Improvement Noted in 2010

Where to start? Being the master of understatement that I am, it's been an interesting year. Certainly we experienced the normal "stuff"—four or five performances,

Singing Valentines, a Golf tournament, a successful garage sale, and some other things.

But beyond that we experienced a metamorphosis unlike any *HOA* has seen in recent memory. Was this metamorphosis necessary? Did we have to go through the trauma of an audition process to improve our sound? Well, based upon comments from some very knowledgeable people concerning our recent performances and based upon earning "most improved chorus" at our District Competition, I don't think there is any dispute that our sound has improved significantly. Question is, how important is it for *HOA* to have (and continue to improve) that sound.

In my opinion, **Don Blank** was correct at our last installation dinner when he said the future of the Barbershop Society is in the Metropolitan areas. Did you know that the Society's membership is down to 28,000 (plus) from 33,000 (plus) in 1998? Folks, it doesn't take the proverbial "rocket scientist" to figure out that the trend is in the wrong direction. We are losing people because we are naturally becoming a much older Society. If we (both *HOA* and the Society) are to reverse that trend we must

attract younger singers and it's clear that those younger singers don't want to be a part of a less than quality sound.

Is it working? It's a moving target, but we have around 75 members in the performing chorus and a dozen or so of them are under 40 (with the majority of those under 30!). Plus, we have more young men who have been guests lately and are potential new members. Perhaps it's even more significant that some of them are getting involved by becoming members of the Music Team (and one is your new Membership Vice-President).

It's working. Yes, it's traumatic and sometimes painful. O. C. Cash started our Society because he wanted to preserve our art form. *Heart of America* is an example of what can be done to continue that dream.

2010 Caroling Caravan - What a Great Day!

Ask any of the thirty-three guys participating in this year's Caroling Caravan and you will hear the

same comment: What a great day! The weather was really nice, a little nippy maybe but no snow or ice to hamper navi-

gation to the six retirement communities.

Event co-chairmen, **Bob Burdick** and **Mike Mathieu** did an outstanding job of planning the event, making personal contacts with each home and providing them with literature & publicity materials about the upcoming 30-minute fund raiser concert for the Salvation Army Bell Ringing Campaign.

HOA has participated in

raising money for the Salvation Army through bell ringing activities every year since the late 1940's. It all started when chapter members rang bells outside Emery, Bird, Thayer Dry Goods Store in downtown Kansas City (see artwork above and right). During the boom of the malls, HOA held hourly concerts inside malls instead of just ringing bells. In recent years as malls started disappearing and the appearance of kiosks caused space limitations in the remaining malls, HOA started taking its bell ringing concerts on the road. Mike Mathieu is happy to report that contributions via the caravan the past couple of years have been up to five times the amount recorded in the last year at a mall.

Each of the caravan concerts were basically the same starting off with the chorus singing

"Caroling, Caroling." Next came a chapter quartet Homeward Bound (Wendell Shaffer- tenor from the Overland Park Chapter, **Carl Turlin** - lead, **Don Fuson** - Bari, **Alex Tate** - bass from the Frank Thorne Chapter) with one song. Then the chorus sang "Angels We Have Heard On High," "O Come All Ye Faithful," and "Silent Night." On "Silent Night" the audience sang the final time through with the chorus humming. It was great! Next came chapter quartet *Command Per*-



formance (Carter Combs - tenor, Jon Gathright - lead, Rich Huyck - bari, Monty Deurksen - bass). They did their hilarious version of "The Twelve Days of Christmas."Next the chorus sang "While By My Sheep" and "Jingle Bells." *HOA* veteran barbershopper Dan Henry Bowser directed "Jingle Bells" in his zany way. The crowd and the chorus members love it when Dan is out front directing!

Tone-Henge (Jim Bagby - bari, Dan Bowser - lead, Bruce Wenner - tenor, Keith Schweer -bass) were next. They are always a big hit especially when they sing and play their home made instruments. HOA ended each show with three songs: "The Christmas Song" (directed by assistant director Mark Fortino, many thanks!), "Ring De Bells," and "We Wish You A Merry Christmas." Throughout the concert Mike Mathieu told the audience about HOA and The Salvation Army Bell Ringing Program. Special thanks to director David Krause for his extra efforts to make our first concert after attending his early Saturday morning church choir rehearsal across town. That's dedication and we appreciate it, big time! David is cool under pressure and kept all six concerts running flawlessly.

After each concert it was back on the bus for the caravan to the next stop. Speaking of the bus, its rental fee was donated by J. E. Dunn Construction Company in Kansas City. In addition, J. E. Dunn matched

dollar for dollar for all bell ringing donations in the Kansas City area on the day of the *HOA* Caravan up to one hundred and fifty thousand dollars! This is huge. Many thanks to the J. E. Dunn!

Also thanks to *Heartbeats* (*HOA's* Ladies Auxiliary) **Jeffi Combs** and **Linda Fuson** for preparing forty sack lunches for the event. The guys really enjoyed the goodies and had a good time "dining in" on the bus. Ice cold water was available on the bus all day thanks to chorus manager **Vince Perry**.

In the afternoon, out came the miniature candy bars to provide the troops with a source of extra energy.

HOA members participating in their first bell ringing caravan this year included Music & Performance Vice President Mark Fortino who sang the solo part on "Ring De Bells," **Ray Young, David Jobe**, and **Vince Perry IV**. Missing this year and ending his consecutive bell ringing participation streak since 1981 was **Ron McIntire**. He hated to miss but had a family wedding conflict that took precedence.

At this point we don't know the amount of money HOA raised for the Salvation Army. I hope it was huge. I do know that everyone left that day feeling a bit tired but with a glow of self satisfaction that comes from giving from the heart. It was a great day to be a barbershopper! Thank you HOA for all you do! Your Caroling Caravan efforts will touch many lives in a positive way! \clubsuit

Although I had sung with two different choirs previously, I had not felt as welcome as I did the evening I attended that practice.

I was hooked and after three weeks I submitted my application to join. My only regret is that it took me so long to become involved in barbershop singing."

Now that was simple enough wasn't it? Sure, it doesn't work every time, but with persistence it eventually will. Perhaps not for you in this setting, but what about other circumstances you find yourself in? Who knows how many months or years the gentleman that invited Harry had been asking other people? Or how many did not respond, but more importantly, did!

The key is to keep the reason you became involved in this craft always alive within the remote corners of your consciousness. Think of each contact you have as a potential chorus member. How neat would it be to share your experience with another person, especially if he then gets involved and excited enough to pass his excitement along as well?

The total collected for the year to date (since Jan. 5, 2010) is \$1,710.


The total for the previous year was \$3,854 at year end.

The total in our best previous year (2006) was \$4,500.

The total in 2007 was \$2,290, which was the lowest in the past 7 years.

The year had fewer drawings (all previous years had at least 48), and with lower average attendance throughout the year, the contribution to Harmony Foundation was the lowest in the past 8 years.

The progressive jackpot stands at \$365.

CSD Remains One of the Strongest Districts in Society

The fall district competitions are over, and once again, Central States District distinguished itself. There were 17 district contests, , and results were included for the May competitions in Great Britain (BABS) and Sweden (SNOBS).

The quartet competition produced two outstanding champions, Forefront (Cardinal District) and The Crush (Far Western District), both of which posted scores in the 83% range that would have placed them just below the top 10 in Philadelphia. No other

quartet posted over 80%. There were 23 quartets that scored over 76%, which is the cutoff point for eligibility at the international competition. Those included CSD champ Progression. Our own ListenUp! was 24th at 75.9, just four points (out of 3,600) below that 76 cutoff point.

Considering the top 5five quartets from each district competition, FWD (77.6) and Mid-Atlantic District (77.1)

stood above all others. Third was Sunshine (74.9). Central States placed fifth (behind BABS) with 74.2. The overall average of the 19 districts was 72.7. Last year, CSD was sixth in this ranking at 74.3, while in 2008, we were third at 76 (when Crossroads competed).

It should be noted that the district competitions are not entirely equivalent. These results include all quartets that competed, including seniors. The total number of competitors varied from 11 (Sunshine District) to 28 (Johnny Appleseed and Evergreen), and the number moving to the finals round varied from 7 to 10. (Central States had a total of 26 competing quartets.) The two European competitions combine the spring qualifications for iInternational with their national competitions (they have one annual convention only). In each district, past champions are not eligible to compete. The spring contests are open to all quartets in the district (other than International champions) and are a better measure of the strength of the quartets in a district. However, if a quality quartet chooses not to compete, this can seriously damage the district average, as shown by SNOBS, where Ringmasters did not compete in May.

That said, the strength of the CSD quartet



competition stands out in that the district is 4th in rank when all finalist quartets are averaged, and 3rd when the best 20 quartets are averaged from each district. Far Western and Mid-Atlantic are 1st and 2nd in these categories as well. CSD is also 3rd in the total number of competing quartets in the fall competition, with 26.

On the chorus side, CSD also shows strength and depth. This competition is a better measure than the quartets, since all districts have just one chorus competition each year that both crowns a champion and determines eligibility for international. Here, consideration is given to the fact that the past two years' international champion chorus is ineligible in a given year, and their absence adversely affects the average for their district. (For these choruses, the most recent district competition score is used for comparison.) Considering the top five choruses from each district, Central States placed fourth with an average of 79.3 percent. On top was Far Western (82), followed by Southwestern (81.5) and MAD (81.4). The overall average for all 19 districts was 75.4.

With the past champion choruses included with the top four of their districts, FWD improves to 86.4 and CSD moves up to second place with 83.2. With two international champion choruses and a third at 84.%, Far Western certainly stands

out as the strongest district. Considering the top 10 choruses in each district (with the two past international champions), Central States placed third with 76.6 percent behind Far Western (78) and Mid-Atlantic (77.5). Ontario was fourth at 74.9%, but only sixth choruses entered its competition. The overall average was 71.3.

A total of 37 choruses competed in May in BABS. In North America, the biggest

competition was 22 in the Mid-Atlantic district and 21 in the Far Western district. There were 13 choruses at Mason City. In seven of the districts, there were fewer than 10 choruses in the competition.

There were 1,205 competitors in BABS (32.6 average per chorus). In Mid-Atlantic district, 778 competed (35.4 per chorus), and in Far Western, 762 competed (36.3 per chorus). There were 493 competitors in Mason City (37.9 per chorus). The overall average chorus size was 32.5 men.

In conclusion, our district is one of the stronger in the Society, but Mid-Atlantic and Far Western stand above all others. There are a lot of districts out there that are struggling, both from a quality of competition standpoint and quantity of people coming to and competing in the contests. \heartsuit
