The Wright way:

- Emphasize smoothness in the lyric, giving the word sounds both accentuation and lilt.
  - Nothing but the best sound on every start. The "schlock" approach is never good enough.
  - If you can tune DO-RE-MI, you can be a championship chorus. But that's a constant battle. The key is to make ALL 3rds and 6ths higher.
  - All music must have dynamics and forward motion. as well as tone color. Use a range of colors. especially for background singing.
  - We want to hear a little "cool" in the sound. particularly in swing passages.
  - HOA is at the "pretty darn good" level. To climb from there takes individual dedication, discipline and hard work. But the hard work is rewarded in good singing that makes each meeting fun.
  - Similar to Greg Lyne's "I'm talking to you" admonition, assume that instructions from the music team are meant for YOU.

Although it's been over nine years since I last attended an HOA Chapter meeting, I still get a warm, fuzzy feeling when I recall how much pleasure I derived from my years of active membership before a heart attack on June 18, 1997, plus the steady deterioration of Joyce's health, put me on the sidelines for good. I particularly enjoyed my nearly 12 years as the editor of *Harmonotes*. In preparing this column for the March issue, I note that the same issue ten years ago contained 18 pages, with articles


from <u>15</u> different contributors! I know other bulletin editors, who would

kill for that kind of support, which eventually led to the selection of *Harmonotes* as the best chapter bulletin in the Society in 1998.

#### Ten Years Ago-March, 1993

Here are a few gleanings from the March 1993 issue:

Monty Duerksen reported that the third annual "Singing Valentines" effort brought in over \$6,000 from the sale of 220 deliveries, compared with 12 deliveries and \$250 two years previously. Director Jim Bagby was shooting for an 80-man chorus on the risers at the international contest in Calgary and 100 singers on

stage for our annual show on March 13.

Show ticket chairman Jim White was concerned with an unexplained falling-off of sales after the initial three weeks of the campaign. There was an announcement that our chapter had won the CSD chapter achievement contest for 1992 with a score of 1,645 points. We were in seventh place out of 40 chapters in our category Society-wide. Organizer Mike Schumacher proudly displayed the winning plaque for our plateau in collections for the Salvation Army during out all day singout at the Ward Parkway Shopping Center. We collected a sum of \$2,687.06. There were 70-plus members who were on hand for all six shows. Show chairman Lud Einess announced that our show theme would be "Songs Like Daddy Used To Play." (That song was the on the program but I swear I can't remember how it goes!) Orval Wilson was recovering nicely from injuries incurred when he slipped on the ice on Feb. 18 as he was leaving Waid's Restaurant at 103rd & Wornall Road. His injuries included a fractured shoulder and a torn muscle in the groin and required treatment in a hospital emergency room. Rural Route 4 bass Willard Yoder extended congratulations to Jim and Joann Bagby on the birth of their second grandchild, Hayley Paige, born to Kristin and Mike. (Continued on page 7∞)

#### Thirty Years Ago - March, 1983

The over 100 members of the ladies' auxiliary (I don't believe they took the name *Heartbeats* until some time later) were embarked on a project to produce and publish a Society cook book. Steve Hanrahan's wife, Harriet, was to spearhead this project. The proceeds were to go to the *Institute of Logopedics*, now known as Heartspring. An article attributed to Bruce Wenner announced the formation of a new chapter quartet called the Morning Times, with Alan Durick (tenor), Tim Flemming (lead), Bruce Wenner (baritone) and Stan Grossman (bass). They were getting some coaching from Byron Myers, were planning on singing an the St. Joseph Chapter show on March 30 and 31, and competing in the international prelims at Denver on April 28. I recall that Joyce and I were on our way to Denver to take in the CSD convention (that was prior to the formation of the Rocky Mountain District in 1978. which took a sizeable chunk, including Denver, out of our district) and had made a lunch stop on the way when the *Morning Times* came trooping into the restaurant and sat with us. It was fun!

#### Fifty Years Ago - March, 1953

The banner headline for the March 20, 1953, issue fairly shouts that "5000 Tickets Must Be Sold," referring to the chapter's annual show on April 18 and 19. I've researched many back issues of Harmonotes, but I've been unable to find where the show was to be held. However, with 5,000 tickets to be sold for the two shows, one might assume that the show would be presented in the Music Hall. But the real shocker is that as of the date of this issue of Harmonotes, only 271 tickets had been sold! Panic!

Here's an item for you real old-timers. Radio Station WHB, Kansas city, announced "Ed Birr Week" during March 22-28, celebrating Ed's tenth anniversary as a salesman in the WHB Client Service Department. Ed's wife was on the WHB staff as "Sandra Lea," the station's Director of Women's Activities.




