computer for him!

The income from the sale will total nearly \$1,250, after I figure out how to sell the really old books that I still have in a box. So. as you might guess, we might do this again next year, so be ready to donate some stuff to the HOA Garage Sale in 2013!

HOA Contributes To Food Pantry

The Heart of America Chorus continues to show its "heart" by contributing biweekly to the food pantry of their host church, St. Peter's United Church of Christ. The pantry is an outreach ministry of the Church to the immediate surrounding neighborhood.

During any given month the pantry provides food supplements to 25 to 50 family units in need. In these financially tenuous times many single parent families, older parishioners on fixed incomes, and families out of work are in need of assistance to make it through the month.

For those of you that measure success in numbers, they are as follows: *HOA* has given in the last four years an average of just under 1,800 food items per year. Last year's highest contribution was 2,086 items. Currently through October the *HOA* total is 1,988 items which seems to indicate that 2012 may be higher than last year's record total. Time will tell as there are at least four more opportunities to contribute through November and December giving on the **second and fourth Tuesday of the month.**

Contributions to the Pantry is just one method that *HOA* continues to show its philanthropic spirit. *HOA* is far more than a bunch of "pretty faces" (sic.) on the risers enjoying singing. *HOA* is a giving part of the spirit and soul of the midwestern greater community that is called Kansas City. *HOA* is a group of young men, sons, fathers, and friends joined in the "spirit of song" giving back to our community.



"My Experience at Harmony University"

Long before I went to Harmony University, I had an almost mythical impression of it. I really had no idea what it was, or where it was. All I knew was that it was some sort of gatheringa place where the best barbershoppers in the world met to sing songs and tags. On Youtube,

I had found video after video of world class barbershopppers singing the most beautiful and stunning tags ever known to man. From what I could tell, the whole thing seemed to take place in an especially loud stairwell somewhere, where even the softest tags would ring for days. So when the chance to actually go to this mysterious Harmony University came to me, I lept! When you sign up for that one week at Harmony U, you're sent a packet of songs, learning media, class information, and everything you need to know. I literally digested these songs, learning bari front to back, then learning my favorites of the other parts (like any bari does unwittingly). This was an easy task, since I was unemployed at the time. The week before the whole thing, I learned that Old School would be headlining the Saturday night show. I could see it all: meeting Joe Connely, singing a tag or song with some of the champs, and learning some of these new and awesome tags.

I didn't particularly know what I was in for, but what I did know was that I had to find this stairwell- this mecca of chord-worshipers. When I arrived at the Northwestern Missouri State campus, I found the registration table with no problems at all. Everything at Harmony University is made simple and clear by the staff and faculty. The staff at Harmony U is just fantastic. After quickly pointing out where the fabled Tag Temple is, as well as the ice cream machine (yes, infinite free ice cream), they helped me work out a custom curriculum completely based on the classes I most wanted to take.

The classes at Harmony U are out of this world. If you're a total barbershop nerd (i.e. a baritone or bass), and you want to eat, sleep, and breathe barbershop for seven days straight, you need to check it out. Even if your ear is not particularly inclined to barbershop (i.e. a lead or tenor), they have classes for every level! Along with my other classes, I was able to bypass music theory in favor of The History of Barbershop, taught by some guy named David Wright. I also managed to audition my way into the Honors Chorus, led by Joe Cerutti. The Honors Chorus will always be a special memory- the quality of that group of singers was profound. For that 4:00pm slot every day that week, I got to take part in a chorus that made the most moving, spiritual, and exciting music I've ever performed. I honestly don't know if I'll ever sing in a group at quite that level again, but the memories will always remain.

All in all, the amount of information I was taking in from morning till midnight every day was immense! Not only was I learning about barbershop choral sound in my 10am Sound Management class, but I was practicing it every afternoon with the same teacher! And trust me, at Harmony U, you will sing all day and all night. Everyone quickly learns that they must drink lots of water and find rest whenever possible to survive! Plenty of over-zealous "Lover Come Back"-ers

and "Last Night"ers found it a little more difficult to belt 'em out come Thursday.

The final show on Saturday night was simply incredible. Three collegeassembled choruses, the Sound of the Rockies chorus, a few quartets and Old School hit the stage in downtown St. Joe. I performed with the Honors Chorus, and along with singing the best barbershop set of my life, we sang "Tis the Gift to be Simple" with Tim Waurick, who made a surprise cameo. The show went out with a bang (a very loud and precise bang) with Old School.

After the Saturday night show, we had our last night to enjoy Tag Temple. It was, surprisingly, a lot like I had imagined it would be. For one thing, it was practically an AIC sing-off for much of the night! It produced the most fantastic tag singing that I've ever witnessed. There were so many

beautiful tags and songs in that room, that it was packed with people who were there just to listen. Neither the crowd nor I could get enough of that night, and for that matter, the week. I listened and sang tags that night till the last dog died.

happening with individual singers! I saw a classroom of chorus directors make profound breakthoughs in their individual singing almost every day--I kid you not. People go to Missouri from all over the world for this week of education, immersion and great music. Many of the people I met haven't sung on the international stage, yet they make this journey every year to get better at the

thing they love most. There's simply no better place on earth to meet more people who love our art, all of them striving to make great music.

Needless to say, I had an incredible time at Harmony University, and I highly recommend it to anyone who wants to spend a week of their life learning about barbershop, meeting people who love barbershop, singing day and night, or just eating lots of (free) ice cream. The experiences I have from Harmony U will stay

with me for a lifetime. If you're a barbershopper at heart, this place is made for you.

Watching all the great performances of choruses and quartets that had just come off a week of coaching and education was not only an experience in itself, but also a reaffirmation of a maxim that I'd slowly been learning: you can always improve. I watched the most amazing transformations every day. They happened in my chorus constantly as we changed the way we performed and sang over the week. But perhaps more amazingly, transformations were

Hardly anyone knew Jerry was around. He was so quiet, yet he always seemed to be there, doing what he could to support the chapter when and wherever he was needed.

Jerry joined the Kansas City Chapter in 1994 and found his place in the HOA chorus—

most of the time standing on the right end of the risers and almost always on the second row. That place suited him best because he was not tall man. Most would agree, he had a strong, bass voice.

He loved music, especially barbershop music. Jerry had a kind heart too. For a number of years he stopped by to pickup Jim Moynihan to bring him to St. Peter's and to chorus performances, partly because he could but mostly because it was in his nature.

Jerry died of cancer Aug. 8, 2012 at the age of 82. He was a barbershopper for 25 years.

Thirty-eight past and present members of *HOA* were on hand at his funeral at Mt. Moriah & Freeman Funeral Home to sing *Friends* and *I Believe* under the direction of Emeritus Director, Jim Bagby. >

Note that we will have our raffle each time we meet in our regular location. By Board resolution, this year all of the proceeds from the raffle not given as prizes goes to Harmony Foundation. In return, the board is able to have the Foundation designate up to 30%

of the fund to chapter activities such as Harmony Explosion.

As of Oct. 24, after 39 drawings (13 since last report):

- The total collected for Harmony Foundation since the last report is \$262.
- The total collected for the year to date is \$793.
- The total for the previous year was \$869.
- The total two years ago was \$1,602.

Jim Clark hit the jackpot and won \$505 on Oct. 23.

Ticket Sale Contest For HHS Show

Hopefully, by now, you have heard about the contest that we are running within both choruses for selling tickets to this years's HHS show. Just for clarification purposes, here are the rules:

1) We have extended the deadline for eligibility in the contest to Nov. 15, so you still have 2-1/2 weeks left to go sell tickets.

2) To be eligible for the contest, you have to sell at least 10 tickets to the show. The actual number of tickets you sell will determine the number of times your name will be entered in the drawing, so (for instance) if you sell 20 tickets to the show, you would have twice the number of chances to have your name drawn that you would have if you sold 10 tickets.

3) Due to our policy - this year - of giving a \$5 discount off of any priced ticket (\$15, \$20, or \$25) for group sales of 10 or more, that applies to you as the contest entrant. Therefore, you are perfectly eligible to purchase 10 of the \$20 tickets (for instance) for \$150 (with \$5 discount per ticket) and then go sell those 10 tickets for face value or whatever you want to sell them for, or even to give them away to your friends and relatives. This would be a great way for you to become eligible for the drawing AND to help us sell out the venue for both shows. Let's be frank - we work very hard to prepare for this show each year; isn't it more rewarding to do that with the seats full rather than half full? This is a good way for you to support your chorus' goal of making significant dollars on this show - each chorus receives half of the net profits.

This should be an easy sell - \$15 - \$20 - or \$25 is a bargain for hearing Vocal Spectrum alone, much less getting to hear each of our choruses, plus the combined chorus with 8-part harmony, plus the other quartets, and on and on...

The winner of the drawing wins a brand new 32-inch flat screen color TV!

Now go out there and sell, sell, sell.

You can have a seat right up front on the Central States District judging panel at the spring convention in McPherson. Kansas. You'll choose your scoring category: Singing, Presentation or You don't have to know the specifics about any of those, because your scores won't count. But vou have access to the category descriptions prior to the contest and can bone up. Or you can just let your experience and gut feel guide you.

You'll wear an official judge badge, attend the pre-contest briefing, eat Friday dinner, Saturday lunch and dinner with the judges, have access to the judges' hospitality suite and get the same scoring sheet the judges use, with your name pre-printed on it. You'll get to be part of the comparison when the scores are tabulated. And your name will be footnoted on the official scoring summary.

How can you be the one person who lands this singular, first-time-ever honor? Very simple. You pay for it. And the money will go to help get our first-ever youth chorus, The Recruits, to the international competition in Las Vegas this coming January.

It's a simple bidding process that begins now at \$200 and ends at midnight, Dec. 31. The McPherson con-

vention is the weekend of April 19-21, so the winning bidder will have lots of time to prepare his or her judicial chops. Help will be available from any member of the CSD contest and judging community. More on that later.

All you need to know now is that you go to rrs@mdsi.kscoxmail.com and enter your tax-deductable bid. No one will see it except the administrator of this philanthropic venture. Bob Swenson of Manhattan, Kan. As you bid, your name will be added to a Yahoo email group. At least once a week. and more often if the number of bids dictates. Bob will post to the group the top bid (but not the name of the bidder), much like a silent auction, and send that out to all who have bid. We also expect to announce the top bid to the district, through other lists, to spark additional interest.

We'll announce the winner Jan. 2 and work with that person to make him or her comfortable for the experience in McPherson.
