No doubt you will hear elsewhere in this issue about how great International was and I am in total agreement. David's "goose bumps" must be catching because I get them every time I think about our performance.

It was the most exciting performance that I have ever experienced with *HOA*.

Competition, however, is only one manifestation of what I was talking about in **Vince's** Philly information booklet when I said I couldn't be prouder of the *Heart of America Chorus*. I wrote that a few days before we arrived at International and meant every word even though we hadn't competed yet. In fact, my words had nothing to do with competition. They had everything to do with an attitude, a work ethic, and a commitment.

But now we've done it. We have demonstrated our potential by improving a whopping 3.5 points from our fall competition. We have set our own standards. We are now our own competition. How can we now settle for anything less than that which we have already accomplished? Did we create this attitude, this work ethic, and this commitment for just one contest? I think not.

David said in one of his extra rehearsals, "If it is to be, it's up to me." He also said, "...I mentioned a long time

ago that for this contest we were going to average in the 80's in all categories or know the reason why? Well, individual commitment will be the main reason...one way or the other." **Mike Slamka** said we all needed to take "ownership" of our performance. Obviously you all demonstrated that you took ownership — that it was up to you — and that you were willing to commit.

Now is the time to build upon the tremendous foundation we have created. We have an awesome opportunity to jump to the next level. You (I'm talking to <u>you!</u>) can start by making a total commitment to practice at home, by making a total commitment to not <u>ever</u> miss practice except when it is absolutely unavoidable (that commitment alone would probably increase our scores by a couple of points), by making a total commitment to riser discipline.

You've done it once, now it's up to each of you individually to keep the momentum going. ♥

I'm glad I waited a while before composing this note. I wanted to hear from some of you first even though I had been working on this article for a while. The good news is that this will be brief as several are already thinking just like me, including Mark Fortino. In fact his main point

on the following page is exactly mine. How good do we want to be?

But before we go there we must recognize and congratulate the 59 on their accomplishment. I hope those of you there had the same experience as I. I enjoyed every minute of every rehearsal. And, was very appreciative of your attention and responsiveness. We improved quite a bit that week! In fact, perhaps as much as a point and a half per judge in my estimation. And, it all came together on the stage. Can't wait to see the video. I personally managed to stay in performer mode the whole contest set and only starting thinking a bit as we sang the long tag to "Basin." I don't think it waas quite as good as it was a couple of times in rehearsal that week. If it had been those two songs may have ended up close to identical in score. Wow. Do you guys know how hard it is to sing that song that well? Tougher songs like that take a while longer to get to a very high level. But then they become really fun. And, you know what's going to be really fun? We can still make both of those songs better. As Mark already mentioned we didn't take all of us. And, until we hit Philly we had only had one extra rehearsal in the previous three months. Anyway, we certainly peaked on stage, which is a great feeling, isn't it? In fact, on my ride home I listened to the Master's of Harmony's winning performance of "Love Me from the '90s and it just didn't sound as good to me as I remembered. My memory of our stage performance seemed superior.

Now, back to that how good do you want to be thing. In my view it's mostly about each guy being dedicate to improving. One category needs the most focus now. The one we haven't payed as much attention to in the last couple of years. My own. And, here's my simple recipe for our level to improve very quickly in this category. Individual work. By now you guys know that I dislike extra rehearsals unless you guys ask for them. If we aren't having 90% attend. at our regular meetings why add more? And, our time together needs to mostly be about blend, balance, etc. So, the individual commitment to facial expression of the song has to be exactly that.....an individual commitment. More on that soon.

OK now back to my third sentence above. The part where I said this would be brief? *Oops*. So, we'll save some of the rest of my thoughts for our next music team meeting and the 20th and...? But, I will share a fantasy I've considered a few times in the last days. We had 59 in Philly and several of the PC didn't go. What if we added those and then some? And, next July is in Kansas City. Wonder how many great singers we can put on that stage?

My sincere thanks to all of the Philly guys for one of my best barbershop moments ever.

I got back into town last night but I've been dying to write you guys and say: "OK, now THAT was fun!" (Putting it in the words of our illustrious director!)

Do you all realize what we accomplished? Do you realize that we accomplished it with 25% of our qualified performing chorus members missing? Yes, that's right, we left 20 guys home because of work conflicts, financial reasons, etc! Those are 20 great singers that passed their audition but were not able to be on stage with us in Philly!

Imagine what happens when we add many of those 20 back, along with guys who have already told members of our music team since we stepped off the stage in Philly, "I'm in! I want on the bus!"

I hope the 59 of you realize that you carved a path for the future of this chapter that will forever be remembered as the turning point for *HOA* toward musical excellence! You don't score an 84 in the music category on anything unless you have a great group of singers AND the right musical leadership in place to do it. I couldn't be more proud of our performing chorus and our director and music team.

Jim Henry told me when we were going through the audition process that if you hold your membership to a higher standard and improve the quality level of your performing chorus, your musical leadership must also step up to a new level or you will never achieve your goals. Well, there is no doubt that BOTH our membership and our leadership stepped up and pulled off what many thought was unthinkable, *and* again we did it with 25% of our Performing Chorus missing! WOW!

OK...that's about as much celebrating as I can handle because I'm already thinking about our next goal, 84 average this fall!

How good do you guys want to be? Notice I didn't ask how much do you want to win the District GOLD? The first question will always answer the second. Strive for excellence and all the medals and trophies and all that other "junk" will take care of itself all while crowds are leaping to their feet to applaud you for moving them in ways they've never been moved before! That's the goal!

While it's awesome that *HOA* came out on top of the three CSD choruses in Philly, I got to see both *Central Standard* and *Fremont's* performance's and they were awe-

some! Don't think that this fall will be a walk in the park to bring home the GOLD. *Central Standard* and *Fremont* will be even stronger than they are now. That's what is so great about competition. Look what coming in third place did to us last fall. Competition, when approached in a healthy way, can be an awesome motivator for improvement.

BUT, let's stay focused on my first question, "How good do you want to be?" How good you want to be individually will determine how good we will be as a chorus forever.

The way I see it, how good YOU—and I'm talking to ME too—want to be will begin to be told by your/my attendance at our next rehearsal.

So, where do you plan to be Tuesday night, July 20? Which uptune do you want to take to district competition? Do you want to sing "Basin Street Blues" again?! Do you want to sing "Fit As A Fiddle?" I will tell you that your music team is leaving that decision up to YOU! YOU will tell US through your own actions if we are going to have to hold onto "Basin Street" for yet another contest by how well YOU show up on July 20 knowing every word and note and every rhythm to "Fit As A Fiddle."

Do you realize there are only 12 rehearsals left before the fall contest plus the Aug. 20-21 retreat with **Mike Slamka** and **Cindy Hansen,** which will require 100% attendance if we hope to acheive our goals? Do you realize that we will also need to be learning new repertoire music, new holiday show music all while trying to prepare for the district contest?

Attendance will become a much stronger focus for qualification to remain in the performing chorus over these next several months leading up to the district contest.

When you reflect on last week in Philly I hope what you remember is not our score or our placement. Nobody really cares about those things. Really, they don't. I bet very few of you could tell me the five medalist chorus's from last year. BUT, I'll bet nearly every one of you will never forget the feeling you had at the end of "Love Me and The World Is Mine" on that International Stage when the crowd began to applaud! Never forget that *that* is why we are working/playing so hard and having so much fun together! There is no other reason. That joy is the reward for all the fun we have each and every Tuesday night together as the *HOA* family!

I can't wait to see each and every one of you on July 20 and rip some chords together and celebrate a great contest and continue the journey!

TEN YEARS AGO: JULY, 2000

This issue of *Harmonotes* was a special commemorative edition for the fourth International Convention to be hosted by the Kansas City Chapter. There are only ten pages, counting

the front and back covers, but they contain a great deal of history authored by *HOA* members who had been attending the conventions almost from the first one in 1938. As you might expect, our own **Mike Mathieu** provided an article in which he described what was scheduled for each day during the convention, which was chaired by the late **Gil Lefholz**. Then **Jim Bagby**, who explained that this "will be my 38th and the 31st in a row." Jim wrote that **Gil Lefholz** probably had attended more conventions than that, and that **Doug Miller** "is working a string of 35 or so in a row."

TWENTY YEARS AGO: JULY, 1990

The headline on the first page of this issue of *Harmonotes* carries the huge title that "**Jim Bagby** New HOA Director," as though he'd never directed our chorus before. All of *HOA* was shocked by the totally unexpected announcement of the resignation of our musical director of two and a

half years, **David Krause**, who had taken us to second place finishes in CSD competition in 1988 and 1989. Jim, was a veteran of 10 years as the *HOA* arm-waver and one of the finest barbershop chorus directors in the entire Society. In his acceptance article in this same issue, Jim says "I resume the most honored position in the chapter after a seven-year absence with both eagerness and trepidation. I feel a little like **Elizabeth Taylor's** sixth husband — I know what I'm supposed to do. I just hope I can make it interesting."

FORTY YEARS AGO: AUGUST, 1970

"The Heart of America Chorus took one of our most enjoyable trips in recent years on July 18 when we drove to Joplin, MO, to put on a show for the new Joplin Chapter. The Barbershoppers in Joplin were very appreciative of the show we put on and for our acting as sponsor of their new chapter. In addition to the Heart of American Chorus, the show included the Digits, Percy Franks, Dan Henry as M.C., and as a special treat, the Travelaires from Western Kansas. Although about only 38 members from Kansas City were able to make the long trip, the chorus was well-balanced and did a very fine job."

rial in Washington D.C. Honor Flights are totally supported by donations from individuals or firms who view this as a truly worthwhile cause.

Memorials visited, in addition to the WWII Memorial, included the Lincoln Memorial, changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, the Korean Memorial, and

Memorial (shown at left) which was dedicated in 2004. Many WWII veterans will never have the opportunity to visit this memorial inasmuch as most are in their upper 80's or in their 90's and it has been determined that in excess of 1,000 are dying each and every day.

Most Kansas City area barbershoppers are well aware of the historical plaque hanging in the original Muehlebach Hotel lobby, indicating the location of the chance meeting that resulted in the Society we all cherish. But wait! There's another one

hanging right under it! More about the second one later.

The Kansas City, Missouri Chapter of SPEBSQSA, Inc., under president **Nile Abbott**, decided there should be an official "marker" to tell the world. "This is where the world's largest,

all-male singing organization began." I'm not sure which chapter member contacted the Muehlebach for permission to hang a plaque there but an educated guess would most certainly be **Gil Lefholz**, who would later become the President of the entire Society.

The hotel has a policy <u>preventing</u> **any** plaques, ads etc. from being stuck on columns and walls, but the magnetic attraction of the plaque we had in mind was explained.

"It'll be an historical "marker" establishing the Muehlebach Hotel lobby as a national landmark".

The hotel's manager in 1963, Phil Pistilli, immediately recognized the potential of such an endeavor, and lifted the ban, *just this once*. So, on the Society's 25th Anniversary in April of that year, we hung a beautiful,

bronze plaque on one of those gorgeous, walnut columns in the old lobby, a ceremony highlighted by the harmonies of a proud *Heart of America* chorus.

Later came the hotel's remodeling and renovation. About this time Gil is wondering if the plaque is safe, and drives to the Muehlebach, only to discover that the plaque is **missing!** After many inquiries it's determined that it must be in that pile of debris in the basement. Good grief! Gil runs to the pile and after hours of on-the-knees digging through plaster, granite, tile, lumber and you-name-it, finds the plaque! It's much the worse for wear, so he has it cleaned and polished (he paid for all that) and to further insure its safety, sends it to Society HQ for safekeeping **until the Muehlebach's renovation and reconstruction is completed.** There is a reason that last phrase is in bold letters. Read on.


OK. When Muehlebach construction is shiningly completed, Gil calls Society HQ:

Gil: "We need to have our plaque returned so we can re-hang it."

HQ: "What? That's not YOUR plaque! It belongs to the Society! It's OURS!"

Gil: "The H--- it is! WE had it made, WE paid for it, WE contacted the Muehlebach and made all arrangements to place it in the lobby, hung it there in 1963! From the beginning, the idea and its fruition all came from Kansas City and !!@#*^%!! it, we

want it back!"



Now Gil calls then-Society historian **Dave Krause** and yours truly and says, "Let's have *another* plaque made; a re-dedication. I have contacted the nice lady that manages the Muehlebach now, **Carol Pecoraro**, and she has agreed to let us re-hang the original and put a new one below it. You want in on the ceremony and expense?"

Well, obviously we both said, "H---, yes!"...or words to that effect Believe it or not, we found the original screw holes that held the original plaque, and as a hotel worker re-hung the origi-

nal *and* the new one beneath, he was observed by the sum total of four folks, namely **Carol, Gil, Dave** and **Dan**. Big ceremony.

So, here's an invitation to the new members of our chapter. Go to the old, (east side) world-famous lobby of the Muehlebach and read both of the *only* plaques hanging on a column there, and when you're finished, enjoy the pride you'll feel along with the knowledge that you're standing in the same spot where **O.C. Cash, Rupert Hall** and a couple of other guys started it all on a stormy April night in 1938.

Then, when you're hosting the International next year, ask the guests you meet if they've seen the plaques. Most will say, "Yes." But if they haven't and they want to see 'em, you'll be a knowledgeable and proud guide.

HOA Scoring Analysis from Philadelphia

The Heart of America Chorus improvement in Philadelphia from district competition in October was 3.43%. The district score was a .94% improvement over our 2008 district score.

Our Philly score was our best in a district or international competition in five years. We scored 2,498 points in Salt Lake City in 2005, 83.27%, our best performance this century. The best performance by *HOA* in the 1990s was in 1997, when the chorus scored 2,526 (84.2%). Scores prior to 1994 are not comparable to current results (*Ed: because of a different scoring system.*)

HOA's best district score this century was in 2003 (1,492 pts, 82.89%) followed closely by 2004 (1,490, 82.78%). Note that in Philadelphia we virtually matched these results with our 2,483 score (82.77%). The best district score was in 1996 (1,511 pts, 83.94%).

Looking at all of the 27 competing choruses in Philadelphia, the average of all improved 2.24%, so we are above the norm, but it is clear that a lot of other choruses also did better.

If there were such a thing as a mostimproved award at the international level, it would go to Bolton, England, which improved 5.89% from its own convention qualifying score. Not far behind was the *Toronto Northern Lights chorus*, which improved by 5.82%. The *Westminster chorus* also improved its district score by 5.32%.

Brothers in Harmony from the Mid-AtlanticDistict showed a 4.23% gain, while the Salem Senate-Aires came up 3.89% (passing us in the process). The *Midwest Vocal Express* showed a 3.80% improvement with their package.

Beyond that? We beat 'em all. Ours is the seventh-best improvement among all of them from fall to international. Did you notice where traditional powerhouses *New Tradition* and *Big Apple Chorus* finished? Yep, behind us. Believe it!

Looking at the quartets, comparisons are to their scores at the spring prelims in most cases.

Give gold medalist *Storm Front* credit, they improved their score by more than 5% over their performance in April, while *Old School* improved only slightly. *Old School* was over 4% better than Storm Front *last spring*.

The average improvement of all 50 quartets over their spring performances was 1.83%. Only seven quartets posted a lower score in Philly than they did last spring. The top 10 quartets showed a 2.46% improvement on average, while the second 10, including all three CSD quartets, showed a 3.11% improvement.

High Definition posted a 3.27% improvement, taking 12th place after being seeded 14th in the spring. *Skyline* posted a 4.16% improvement, finishing 18th after being seeded 30th in the spring.

Give credit to *The Party*, seeded 50th and last, they improved 4.10% and took 38th. *Maverick* improved the most. Seeded 47th, they improved 5.24% and took 24th. In the top 20, most improved (other than *Storm Front*) was '*Round Midnight*. Seeded 21st, they finished 15th, improving 4.41%. *Skyline's* improvement was third- best among the top 20, and *High Definition's* was fifth-best. In the top 10, the best improvements (just over 3%) were *A Mighty Wind* and *Musical Island Boys*.
