## Goals to Shoot For Along the Way by David Krause, HOA Director



This message pertains to our prep for Nashville, and beyond. My goals are evolving from my initial comments to many of you. I said I thought we should plan to average an 84 score. I'm no longer in that mind-set. I'm hoping for more. And, it's not really

about points or placement. It's simply about striving to learn and be the best we can be as a chorus. If we all INDIVIDU-ALLY dedicate ourselves to doing the best we can to improve in the next several weeks, an 84 average will be easily attained and left behind. Of course, that sentence started with if.

Does it matter what your director does in the next few weeks? Of course. I probably have the most improvement needed of all of us. I promise to really work on it. The director is the most important performer on stage in a chorus performance. Therefore, guys like Greg Lyne can develop great choruses seemingly at will. I have lots to do.

But that doesn't let you off the hook. In fact, I mentioned Greg for a reason. As I was doing some of my homework about directing recently I came across Greg's 10 steps to a better singing and performing chorus from a master class he presented in 1997. It's in our most recent manual to improve directors but, it all focuses on you. It's all about the individual chorus member improving. I want to share it all and hope you will take it to heart. If each of us works on all of this individually the results will be phenomenal.

I'll begin with his last four of the 10 steps as I feel they are the most important. They're not the technical things.

#### Bring the whole singer.

Bring all that you have to offer to every experience in life, including the rehearsal. Be in the moment, be attentive, be alert, be energetic, contribute to the whole. "Be all that you can be."

### Expect to grow.

Expect every rehearsal to bring personal and corporate growth. Come with the expectation of learning. Come expecting musical leadership to have something to teach you. Treat time spent not gaining knowledge as time wasted. Mean to improve.

#### "I'm talking to you!"

Not to the man behind you, not to the man on either side, not to the man in front, but to you. Every comment is meant for you. Be prepared to change instantly when the musical leader asks for a change. Don't think he means someone else. He means you! Do it now! Only you can change the way the chorus performs!

#### Look, act, be successful!

When you're a little down, your back or feet hurt, or you wish you were somewhere else, try acting the way you'd like to feel. Stand up straight, smile, elevate your chest, look someone in the eye.

If you look successful and act successful, success will follow. Take charge of your experience and make it something wonderful! (Obviously, developing this habit pays off everywhere, not just at our events.)

Now, once we've mastered these attitudinal things, the rest will happen easily. I know that even though this is long, you now want to know the first six things you need to do. They are the technical things you guys already do fairly well. But, just like the four steps above, they are the keys to growth and we can *always* improve. That's what makes this so much fun.

### Singer's posture

Always sing with one foot slightly in front of the other, weight comfortably forward, **chest comfortably up in a proud position**, shoulders resting comfortably down and a little back, head in line with the body. Stand tall. **Controlled relaxation** is the goal, an attitude of readiness for anything. Everything in perfect equipoise! (There's a word you don't see every day!)

#### Active Face

Always sing with an involved face! (Wow, some of us need to read this many times and actually spend our individual time away from the chorus working on this. It will not happen for some of us with attention only on Tuesday. Or even with lots of extra rehearsals. It's an individual responsibility to the team. This is currently one of our weakest areas. I sincerely believe it is an individual responsibility which some of our gold-medal quartet singers don't even take seriously enough. Oops, didn't mean to interrupt Greg for so long!) Lift the cheek muscles a little, raise and lift the upper lip a little, energize the eyes a lot, get involved facially. No tortured looks, just energize the facial muscles.

### Vowels that look right

Make an "oh" vowel look like an "oh" and "oo like an "oo," etc. Keep all the vowels vertical, not horizontal. Notice that a slight animation of the upper lip (a "lift" off the teeth) can contribute to increased resonation.

#### **In-line singing**

Make all the vowels sound similar to each other. That is, no single vowel should "pop" out at the listener. They should all have a similar character. While an "ah" is certainly distinct from an "oh" or an "ee," it should not be vastly different in the way it's placed, vocally, or in its inherent resonant characteristics. This is achieved by consistent vocal production, consistent placement, and a consistent approach to the musical line. At its best, there should be a continual, uninterrupted resonance (ring) throughout the entire vocal line, through the full range of word sounds and pitches.

#### Focused singing

The sound is simply focused into a resonant point, about where the point of the unicorn's horn would be. Start with the chorus with their hands held wide, shoulder high, and have them sing a unison pitch while slowly bringing the palms together in front of them. Have them listen to the "focusing" of the sound. This is related to No. 4, above. They will feel the tone placed behind the eyes or a little higher. The tongue position is critical. The tongue should be relaxed with the tip touching the lower gum ridge. This should be carefully taught and carefully monitored. Tongue tension is counter-productive. ### Know the characteristics of your part.

There are many ways to relate the different roles of each part to the unified whole. I like the car analogy: The chorus is a finely tuned, extremely expensive racing machine (say, a Lamborghini). The basses are the engine: smooth, velvet, powerful, unrelenting in it's supply of *EFFORTLESS*, masculine power. The baris are the transmission: shifting from gear to gear in a smooth, *EFFORTLESS* motion. The leads are, of course, the *EFFORTLESS* (I added the word that time) drivers. They are in control of both the speed and direction of this well-constructed machine. And the tenors are, well, how about the paint job? Brilliant yellow, fire engine red? (If they are really good, we'll let them add wax!)

Of course, any descriptive approach to part characteristics (foundation from the basses, dignity from the baris, personality from the leads, shimmer or sparkle from the tenors works very well.

Now, if you think that took a while to read, you should have typed all of this adding emphasis, etc. I'm really hoping some guys didn't quit reading this several paragraphs ago. If so, that tells us all something, and I sure wish I had a way of knowing. Well, maybe not. But, we should all reference this always. What if a director or clinician could just say one of the headings, like in-line singing, and the chorus immediately focused and did all of the things described in that paragraph!

I'm betting you'd agree that Greg is the master director. Some of you have been lucky enough to work with him. I have been in his classes several times and consider him a good friend with the best hands in our business. Easily. He used to coach us some. Maybe we can get him back soon. He is picky about who he visits and won't return if he doesn't sense a real dedication to learning and improvement. Doesn't like to waste his time (see that in his list of tips). If we got him to come coach us it would be an indication of his recognition of our direction, commitment, etc.

Believe it or not, there is more to this. Again note the subject above. Individual attention to all of this in this e-mail will replace many extra rehearsals. We only have one extra rehearsal, not counting our retreat, until Nashville and that is our send-off. My objective is to keep the extra rehearsals to a minimum so we get more guys at the ones we do have. So, again, the individual commitment to improvement becomes crucial. You have to work a bit, even just thinking about the stuff away from the team.

Do you know the two contest songs pitch and word perfect yet? That means you'd be able to start almost anywhere in the song upon request and not screw up the next lyrics, notes, etc. My guess is the answer is *no*. The answer must be **yes** as soon as possible. Again, your responsibility, not the music team and not the director. Speaking of that, we'll have a new really tough song soon for all of us to start learning. **Mark, Keith** and I almost have it done. It's a stretch piece. May be the toughest song you've ever tried to learn as a chorus. But I think we need the challenge and you'll rise to it.

**Next individual challenge.** What if we ended the retreat this weekend after hours of singing and hard fun (not work!) and every guy was in perfect vocal health? Is that possible? Might not be. If you are not used to singing a lot in an effortless fashion and don't often vocalize except on Tuesdays, then I would say it's not possible. But why not try? Vocalize a bit each of the next few days concentrating on the relaxed easy, effortless, on air singing we often talk about. No muscle in the sound. Then do that all weekend. Don't let yourself sing any other way. Of all of my many quartet experiences over the years I only achieved this type of singing one time for just a couple of months. We could rehearse for five or six hours and not be vocally tired at all. We were easily singing at a top 10 level. But, a contest didn't happen in those two months and it went downhill from that peak quickly. Doesn't take much to weaken a team effort. And if you're not improving you're getting worse. What if guys actually warmed up on the way to rehearsal so that when we sang "The Old Songs" it stayed in key, we sang all of the word sounds, etc. without having to work on it for 15-20 minutes? Think it's possible? I'd sure like to try. Then we'll start calling warm-ups "tune-ups," and they'll last about 10 minutes!

One last thing I've meant to say to you guys for weeks and haven't found the time. Some guys think I talk too much at rehearsal anyway, and that's probably correct. So I've been meaning to explain why I think it's so important for us to get to 100 guys in our group. It's not mainly to help us score better, etc. It's simply because as a barbershop chorus with our tradition and dedication we should have at least that many members in a city this size. I know there are other chapters in town guys can join, but we should easily be the best. We should attract all guys of all ages who enjoy singing and help teach them and learn from them and involve them in this great hobby to the extent they choose. We shouldn't require them to attend but inspire them to attend. And if they want to simply sing with us once a year that's OK. If they want to sing with us every Tuesday, even better. If they can't make it to Nashville, that's OK. We should encourage and accept whatever degree of involvement they wish.

As always, feel free to let me know what you think. And check with other guys to see if they read this. If not, encourage them to do so.

The 60-plus *HOA* members on the risers (where were the rest of you who plan to join the chorus at Nashville for the international contest next July?), under the direction of our new music director, **David Krause**, with our talented clinician, **Kevin Keller**, (who happens to be a member of the *Ambassadors of Harmony* of St. Charles; wonder what he thought of that outburst) right at his elbow, had just turned out a goose-bumping rendition of the last eight bars of "You Make Me Feel So Good" that exceeded the efforts of any previous performance of this song by the *HOA chorus!* You had to be there to really appreciate it.

Our thanks go to **Kevin Keller**, who coached our chorus just as though it was his own outfit at St. Charles. A nice fellow with a great sense of humor. Hope we can get him back again.

And kudos to our own **Al Higgins** for coordinating all of the arrangements for the retreat. I expect you'll get the call again next year, Al. Better be prepared. •

#### **TEN YEARS AGO: MAY, 1998**

Boy, was I wrong! And **Jim Bagby** has been quick to straighten me out! Says Jim, "I did not withdraw my letter of resignation in 1998. I was replaced by **Gordon Lankenau**, who directed until 2001." At that time, Jim was reappointed as the chorus director. And I don't remember any part of that transaction! All I can do is apologize to those who were misled by my mistake. I hope it'll never happen again.

The Kansas City chapter entered the cyber age with the establishment by **Rich Huyck** of a network mailing list that enabled each member to send e-mail to every other member on the network. Not only that, **Joe Mathieu** had put up and was running a WEB site for the chapter. There was even a suggestion that *Harmonotes* would no longer be needed.

There is good photographic coverage, thanks to Dale Neuman, plus a good summary of the festivities at the "new" Muehlbach Hotel in downtown Kansas City when the Society "Founders' Plaque" was restored in its place where it had hung since April of 1963. Raymond Schwarzkopf's article reports that the program included historical bits presented by David Krause, CSD historian, David Wright, of the St. Charles chapter and society historian, about the meeting of O. C. Cash and Rupert Hall in the hotel lobby that led to the formation of our Barbershop Harmony Society. Raymond reports that Kansas City Mayor Pro-Tem George Blackwell insisted on singing with a quartet, so three HOA members, the late Gil Lefholz on bass and Kevin Beauford on baritone and Raymond singing the tenor got together with the mayor singing the lead. Raymond comments on the mayor's "AMAZING VOICE."

### **TWENTY YEARS AGO: JUNE, 1988**

In his monthly "Commentary," your bulletin editor announced that 25 members of the Kansas City chapter were committed to attending Harmony College that summer, probably a record number of attendees from the same chapter. This can probably be attributed to the fact that our chapter board of directors had earmarked \$3,000 of chapter funds to be used to subsidize (up to a maximum of \$100 per participant) the cost of the tuition for each member who wanted to go. But the board asked that each participant consider that whatever knowledge and skills are acquired at Harmony College ought to be such as can be put to good use for the general benefit of the chapter as well as the individual.

#### **FORTY YEARS AGO: JUNE, 1968**

The late **Gil Lefholz** was awarded the chapter's award for outstanding service to the chapter, district and international society. Twenty-one members had been honored since the award was originated in 1952.

Mr. Bob Johnson, Society Director of Musical Activities, was in town on May 7 lecturing at the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music and our chapter meeting, which was held at the same time at the UMKC. Our chorus and quartets gave a thirty-minute program and then acted as guinea pigs for Bob in his demonstration of how to teach nonreaders how to read music. Music Director Steve Leone reported later that the Conservatory faculty was greatly impressed with our performance, and that the student body particularly enjoyed Bob's appearance as guest lecturer at some of their classes. ♥

### **HOA Financial Corner**

keep promising to write an article about Gift Annuities, but again we have a more urgent matter to discuss.

Since International will quickly

be upon us, we need to talk about the President's Fund. The President's Fund was established to help HOA members who are in some kind of financial need participate in district and international contests. Our avocation (I prefer not to call it a "hobby") can be an expensive one and it's understandable that some may require financial assistance to be able to attend these contests. If you have such a need the procedure is to contact **Dale Neuman, Carter Combs,** or **Doug Brott** and explain your circumstances. Procedurally, Dale reminded me that we need lead time to determine total need, a reasonable allocation, and cut the check.

We know that most people are reluctant to admit financial difficulties, but since most of us were not born with the proverbial "silver spoon" we have all "been there" at one point or another in our lives. Remember, the people (or person) with whom you will discuss the issue will be kept at the absolute minimum (need-to-know basis).

The two young women then picked up the injured player and carried her around the bases stopping at each base so the batter could touch her good leg on each base, thus completing the home run. A tremendous example of sportsmanship made more poignant by the fact that this home run and the associated RBI's were the winning runs for the game. Not only sportsmanship but sacrifice as well. What a story!

What does that have to do with HOA, you ask? EVERYTHING! Sportsmanship like the above should be a constant part of our life in HOA. We need to help each other and our brothers in other chapters. When David Krause became our director one of the first things he said was he wanted to see a kinder, gentler HOA (I sometimes get tongue tied on *kinder*, thus the title above).
