

An Orlando Experience at International!

Stand-By (Tenor Ryan Sanford, Lead Kyle Feather, Baritone Mark Doyle, Bass Carson Kientz) is a youth barbershop quartet from Blue Valley Northwest High School. They have sung in Harmony Explosion! for the past two years, and have received the highest overall scores in both years. In 2017 they met and sang with Throwback (3rd place International Finalist) on HOA's Annual Show; in 2018 they met and sang with *After Hours* on the Annual Show. After Hours just became the 2018 International Quartet Champions! Stand-By participated in the new Next Generation Varsity Quartet Contest (f/k/a the Collegiate Quartet Contest) for the first time this year in Orlando. They were clearly the youngest competitors in that contest; nearly all of the other quartet competitors were 20 - 25 years old. Stand-By qualified 9th going into the contest and finished 9th overall at the contest. They did a fantastic job representing the Central States District and our Barbershop family. We are very proud of them.

From Stand-By:

"If we were to use one word to describe our first experience at an international barbershop convention, it would be community. It was astonishing (and at the same time, not surprising) that we would constantly run into friendly faces, including people who we were close with, people who knew about us, and people who just wanted to ring a tag. Not only was it a blast to compete in the collegiate competition, but to have the opportunity to watch the big league competition was unforgettable. Speaking of which, we were so incredibly proud of our friends, *After Hours*, whom we had the pleasure to perform with on the *Heart of America Chorus'* show a couple weeks before. They absolutely killed it in Orlando, and we couldn't have been happier. Overall we had such a wonderful experience, and we are so thankful for all of the friends, family, quartets, and choruses that have supported us on this amazing journey. And to think that it's only our first year!"

ARTHUR PAUL WINANS 1933~2018

Arthur Paul was his given name but he always went by Paul. His family knew him as a loving family man and he used to tell his children "Never fear, Daddy Paul is Here." He could fix almost anything.

In his younger life, Paul was born a welfare baby and slept in the backroom of his father's appliance store. Later, he grew up

helping his dad with his business; he worked at a wildlife preserve; worked on the railroad in lowa and was drafted into the Army where he was assigned to a Missile site setting gyroscopes on NIKE Missiles. In college, he studied history and counseling and earned his PHD in Counseling. He taught at Lee's Summit High for a time then worked as a counselor in the UMKC Veterans Administration program where he was a Professor of Counseling at Warrensburg University of Central Missouri. Among his other positions and hobbies, he worked at Radio Shack for a time and was fascinated with all electronic equipment so he always had the best electronic gear and was a member of the lowa Historical Society.

Paul was a 22-year member of the Kansas City Chapter, having joined in 1996, and sang bass in the *Heart of America Chorus*. He served for a year or two as treasurer but he is most remembered for his work as ticket chairman of the annual show for a number of years, not an easy task. Though he was not active for the past few years, he kept his membership up to date and he and his wife attended the annual shows every year. He was a quiet man, always made friends easily and was willing to help out where he could.

In early June, Paul complained of what he thought was a heart problem but resisted seeing a doctor. When he eventually went to the doctor he was found to have advanced cancer of the colon. He died Friday June 11, 2018. He was 84 years old.

A contingent of 11 members of *HOA* sang *I Believe* and *Irish Blessing* at Paul's memorial service at Langsford Funeral Home in Lee's Summit, Missouri.

RODNEY "ROD" FLATER 1946~2018

Rodney "Rod" Curtiss Flater, 72, was born March 17, 1946 in Eldora, lowa, population 2732 in 2010, and died March 24, 2018.

He attended Grundy Center High School in Grundy Center, IA where he graduated in 1964, and went to Weaver Airline School in Kansas City, MO. He worked at Delta Airlines

in 1965 until 2000 with time out for a stint in the U.S. Air Force, serving one year in Okinawa, Japan.

Rod loved to sing. He joined the *Pride of Northland* chapter sometime after 1970 when he and his wife moved to Kansas City, and later joined the Kansas City Chapter in about 1980 after the Northland chapter closed. He sang baritone in the *Heart of America Chorus* from 1980 until 2003 and in at least two Singing Valentine's quartets in 2011 and 2012 when *HOA* needed additional quartet members to deliver Valentine's to patrons in the Kansas City area. Members of *HOA* remember Rod as knowledgeable in music and a strong voice in accurate singing, especially the baritone part.

He loved annual fishing trips with his brothers and grandson, organized a neighborhood Block Watch, managed a church softball league, coached a girl's T-ball team during his later life and played the piano when he was younger. He was a member of Platte Woods United Methodist Church for 46 years.

Rod was a heavy smoker for years and could never quit despite encouragement from members of the chapter. He died from lung cancer.

Rod married **Linda (Rhoads)** in 1967 in Grundy Center, IA, and they moved to Kansas City, MO in 1970 where they raised three daughters. He was preceded in death by his parents and a nephew. He is survived by Linda, his wife, daughters: **Tammy, Angie,** and **Amy**; seven grandchildren and brothers: **Jack, Jay, Roger** and **Jerry.**

A memorial service honoring Rodney's life was held, March 28, 2018, at the Platte Woods United Methodist Church and a committal service with military honors followed.

HOA OBITUARY

6LYDE H. MENSEN 1927~2017

Clyde H. Mensen, 90, was a well known member of the Kansas City Chapter and *Heart of America Chorus* for a number of years. He is believed to have joined the Olathe Kansas Chapter in the early 1960s and transferred from Olathe to Kansas City in the late 1970s, He was active in Kansas City for a number of years until he moved to Zellwood, FL in 1983. In those years he was

Chorus Manager and sang lead in the HOA chorus.

Clyde served in the U.S. Navy in the Seattle, WA area from 1944 until he was discharged in 1945 after contacting Scarlet Fever. After the war, he worked as an Air Traffic Controller for 21 years until he retired in 1975. In Olathe, he started his own sign company in his garage called *SignCraft Signs* and He moved to Stilwell, KS, a suburb of Olathe, in 1976 continuing to paint signs and do hand lettering out of the barn he renovated in a sign shop.

He was chosen Barbershopper of the Year in 1980, for his work setting up and handling travel arrangements and for the printing jobs he did for the chorus in preparation for the 1979 International contest and other activities. He and **Della**, Clyde's wife, were leaders when *HOA* won its first district title in 1978 and headed for the Minneapolis International in 1979. In the big metal building on the property behind the Mensen house and on the yard between, they led the *Heartbeats* and chapter volunteers in producing untold numbers of silk-screened, heart-shaped *HOA* fans, bumper stickers and T-shirts. Our performing attire then was the three-piece brown suit with bright yellow piping, so all the signs were bright yellow with brown print.

Through the Rotary Club, Clyde had met outgoing Santa Fe Junior High vocal music teacher **Texanna Olenberger**. And, along with fellow *HOA* member **Al Higgins** — a frequent substitute teacher at Santa Fe — they further inspired her strong interest in barbershop harmony. She said Clyde and his quartet had invited her to an *HOA* show and that cemented her plan to incorporate quartetting into her music program. It didn't take much persuasion to get Texanna and some of her boys to join our bus trip to Minneapolis, where she recalls to this day it was a wonderful time.

Della developed Multple Sclerosis in the later years and Clyde took care of her until her death. He lived in Atlanta, GA until 2013 until he developed bladder cancer and his daughters moved him to Belton, MO in 2016.

Clyde sang in a few quartets over the years but the only two quartets his daughters could remember were *The Wagon Masters* and *The Dream Dusters*. He also sang in quartets in Florida and in Georgia and with the *Stone Mountain Chorus* when he lived in Peachtree City, GA.

Clyde Mensen died as he had wished, quietly listening to Ray Coniff on his favorite Pandora radio station. He leaves behind four children, seven grandchildren and seventeen great grandchildren. Those that knew him in the Kansas City Chapter will likely remember him as hard working and willing to serve the chapter in the best way he could.

ANEWARE AND PARE BE

- 1- When asked by a newspaper reporter where chapters, then called "singing clubs," were being established other than in Tulsa, Cash said that his old friend, **Everett Baker**, a railroad executive, was currently busy organizing a chapter in St. Louis. That was an outright lie, but it wound up in the St. Louis papers. Baker's phone then started ringing off the hook, and, voilà, the St. Louis Chapter was born.
- 2- In the hotel where he was staying, Cash paid a bellhop to meander through the lobby in the manner of a town crier proclaiming "call for barbershop tenors and basses." Several singers my source did not specify the number stepped forward. Cash was evidently a true believer in the "you can't lose what you don't have" school of thought, hence his willingness to try the unconventional good advice for latter day barbershop recruiters.
- 3- Spacing out during the interview the society's crazy growth spurt in the very early days was definitely newsworthy, and Cash was frequently interviewed, so I guess we can forgive him if his eyes glazed over now and then Cash came out with another whopper. He told the reporter that neither he nor anyone else knew the verse to *Sweet Adeline*. Sure enough, the lyrics were then published in newspapers all over the country, oftentimes linked to stories about our nascent society. Barbershop and the society were back in the news, just where Cash wanted them to be, thanks to O.C.'s inventiveness and boldness.
- 4 He suggested that owners of old shaving mugs donate them to the society. He knew that very few would actually be sent to Tulsa, but he also surmised that the ploy had just the right amount of serendipity to make the papers. Right he was! The story was picked up by the wire services and widely published in newspapers. Once again barbershop was front and center in the public eye.
- 5 -In a letter to **Deac Martin**, the famed musicologist, regular *Harmonizer* columnist for many years and early society historian, Cash suggested that babies be fed birdseed instead of cereal. Cash was always looking for a way to garner attention and get a hook into people. He certainly had his share of human failings, notably that he was an unrepentant bigot, an altogether common mindset in people from the place and time of his youth. That unfortunate aspect of his personality, notwithstanding, I believe that all barber shoppers owe him a huge debt of gratitude not only for founding the society but also for launching it like a rocket by virtue of his amazing talent as a publicist, promoter and marketing expert extraordinaire. In that regard, all these many years after his death in 1953, his equal has not yet come along. ♥
