Can you FEEL the excitement? Can you SENSE the energy? Are you HAVING FUN singing in the chorus right now? I'll go out on a limb and say the answer to those questions is probably a resounding "YES!" I also want to share some thoughts with you about what I believe lies ahead for HOA.

We are in a great "place" right now. We're learning some wonderful new music. receiving fantastic vocal coaching from Bill

Biffle, got a great staging plan for "Changes Made" from

Rosemary Calderon, a trip to the Buckeye Invitational in August and our return to the Central States District chorus contest this fall in Wichita. Along the way, we'll have more coaching, a retreat weekend, "Concert in the Park" in July, and later in the year, the Holiday Harmony Spectacular returns with the Kansas City Chorus of Sweet Adelines. The rest of the year is chock full of GOOD STUFF!

So with all of those things lined up, how can we use each of them as building blocks to improve? There are loads of opportunities in what I just mentioned, so how can we capitalize on each of them? Let me share with you some ideas about what I think we can do to continue our guest for outstanding music and performance:


1). Come to rehearsal prepared and ready to sing. As Dr. Greg Lyne would say, "Bring all of yourself to the party." Each Tuesday presents another opportunity for us to better ourselves, practice and reinforce the guidance and techniques our coaches have given us, and at the same time, share in the joy of making great music with each other. I look forward to the three hours we get to spend together every Tuesday. When I arrive at rehearsal, I am ready to throw

myself into the evening and walk out of the hall later on knowing that I got better at something. Have that attitude!

2). Find ways to make the best singing and vocal production techniques "second nature." Our coaches and Music Team are committed to teaching and promoting the best singing techniques possible. But it's

> impossible for us to monitor each and every voice all the time. We strive for excellent singing in rehearsal and performance, but what can each of us do individually. outside of Tuesday nights, to help HOA get better? Consider these possibilities:

- Tape yourself regularly and listen to your tape. What do you hear? What would you change or do differently next time? Does


- Practice with your learning tape, CD or MP3 file.

- Practice at home in front of a mirror and see if you are making the proper vowel shapes.

- Listen to yourself when you are on the risers and see if your voice matches the sound within your section, as well as the whole ensemble.

- And remember Bill Biffle's challenge to us: "Sing alike, sing in-tune, sing together." Not rocket science, is it? It's amazing how simple, yet effective that statement is.



It's a great tool to take home, so your family knows what's going on, too.

But we frequently have time getting our meetings off on the right foot, mostly because some guys take the risers unprepared. Our goal is to start the meeting at 7 p.m. and launch the singing at 7:10. It's hard to sing when guys are scrambling to find music or trying to look over a shoulder two rows away.

That's one major purpose of *In-Tune*: to let you know what songs will be covered each night. If you don't have them, see ace librarian **Reed Alberg** before 7:10. We're doing a lot of sight-

reading these days, so look on the table as you enter for the stacks of music, new and old.

3). Live the Music! When we've created the best sounds, and as I mentioned above, when that becomes second nature, we have the chance to really explore and feel the music.

Surely you have been in a rehearsal where we've worked on specific singing skills and then the director says, "Okay, now lets perform!" That's a tough transition to make, isn't it? Left brain to right brain—180 degrees! I know I have never done that in front of you, now have I? Yeah, right...

Seriously though, I truly believe that when the fundamentals of great singing become natural to us, we have more opportunities to let go and live the music, instead of working on technique. The challenge to become better singers/performers/barbershoppers embodies many things—physical technique, visual expression, vocal inflection, dynamics, staging, you name it. A number of different elements. All of those things are very "left brain" though, aren't they? They are things we practice and think about.

But what happens when we master those things, concentrate less on technique and are able to focus on delivering the

lyrics of the music? Remember how you sang "How far would I travel, to be where you are? How far is the journey, from here to a star? And if I ever lost you, how much would I cry?" from "How



Deep is the Ocean?" Those are very emotional, powerful lyrics. If all of the techniques in the process are present and working properly, and you focus on that lyric (or the lyric of ANY song we sing), what does it feel like when you live the music and communicate the song? Those are the magical moments—when the performer and the music become one. It's happened to each of us before. It's like the moon and stars align and for a few moments, everything is just "right." Remember how good that feels, and how you want it to happen again? It can...and it will.

4). Lastly, rejoice in and cherish what we share together. What a wonderful chance we have to come together regularly, share the bond of music, become better friends and musicians, and give this gift to our families, friends and audiences. Music has the power to change people's lives. WE can touch people—whether it be on a Tuesday night, at a contest, or at a show, we may never know the impact we can have on others with our music.

I continue to remind myself of how fortunate I am to be a part of this group. Be proud of what we do, yet never stop seeking out opportunities to grow and share. Let's find the champion in each and every one of us as we continue our quest through Columbus, Wichita and then on to Montreal.

A LOOK AT THE PAST IN HARMONOTES


<u> Ten Years Ago - July, 1992</u>

David Krause announced that *Special Touch* would perform their final public appearance at the Northwest Missouri University Music Camp. According to David, the immediate reason for the retirement of one of HOA's best-ever quartets was that **Matt Moore** had expressed a desire to "sing bass again and has recently been distracted from barbershop by his work and a very shortly due first child." David didn't know at the time what the future held in store for *Special Touch*, but I seem to recall that after a change or two in personnel, they were right back at it again.

We found this "Briefly" in the July 1992 *Harmonotes*:

"In case you haven't seen the announcement in the Kansas City Star (or heard it on Channel 4), TV weatherman and longtime HOA member Dan Henry Bowser will retire on November 27. Dare we hope that Dan, who was the baritone of the popular comedy quartet, the Merry Mugs, and one to the finest barbershop MC's ever to tear up a bad joke, will be able to spend a little time with us on Tuesday evenings? Well, it took a little time, but he's been back for some time now, as active as ever, and the other three Tone-Henges couldn't be happier.

Our *Harmonotes* editor announced there would be a complete report on our accomplishments at the International contest in New Orleans



in the August issue. He gives no reason, but it was probably because by the time we got home, it was well into July. Also, **Jim Bagby** gave us a clue when he referred in the "Armwavers Outlook" to what fie called the "Louisians Lunacy."

Twenty Years Ago - July, 1982

HOA Convention Chairman **Clyde Mensen** used the front page and two additional pages to provide complete details for the HOA trip to Pittsburgh for the 1982 International convention and contests. We stayed at the Marriott Inn, and the convention headquarters were in the William Penn Hotel.

Al Moritz describes the trip to Meramec State Park to join fellow barbershoppers for the 28th Annual No Fishin'-No Huntin' weekend (I believe it was hosted by one of the St. Louis chapters). Traveling in motor homes driven by Barney Wasson and John Stucker, the group also included Nile Abbott, Terry Smelcer, Al Moritz, Keith Schweer, Ed Fleeman, Rod Rule and the Lankenau brothers, Ross, Gordon and Wayne. The idea was to spend Friday evening, Saturday, and Sunday morning doing a great deal of woodshedding, with a horseshoe pitching tournament and a Saturday evening show for the campers in general. Oh, yes, there was supposed to have been a float down the river. However, bad weather plagued the guys for most of the weekend, and many of those in attendance chose to stay in camp and try to keep warm.

<u> Thirty-Five Years Ago - July, 1967</u>

Editor **Don Thorne** reported the passing of **Ben Franklin** on May 24. Ben sang lead with the old Barberpole Cats, later known as the Kansas City Serenaders who finished in second place at the 1941, 1942, 1943, 1946, and 1947 International contests. They also won the CSD championship in 1948. When Ben joined the Kansas City Chapter in 1939, he was the only barber in the entire Society.



Nothing that is immediately life-threatening, but 3 of the 5 hospitalizations were for GI-bleeding, and one of those times involved being transfused with 14 units of blood, packed cells, plasma, etc. Dave says he is doing fine—is just feeling very weak. He says send sympathy, cards and chocolate. If pressed for time, omit the cards. If VERY pressed for time, omit the sympathy!

We received this recent note from long-time member Dick Sutton:

"This chorus I'm directing in Columbia City, (Indiana) is growing nicely, up to 23 members from about 15 a year ago. Our singing is getting better also. My 23 years of training in HOA really is paying off!"—Dick




