

### LAST LOOK AT THE ARENA; AND AN HOA PEEK AHEAD

The challenging/grueling/rewarding December provided plenty of fodder for reflections and observations. Before the old year starts to dim in the rearview mirror, and before the new one can overwhelm us, let me share some of those with you, as honestly as I can.

If you agree, we'll translate many of these ideas into discussion topics and possible action items for the music team's Jan. 29 all-day planning session. If you disagree—and we need your candor, since this is a hobby-let us know so we can consider alternate viewpoints or approaches.

- 1. Three weekends of performances in a row during the holidays is probably too much to expect of a chapter, no matter how much money is to be made. The size of our chorus shrank on consecutive weekends, which is to be expected. The good news is the quality of the effort and the singing did not diminish from one performance to the next, even when we were missing some key voices.
- 2. With the variety of directors involved in the three shows, and the

- varied alignments HOA was in over the three weekends. I found myself standing in a lot of different places in the chorus. I discovered again that we have many more strong voices than leaners. I was surprised at the improvement in some voices I'd not heard individually in some time, both veterans and folks who've joined us in the last year or two, or less. This leads me to be optimistic about the work we're doing week in and week out.
- 3. The enthusiasm from the majority of the chorus following good meetings, successful rehearsals and well-received performances leads me to conclude that our music team-starting with me and the directing staff-need to be even better prepared, demand more, expect more and accept fewer excuses. No, don't read into that we need to reorder our lives so that our hobby comes before God and family and job. But sometimes we can plan better how it does fit, or how we can organize our time so we know our music on time, and juggle schedules on occasion. [After more than six decades, I know this for sure: we mostly do in this life what we want to do most. If it's deer hunting, we plan for that; or seeing the grandchildren. Or attending the national manifong tournament. Name your poison...] Continued on pg. 3

4. It won't have much effect for the music team to kick it up a notch if the HOA members don't do the same. Not just say "yeah, we believe" or "yes, we'll record regularly" or "yes, we'll use our learning media" or "yes, we'll sing every day" but actually do it. We've been through all the pledges, and experienced bursts of dogooder spells. But I think we can agree there has not been an epiphany of the kind Kevin Keller described, where AOH decided it would put its mouth where its pitchpipe was, and proceed upward instead of laterally.

Our last public event each year is also one of the most fun events, as we perform for the Salvation Army in a mall setting on the last Saturday before Christmas. This year's event at Metro North Mall was no exception, and will be remembered for the camaraderie, the singing, the renewal of old acquaintances, and for a few surprises as well.

At each session, we invited others from the audience to join us for a few familiar carols, and the wriggling around to accommodate them without pushing the end men off into the water was interesting. This certainly was the most pleasant surprise of the day, as the men in the chorus were wanting to applaud along with the audience in front of us after they sang their songs.

There were a lot of old-timers in the audience at one time or another. It was a treat to have some of these fellows join us on the risers to sing a few songs together. Our youngest member was **John Winfield's** infant son, who sat on his father's shoulders most of the day as Dad joined the chorus in song. He was a trooper and never once tried to add his own notes to the chords!

I saw a lady in the audience who was clearly enjoying our performance. I talked to her after the 2 pm set—she said she had never heard us before. She was one of the most enthusiastic people in the audience. I found out she lived nearby and was part of a church where there had been some discussion about starting up a male singing group to do four-part harmony, and that she had been looking for some group to use as a model. I told her all I knew about the chorus, gave her a card, and our web-site address, and invited her to hear us on our spring show. Since she was in that local area, I also told her about the *Sons of Liberty*, and invited her also to check them out. There was an additional delight here as well, as she crossed paths with **David Krause**, and found out she was a high school classmate of David, and had not seen him in over 25 years!

Part of the experience was singing request songs from the audience. One request during our last set was for "That Old Quartet of Mine", which seemed to sum up the day nicely, as so many old friends had joined us in song during the day. This song was once in the chorus repertoire, and the men with over 5 years experience did it very well. The big bonus is that by accepting this job, I've guaranteed a slot to come back to Kansas City when I return, for at least a few more years.

So, thanks for the memories so far in the best chorus in the Society. I will be watching you on the webcast this July, so don't let me catch anyone not emoting as much as I would be. I look forward to staying in contact with you in various forms, especially e-mail and the *Harmonotes*. Consider this an "I'll Be Seeing You" later, as opposed to a "To the Last Goodbye!" because I'll be back in a few

In the "Look at the Past" column, in the December Harmonotes, I made reference in the "Ten Years Ago" segment to "one **Don Peck**" who had just joined the chapter. I added in parentheses "(anyone know where he is these days?") as a gentle, tongue-in-cheek reference to Don's long and faithful service as an HOA member, assuming that anyone who knew Don should be aware of his attendance and service record with the chapter. It never occurred to me that someone might misunderstand my intent and respond quickly, "Oh, I know where Don is. He's right there on the risers every Tuesday night," or something like that.

Well, a few days after the publication of the December *Harmonotes*, I received the nicest email message from a very gracious lady named **Jane**, who is the wife of **Dennis Taylor**, the original tenor with one of the best comedy quartets

every to be generated, the *Merry Mugs*. Here's what she had to say: "I was just reading Don's *Harmonotes* and noticed the IO-years-ago article looking for Don Peck. I attended a Tuesday night meeting approximately two months ago and Don Peck was there. I noticed him because our daughter-in-law met him last summer back East at a family reunion. Seems he was related by marriage to one of our aunts. When he mentioned barbershopping, her ears perked up and she told him her father-in-law, Dennis Taylor was a long-time member. But my point is—evidently Don Peck is definitely still around."

I immediately e-mailed a reply in which I apologized for misleading her, and I asked if I could have a few words about Dennis, where he is now, what he's doing, how is he, etc. She very helpfully supplied the following: "Time marches on, but he is doing just fine. His vocal chords aren't as flexible as they used to be so he isn't singing much these days, but he loves to go to the HOA Tuesday night meetings occasionally to listen to the chorus and sit with old friend, **Dan Henry**. Dennis quit singing with the *Merry Mugs* in 1966 when he became a pilot for TWA and his schedule would not permit weekends off. We have a new Apple IPOD with about 1,000 songs and 50 different artists on it, but if I play anything other than "BB," he complains. He tells everyone who will listen he is the longest term member of HOA (he thinks he and **Frank Leone** may have joined the same night). He has been a member for 56 years. What wonderful memories we both have of many swell people and music that holds its own, and then some, more than any other genre." Anybody want to comment on that? How about it, Frank? Dan?

#### TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO: JANUARY, 1979

You know, I get a real kick out of going through these back issues of *Harmonotes* each month, searching for items that might be of interest for this column. I like to check the names of fellows who were relatively new back then to barbershopping and the chapter, to note what they were contributing at the time, and to muse over what they have done in the intervening years to help make the *Heart of America Chorus* what it is today.

Take the Jan. 1979 issue, for example. Chapter President Fred Whisman reminded us of the three major performing events that we should be looking forward to during what Fred calls the "Year of Challenge": The March Parade of Quartets, the international chorus contest in Minneapolis in July (HOA had just won its first district chorus championship the preceding October right here in Kansas City), and the CSD fall contest in Ornaha. We can all remember how Fred, with that beautiful head of white hair, used to stand out on the risers. Last I heard, Fred's poor health was making that long trip to Kearney to each Tuesday night meeting a real chore... Membership VP Frank Lasta reports the following guests on hand during the guest night on Jan. 9. They were Walt Bates, Jerry Chelemer, Wendell Cochren (deceased), Rod Flater, Bob Gippert, Jeff Jones, and Manley Vance. Frank's job with Black & Veatch took him all over the world. Imagine what his contribution might have been if he'd been able to be with us every Tuesday night. Pete Peterson (deceased) was busy making hotel reservations at the Curtis Hotel (right across the street from the headquarters hotel for the international convention in Minneapolis). Now there's a guy who made a mark as a judging chairman at all levels of barbershopping competition...Jim Bagby, still flushed with success after his first chorus championship as a music director, announced that the HOA and St. Joseph Pony Expressmen (that's what they called themselves back then) were scheduled to appear together on the late show following the CSD spring prelims. They were to sing "Night Time in Dixie," and "Gonna Build a Mountain." And how fortunate we are to have had Jim with us all these years...Linn Bellis (deceased?) was in the process of producing the new chapter directory. Wonder if he had access to a computer back then...CSD Convention Steering Committee Chairman Clyde Menson proudly presented a check in the amount of \$5,009.12 as the HOA share of the 1978 district convention profits. Now there was a potential ball of fire. Wonder what happened to Clyde? Seems I remember he retired and moved to Florida. Am I right, somebody?...Gil Lefholz, chairman of the afterglow committee for the 1979 annual show, announced that the event would be held in the Imperial Ballroom of the Muehlbach Hotel. Now there's a guy who has left an impression on our barbershopping hobby. I believe that Gil's term as international president was extended over the better part of three years by the death or incapacitation of the elected official. (I should also point out that Gil was editor of *Harmonotes* in 1979.) Take good care of yourself, Gil. New members reported in this issue were Carl Kreiser, Michael R. Schumacher (he's listed as lead/baritone. Thought he sang bass?), and John Warrior. A couple of guys there, John and Mike, would be sorely missed if we lost them. We seldom see John except backstage at the Music Hall during our annual show, but what an advantage it is to have somebody back there who knows what he's doing. . . . The late Bill Wall was ticket chairman; for the 1979 show, In his article, he announced that "the financial pressures of taking a chorus to Minneapolis" had resulted in an increase in price to \$6, \$5, \$4, and \$2." Guess we were all born 25 years too soon. In an article without a byline (probably the editor's), we learn of the organization of the Harmony Handful, a "day chorus" to respond to calls for a group for functions that occurred when most of the regular HOA members would not be available. New officers were Merlin Barcus (deceased) (president), Leo Erickson (executive VP), James Noeth (secretary), and Ed Sundermeyer (treasurer). Jim Bagby would be the director. with Rod Rule (deceased) and David Krause as his assistants...and last but certainly not least, Charlie Greene was calling for donations of aluminum cans to be sold as a source of chapter revenue.

#### FIFTY YEARS AGO: FEBRUARY, 1955

I don't find a copy of the Jan. 1955 Harmonotes among the bunch that Warren Edmonds sent me several years ago. But I did find this item in the Feb. issue that I thought some of you real, real old-timers might find interesting. It's a compilation of events that occurred during the year 1956, put together by Ray Koenig, who may have been the chapter historian since I'm aware that he provided a series of these articles for the Harmonotes when Warren was the editor. Hope you find it interesting.

The new chapter officers for 1956 were Bob Gall (president), Elston Schrader (vice president), Bill Wall (secretary), Pete Peterson (treasurer), Mike Michel (district delegate), Don Stephens (immediate past president), and the following members-at-large: LaVerne Cable, Nile Abbott, Art Babcock, Howard Houston, Bert Phelps, and Don Thorne.

Here's something HOA might want to try. The Past Presidents of the *Heart of America* chapter held their annual meeting at the Twin Oaks on June. Fourteen of the 16 members attended and elected **Orval Wilson** chairman for the corning year. **Don Thorne** was named secretary. The article doesn't describe the purpose and mission of the group, but I would imagine they were intended as a source of a great deal of barbershopping experience for the benefit of the chapter in general. I just counted 34 surviving past chapter presidents—(oops, I just noticed that that includes **Marty Oldehoeft**. Well, it won't be long, will it, Marty. Unless they elected you for a second term?)

Here's how barbershoppers went to the international convention back in those days. The "Texas Rocket," with a special car for barbershoppers, was scheduled to leave Kansas City for Minneapolis at 8:55 p.m. the following Wednesday (the item was dated June I3). The event was the international contest. Thirty-five barbershoppers, plus 20 family members, made the trip. Wonder what the tickets cost?

While we're talking about the convention and the contests, Ray has provided a bit of history regarding the HOA quartet participants. The BMA Gamboliers (Barney Wasson, Ed Schliebs, Orval Wilson, Harold Robinette) and the Hi-Neighbor Four (Jim Conover, Bill Hamm, John Goldsberry, Tom Saunders) represented Kansas City in the contest. Only two other cities in the Society had two quartets in the contest-Skokie, Illinois, and Milwaukee, Wisconsin. The Confederates of Memphis, Tennessee, won the international gold medal.

And a final note: As of July 31, 1956, the Society's "Century Club," consisting of chapters with 100 or more members, contained 20 chapters. The CSD had two, Wichita, with 114 members, and Kansas City, with 112 Wonder what ever happened to the "Century Club." Seems like Kenosha used to publish a list of the chapters in the Harmonizer. Wonder why they quit? ♥

An unbelievable return of 50% of survey cards were turned in. I copied all the comments and in the future will share them with you. NO NEGATIVE COMMENTS!!! WOW! What a performance by all.

Many folks requested to be included in future mailings and many requested tickets for the HOA March 19, Music Hall Show!!!

The survey cards confirmed that there were two marketing efforts that worked above everything else. 1.) The flyers and 2.) the pocket cards with your individual efforts to get the word out to all your friends, neighbors and family.

Keep positive and look to the future. Our community, our friends and our families need us and what we give—a dedication, work ethic and striving to "master our art form." 4-part a cappella barbershop harmony, sung by the *Heart of America Barbershop Chorus!* Remember that in March we have the 59th Annual Show at the Music Hall. Flyers will be going out soon to promote this show and of course you will have some NEW "pocket cards" to help promote this event! Isn't a full house great?


