Our highlight was for *HOA* to take center stage on Saturday for about 40 minutes to a noise-afflicted, carnival runway crowd that was grateful for a more pleasant sound. Our own Armchair Chorderbacks contributed to the success of the day.

Next up was our 8th annual HOA Golf Tournament on Sept. 18, held again at Falcon Lakes in Leavenworth. As always, HOA's Kent Miller came through with another very successful event. The dipstick we use to calibrate success – not one complaint from anyone that I'm aware of. Now there are those of us that he brow-beat coming into the event, but that's another story.

As sometimes usually happens, you plan for the best but hope for the worst. That is sort of what happened putting together a last-minute retreat prior to fall contest. We finally got a date scheduled at Lake Chippewa in Ottawa, Ks, only to find out they had double booked us with another group. So we were out. Last minute efforts granted us our facility at St. Peter's where we rehearse weekly.

On Oct. 26 and 27, the final preparations formulated for this lastminute event were finalized. The high point of the event was the star coach, being none other than **Mr. Rik Johnson**. I know I've shrunk over the last few years, but this dude is tall - maybe up to his breastbone if I hugged him – not! Joking aside, yes he is tall in stature, but also tall in knowing what he is talking about!

We found Rik to be one of the most patient, yet demanding coaches I've ever seen. He's the guy that gets through to you when you've heard the same story a dozen times before, and you still don't get it. Then Rik comes into play, and – Bang! There it is. Things like" legato" is the secret sauce, take a full, deep breath even when you don't need it while remembering "this is easy," posture, open wind pipe and larynx, shape and trajectory of the sound. And then remember to verbally celebrate the VICTORIES! Most times these will rub off to help correct many insufficient habits. Also, remembering that "we are one" with each other and our Director in trust, delivery, tone, sections and all things Barbershop. Finally, but certainly not last on his list, remember "it's the journey" that counts, not the numbers or placement in a contest setting. Only we control our destiny, and fun has to be the ultimate experience within it.

I think it was **Mike Schumacher** that left this quote with us on the last day of the retreat by **Tony Robbins** "If you do what you've always done, you'll get what you've always gotten. It's not what we do once in a while that shapes our lives, but what we do consistently."

Oct. 4 found us at the Ritz Charles Hotel in Overland Park as the guest entertainers for the Cross-Lines Gala fundraiser event for many worthwhile charities in the metro area. This was a great venue to not only give back to the community that supports us, but practice our contest set for the CSD contest in Cedar Rapids later in the month.

On Oct. 7th we welcomed many guests to our send-off rehearsal for our upcoming CSD contest. It was such a great evening, finished off with all those "sweet" things to enhance your health and singing – ha!

Now to the center ring of the "big show." – The CSD Annual Convention and quartet/chorus competitions for qualification to the 2015 International Convention in Pittsburg, PA. Beautiful Cedar Rapids was a dry, non-flooded city as opposed to our 2008 gathering. We were wrapped in the luxury of the beautifully restored Paramount Theater.

I have to say that the weekend was awesome! Not only the chorus productions, but quartet offerings as well. My first competition was in 2006. I can only emphasize the huge increased and positive difference in singing and presence on stage there has been since that time.

What does this mean to me? It means that I'm very proud of how we presented ourselves on stage. It also means that there is no way we can give up on trying to improve upon what we personally contribute each week. Not only for others, but primarily ourselves. Competition numbers and placement have nothing to do with this philosophy. They only tend to confuse the issues at hand. Most of what Rik and others taught us stuck like glue.

Whatever it is we do in this short life, if we do it pretty well we don't want to do less next time, or there will be disappointment and frustration over time. If we do it really well, the same rule applies. Sure, there may be a shortcoming now and then, but the continuing long-term efforts continue to raise and reward. So if we strive to do our own personal best each time, just think about the collective effect it may produce. We may never be, or even want to be. "the best" – but we certainly can and should always want to be "our best." In my thinking, therein lies the secret to success at whatever level you may want to define it.

Now to the last, and perhaps most important decision I've imposed on this Chapter in two years. I moved our regularly scheduled meeting nights Tuesday 21st to the 23rd,

and Tuesday 28th to the 30th. This move was intended to accommodate all showing any interest, of any degree, in the 2014 World Series of Baseball; especially for the great and faithful Royals/(Giants) fans in this great supportive Kansas City Metro area! I hope it saves my hide!

A few last thoughts; in my mind we have grown closer together as a brother-hood and core unit than in some times past. We are trusting Director, Jerry Garrard more than ever, and he in turn us as well. We have demonstrated that whatever we are confronted with, we will prevail in accomplishing it successfully.

All that being said, our consistent riser numbers range between 28-40 for rehearsals and performances. We are also aware that, although we have a big sound for our numbers, in order to better fill and balance that big sound strongly, and carry the song's message successfully, we need to increase our numbers as we move forward. I strongly believe that our "curiosity" and "forward-looking" leadership will continue to open new ways into the future and accomplish this desire.

I have a long-term belief in this Chapter. I believe we are solid, progressive, curious, forward-thinking, and always looking for new doors to open; new paths to follow in ways to exploit the future. Once more, thanks for all your efforts in achieving the standards that this chorus is known for.




















CSD Rankings

The 17 BHS districts completed their fall competitions on Oct. 25, and the lineup for the International chorus contest in Pittsburgh in July 2015 is thus finalized [barring later withdrawals].

While the ranking is of some interest, in most district competitions involving a top-level chorus there was little doubt who would emerge as district champion, and the only important consideration was to make the cut and qualify for International. Therefore, the rankings in these competitions may not be very strong indicators of who will emerge with the medals next July. That said, the top 10 choruses, with percentage scores are:

- 1: Westminster, 94.5% (FWD)
- 2: Ambassadors of Harmony, 93.8% (CSD)
- 3: Alexandria Harmonizers, 90.9% (MAD)
- 4: Denver Mile High, 89.1% (RMD)
- 5: Central Standard, 87.2% (CSD)
- 6: Nashville Music City, 86.4% (DIX)
- 7: Hamilton Square NJ, 85.7% (MAD)
- Voices of Gotham, 85,3% (MAD)
- 9: Tampa Heralds of Harmony, 84.6% (SUN)
- 10: Bloominaton Sounds of Illinois: 83.5% (ILL)

Other notables:

13: Fremont Pathfinders, 82.9%, the third CSD chorus in the running

11, 12, 14: Men of Independence, Southern Gateway, The Alliance three choruses from JAD.

20: Sunrise, FL, THX, 81.6%, the last qualifying wildcard chorus.

Two more CSD members. South Central Kansas (28th) and Mason City, IA (30th) fell just short of qualifying [but still could be called if there are dropouts). The Heart of America Chorus finished 48th overall, just ahead of Grand Rapids, MI, (50th) which qualified for International as the Pioneer District champion.

Since the start of 2014, we have done 12 performances and have at least four more scheduled between now and the end of the year including another doubleheader on Oct. 24. And we will be part of the Men's

Choral Festival at the John Knox Village Pavilion at 6:30 p.m. Nov. 2, where the free will offering will benefit their food pantry. All of us are pleased to be seeing a much trimmer Mike O'Dell back at rehearsals after his surgery earlier this vear.

Our ecumenical approach has let us

fill in for Baptist, Christian, Episcopal, Lutheran, Methodist and Presbyterian choirs during worship services this past summer. We have also sung for women's organizations that were church-affiliated. We have provided music at a number of retirement complexes and care facilities across the metro area. We were able to visit with long-time *HOA* member **Sam Solomon** when we sand at Santa Marta on July 23. (And we visited HOA one Tuesday night and did two numbers for their program.)

We also do a barbershop demo where we encourage the audience to join us in picking on the baritones for the weirdness of the part they allegedly sing.

Generally, we do not schedule a performance when he cannot be there or if we would not have enough men on each part to have a balanced sound. This was for a Lutheran Women's Leadership Conference at the Holiday Inn Conference Center near KCl in June. The

program went very well as all three did great jobs. The other time we performed without Jim for at least the first song or two was more recent and he (he claims) was busy doing barbershop business on the internet only to see a reminder from Tony to arrive at 9:45 that morning to warm up. When he looked at his watch, it was

already 9:45 and he was still at home, not in uniform. the venue was on NW 79th Terrace—and Jim lives near Raytown. That he got there to take over by the second song is testimony to his speed at many things, an ability to multi-task and maybe a good radar detector.
