t started 35 years ago, in December of 1971, at Ward Parkway Shopping Center, with the Heart of America Chorus directed by Don Webb, **Percy Franks** playing during breaks and Smak's hamburgers. It was my first experience with HOA Salvation Army Bell Ringing concerts, and I was hooked.

Not many years before that, HOA

members had gathered on a December Saturday outside Emery, Bird and Thayer, known as Kansas City's first de-

One thing that didn't last indoors was the bells. The merchants complained about the noise of the bells, so we've been left with bells with paper clips for clappers, so they go "clpp" of maybe "dnkk" -- but no longer ring. And we've made the round of the malls, as management found they could rent the wide-open spaces where our risers used to sit for kiosks, stalls and mini-shops.

So after more than a dozen years at Ward Parkway, we've made stops at Independence Center (under a stairway), Bannister Mall, Oak Park Mall (in a far corner), Blue Ridge Mall (as it began its final decline) and the last four years on an island at Metro North.

Ward Parkway was my favorite. At the break we could scuttle off to Smak's to order a 25-cent hamburger (maybe 15-cent in the early days) and get back in time for the next set. The late, great Percy Franks had a grand piano set up behind our risers and would entertain energetically between sets. We had a couple of different spots in the main mall there, and always did well until the space ran out.

Some things have been constant every year. The big, iron kettle belongs to us, not the Salvation Army. It was designed and stored year to year by the late Bill Wall, a past president who also created the shell we still use in the Music Hall. Ron Abel now is the keeper of the kettle. Our music has always been well received by those who take the time to pause and listen, and many return for more than one set.

But the biggest reward, other than the money we've raised for the Army, has been the dedication I've seen year after year from HOA. It has to be our most physically demanding day of the year. Yet guys arrange their schedules to be there all day, or most of it, despite the other pressures of the holiday season. On Dec. 17, one week before Christmas, we had 63 members participate, and 36 of those were for all six sets.

Having 12th Street Rag and Tone-Henge available as headliners was...wait, I thought I heard a snicker somewhere...OK, having 12th Street Rag and Dan Henry to lead the way was a major part of a successful day, and we are especially indebted to Micah and Barry for stretching their weekend!

But if you miss a session, you may miss a magic moment. It happens every year. It might be a performance of "I Have Seen the Light." It might be someone from the audience who comes to sing with us, including an inactive or past member. This year it was a singalong.

For one brief moment, the chorus, our guest singers, the audience and shoppers on the lower and upper level lifted their voices in "Silent Night." It made my day, and reminded me again why I'm so fortunate to be a part of this hobby, and the wonderful HOA organization.

The Annual Multi-National Force-Iraq and Multi-National Corps-Iraq Christmas tree lighting ceremony was held at the Al-Faw Palace Sunday to celebrate the beginning of this holiday season.

Gen. George W. Casey Jr., MNF-I commander, was present and seemed pleased to see faces from so many countries together to witness the lighting of the Christmas tree.

"The notion that countries from all over the world have sent their young men and women here to give the gift of freedom to the people of Iraq is about

through stressful periods," said Lt. Col. Neil Johnson, HardCorps Chorale director. "For a lot of folks this is their first Christmas away from home, and it's things like this and singing Christmas music that provide a great way to cope with the separation." As Christmas

music rang through the halls of the palace and refreshments were served, it seemed easy for most people to get into the holiday spirit.

"Even though we can't be at home right now it is nice to able to come out and share your holiday spirit with everyone," said Capt. Darwin Maul. Multi-National Corps-Iraq Fires and Effects. "If you can't be home for the holidays at least be with people you like and the people vou work with." Although separated from families and friends this holiday season, troops from all over the world can make the best of the situation and continue providing freedom and stability to Iraq.

"This tree can give us all something that can remind us of home," Casey said. "I know it is hard to be away from loved ones over the holidays, but I very much appreciate your sacrifices and the sacrifices of your families this holiday season."




New Member Spotlight

f anyone would like help in making certain your donations get credited to HOA, here are some directions I just received from the Salvation Army Divisional Headquarters.


On-line, go to armykettle.com. To insure that we get credit, in the specific use field under donation details, just type instructions to credit this to the bellringing campaign and the organization or group name.

they weren't a bad chorus then). they did their Christmas show in a 400-seat high school auditorium, 2 shows on a Saturday, and they didn't sell out either one. Now, they have 5 shows (Fri. eve, two Saturday, two Sunday) in a beautiful 1000-seat theatre at the University of Missouri St. Louis, and they probably are selling out most of them. They certainly sold out Saturday evening, when I was there. Charlie Ramirez was also there, and I asked him if he'd like the challenge of doing 5 shows in one weekend instead of 2, and he looked at the theatre and the crowd and said right away "I sure would!" Good attitude, Charlie!

Last spring I went to Des Moines to see what I thought was the last show by the Gas House Gang. Turns out that was a bit premature. At that time, they had appeared in 48 of the 50 states. They now proclaim they have visited all 50, plus 15 foreign countries. They recently completed a tour of Japan, and as **Jim Henry** related to the audience, they all felt they had to close it out in front of the home town supporters. This was truly their last show, and for you trivia buffs, the last song they sang together was their "Eine Kleine Nacht Musik" number (or the "magic flute"). Another highlight of the evening was a reprise of their "Calypso" sthick, which originally featured **Rob Henry** playing Harry Belafonte, and doing his "Day-O" from offstage at the urging of **Kipp Buckner**. This time, JIM Henry played the role, adorned with a ridiculous wig with two-foot-long tornado curls like you see some of the black football

players wearing these days. At the end, after a lengthy standing ovation, they challenged the audience to support the next generation as well as they supported the Gas House Gang. They then invited Vocal Spectrum (who had completed their set ahead of the *GHG* set) to come out, and the eight of them sang "Scarborough Fair" together. The ringing chords from that ensemble had to be heard to be believed!


The rest of the show was the Ambassadors, of course, doing two sets. The opening set had the Santa Claus and children's songs, and the closing set was entirely songs of the season and the birth of the Christ Child. Several of their songs are also songs we do, such as "Happy Holidays", which was their opener. Others are songs I sang with them 15 years ago. I reckon there are just not all that many Christmas songs out there! Anyway, people keep coming back because it seems every year they add something and, of course, they just plain do it better and better. They had a different Hanukkah song this year, a very lively number that they added guitar accompaniment to. The show closed with "Silent Night", during which they all walked off stage and filled the aisles in the theatre, after which everyone was invited to sing along as they re-did the first verse. Several of them were nearby where I was sitting, so singing with them at that point was practically like being on stage with them.

Next year, they are offering a two-for-one deal. Buy tickets for their June show and you can have tickets in the same seats for the Christmas show with a 10% discount. My brother and his wife have become fans now. We're probably going to do it! $\mathbf{\Psi}$

DeSylva and Brown were outstanding writers for many years and when Ray Henderson joined them, they wrote even more tremendous tunes. They were, as far as I know, the only truly famous writing trio that lasted for any length of time. These three guys were indeed brilliant, and their songs entertained us for a lifetime.



Away back in the October issue of Harmonotes, in this spot under the "Thirty-five Years Ago" segment, I noted that Millie Robinette had referred to our ladies' auxiliary as the SPEBSQSA Auxiliary and raised the question, "Does anybody remember when the present name, the Heartbeats, became official and who was responsible for suggesting the name?" Well, veteran HOA member Ron Abel lost no time in



dashing off a note to me with just the information I asked for. Here it is: "The chapter board authorized formation of a Ladies' Auxiliary in April, 1969. Bev Wasson was the first president. With regard to your inquiry, the name, Heartbeats, was suggested by Della and Clyde Mensen in 1978 or 1979 when a Heartbeats Cookbook was published." Turns out that I inadvertently filed Ron's note with a bunch of stuff I was holding for my column in the Serenade. My profound apologies and many thanks to you, Ron. What would I do without you?

TEN YEARS AGO: JANUARY, 1996:

The entire content of the 22-page January 1996 issue of Harmonotes was overshadowed by news of the unexpected and untimely death on Dec. 15 of 47-year barbershopper and member of the Kansas City chapter, Bob Gall. He had just turned 70 years old.

Bob joined the Society and our chapter in 1949 and almost immediately became involved in chapter administration. He served on the board of directors in 1952 and 1953, as secretary in 1954 and 1955, and as president in 1956. In 1962 and 1963, he served the Central States District as secretary and was elected district president in 1964 and 1965. He became a member of the international board of directors in 1966, first vice president in 1968, and was elected our international president in 1969.

Bob's musical contribution to the chapter and our hobby was equally impressive. Over the years, he was a part of the Cross Towners, the K.C.Moners, the Rudy Fisk Royalaires, the Crackerjacks, and the Merry Mugs, which will be remembers as one of the most popular comedy quartets in the Society during the 1950s and 1960s. It's interesting to note that until Bob's death, all four of the original members-Dennis Taylor, Frank Leone and Dan Bowser—were still members of the Kansas City chapter. Just prior to his death, Bob sang with a newly organized quartet called Hubbub, with Jim Bagby (tenor), Manley Vance (lead), and Dan Bowser (baritone). The quartet had competed in the CSD fall contest in the preceding October.


TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO: JANUARY, 1986

The "Bellringers' Honor Roll" included a list of the names of the 42 HOA members who showed up for all six performances for the Salvation Army at the Ward Parkway Shopping Center on Dec. 14. But only 18 members had slogged through the sleet on Dec. 10, "the coldest, wettest, freezingest, iciest weather of the winter" to Crown Center to sing their program of Christmas carols, only to find the store about to close for lack of business and to let their staff go home before things got really bad.

FORTY YEARS AGO: MARCH, 1966

If you're wondering about the missing January and February 1966 issues, the apologetic tone taken by Editor War**ren Edmonds** in the first two paragraphs of the March 1966 issue may provide a clue. His first paragraph implies that something had occurred to prevent the publication of the two missing issues. Then, in the second paragraph, he includes the words "nine weeks on the road," which would indicate that he'd been traveling (don't know what Warren did for a living) and had been unable to put out a bulletin.

Under the heading, "Chapter Quartet News," we learn that **Dennis Taylor** had given up the tenor spot with the Merry Mugs to Ed Rooker. Apparently Dennis' job with TWA prevented him from continuing with the quartet. Then there's a note that **Al Moritz** had taken the bass position in the **B.M.A. Beaconaires** that had been vacated by Byron Werges, who'd been transferred out of the Kansas City area. The B.M.A. Beaconaires were the oldest quartet in the chapter and were planning to compete in the spring prelims at Burlington, Iowa. ♥





F CAL POINT: Up Close And Personal! by Wade Dexter

Many years ago, back in the 1960s, when I was still in the Army and stationed at Fort Leavenworth. I used to do a bit of fishing in my leisure time. I'd drive down to the lake at Tonganoxie and toss a line, either from a rented boat or off the shore. On the way down there, I'd have my car radio, and later a portable set, tuned to

Radio Station WDAF in Kansas City so I could enjoy listening to my favorite disc jockey, who played all of my favorite songs and delivered a clever chatter between records. Little did I know that the day would come when I would be writing about the guy in this column.

Dan Henry Bowser was born and raised in Coffeyville, KS, where he graduated from high school. His mother and two brothers were singers, and as Dan says, "Lots of harmonizing at home."

While he was attending Coffeyville Junior College, he played the sousaphone (the big tuba) in the band. It was there in 1942 that Dan met Estvl. who played the flute. He joined the Navy in 1943, served to the end of the war and was discharged in 1946. He and Estyl were married shortly thereafter. Dan continued with his education and earned a bachelor's degree from Kansas State University and a master's degree in education from KU. It was while he was a general science teacher at Roosevelt Junior High School in Topeka that he started a boys' ninth grade barbershop quartet. A friend of some of the boys in the quartet who attended another Topeka junior high school happened to be Greg Lyne, former Society director of music services. As Dan tells it, "All this led me to say for years, 'I introduced Greg Lyne to the barbershop Society.' As far

as I know, that's true, but it may be a stretch." Like most schoolteachers. Dan found himself searching for a source of summer income. He applied for a position at Radio Station WIBW and was hired as an announcer. He worked in that capacity for several years, and in 1956, was offered a full-time job at a salary, according to Dan, "as large as I would have been making (after) teaching 10 years hence."

Dan says that he would have joined the Society long

before he became a member of the Topeka chapter, but "I thought you had to be invited." Kind of scares you doesn't it, when you think there may be thousands of other highly talented singers hanging back because they aren't "invited" or may have to pass a strenuous audition for membership. Dan was finally "invited" to join the Topeka Chapter in

1949. It wasn't long before he joined a quartet called the Interurbanaires. Two members were from the Topeka Chapter: Dan (bari) and **Bob Bobo** (lead), and two were from the Kansas City Chapter: **Dennis Taylor** (tenor) and **Don Page** (bass). He says they only went to one contest, but finished in 12th or 13th place. Dan also directed the Topeka chorus for a few years. Is there anything this guy can't do?

In the fall of 1959, Dan was called and hired by WDAF in Kansas City and transferred his Society membership to the Kansas City Chapter. He served as chapter president in 1965 and directed the HOA chorus for a few years in the late 1960s and early 1970s, but had to resign when he was offered the WDAF-TV weather reporter job, which required night work. So for the next 20 years, we had to be content to watch Dan give us the weather report each evening at 10 p.m. on Channel 4 if we wanted to see him at all. Dan retired from WDAF in 1992.

When I asked Dan to name the one barbershopping experience that brought back his fondest memories, I fully expected him to name the visit by the Merry Mugs to Guantanamo Bay in 1965. But he couldn't be satisfied to name that single adventure. "The Gitmo trip, the Far East trip in '67, MCing numerous international contest sessions, teaching COTS for two years, and two years' attendance at Harmony College rise frequently as fondest Society memories. However, I have to include the wonderful memories being constantly increased by the current quartet, Tone-Henge. It's a blast sing-

ing and socializing with Wenner, Bagby, and Schweer and their ladies. Estyl and I are lucky!"

Well, there you have it. Yeah, I know, I only skimmed the surface of the record of Dan's accomplishments for the Society and the Kansas City chapter over a 57-year career. But **Todd's** going to raise Cain with me if I use any more of his precious space. All I can say is that I hope you all enjoy reading this account as much as I did putting it together.

Where Are They Now?

Had a nice chat the other evening with former HOA member Manley Vance, who is living with his lovely wife, Spike, on 68 acres about halfway between Liberty and Kearney. Some of you may recall that the two of them ran a summer camp for children there for about 15 years, "until the insurance cost too much," as Manley tells it. Their address is 12600 Plattsburg

Road in Kansas City (64060). Manley assured me that he'd be delighted if some of you guys gave him a call at (816) 781-3358.

I'd heard that Manley had surgery some time back for the removal of a brain tumor. He confirmed this and explained that he and Spike had just returned from a visit to the M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston, where they had conducted a thorough examination and prescribed a program of chemotherapy and radiation which Manley had just begun at Liberty Hospital. I was happy to hear that both he and Spike are feeling well.

I asked Manley abut his barbershopping experiences. He told me that he'd originally joined the newly formed Northland Chapter, but when it folded in 1968, he and several other members transferred to the Kansas City group. He let his membership expire a few years ago after back surgery had made it impossible for him to spend the required time on the risers.

I inquired about some of the chapter offices Manley had held while he was an HOA member. He admitted that his recollection was poor, so I reminded him that he was the chapter president at about the time I joined back in the early 1980s. He also recalled that he served as show chairman once and even acted as chapter secretary at one time.

Manley was an active quartetter almost from the beginning when he joined a foursome called "Principle (he said that was the way it was spelled) Ingredient." He sang the lead with **Dick Henderson** on tenor, **Rod** Flater on baritone, and Wendell Cochren singing the bass. But he considers the one barbershopping experience that he remembers with the greatest pleasure came when he sang with a quartet called *Hubbub*. Again, Manley sang the lead, Jim Bagby was the tenor, Dan Bowser was the baritone, and the bass was **Bob Gall.** (Jim tells me that **Willard Yoder** sang the bass after Bob died). What a combination that must have been!

Like so many other long-time members who spent so many years with the Heart of America Chorus, Manley says he still has warm thoughts and memories about the chapter and the guys he sang with-especially one guy by the name of Bagby. \checkmark
