Everyone who thinks his chorus will make the top 10 in Louisville take one step forward. *Not so fast there, HOA...*


Whaddaya mean? We're not a shoo-in for the top 10? Didn't you hear all those great things **Dwain Brobst** and **Don Kahl** said about us? Even down-to-earth **Bill Biffle** talks about our potential.

Yep, we've got a lot of that. But without intending to impose anything other than a realistic view, let's look at what's happened in international chorus competition since we were last there in 1998—and at the other wanna-be's and already-are's.

By my count, without factoring in HOA, there are at least 14 contenders for the top 10. Most observers would agree the top 3 should be our *AOH* brothers, *Northern Lights* and *New Tradition*—in whatever order you wanna believe. The medalist *Alliance* and *Midwest Vocal Express* choruses return. So do perennial medalist *Great Northern Union* and former medalist *Big Chicken*.

If you're keeping score, that's seven. New to the scene and getting rave reviews are the champs of the always-potent Far Western District, *Westminster*. Top ten regular *Tampa* is under the new leadership of **Randy Loos**, a Sweet Adeline gold medal arm-waver. How fast will his *Heralds of Harmony* advance?

Speaking of question marks, how can you discount former chorus champs *Alexandria* and *Cincirmati?* Both with talented directors just barely into their second year of new regimes. Then there's on-trushing *Denver*, a 100-plus chorus under former HOA member **Darrin Drown**; the *Sound of the Rockies* took seventh a year ago.

Without mentioning any of the other district champs with the same goal we have–knock somebody off–and the affiliates, who are always unknown quantities.

So should we take down that banner with the big red letters hanging in our meeting hall? Not so fast, pitchpipe breath. Let's poll our members about what they want—and what they're willing to do to achieve it.

There are some encouraging signs: every lead, baritone and almost every signed-up member turned in a tape by the first recording deadline. Many passed their first tape. The section leaders and music team have given unselfishly of their time to qualify others. At this writing, we still have over 80 on the risers.

So I suggest those four minutes a day—at least—become very important. For everyone. And the dedicated attitude indicated by that commitment is key. The five-time champion *Masters of Harmony* say "All it takes is all you've got, all the time." For HOA, at this stage in our climb, I ask—on behalf of the chorus—that you get away from your comfort zone. Practice and perform with all you are capable of giving now, physically and vocally.

When that happens, the one-step-forward command will be followed by "That means you, HOA!"



want to thank all the guys in the chapter who have offered me encouragement and kind words during the "Lighter in Louisville" contest. Losing weight is more than day to day, it is minute by minute—recommitting yourself to living and eating differently than you have in the past. 

But they still came from work or from home; from nearby or from the far side of the metro area to sing our kind of harmony one more time for Howard and his family. I did a guick calculation (with estimates to be sure) and some of the singers had only been members for one. two, or three years, others had been with HOA for one, two or three (or more) decades. It made no difference as our voices lifted in song. We are part of a fellowship that transcends time and we should always remember that. Maybe we should amend our motto to read: "Drawn by Harmony, Bound by Friendship, Striving for Excellence—Forever!" ~

EVERYTHING I KNOW I LEARNED... IN PERFECT HARMONY by Cynthia Jacobsen

As observed by Dr. Cynthia Jacobsen while waiting to receive the check from HOA. She was impressed with the HOA work ethic and saw fit to share this with others.

Although some of us think, as the popular book tells us, that kindergarten teaches us all that we need to know, I learned a lesson just recently, decades removed from kindergarten.

As I watched a rehearsal of the Heart of America Barbershop Chorus, I learned that through perfect harmony, hearts are touched, love is shared and much much more.

The first remarkable lesson I learned was the truth of "you shall teach them diligently unto your children." Up on the risers, were three generations of families—grandfather, father and son—all singing with joy and enthusiasm. What better way to form relationships and love of learning together?

As an expert in dyslexia, and children's language disorders, I was struck how the choral director used all the tricks of good teachers and therapists. He formed teamwork by providing a start-up note and gaining attention and commitment. He used multisensory learning, so important in reaching different kinds of minds. He combined hand signals, rhythm cues and pacing signals so that all could benefit from instruction.

I thought about the importance of rhyme in getting children to hear the sounds of language. Here was an example of how music and rhyme could be combined to aid memory and integration of new material. There was a lot of repetition, and times to consolidate new learning into long-term memory.

The choral director used kinesthetic learning, knowledge of how the body and the voice worked in concert. When the men overworked one muscle part, such as the head, he brought it to their awareness. I thought of the children with dyslexia, whose bodies curve over as they attempt to write, unable to separate eve and hand. The director encouraged relaxation by letting the singers "shake it out." At Children's Mercy Hearing and Speech Clinic, it is also the practice to make learning fun, to provide stress-free learning. Children with anxiety have decreased memory. Likewise, adult learners also need to relax, and experience the present moment.

Frequent praise and feedback were provided as well, all critical for improved performance and change. If all of us could continue to learn in our adult lives, in these methods, demonstrated by the Heart of America Barbershoppers we would continue to gain in confidence and skills, and satisfaction.

The barbershoppers do more than teach. During the past 10 years, they have contributed a portion of the money raise through Singing Valentines. That's



another lesson...gifts come in many forms and it's incumbent upon us to share them.


SUPER **SELLERS!!!**

SCALES by Carter Combs

At our typical Tuesday night chorus rehearsal, if anyone says "scale," I will usually think "do, re, mi..." and wait for the starting pitch.

Now, if we're out fishing and just landed a beautiful rainbow trout, and you say "scale," I might reach for the tacklebox to start working on that fish. "Do, re, mi" never even pops into my brain.

Or, if we are at our Mt. Everest base-camp, and our sherpa says "scale," I would most likely check my climbing gear and head for the nearest rock wall. Unless it's a scientific expedition and I'm taking measurements, in which case I'd simply reply "meters".

So, responding to the same word, I reacted four different ways. Why? Simply put, my brain put the word "scale" in context, based on my surroundings and the current situation, allowing me to respond in an appropriate fashion.

Now, more importantly, why should that matter to us, a performing, competing chorus? Consider our typical performance venue: on stage, on risers, in tuxes, under stage lights, singing multiple songs covering many themes and emotions. We have a very limited ability to change the environment to help the audience put our music into context. We certainly can't physically transport them to a stream or mountain, or to that tumble-down shack in Athlone, or even to a train platform.

Our alternative is to transport them mentally; to trick the audience's collective brain, by using every method and talent we have. We want to slyly convince their subconscious emotions that they really are seeing a group of guys excitedly waiting to board that train for Dixie, or recalling and toasting our old friends.

It's simply not enough to use only the words and music... that's like saying "scale" in the dark... it takes much too long to figure out how to respond. We establish the emotional context (set the mood) visually. So all those things we do, the press, reset, prep, step, smile, arm sweep, eyebrows, glance in, ticket wave, marching band, spread... are not moves. They are opportunities for us place the music in the desired context, to share the story with our audience, to make the emotional connection.

When we do that, the audience loves us, and the scores take care of themselves.

So, let's look at the calendar.



John Fortino hardly concealed his excitement over the qualification of the *l2th Street Rag* for competition in the International competition in Pittsburgh in July. This was to be the first experience at that level of competition for John and Mark.

Chapter President **John Pennington** announced that our first-ever retreat was scheduled for September 9-ll, at a yet to be determined location (probably Atchison). It appears that the event had been set up on an earlier date but had to be canceled because of lack of interest. John reveals that "we had to pay for the rooms that we blocked out because the hotel was unable to sell them on such short notice. The bottom line is that it cost us \$1,870. That hurts!"



MUSICAL NOTES

This may be this last edition of *Harmonotes* prior to our going to Louisville. As of this writing we have 5 Tuesdays and 3 Thursdays left. We have come a long way, but we still have a long way to go. The initial feedback from the section leaders is that the

qualification taping is going pretty well. Folks are turning in better tapes earlier and that's a good sign. 

Nice quartet, and good guvs-we enjoyed hanging out with them. Matinee and evening show, then a (DRY!) afterglow in a community college cafeteria. Great audiences at both the evening show and the afterglow. Another guy you might know took good care of us-Don Kready, who directs their chorus and sings in a chapter quartet. Don's son and grandson were present-son Rick (of Special Touch and 12th Street Rag) and grandson Jeff. who emceed the show. They had to drive back to Topeka after the afterglow, to get Jeff a couple hours of sleep before directing his church choir next morning.
