"WELCOME BACK, JIM!"

The *Heart of America Chorus* is very fortunate to have someone with **Jim Bagby's** talent and energy as our musical director ...again. As **Gordon** said in his article last month, being the director of the *Heart of America Chorus* takes a lot of time—time between Tuesdays in planning and preparation. Well, Jim's done it before. He knows what it takes and he's ready to do it again! For those of you who are not long-time members or for those

who have forgotten, Jim led HOA to its first Central States District championship in 1978 here in Kansas City. That was followed by our first International competition in Minneapolis in '79 where we placed 8th and we were ecstatic about it! He followed that with CSD victories in '79, '80, '81, '82, and '83. Those championships led to International appearances in '80 (Salt Lake City), '81 (Detroit), '82 (Pittsburgh), '83 (Seattle) and '84 (St. Louis). He resigned the first time after the '83 CSD District Contest, taking a break until his return in 1990 starting another string of 3 CSD championships that qualified us for International Contests in '91 (Louisville), '92 (New Orleans) and '93 (Calgary). Between 1994 and 1998, we qualified as a wild card entry twice more under Jim's direction.

It was during that break that Jim's *Rural Route 4*, one of the

most popular and entertaining quartets in the history of our Society, won the gold in Salt Lake City in 1986. WHAT A RECORD!!

The Heart of America Chorus can also take pride in the fact

that our director is the only Society–Certified Master
Director in the Central States District.
This is only the beginning of Jim's barbershop credits,
but it about the only the translation of the problem.







THE GLOBAL MUSIC EXCHANGE BARBERSHOP CHORUS TOUR OF CHINA - OCTOBER 27 - NOVEMBER 13, 2001

Editor's Note: Our December 2001 issue featured an article by Don Peck regarding his incredible trip to China. It turns out some of the story got lost in transit! Following is the missing portion. Thanks again, Don!

On board ship we find that our rehearsals go much better when we stand so that we sway side-to-side rather than front-to-back with the ship's movement. Hev, those Chinese words are tough! Our show shirts are black with a wide red slash across the left shoulder and a Barber Pole World Harmony emblem, and are to be worn with black pants and shoes.

The next day we stop in Fengdu, a small ancient river town to visit the Shibaozhai Pagoda and the narrow streets of the market place. New American dollar bills are king in China, and you must bargain or the Chinese will be offended.

We take our last look at the Yangtze as we depart our cruiser in Chonquing, a city built on the side of a mountain and home to several million people. No bikes are allowed in this mountainous city. Everyone has sturdy legs from climbing these streets. We visit the zoo to see the famous Pandas. The next stop is the

People's Meeting House where the Communist leaders meet and was opened only recently to the public. We cannot resist singing a couple of songs in the huge domed auditorium. The very large city market filled with all kinds of fish, foul, meat, fresh vegetables, eggs (some aged for 30 days in manure) and other items defying description are fascinating. In the afternoon we fly to Xi'an (Shean) the former capital of China for over 1000 years and the only completely walled city left in China. Following dinner, another chorus rehearsal.

We visit Banpa Museum, the meticulously restored ruins of the living quarters and artifacts of a 6000-year old Neolithic village. The afternoon is spent visiting the Museum of the Qin Emperor's Tomb, the first emperor of China. This archeological site, still under excavation, displays the life-size army of over 6,000 terra cotta warriors and horses that guarded the tomb over 22 centuries ago. It is considered the "Eighth Wonder of the World".

We have a delightful evening attending an "Imperial Dumpling Banquet" at a famous restaurant followed by the Tang Dynasty music and dance show. The costumes are tremendous with the girls looking every bit the China Dolls, the dancers so graceful using the beautiful flowing sleeves of their gowns to accentuate their moves. Their singing is extremely high-pitched and very different to our American ears. Next day we visit the Wild Goose Pagoda.

Our first official concert is at the Foreign Language Institute in Xi'an. The students put on a short singing performance before we take the stage. We are well received and the students clamor to visit with both the singers and clappers in our group. The students are extremely polite and very interested in America and our music. Our local guide here in Xi'an is a pretty 25 year-old college graduate who speaks beautiful English and sings several love songs to us in Chinese. Needless to say, we all fall in love with her!

We leave the next morning for an hour's flight to Beijing and a 3-hour bus ride to Shijiazhuang (Sue-John-Dwong),

a small city of only 7 million people. It is the capital of Hebei Province that surrounds Beijing with a population of 66 million. You never saw so many bicycles in your life. Lots of traffic but no upset if you are cut off or cross the white line or go through a red light. Our buses have no problems

one seems to get angry or

with the congested traffic as we have a police escort in this town as well as in Xi'an. Local dignitaries including the Lt. Governor of Hebei Province and the City Mayor host a banquet that evening with many speeches. We sing for then, of course.

We have a joint rehearsal the next morning with the Senior Mixed Chorus of Hebei Province. We figure out how to get our combined choruses on stage for the finale to sing in both English and Chinese, and then run through our program.

The performance that evening in the beautiful new 3,000-seat symphony hall at the Hebei Art Center is a great success. Each chorus gives a performance before combining for the finale. Lots of young people and students are in the audience who speak English and are delightful to talk with. They ask for copies of our music.

On one crisp morning we get up early to participate in the early morning exercises in a city park. Hundreds of people of all ages are doing all sorts of exercises such as a form of line dancing, simple stretching, traditional Tai Chi (with swords), and group singing. After joining in the exercises, we sing a couple of songs that are hugely appreciated. Then we climb back on our buses, they on their bicycles, and we are off for whatever the day has in

After driving back to Beijing, we visit Longxing Temple where statues of Buddhas and their accompanying buildings have been collected from all over China and

brought to this location for protection and preservation.

In Beijing we walk through the largest public square in the world. Tiananmen Square. Beijing was the ancient capital of Imperial China and is the capital of present-day China. In the middle of the square is their equivalent of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington, with a 24-hour guard. At the opposite side of the square from the Forbidden City-and it seems like a mile in distance-is Mao's Tomb, with spectacular sculptures on each side. We tour the Forbidden City. This walled city forms one side of the square. Many of you may have seen the movie "The Last Emperor". Well, we saw it all with our own eyes. You know you are in China when you see this display of the ancient world. After lunch we visit the Summer Palace on the shores of Kurning Lake. In the evening, the gourmet level goes up yet another notch-the traditional Beijing Duck Banquet (At this point, we would have much preferred a Kansas City steak or Bar-be-que!)

We have our last performance in Beijing at the number one university in China, Qinghua University. Preceding our performance, we are thrilled by one of the most beautiful student acappella choirs we've ever heard. They sing familiar classical pieces in several languages. We are treated to a "solo" performance by the Chinese National Student Champion operatic tenor, and a perfect rendition of the "Vienna Waltz" by a pristine quartet of young girls.

Kenny Hatton realizes we will never be able to out sing these young singers so we will have to focus on entertainment. And that we do, much to the delight of the audience. Our program consists of "Rainbow Sister" (well known Chinese folk song sung in Chinese), "America, I Love You" (as intro to "Wait Till the Sun Shines, Nellie"), "Coney Island Baby", "I Love You Truly", "Red River Valley" (part in English, part in Chinese), "Down Our Way", "Edelweiss" (tag in Chinese), Hao Yun Qi Singers Quartet (Holly Beck. tenor: Brian Beck, lead: Kim Orloff. baritone: Jerry Orloff, bass), "Jingle Bells" (chorus in Chinese, directed by Brian Beck, and including a sing-along with the audience), "Auld Lang Syne" (English and Chinese), "Home on the

Range", "Bye Bye Blues" (directed by **Val Hicks**), and "Keep the Whole World Singing."

At the end of our program, the student chorus, which is seated in the audience, spontaneously breaks out in their rendition of "Auld Lang Syne" and then rushes on stage to greet us. Emotions are very high and there isn't a dry eye on the stage. They all want our music. Hey, what can I say—they love our Barbershop style!

Our last day is spent visiting the main tomb of Emperor Wanli, which is an excellent example of the grandeur of the Ming Dynasty. Then the Great Wall, itself! The construction of this wall started in the seventh century B.C. and continued until the sixteenth century A.D. and extends nearly 4,000 miles through China's seven northern provinces. It is very impressive and beyond description. Here at the Wall, the weather turns against us, cold, windy and finally some snow. We are to have a performance on the Wall in our uniforms and a photo shoot. None of us is willing to

shed our coats but we do manage a couple of teeth chattering songs before heading for the warmth of an indoor market for our last chance to buy pearls, jade, cloisonné, terra cotta soldiers, fans, silk scarves, bells, coffee table picture books and baseball caps for a buck!

Our last evening is spent eating, listening to farewell speeches, singing, and saying good-byes. So there you have it! We did everything a typical tourist would do plus enjoyed the singing, the fellowship and the camaraderie found only in a group of Barbershoppers. We also had the privilege of introducing Barbershop Chorus singing to China. The Chinese people are friendly and accommodating with lots of smiles and hand waving. Never once did we have the slightest fear for our safety and were treated with the utmost respect and courtesy by everyone with whom we came in contact. We feel we made many new friends and left a good impression of Americans. We say "dzai jien", China (good-bye, see you again)! ~



To kick that off, we have scheduled **Kirk Young** of our International Office to visit our chapter on Tuesday, February 5th. Kirk is a certified Music judge and coach. Other coaching events, including our annual retreat, are in the planning stages and we'll keep you informed of details as they develop. Your Music Team believes that better singing leads to improvement in the other categories, as well as increased membership and more fun overall in our hobby.



WHAT IS BARBERSHOPPING? by James Moynihan

When I consider barbershopping I think of a continuum. On one end there are choruses like the Harmonizers and the Vocal Majority. They are big, awesome and always medal in international competition. Somewhere in the middle is HOA. We aspire to medal, competed several times in international competitions, and finished as high as sixth place in Detroit in 1981. At the other end is a chorus like Overland Stage which does not aspire to medal and has not competed in international competition.

Consider Overland Stage. The chorus meets once a week, sings barbershop songs, has a treasury and a slate of officers and sings barbershop at its annual show. When the chorus competed at district the director said that the goal was to have fun and it did not matter where we finished. The members had no guarrel with this outlook and were not upset when the chorus finished dead S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A.

The chorus is composed of older men who are some of the nicest people you would ever want to meet. They have a good time and enjoy the evening. The experience is pleasant and it is barbershop.

The recent resignation of Gordon Lankenau as our chorus director got me dreaming about barbershopping, HOA style. The other night my wife woke me up and I asked why. She said I was thrashing about and screaming something about Greg Lyne becoming our director with Freddie King as assistant director. We had just won the gold medal on international stage and the audience was applauding wildly. Then reality set in.

I realized that with Gordon as director for the past three years the grazing was pretty good. He is a professional musician who teaches music and band at the high school level; he knows his stuff. He had been our tenor section leader in the good old days when I could sing tenor.

Under Gordon's leadership we won second place in district competition in Topeka. Once again Jim Bagby is taking the helm. A barbershopper named **Ed Fleeman,** who has since deceased, told me that when Jim Bagby became director he immediately got the chorus's attention by telling the men to sit up straight and put their feet on the floor. He said HOA could rise from also-rans to a championship chorus if that was their goal. The rest is history.

HOA has so many problems. We could be directed by **Darrell McCune** who also teaches music and is always right when it comes to music. He told me his son learned to play piano at age four, which is really scary.

Then there is **Mike Neff**, who does not know about making wax but is always striving for perfection.

When we sang and he said, "Leads, that is not acceptable", I knew I had returned home.

Then there is David Krause, who said he did not work this hard to come in second place when he directed the chorus. We came in second but I knew we had done our best. His cool intensity was tremendous. Then there is Steve Leone, who directed us and sang some unforgetttable solos.

We are told that Mark Fortino will direct on our upcoming spring show. Isn't this enough? Of course not. We have now inherited a man named Carter Combs from the State of Florida, where the people do not know how to count or follow simple directions.

He has been chapter president, has wide quartet experience and directed his chorus for several years. He will just have to settle for assistant director until Greg Lyne comes along.

> So where are we now and where do we go from here? I am not sure. If we had a tape recorder running over the years and could play back the tapes, we would hear talk about winning medals in international competition and then going for the gold.

Just for curiosity at chapter meeting, ask the members how many recall the mission statement or the five-year plan developed when Don

Young was president. Could we even find these documents? If so, should we revisit that statement or do we need a new mission statement?

After all these discussions, I believe that a bedrock principle has been established. That principle is that it is still my responsibility and the responsibility of the other chorus members to learn the words and notes cold. Then add choreography, since we are not singers but entertainers.

We often fail at these important tasks. We have heard ad infinitum around Christmas time about een excelsis deo when singing "Come All Ye Faithful." Then there is Keith Schweer singing the notes for the basses "Sleep in Heavenly Peace" for "Silent Night." I have heard this correction so many times that I could sing the notes myself but not with bass quality. (I would give my right ventricle (not) to sing bass like Stan Grossman, Tom Shadley, Larry Wilson or **Jeff Oxley,** but, alas, this is not to be.) Retention is a problem for us.

Then comes the hardest part, smile. **Dale Neuman** is always reminding me of this and I try to remember but I am getting older. I try to envision the Giants winning the Super Bowl and **Paul Tagliabue** is giving the **Vince Lombardi** trophy to the Giants owner.

I don't know where we are going or exactly where we are headed. The ride has been pretty good so far and will probably get better. Things are not perfect and there are hurdles to be surmounted. We are always raising the bar and we are never satisfied. But we are in good hands and we are on our way to achieving our goals.

God, how I love this country. I thank God every day for allowing me to be an American.




GREAT JOB! by Mike Mathieu



You sang with spirit and emotion, even while adapting to different interpretations some of them intentional and others attributable to my feeling my way through songs I'd sung but not directed. Most important, to me, was that the level of musicality increased through the day, even when we should have been starting to show some wear and tear. I thought Mike Neff was gonna come apart after the first performance of "Beginning to See the Light." It was that kind of day.

So I'm grateful for your considerable effort to make this another memorable day.

And in this brand-new 2002. I offer some (stolen) words of intended inspiration. They come from Vince Lombardi, who did NOT say "winning is the only thing." Here's the meat

of his often-twisted quotation (the capitalization is mine):

"Winning is not a one-time thing, it is an alltime thing. You don't do things right once
