In fact, the only ineffective presentation, oddly enough, was by the seminar president. We heard sales experts you see on TV: Tom Hopkins. Brvan Flanagan. James Smith and Dan Israel-look alike Phil Town.

These are the guys like the ones I've been drawn to for years at fairs and carnivals, selling choppers and knives and amazing decks of cards and magic tricks. Whatever they sold. And Flanagan must have conferred with **Kevin** Keller, because he talked about "unconscious competence." or being able to perform at the highest level without appearing to work at it. That ring a bell? Kevin called it "transparent artistry."

If you-personally-are motivated to achieve that level of artistry, by applying and giving and sharing, and by answering "ves" to those

questions I posed earlier. can say "Yes, I have a pretty good idea how

we'll do in SLC." Thanks for

The meeting was called to order by **Marty Oldehoeft** on Monday, May 9, 6:30 pm at the Johnson County License Bureau.

In attendance were: President - Marty Oldehoeft, Immediate Past President - Dick Irwin, Director - Jim Bagby, Membership VP - Stewart Grosser, Program VP – Jerry Garrard, Operations VP – Chuck Ames, Treasurer – **Charles Ramirez**, Secretary – **Kevin Tritsch**. Board Members at Large: Doug Brott, Harry Stewart, Rich Huyck, Kent McClean, Bob Howad. Not in attendance: Steve Carruthers, Keith Schweer, Dick Korek, Brian Sevditz.

Music and Performance: Jim Bagby - 95 people, plus the director, have signed up for Salt Lake City, that's including those that haven't qualified. If we have all 95, it will be the largest competing HOA chorus in recent history.

In the last Music Team meeting it was discussed what our goal would be for Salt Lake City. The main discussion was to make Top 10. Based on our current attendance for practices, making the making the Top 10 would be very difficult. We don't have everyone attending each week.

On May 23, the Music Team will again meet and make a consensus on what our goal should be.

Coaching sessions are here with **Kevin Keller** on May 10. The final all day coaching will be on Saturday June 25. Extra rehearsals will be May 26, June 23 & 30.

During the Music Teams' May 23 meeting, they will be deciding on the music for the Holiday show. **Mel Knight** will be arranging two new 8 part songs for the show.

### **Using The Breath For Musical Effect**

It's more than just oxygen—it's a part of the musical experience. Music judge and coach Kevin Keller explains how in this piece taken from the QT newsletter from the Barbershop Harmony Society.

There are a number of things that make a group "musical". One of the primary tools is the delivery of the breath. Yes, the delivery of the breath. The breath is the most important part of each and every phrase; more important than any note that you sing. Furthermore, the breath concludes the musical phrase rather than starting it.

When the breath is the most important part of the phrase and it concludes the phrase, you must energize the end of the phrase to raise the musical value of the breath. You will also sustain the energy through the phrase and build it, as opposed to plodding along and falling into chord worshipping (whether you intended to or not!). This reinforces the lyrical message of the song. Musically, you can sing louder, softer, faster, slower, more/less color, more/less texture. Just about anything you believe will work actually will work. You manage your breath better, because less air is expended needlessly at the beginning of the phrase. You improve your synchronization on attacks and releases. When the breath is "ordinary" (re: a place to get air), all that you can do is exactly what you were doing with dynamics, texture, color, tempo, etc. This is not musically appealing!

Take one of your repertoire songs and perform this exercise. Sing 32 bars where the breath is ordinary, a place to get air. Then sing those same 32 bars and focus on making the breath the most musically interesting part of the phrase. See what results you get and which vou like better.

There are a host of other things you will discover a focus on the breath will bring. Enjoy! ♥

#### TEN YEARS AGO: JUNE, 1995;

The 69 HOA members who performed on stage during the 1995 international chorus competition in Miami Beach came home with a ninth place finish, and they certainly must have eaten well while they were there. Convention coordinator Mike Mathieu. reporting on his "fam" (that's "familiarization") visit to Miami Beach, describes in the May Harmonotes the plans he had made for special meals while the guys and their families were there. On Thursday evening of convention week, they were to attend a "Beach Party/Bar-B-Que" at the Eden Roc Hotel. The menu was to include potato salad, a half-pound hamburger, baked beans. corn-on-the-cob, Wisconsin shredded cheese, sweet onion. and assorted pies, all for the low price of \$12, which included tax and tip (Wow!). They were to be joined by the *Big Chicken Chorus* from the Dixie District, the New Mexichords from Albuquerque, and the Ambassadors of Harmonv from St. Charles. MO. On Saturday morning. Mike had negotiated an \$11 breakfast buffet for the entire chorus. Mike says that the normal price for this spread would be over \$22. On Saturday evening, dinner was to be at the Doral Hotel, where most everybody was staying. The menu for this event included a pasta bar serving five different types of pasta and herb garlic bread, a full-line salad bar featuring many salads and all the fixin's, a fajita bar with marinated chicken and beef, sauteed onions and peppers, flour tortillas, salsa, guacamole and condiments, and a dessert bar to top it all off. All this for only \$20, tax and tip included. Is it any wonder that we've picked this guy for the "fam" visits for nearly every international convention we've been to over the past ten years?

#### **TWENTY YEARS AGO: JUNE, 1985:**

Editor Dale Neuman reported that Keith Schweer had accepted the chapter board's appointment as president pro tem for the remainder of the term of **Rich Huyck**, who had been forced to resign because of the pressure of added job responsibilities that prevented him from carrying out the duties of chapter president. Keith had served an elected term back in 1981, and this was the second time that he had stepped forward while the board sought a candidate for replacement of the elected president. (Dale didn't mention who was replaced the first time.) As I recall, Keith eventually served out the entire remainder of Rich's term.

Found this item in the "HOORAYS AND HOWCOMES" column (there's no byline, but I suspect that **Jim Baqby** was the author): "HOORAY for the rumor there's a new HOA quartet working, tentatively called the 12th Street Rag. HOWCOME they haven't sung for the chapter?" Doesn't seem like 20 years, does it?

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**THIRTY-FIVE YEARS AGO: JUNE, 1970** Does anyone remember a fellow named **F.M. Davisson?** F.M., as he was apparently called (surely he must have had the usual two given names that all the rest of us enjoy), was also known as "Mr. Hornblower" because he was the guy who could always be depended upon to blow the right pitch every time the chorus was

about to sing a song. He was one of the guys who was a regular chorus member who seldom missed a chapter meeting or public performance. He was our perennial music committee chairman and music librarian and was always the first one to arrive at a chapter meeting and the last to leave, helping House Committee Chairman John Cross to leave the meeting room in proper order. As Editor **Dick Hamm** explained it: "One bad thing about F. M. is that he is so dependable and uncomplaining that it is sometimes easy to take all he does for granted." So it's apparent that, being a bunch of sentimental fools, the chapter presented the 1970 "Barbershopper of the Year Award" to none other than F. M. Davisson. The ceremony took place during the annual Ladies' Night dinner that was held at the Armour East Restaurant. Isn't it great to be a sentimental fool? ♥

### **Precious Lord: Which Dorsey** Wrote It?

**Rich Huyck** posted a background story on how the song "Precious Lord, Take My Hand" was written. If you are like me you jumped to the conclusion that the author

was big band leader Tommy Dorsey. According to **Robert J. Morgan** the author was actually Thomas Andrew **Dorsey**, the son of a black revivalist preacher. The following is guoted from Mr. Morgan's book Then Sings My Soul: Thomas was born in a small town in Georgia in 1899. When he was about eleven, the Dorsevs moved to Atlanta

where Thomas was guickly enamored with the blues and began playing piano at a vaudeville theater. Later the family moved to Chicago where he attended classes at the College of Composition and Arranging. Soon he was on stage under the name "Georgia Tom," playing barrelhouse piano in one of Al **Capone's** Chicago speakeasies and leading jazz bands.

Thomas was converted at the National Baptist Convention in Chicago in 1921. and began writing gospel songs and trying to get them published. It was discouraging at first. He later said. "I borrowed five dollars and sent out 500 copies of my song, 'If You See My Savior,' to churches throughout the country...it was three years before I got a single order. I felt like going back to the blues."

He didn't, and gradually his reputation grew and his work became known.

Morgan then relates the story of his wife and child's death and the writing of "Precious Lord" much the same way that Rich shared with us. Dorsey wrote hundreds of gospel songs including "Peace in the Valley." V

#### Here's an Iraq update from *HOA-forward*...

Life goes on, day by day. Nothing too exciting to report back on lately, from a war perspective. The insurgents hate us, the Iragi civilians love us, and we all just want to get the heck outta here. That about sums it up.

I recently visited the Abu Ghraib prison. What a mess that place is. What truly impressed me was how the docs and nurses managed to keep their spirits up, despite the "clientele" and all the political hoopla still surrounding that place.



I got to meet **Toby Keith** (above) during his USO Tour. He did a live feed from our camp for the Country Music Awards show back home (did you see me?). It was a great show. I happened to be over at their hotel the next day helping the other guitarist with a back problem, and we got to watch the delayed feed on Armed Forces TV with the band. Suffice it to say Toby wasn't too happy about not winning Entertainer of the Year.

From a singing perspective, a lot is going on. Kenosha recently sent us the "Star Spangled Banner" sheet music for the Hard Corps Chorale in Iraq. We started learning it the night we received them. I even recorded all four voice parts for our learning CD, which helped get them up to speed even faster. The singers clearly enjoy this version better than the SATB version that we had before, as the SPEBSQSA version is geared more towards amateur singers and it has a lot better harmony. The latter is brand-new, never-before sung here. Before the fall of **Saddam's** regime, they had a different national anthem, one that was forbidden to be sund by the majority of Iragis. After his ousting, the people decided to come up with a new anthem, one all the people can sing. Ironically, it's an adaptation of an old Palestinian folk song. Anyway, I got a hold of a translation of the song and the melody, and began arranging it in 4-part harmony. I can't wait til it's finished.

As always, I appreciate your keeping me in the loop about HOA and the preparations for SLC. Despite the 7,035 miles that separate us, I really can feel the energy building and can share the moment. It's going to be a great contest!

Jim Henry noted that seldom when they did chapter shows were the chorus guys on stage with them and noted that they didn't have the best view -but they were able to hear everything that the *Gang* sang. I thought that was a wonderful idea, and would welcome being able to do that in a HOA show.

We expected the *Gang* to make a presentation appropriate for a final performance, including a tribute to Rob, but that was not their style. Instead, they offered a mixture of their old favorites, up tunes for the most part, including their **Ed Sullivan** package, the Lone Ranger song from their early days, and "Eine Kleine Nacht Musik", sung after Jim Henry FINALLY guit talking about Beethoven!

The tearful farewells came after the show. We had a chance to talk with and thank each of the guys in the *Gang* and several in the chorus before leaving, knowing that while we won't be privileged to hear this wonderful quartet do a show again, its individual members would still be with us at various Society events. The Des Moines fellows thanked us for coming, and are prepared to show us all a Pride of lowa welcome when we come to Des Moines in October.
