We have some wonderful music for our 2007 spring show – songs that will delight our audience and be a great addition to our repertoire. Above all, they're songs the *Heart of America Chorus* will derive much fun and pleasure from performing. One of them is our

contest ballad for Denver, and it's one of the greatest love songs we've ever laid a vocal cord on (more about it later).

Some of these songs-in fact several-fall into the category of challenging music, as most of you already have discovered. Our finale, "All Rise," certainly is one of the most demanding charts we've undertaken, from a range and rhythm standpoint. A special mini-chorus has volunteered to take on the more difficult Chorus 2, and gifted lead **Mark Fortino** (well, how many of us have our own CD out?) will do the soaring solo. It's basically the same version that the *Voices of Lee* did, nicely treated into nine parts by **Brent Dunavant** of the Heart of Texas Chapter.

Then there's "Small World, another multi-part endeavor from the pen of ever-brilliant **Clay Hine**, not as hard as it is licketysplit, and the ultra-exciting **Jim Clancy** arrangement of "Harmony" that will be our *HOA* opener for the next couple of years.

We will have started on all these by the time you read this. All are available on the *HOA* Web site, and on excellent part-predominant CD's–along with all the spring show songs–thanks again to great work by section leaders **Carter Combs, Mike Neff, Grant Hunget** and **Keith Schweer**, plus production/engineering ace **Mark Fortino** (hmmm, where have I heard that name?) and our usual reproduction team.

HOWEVER, it should be obvious that in order to devote our meeting time to polishing, rather than to the learning process, we must adopt a new attitude and work ethic in 2007. And according to results of the just-completed chapter survey, you agree. That is, 98 percent of the respondents said "we should be studying our music at home." Now our job is to change that to 100 percent saying "we WILL study our music at home." Please go back to Clancy's article in the November *Harmonotes*, where he talks about the *Vocal Majority* members taking 1-3 weeks to learn a new piece of music before the chorus begins to work on it seriously. OK, we may not become the *VM* this year, but with your cooperation, this sure seems like a step in the right direction.

I know your musical leadership is ready to work harder, and smarter. We have a daylong planning session set for Jan. 20, if you have any ideas you want to get to new Music Vice President **Carter Combs**. My weekly sound feedback is going to be much better, thanks to my Christmas present from **Joann**: an Olympus 3100PC digital voice recorder.

We'll know early on how we're progressing. We have a major show at John Knox Village on Feb. 17. Let's see how much of the new music we have ready to perform on that night, even if it's without full staging.

I know one thing for sure we did right in 2006: the new *HOA* CD. I've heard the next-to-final mix and I can promise you'll like the finished product, and be proud of this project. Congratulations are in order for all involved!

And I know we may remember 2007 as the year of "Time after Time," one of the most compelling ballads ever adopted by *HOA*. This arrangement by the late **Ed Waesche** is one of his finest, and was sung in gold medal performances both by *Power Play* and the *Masters of Harmony*. We have **Mark Hale's** tag on it, and an interpretive plan created by our music team that's better than that of either aforementioned group (but don't let that out).

Speaking of Hale, he's now scheduled to work with us three times in '07, the first one Saturday, Ferbruary 24. Please mark (pun intended) your calendar; that replaces the Feb. 3 date where some boob on the music team whose initials are "J.B." forgot to note a conflict on his calendar.

I'm excited about the coming year, and hope you are, too! Let's round up the backsliders, help incoming Membership Veep **Bob Murphy** add to our numbers and have a bang-up 2007. Happy New Year! ♥

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A Review of the *AOH* Annual Christmas Show

Each year I go to this show with the expectation that it will be even better than what I've seen and heard before. The 140 or so voices of the *Ambassadors of Harmony* did not disappoint me.

Once again this year, they did five shows, all sellouts, in the beautiful Blanche M. Touhill Theatre at University of Missouri-St. Louis. I came looking to see our own **Brian Marston** in their midst, but Brian is in his first semester of college, it was finals week and it may be 40-plus years ago but I know the feeling when Brian had to concede he couldn't do it. The format of their show is the same as in past years _ the first half features the fun songs of Christmas (snow, Santa Claus, etc), and all of the singers were dressed casually with brightly colored sweaters and scarves. This part wrapped up with their hilarious presentation of "Twelve Days of Christmas." There was then an interlude before intermission where Vocal Spectrum did a set, then the chorus came back in its formal outfits to do the Story of Christmas, singing the songs that speak of the Christ child after kicking off with "Hanukkah Medley." Most of the songs are old favorites that you can hear on the AOH Christmas music CD. They close, as they always do, with a dignified presentation of "Silent Night," where the members all walk off stage and are all around the back of the theater when the song ends. After that, they can get into the lobby, where we can come out and greet them one by one. I was able to meet Jim Henry, David Wright and Kevin Keller.

Vocal Spectrum sang some songs from their show repertoire, including "South Rampart Street Parade" and "Cruella DeVille," but added a couple of new ones. One was *Gas Hous Gang's* tribute to his son **Rob Henry's** son, **Ryan**, a tune called "Lullabye" from GHG's final CD. *VS's* beautiful "Bring Him Home" might take on a new meaning as we contemplate our future in Iraq.

All in all, it's a challenge to keep the audience coming back year after year, and it's a challenge for the men to do five shows in three days, being onstage for nearly all of each show. But AOH is doing it, and I'm looking forward to more next year! \heartsuit

and accomplishment, but something more. During the evening performance something else happened. I'm not sure exactly when, but I think during "Silent Night" is when I became aware of it.

"Stop pushing." "I'm not, you bumped into me!" "Shhhhh!" "Stop looking through the curtain!" "But there's Mom and Dad...Hi!" "Quit!" "Where's Jimmy? He's supposed to turn on the manger light." "He had to go to the outhouse really quick." "Floyd, did you close the draft on the stove like Miss

Mildred asked you to? It looks awfully red." "Okay I'm ready, just as soon as I give the welcome speech, then get with the rest of the wise men, you can open the curtain." "But the sheet is caught on the wire!"

The curtain opened and little baby Jesus was all aglow in the hay with Mary, Joseph, the wise men, angels and animals in the stable gathered closely by. After telling the story of their journey, everyone including the angels and animals, sang "Away In A Manger". It was soon followed by "Oh, Little Town of Bethlehem" and "Silent Night." There were probably others. Some were stories, poems and recitations such as my brother Terry gave, who in kindergarten boldly recited "Fuzzy Wuzzy Wuz A Bear." He hates it to this day.

Yes, I walked to school in those days. It was only half-mile up hill in either direction. Snow drifts were sometimes over our heads. There were no snow days when school could be conveniently closed. On this page is photo taken of Green School (Evergreen District) where I attended 2nd through 5th grades from 1949-1952. Later, when I went back to "town school" I was ahead of most of the kindergarten and first grade students that I'd previously known, in English, geography and science (not so



much in math, I'm sorry to say. But I'll bet they couldn't stoke a very good coal fire, either).

Through the spotlights I could see no one. I was as nervous and excited now as I was some 55 years ago in that little 20' x 24' souternn Iowa schoolhouse. I was moved by the moments created by the emotional direction of **Jo Kraut** and **Jim Bagby**.

I was also moved because I knew my family was in front of me, somewhere close but blind to me through the lights. Just as my parents had been close those many years ago sitting in those cramped, old oak school desks while I gave the welcoming speech, played a wise man and sang my heart out to them; the parents I love so dearly. The not-yet 22-year-old teacher pictured second row left wrote the accompanying article (see page seven), which was published in December 1932, in the *Lamoni Chronicle*, Lamoni, Iowa. There were many more. She must have felt something of the same as she proudly encouraged, inspired and promoted her 10 students in their annual Christmas program a mere 74 years ago this past December. This, in the same one-room schoolhouse that I attended. All those past Christ-

mas programs, from 1932-1934, and from 1949-1952, must have meant as much to her and were as dear to them as it is to us this day.

While reading her article, you can see without question the differences in technology, then and now, and what belief and imagination can do to make life a precious gift. To make music a precious gift. Are things really so different now in our beliefs and our way of expressing them than long ago? What of the similarities of tradition, excitement to share with the community and the efforts to give and support a

common worthwhile charity? I can't remember the last time I thought about my years in that one-room schoolhouse. I'm sure many of you have similar memories. For that I thank the music. Good for the heart? Good for the soul? You bet!

Dad has been gone for 20 years now. Mom is still with us in an assisted living facility. How I wish she could have been at the show this year. I wish I could have sung "Silent Night" to them both again as I did in 1950, with the same nervousness and excitement as that night. By the way, did I mention that the young school teacher, Louise Strecker, is my Mother? She'll be 96 on January 16. *This is for you, Mom.* ♥

We have some new coping saws and everybody is very much interested in making something. We are also making glass pictures.

Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Thompson brought us a Christmas tree. We appreciated this very much.

Last Friday we drew names for buying our presents.

Wednesday afternoon Superintendent Hutchinson and Miss Parker paid us a short visit. Miss Parker was checking up on the standardization of our school. Last week Junior Bowen received a fangle pin for having sold 25 cents worth of Christmas seals. Altogether we have sold about \$1 worth.

One day last week the general lessons class made some free hand cuttings of candles, pine trees and snow men. They are very good for the first time. We have them on the front blackboard. Miss Parker liked them.

We have a very pretty blackboard picture. It is of a fireplace, a chair, Santa Claus and a Christmas tree. There is a blazing fire in the fireplace and there are three red stockings hanging from the top of the fireplace.

Across the front of the room we have a green cord with icicles on it. We have some other pretty decorations up.

The sand box is fixed up in two scenes. In one end of it we have Bethlehem, with the wise men there and the baby in the manger, etc. The other end of the box is a snow scene. There is white tissue paer for snow and there are houses and a Christmas tree. Under the tree are some toys that have been made of paper.

We have made many Christmas posters. They are mostly of wise men and Santa Claus.

We are saving cinders to make "Depression Plants" with.

Last week we had vegetable soup three days and cocoa two days.

The Battle Hill school kindly sent us some patterns for our manual training work. They were accompanied by a nice letter from one of the pupils. We expect to send them a letter of thanks soon.

We are going to have our program and Christmas tree tomorrow afternoon, December 23, at 2:30 o'clock. Everyone is welcome to come.

TEN YEARS AGO: JANUARY 1997:

Not much out of the ordinary in this issue (What am I saying? Everything *HOA* does is "out of the ordinary"). There's a large, excellent photo on the front page, taken by **Linda**

Schumacher, of "all 60-plus members of the *Heart of America Chorus*, arrayed in those gorgeous gold vests, singing their hearts out for the folks at the Blue Ridge Mall on Dec. 14." There's another good one by **John Starcke** on page 3 of the newly installed chapter officers and board members for 1997. And there's another one on page 5 by John of the new officers of the *Heartbeats*, all except **Sharon Oldehoeft**, the new treasurer.

And finally, on page 7, we see **Don Young**, newly sworn in for his second term as chapter president, presenting the "Barbershopper of the Year" award to **Darrell McCune** in recognition of his contribution over the past year —"and beyond." John probably took that one, too, although there's no credit. Like I said, nothing is ever done by *HOA* that's not "out of the ordinary."

TWENTY YEARS AGO: SEPTEMBER, 1987

Our editor used his recurring column, "COMMENTARY," to announce a slight change in appearance of the banner of our monthly chapter newsletter. It happened that he had to order a year's supply of the preprinted front page (about 3,000 copies), and also to add the year "1986" to our string of CSD chorus championships. So, in the process, he decided to follow the advice of the Layout and Reproduction judge in the recent district bulletin contest, who felt that our banner was too large for the page and suggested that he reduce its size to no more than one-third of the page.

"Barbershop harmony really begins at the end and works backwards. If a quartet is well equipped with 'wicked' endings, the body of the song may be fairly conventional. It is the close that leaves the final fragrance of the barbershop, and if this be beautifully flavored with a nostalgic aroma, it matters little what has gone before. The most obvious harmonies are forgotten in a really subtle finish."

The judge also criticized the name of our bulletin, claiming he "couldn't connect it to your chapter as the judging now expects." Our editor found that a bit hard to understand when the winner of the 1986 international bulletin contest was Hotaire, the bulletin of the Monterey Peninsula (CA) Chapter.

So the printer was instructed to reduce the size of the banner, which resulted in a gain of about four more column inches of space on the front page. But he assured us all that "we have no intention of changing our name, which goes way back to the early 1950s — at least."

FORTY YEARS AGO: JANUARY, 1967

Editor **Don Thorne** devoted the entire front page of this issue to a summary of chapter accomplishments during 1966. These included the growth to the position of the largest chapter in the Central States District, the retention of the chapter's status in the Century Club (100 members or more), and two highly successful benefit shows for the Institute of Logopedics.

But Don expresses his opinion that by far the most enjoyable event during the year was the annual installation banquet held during the preceding December. According to Don, the highlight of the evening was the installation of the new chapter officers by the Society executive director, **Barrie Best**. Entertainment was furnished by the *Skyliners* and the *Merry Mugs*.
