A big thank you to the persons that reviewed and provided editorial comments on the grant. A huge thank you to **Tony Strub** and **Jerry Meier** for attending the meeting and answering the questions the decision makers had. It was definitely a team effort and one that has paid off.

Now we know we can do it, let's celebrate, then get right back to work on the next one.

If it means going to a meeting eight days after a double hip transplant, or six days after heart surgery, or three hours after getting off a plane at KCI, or being on the risers with a "touch of a cold" when we might rather be home in bed, or cooking burgers and dogs in the rain, or taking down risers when I'm 80 plus years old, or staying at a meeting past 10 pm when my director asks, or re-reading all the coaching tips that we have been given through the years, or volunteering for that job I really didn't want to do, basically whatever I can do to help make my chorus better in many ways, that is some of what THE HEART OF AMERICA CHORUS means to me.

In addition to what I can do to make the singing better, my belonging to this organization means many other things to me. It's dedication like **John Cross**, 36 plus years with never missing a meeting or a performance. It's the leadership of **Bob Gall** and **Gil Lefholz**, two of our members who have ascended to the role of International President of this organization. **Joe Stern**, one of our chapter's founders and great International leader. It's all the quartets that have one chapter contests, district contests, and the one that has one the International Quartet Championship. It's hours and hours of singing and ringing chords because it makes us feel good, and it also pleases the audience when we perfect our craft as well as we can make it. To me it is not saying, I'm pleased with as well as we are singing and I'm working hard enough! When we stop attempting to improve our craft I believe we are falling behind. We will then be accepting mediocrity, which I will never accept!

In July of this year there will be an International convention in Anaheim. For many reasons, our nationwide membership has decided to stay home in huge numbers. Less than 5,500 registrations sold as of last week. Next year our convention will be in Philadelphia, and the following year we will be hosting the convention here in our home town. I feel an obligation to try and "turn this ship around". We all need to help to get this done. We need to start today, not tomorrow, not next week, but today. We all have to help in this task.

We have to pay tribute to the great tradition of our Society, our District, our Chapter, and to our many departed brothers whom have created the proud tradition of the *HEART OF AMERICA CHORUS*. In 2000 we hosted a convention, and we attracted 9,958 paid attendees to our hometown. If we are going to beat that great figure, we need to start working on it today. 2011 will be the 50th anniversary of the Suntones International championship, and the 25th anniversary of the *Rural Route 4* victory in Salt Lake

City. What a couple of great quartets we will be able to commemorate and build a great convention around.

That also means that we should all plan on being in Philadelphia next year at the International Convention for three very important reasons. First is to compete on the contest stage as one of the 30 best choruses in the world. Secondly we all need to plan on being there to shadow the folks running the convention next year, so we will know what to do the following year. The third reason is that we need to start pre-selling the convention that will be held here in 2011. The best way to get excitement going for your convention is to spread the word the year before at the International Convention. We need to pre-sell at least 3,500 registrations next summer in Philadelphia if we are to meet our goal of total attendees. Together we can reach those goals!

Start thinking of all the great things we can use to promote Kansas City. The new raceway, Village West, Schlitterbahn water park, the Power and Light District, the World War I Museum, the new Performing Art Center, The Sprint Center, and on and on. This is a great place to be, participating in the greatest hobby in the world, with all the guys that are like family to me. We need to strive for excellence and make our Chapter the "place to be" for any male singer in the greater metro area. We will attract those singers by constantly striving to get better every week.

Every song I sing every week, I try to emulate **Mike Slamka's** tip about "breathing through your ears" and trying to open the hinges of your jaw as wide as you can get them. When my part is told not to sing, I still sing "silently" and try to express the proper emotion of the song, as Jim Henry pleaded with us to do EVERY NIGHT, EVERY SONG ALL NIGHT LONG. Remember how Jim told us that folks in the chairs should not be able to tell if we are singing or not, even though our section may not be singing. We must do what our coaches implore us to do if we want to improve. We must recruit new members constantly. We must always try to improve our singing.

That's what the HEART OF AMERICA CHORUS means to me; Striving to sing well and be one of the best performing choruses in the world at all times. Being an administrative leading chapter in the Barbershop Harmony Society and a model for any other chapter to emulate. The host of more International Conventions than any other chapter. A fraternal singing organization that has a membership of over 100 current, and hundreds of former members that I am proud to call my friends. A brotherhood that has various charitable endeavors that would rank favorably with any organization in our community.

I can't wait to be on the risers again with all of you! I can't wait to start brainstorming about the 2011 Convention here in Kansas City, and I can't wait till next week to start telling all our barbershoppers what a great convention we are going to have here in two years! I can't wait for district convention

when we can earn the right to be on the contest stage again in Philadelphia next summer! Now that the *Ambassadors of Harmony* won the gold medal in Anaheim, the doors are wide open for us to win the District Chorus Championship, and I can't wait to be District Champs Again! ### **Man of Note Recognition**

Have you wondered when a new member is inducted, how many of your fellow HOA riser buddies own these little gems? Have



you ever wondered how it might feel to be awarded your first one? How about your 14th, 15th, 24th or 41st? Or do you reflect on how it feels to not have one at all? Well, I have.

For those of you who have never seen one, it's a small, heavy, golden music note mounted on a pin fastener so you can wear it on your lapel, shirt or display proudly in your home or office. It is a symbolic statement that you have worked your tail off to recruit a new member into the Barbershop Harmony Society.

Did you know that as of 06/30/09, the total HOA membership roster contained only 142 members? Of that number, 87 members own 1 or more Man of Note awards. In total, those 87 members own 388 of them. Of those only 4 members own a whopping 94 Man of Note awards. Now this is a little deceiving because these 4 guys in total have 181 years of barbershopping between them. So when you look at it in a somewhat slanted way, they each would have recruited just about 1 member every 7-1/2 years. Believe me, these stats aren't meant to be intimidating, but aren't they awesome?

So, you ask, how can I get one of these little beauties? Well, as with anything else, with just lots of plain old fashioned hard work. My point here is that we all are Membership and Chapter Development recruiters. When out and around, during casual conversation, somehow work barber shopping into it. Share your stories and experiences with them. Invite them to come and experience it with you. Don't give up. Don't be obtrusive either. If I remember correctly it took my mentor two or three years to get me to commit. Have patience, more patience but never give up. Also, although not for new member recruitment, it's never too late to re-recruit inactive members. Go through the chapter phone list and give those that you haven't seen for some time a call. Ask them to come and see how we've progressed in vowel sounds and our vocal tuning.

And lastly, be sure to thank those you know that own one of these. For without those who own one, where might the Chapter be today? So each time we induct a new member, give a real rousing applause for the guy who gets that little gold pin. You know he's worked long and hard. Just think, as **David** would say, "What if..." we could each recruit a new guy every year or so? ♥

### HOA Financial Corner

**David Stockard, Don Fuson** and I had an excellent meeting recently with **Paul Thomson**, President of the Truman Heartland Community Foundation (THCF). As you know, *HOA* started a fund with THCF last

year. That fund is doing quite well, thanks to both the interest it has earned and to some monetary help from the Foundation.

Probably the most important idea coming from that meeting was that *HOA* needs to establish an endowment fund. We learned that many charitable donors, including many of THCF's donors, <u>only</u> donate funds to organizations with an established endowment fund.

How does an endowment fund differ from the fund we already have with THCF? The basic difference is that we can invade principal at will in our current fund. In an endowment fund we would only use a percentage of the fund each year for operating expenses (the percentage, probably 5%, will be set by board resolution). The money remains ours, but it would take a two-thirds vote of the board to invade principal or change the interest rate used.

A potential donor knows that the money contributed to our current fund may be spent immediately. The same donor knows that money contributed to an endowment fund will likely stay there and help the organization forever. They very much want their gifts to be meaningful for the long term. They want to be part of a legacy.

This concept is so important that THCF has generously agreed to start our endowment fund with a gift of \$500. Your board unanimously passed a motion to set up the fund, and we will develop the resolution shortly to set up the necessary parameters.

### **Bob Gall Honored**

**Bob** Gall was president of our Society in 1969, one of many achievements enumerated by the Lathrop school board in placing Bob's name on the recently established "Hall Of Fame" rolls of Lathrop High School, in the town just about

an hour north of Kansas City, up Interstate 35.


Graduating in 1943, Bob's name joins five others, including that of his brother Bill, who was one of three recipients named in 2008.

Bob's many accomplishments in the business ,scholastic and humanitarian areas were admirably presented at the new Lathrop school. A trophy was presented to the family, who was represented by Bob's middle son, Jeff, during the May 16 ceremony.

In *HOA*, Bob will be remembered as a past president, Central States District president, championship ticket seller and the bass of several quartets. The most prominent of those was the *Merry Mugs*, the first foursome chosen by the Society to make the U.S.O. tours of military bases and hospitals during the Korean War. I was privileged to sing with Bob in that group along with **Frank Leone** and the late **Ed Rooker**.

Bob later sang in Hubbub with me, **Jim Bagby** and the late **Manley Vance**.

Bob died in 1995 at age 69.♥

### **FORTY YEARS AGO: JULY, 1969**

I found this in the July, 1969, edition of *Harmonotes*. I figured you'd find a bit of amusement in it. Notice how it would taste as good today as it did forty years ago:

### **RECIPE FOR SUCCESS**

- Take one *Heart of America (SPEBSQSA) chorus*,
- Add one thoroughly competent musical director,
- Multiply by good attendance, minus minimum absenteeism,
- Mix in generous quantities of hard work and determination,
- Blend with top quality songs, note-perfect and sound that's true.
  - (NOTE: Close attention must be applied while blending and mixing. Do not expose to excessive conversation, disruption or unfamiliarity with the words or music.)
- Sprinkle generously with the best last chord in all of SPEBSQSA.
- Cover with sharp new uniforms.
- Do NOT attempt this recipe without using any of the listed ingredients.

There are two or three references in this edition of the "last chord" and how important it is. We would have asked, "How about the other chords? Aren't they equally important throughout the entire performance?" Can anyone answer that question? Remember, it was forty years ago.

# Rules For Singing Music In A Chorus

- 1. Everyone should sing the same piece.
- 2. Observe the repeat signs only if what you just sang was interesting.
- 3. If you sing a wrong note, glare at one of the other singers.
- 4. Carefully warm up your voice before singing. Then if you sing out of tune, you can at least do it with a clear conscience.
- 5. The right note, at the wrong time, is a wrong note. (And vice-versa.)
- 6. A wrong note, sung timidly, is a wrong note.
- 7. A wrong note, sung with authority, is simply your interpretation of the phrase.
- 8. If everyone gets lost except you, follow the ones who are lost.
- 9. Strive to always sing the maximum notes per second. This will intimidate the weaker singers and gain you the admiration of the ignorant.
- Markings for slurs, dynamics, and accidentals should be completely ignored. They are only there to make the score look more complicated.
- 11. If a passage is difficult, slow down. If it is easy, speed up. Everything will even itself out in the end
- 12. You have achieved a true interpretation when, in the end, you have not sung one note of the original piece.
- 13. When everyone else stops singing, you should stop also. Do not sing any notes you may have left over.
- 14. Blessed are those without perfect pitch, for the kingdom of music is theirs. ♥

### **International 2009—The Best Ever?**

This judges panel must have loved what they were seeing. The average score for the top 10 choruses was 91.3%, compared to 88.8% average from their respective October districts (not including the New Zealand score, which was unavailable).

Union. I reckon the only reason the Ambassadors and the Vocal Majority did not improve 3% is that they were pretty high (around 94%) in October and there isn't much room for improvement!

Consider that **Greg Lyne's** chorus (*Bay Area Metro*) improved over October by 1/2 percent and slipped from 4th to 8th place. This is because their competition all posted gains over 2.5%.

Consider also that *The Alliance* posted 90% and did not get a medal! Last year, the 3rd place chorus posted 89.8%. You might say it is getting crowded at the top. The 10th place score was 88.2%, a score that would have won a 5th place medal last year.

Even the second 10 scored better than in their districts last October. The average score for these choruses was 84.2% in Anaheim compared to 82.6% in the district competitions. Note that an 80% score would have placed 21st this year.

It is also interesting to note there are some falling stars. *Northbrook* scored 83.9% (14th) after 86.8% (7th) in district. *Heart of Texas Chorus* scored 77.8% (24th) after 84.1% (12th) at district. *Toronto Mega City* scored 75.6% (28th) after 79.3% (22nd) in their district.

The Most Improved award goes to Southern Gateway Chorus, with 87.9% (11th) after 83.3% (13th) in their district. It looks like they are on track to once again reassert themselves as a medalist chorus. But watch out for those Swedes. There's something special going on over there. New Zealand also has a pretty good thing going. Other choruses with improvements over 3% include Great Northern Union, Sound of the Rockies, The Alliance, Alexandria Harmonizers, and Kentucky Vocal

In the quartet competition, the judging panel also must have loved what they were seeing, as scores at Anaheim were generally higher than at the preliminary competitions last spring. For the top 20 quartets (excluding *Musical Island Boys*, for which no preliminary score was available), the scores at Anaheim averaged 2.57% higher than at the preliminary competitions.

All of the top 33 quartets posted increases over their preliminary competition scores.

The most improved quartets were *The Edge* and '*Round Midnight*, both improved over 6%. Others with 5% increases are medalists *Storm Front* and *Ringmasters*, also *The Party*, which had the lowest qualifying score in April but placed 27th at Anaheim.

Looking back, the performance by Crossroads (8433 pts, 93.7%) was the 2nd best gold medal performance posted since the current scoring system began in 1994. The best was 8453 by Platinum in 2000 (93.9%). The 3rd best was Max Q in 2007 with 8339 pts (92.7%). It is interesting to note that the only scoring penalty by any quartet was assessed against Crossroads in the semis. The Gas House Gang won in 1993 with a score that would adjust to 8392 points on the present scale, but was posted under the previous scoring system and can't be considered to be a valid comparison.


