



This program has become our best moneymaker. While Jim had something else to do in March on the show date, we put on one our best annual shows ever! Seems as though some little known quartet had a gig on the show date. Due to our second place finish at the previous fall convention, we received an invitation to compete in the 2002 Buckeye Invitational. After a LOT of discussion, it was decided to accept the invitation. So in August a small but very focused HOA chorus traveled to Columbus, Ohio and came back home with a trophy that reads: 2002 Overall Champions Male Chorus! In between all this activity, we had several coaching sessions with Bill Biffle that may have been one of the major reasons for the performance improvements. In October, we traveled down I-35 to Wichita for the 2002 Central States Fall Convention/Competition. One of the stated goals was to come away with points enough to qualify as a wild card competitor next July in Montreal. We just recently completed a very successful annual Combined Christmas Show with the Sweet Adelines. It is too early to know how much we made but I was told by a reliable source the gross figures would be about \$24,000. This money is vital to support our continuing quest for musical excellence!

The crystal ball I am using is not as clear as I would have hoped for, but there are a number of exciting things we are planning for next year. One of the most exciting is our efforts to produce and release a CD for sale. Not only release a new CD, but prepare the CD using the very latest technology available. We want to continue to improve musically so that when we set a goal to earn the score needed to get back to the "Big Dance" we can accomplish the goal.

Stay tuned, the year 2003 will be every bit as exciting and maybe more so. Hope to see all you real busy people back singing with HOA making the chorus bigger and better.

Our 2003 show will include a specialty act we've not presented in more than 25 years: a chorus of our children and grandchildren.

The last time they appeared, under the name "New Offspring Singers Ltd," was in the mid-1970s. Many of them have their own kids now, which we hope to be part of the group.

Here's the criteria: children who can sing (and even harmonize) from ages 5 through teens. They must be related to someone in the *Heart of America Chorus*, who'll be responsible for them during rehearsals and performances. They need to be disciplined enough to get on and off stage without parental coaxing (or threats).

The kids will sing "Daddy Dear" with the HOA chorus, and one number, to be determined, on their own. For that one, we'll ask some of our younger HOA members to fill in on the harmony parts. **Brad Bowser** was one of those in the last NOSL appearance. His father, **Dan**, was director of the first HOA Kiddie Chorus, and I did the next a couple of years later.

Learning tapes and music will be provided, and parents will be expected to work individually with the young singers. Out-of-town offspring are welcome, but they must be here for rehearsals on Friday afternoon, March 14, and Saturday morning, March 15. All others also will rehearse on a couple of Tuesdays prior to the show.

Got someone in mind who almost meets the guidelines? See me and we'll discuss individual cases. Let me emphasize we are looking for singers; churches and schools offer plenty of children's groups who are cute and, sometimes, little else. Our group will appear before an audience that pays well for tickets.

This should be fun for us and the kids, and a treat for our customers. Thanks, and lemme know if you have any questions.

Ten Years Ago-January, 1993

Newly elected 1993 chapter president John Pennington announced plans for a joint performance with the St. Charles chapter (both chapters needed money for the trip to Calgary, Alberta, Canada, for the international contest later in the summer) to be presented on May 26 at the RLDS Auditorium in Independence. Headliners for the show were to be our own Rural Route Four and the Gas House Gana from St. Charles (who went on to win the gold at Calgary), plus the HOA chorus and the Ambassadors of Harmonu, also from St. Charles.

Awards to deserving members were presented at our Christmas Party as follows: The "Ozzie Award," named for former member and valued coach, **Oz Newgard**, went to **Ron Abel**, who would be serving his third consecutive year as music VP (as I recall, Ron served a total of seven consecutive years in that capacity) and his contributions that resulted in CSD chorus championships In 1990, 1991, and 1992; the "John Cross Award" for the best attendance record during the year went to **Rich Huyck** who maintained the chapter mailing list of 5,000 names and addresses; and the "Barbershopper of the Year" award was presented to **Jim White** for his dedicated work in overseeing housing and convention registrations for our trip to International in New Orleans (1992) and the CSD fall convention last October.

Aileen Beard was picked as "Heartbeat of the Year" for 1992. It was Aileen who came up with the splendid idea of providing a sumptuous sandwich bar for the chorus between the Saturday morning rehearsal and the matinee performance of our 1992 annual show. Wonder if the *Heartbeats* are still doing that today.

Quentin Gates, 1993 president of the Overland Park Chapter, announced his intention at the HOA Christmas Party to take dual membership with the Kansas City Chapter in an effort to foster a closer relationship between the two chapters.

Show Chairman **Lud Einess** reported that the *OK-4*, a great comedy quartet from Oklahoma City and the *Sound Legacy*, 1992 CSD quartet champs, had been booked as headliners for our 1993 annual show.

"Singing Valentines" coordinator **Monty Duerksen** announced that five chapter quartets had committed to presentations all three of the days, February 12, 13, and 14.

Chairman **Dave Upp** announced that although the Christmas Show was an artistic success, only 130 people bought tickets. Dave urged that planning for next year's show begin earlier so as to do a better job of getting the word out. (*Continued on page 7*)

Twenty-Five Years Ago -January, 1983

There was no dearth of fine quartets booked for the HOA annual show. There were the *Dealer's Choice* and the *Rural Route Four* (gold medal winners in 1963 and 1986, respectively), plus our own *Merry Mugs*, the *Kansas Citians*, and the *10th Street Harmony Music Company* (never heard of then!). **Dan Henry** was to be the emcee for the show. (I didn't see this show. I was sweating out a military tour of duty in South Korea. For the fun of it, I was working with a foursome of young Korean men who were blind. After considerable time and effort, they were able to do a creditable job on "I'll Take You Home, Kathleen," although they never did learn how to pronounce "Kathleen.") *Sorry, there's another gap in my collection of Harmonotes, and we must skip the January, 1998 report.

Thirty-Five Years Ago -January, 1968

New chapter president **Ed Rooker** predicted a shortage of tickets for the 1968 annual show which would feature the *Nighthawks* of London, Ontario, Canada (they were International bronze medalists in 1961), and the *Vigortones* of Cedar Rapids, CSD quartet champions, also in 1961. Can you imagine booking our show in the Music Hall and running out of tickets?

Editor **Don Thorne** announced the passing of **Fred** "**Pop**" **Nelson**, a 25-year HOA member, on Dec.13.

According to Don, Pop was known for his rendition of "Champagne for the Ladies;" "Kansas City, My Home Town;" and "If I Had My Life To Live Over," the last song always sung to his wife, **Ada**. *Anybody remember Pop?* **Ron Abel** must have been around; he was the lucky winner of the October "Pay As You Go" Club. And **Joe Costigan** was the chapter treasurer.

THE PASSING OF A HEARTBEAT

Former *Heartbeat* of the Year **Ruth Sundermeyer** died Dec. 3 at the John Knox Village hospital. She was 85, and had been in failing health for some time. Her husband **Ed**, is a former chapter leader who has been inactive with HOA since Ruth's health began declining.

Ed was chapter Barbershopper of the Year in 1985, and lead of the first CSD senior quartet champs, *Crosstown 4*. **Gordon Coleman** has since replaced Ed on lead.

Ruth and Ed both are natives of Chamois, near Jefferson City, and had been married 62 years. The *Rural Route 4* sang at their 50th anniversary celebration.

When Ed enlisted in World War II, Ruth did, too. He became an Army specialist in plants and bugs. Ruth served as a Coast Guard Spar. They later moved to the Kansas City area, where he worked for Farmland and she was a nurse's aide in the Raytown School District.

As a *Heartbeat*, Ruth had a recurring role as the reluctant participant in sendoff skits. She will be remembered as the winning "jockey," representing HOA, in the 1991 pre-Louisville festivities. I

TO ALL REGISTERED KANSAS CITY CHAPTER QUARTETS

This criteria has been adopted by the Kansas City Chapter Music Team, to determine which quartets are selected to perform on our Annual Spring Show. It is subject to change each year, as determined by the current Music Team.

The Music Team must determine which quartets exhibit the most suitable level of talent and entertainment for the Show, and must adhere to a determined time allotment for the Show.

Criteria for selection:

- Being a registered Kansas City Chapter quartet does not automatically secure a performance slot for your quartet on the Show.
- 2. Chapter Participation & Contribution: If all 4 quartet members are regular attendees, and contribute considerable time or effort to the betterment of the Chapter, likelihood of performing on the Show increases.
- 3. Performance Level: If the quartet has achieved an acceptable performance level (singing, music, presentation, overall entertainment), and/or has achieved an acceptable placement in competitions, likelihood of performing on the Show increases.
- **4.** New registered quartets after this notification subject to same criteria.
- **5.** To promote youth participation, outstanding *Harmony Explosion* groups may also be invited to perform, at the discretion of Show Committee.

The Show Chairman will contact quartets regarding selection. Quartets not selected for their own slot may be invited to assist with chorus repertoire lead-ins, cameos, etc.

ANY MAN MAY BECOME A MEMBER OF THE **KANSAS CITY CHAPTER OF SPEBSOSA!**

Developed & presented by The Kansas City Chapter Music Team - December, 2002

Separately, it is necessary to identify a process, through which new Chapter members qualify for the performing & competition choruses.

The following steps have been developed & adopted by the Kansas City Chapter Music Team, for the purpose of processing new members into the Heart of America

Barbershop Chorus:

1. Every first-time visitor to a Kansas City Chapter Meeting shall receive a SIMPLE VOICE ANALYSIS. This helps him identify the appropriate section for his voice range, and indicates we are a singing organization interested in more than "warm bodies." Any Music Team member can administer this by listening to his speaking voice, asking about his singing experience, etc.

2. By the time a prospect has attended three meetings. OR when he indicates he is ready to submit an application, each prospect shall receive the STANDARD VOICE PLACE-MENT. The Director should administer this if possible. Otherwise, it can be administered by another Music Team member. The Director, and respective Section Leader will

then receive a copy of the placement.

3. All new Chapter members shall be provided a packet of current Chorus repertoire music by the MUSIC LIBRARIAN in coordination with the Music and Membership Teams and be instructed to confer with his Section Leader for which

songs to learn first, etc.

4. Upon completion of the Membership Team's Orientation Class, each new member then becomes the responsibility of the respective Section Leader. The Section Leader is to instruct the Chorus applicant which songs to concentrate on, depending on the Chapter's current cycle (pre-show, pre-contest, pre-performance; other). The Section Leader and/or assistants have the option of instructing the applicant to stand by him during rehearsals for learning

5. To determine when the Chorus applicant is ready to be assigned a "clothespin" (position) on the risers, the following will occur: a.) Applicant will notify a Music Team member of his intent & desire to become a member of the performing / competition Chorus. b.) Respective Section Leader will select any 2 songs, at random from the current Chorus repertoire. c.) Applicant will audition the 2 songs with a Music Team quartet or octet, for the purpose of identifying that he can "hold his own" on his singing part. Applicant is to provide a 1-week notice to the Music Team for scheduling. This step holds each singer accountable for the entire Chorus repertoire, and establishes credibility for

the HOA Chorus with him.

6. Should the applicant's audition not be of adequate quality, he is to ALWAYS receive encouragement and constructive feedback by the Music Team to continue to try, and be advised that there is not a "deadline" to qualify. In extreme cases where the applicant simply cannot carry a tune or sing with the adequate quality the Chorus is seeking, he will be advised accordingly.


7. Upon SUCCESSFUL completion of the 2-song audition, and AFTER he's become a member, the applicant will be presented with his "clothespin" during a Chapter meeting. The respective Section Leader will present the applicant to the Chorus as a qualified Chorus member, and the applicant will

"place his clothespin."

8. Prior to his membership application being accepted. indoctrination & explanation of staging and visual expectations will be

delivered by head of Presentation Team or one of his representative(s), during orientation if possible. This is intended as informational rather than as a condition of qualification, unless extreme conditions exist.

9. Subsequently, the new Chorus member is then subject to the same taping and qualification requirements as are other performing/ competing Chorus


