## A Lotta Learnin' About Learnin' by Jim Bagby, HOA Chorus Director



One of my favorite emcee gags is about the mother with six kids who's asked if she had it to do over, would she have that many. She says "Sure — but not those six." Now that we're approaching showtime with a half-dozen new songs just learned, would we choose that many again?

Well, that's not really that many. Oh, yeah (I hear you say)—it is when most of them came on top of new holiday show music and we didn't start on some of them until after Christmas. And (I hear you say) are there two tougher songs back-to-back than "Runnin' Wild" and "Happy Together" included in those newbies?

Good point. And what you might not have said is that we've got a raft of new members (aren't we glad!) who are learning as many as a dozen new songs. So it has been a hectic, busy, exciting few months in the life of *HOA*. And maybe we've all learned some things about the learning process along the way.

From a music team standpoint, we know we need to do an even better job of providing you with a learning media that matches the spots on the page, so you can sing along with either or both and not have to worry about which is right. We try to do that, but there still are a few bumps. You'd have to be at a recording session to see just how much time and effort Carter Combs, Mike Neff, Grant Hunget, Keith Schweer and ace technician Mark Fortino put in—plus the director of each song—to appreciate how demanding the process is.

We need to build in even more interpretation, including dynamics, to help you absorb artistry as you learn. And as directors, we're always going to discover some changes we want to make as the song develops in real time with you.

From an individual standpoint, I hope you've found that the earlier you start the self-recording and listening process, the better off you are—and the more you learn about your voice,

and your rate of progress. If you're as dedicated an talented as **Darrell McCune** and some others, you'll find some spots you want to bring to the attention of the music team: is this the right note on the CD? How about this breath spot? We learn from you, too.

Perhaps we've learned, as Mike suggested, we may need to do a better job of balancing our learning time. The songs that were announced for taping have gotten a lot of attention, and maybe the others have gotten less. Obviously, our audiences deserve to have all our show songs polished. End of sermon.

We've certainly learned (or rediscovered) there's never enough time in a meeting night to accomplish all we want to. Every director would like to have twice as much time as I can allot for his song or songs. Some of you would like to learn by repetition — don't stop, just keep going regardless of mistakes or how it sounds. Others say "no, let's stop and fix it — there's no percentage is singing it if it isn't right..." and that frustrates the repetition crowd.

You may know that my pet peeve is holes in the performing chorus lineup. That's why I encourage you to let your administrative section leader know in advance if you know you have to miss, for whatever reason, so I can ask "who's missing and why?" and they have the answer. If you are there and are absolutely physically unable to stand, we understand -- I never want someone on the risers who's back or feet or knees are hurting. But I encourage you to take your spot if your ailment is just a lack of voice -- you can still smile, mouth the words, do the staging and be a support to those around you who count on your presence. And then no one has to adjust for your empty space.

The bottom line about learning is you've done a lot, done it well and I'm looking forward to a bangup HOA performance on our 60th annual show. It is, as we've all noted, some of the most fun music we've ever sung! I'm grateful to the leadership and arm-waving efforts of Mike Neff, John Fortino and Carter Combs -- and all the music team -- as we head into the final days before the curtain goes up March 25th. ♥

## The Songs We Sing

The following item was taken from the "Heritage of Harmony Songbook," edited by Burt Szabo, by Elbert Ford, editor of *The Chorister*, chapter unknown, and borrowed by Editor John Conrad of By-Lines, the St.Louis Suburban Chapter bulletin.

**T**here is "Sweet Genevieve," there is "Sweet Sue," and there is "Sweet Rosie O'Grady." But without doubt, the best known, best loved, and most often sung of the songs with similar titles is, "Sweet Adeline," whose complete title is, "You're the Flower of My Heart, Sweet Adeline."

Harry Armstrong composed the melody in 1896 and titled it, "My Old New England Home," while Richard Gerard's lyric was originally titled "Sweet Rosalie." The two writers were introduced by Jimmy Walker, a lyricist (later to be mayor of New York), and they combined efforts, changing a few melody notes and words. "Rosalie" became "Adeline," supposedly suggested by an advertisement for the great Italian opera singer, Adelina Patti, who was appearing in New York City.

The song, especially the chorus with its harmonizing voices echoing the solo part, has been a standard–almost the national anthem—of barbershop singers. ♥

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## **Singing Valentine Review** by Jim Porter

As I made my way to the Northland from Olathe in the predawn darkness of Valentines Day, I was ready for a bunch of blessings. What a wonderful feeling it is to know what you are doing will delight not only the recipient, but also the one who thought to send it! Those smiles, compliments, even hugs sometimes, makes all that practice time worth while! When Marty Oldenhoeft asked me to sing with him, Carl Turlin and Rod Flatebo for Valentines Day, I wasted no time accepting, even though their plans would take me across the city from my surroundings in Johnson county.

We began the day with 12 assignments that would take us from Liberty to Kearney to Smithville to Platte City to Parkville and a bunch of places in between, probably nearly 200 miles of traveling before the day was done. As we went along, the orders kept coming in, and before we could get done, 7 more were added (we dropped one after the target lady was found to be in Johnson County that day), and in 9 hours we delivered 18 Singing Valentines. I'm happy to say that we made all of our appointments, only two of which were late (and those just 30 minutes late), and every one of the recipients were simply delighted we came, and delighted that someone thought the world of them and arranged to have us come! We were in several schools, a couple of businesses, a few private homes, the Social Security office (in Gladstone), the Board of Election Commissioners (in Platte City), the administration building of Park University, even KCI Airport. At the end of the day, we offered a freebie to the manager of Sam's Club in Gladstone, which recently donated \$500 to the chorus.

The experience always leaves some lessons behind to take to heart next year, and here is our list.

- 1. Start with enough supplies. You WILL get additional orders. Have supplies for at least eight deliveries in addition to the ones you receive from the hotel the previous evening.
- 2. Plan ahead. Have a good street map book and locate each delivery point before you begin to drive to it. (Of course, it helps to have a good navigator, one who knows the area, or one who can read maps well.)
- 3. Minimize the backtracking.
  Arrange your deliveries with the idea of reducing the mileage between points.
  (The time windows will complicate this process, of course. Assume you can deliver 2 Valentines per hour.)
- 4. Practice! Nothing is quite as embarrassing as a poor presentation or one that is obviously not together.

  (Practice between deliveries, too. Just do it inside your closed vehicle.)
- 5. Bring along a digital camera, one that uses a 3.5" floppy disk. The recipient can get pictures simply by giving you a floppy, then let bystanders use the camera. Leave the disk with them as you leave.
- 6. If you can't make it in time to "hit the window", phone ahead before it is too late! When we found it impossible to do both Platte City and Park City before noon, we were able to make arrangements.
- 7. Bring along some munchies. You may find it difficult or impossible to take an hour to stop for lunch. (Water too, of course. Most places you stop at will have facilities for when you need them.)
- 8. Know your limits. Don't take on additional assignments if you know you can't do them in time.

  (You might be able to bargain with the sender to work out a window you can handle.)

#### **TEN YEARS AGO: MARCH, 1986:**

"Singing Valentines" Coordinator **Monty Duerksen** reports on the results of the campaign on Feb. 13 and 14. Says Monty, "Thanks to eight quartets on Tuesday and nine on Wednesday, they were on target 341 times, raising close to \$13,000 for the *Heart of America Chorus* Education Fund and Children's Mercy Hospital Audiology Department.



Then, in another article, in his capacity as Membership V.P., Monty mentions the "HOA Notables," a program established "to tell you that you're important, your accomplishments are important, your friends are honored when you share something of yourself." With help from **Ron McIntire**, four members were given the opportunity to bring to each chapter meeting "a shirt box full of awards, pictures, news articles, quartets you've sung with, family

trivia, hobby news, creations, arrangements, compositions, anything you wish to share with your friends that would be of interest to them. It was Ron's job to hang the "HOA Notables" display for all to see. Members were assured they could take the stuff back home with them after the meeting.

In still another item, under the heading "Strategies for Growth," Membership V.P. Monty reminds the membership about the "Singing Skills" classes offered on an eight-week cycle "as a part of our 'Perpetual Open House' program." Apparently this was an orientation program for prospective chapter members BEFORE they joined. Familiar names of students in the current class included **Todd Anderson** and **Dick Korek**. Is it not a wonder that we picked Monty Duerksen for the "FOCAL POINT" in this issue of *Harmonotes?* 

#### **TWENTY YEARS AGO - MARCH 1986**

Not much of interest in this edition of *Harmonotes*. Although the editor himself had contributed an unusually lengthy commentary, the issue came out with only 12 pages. He went to great pains to plead the case for the acquisition by the chapter of its own meeting place, offering as an example the Grand Rapids, MI, chapter. 
The "Von-Hun-can-4" (Hunget-Duncan, get it?) made its formal debut. **Michelle** is singing Lead for





# **FENCAL POINT:**Up Close And Personal!

Wonder how many of you never knew that Monty
Duerksen's real first name is "Monroe?" And all these years, I've thought it was "Montgomery." Really!
Our subject for this month was born in Salem Hospital in Hillsboro, KS and for the first 12 years of his life lived on a farm near Lehigh (about 23 miles north of Newton) in a house with no electricity, no running

water, and no plumbing. Pretty rugged, huh? When he was halfway through the sixth grade, his family moved to Newton, where Monty attended high school and graduated from Bethel College with a pre-medical degree. Monty professes no formal education in music but attributes his understanding of a cappella singing by ear to having been brought up in a Mennonite family living in a Mennonite community. At the age of three, he was singing solos at church, city, and county events.

As a result of such early exposure, it was no wonder that Monty's first experience with barbershopping came with a quartet in high school called the *Newtones*, which led to his joining the *Barbershop Harmony Society* and the Newton chapter in 1949. He directed the Newton chorus of 51 members in 1957. In 1960, he joined the Emporia chapter where he was the chorus director from 1970 to 1979 and again from 1982 until 1985. He became a member of the Kansas City chapter in 1989.


Monty claims membership during his barbershopping career in a total of 12 quartets, two of which qualified to represent their districts in international competition. These were the *Springsingers*, whom he joined when he was in the Army stationed at Fort Carson, CO, in the Rocky Mountain District, and the *Four Cavaliers*, who finished in second place behind the "Buccaneers" in CSD competition in 1958. In the international senior quartet contest, the *Gentlemen of Note* represented CSD and finished in third place at Jacksonville, FL, in 2001.

Monty admits quite frankly that when he joined *HOA*, he planned to limit his participation in chapter activities to simply standing on the risers and concentrating on good singing. But a fellow by the name of **Mike Mathieu** had other ideas, and recognizing Monty's administrative talents, had him deeply involved in administrative projects almost from the beginning. Mike persuaded

him to work with him with the Spring Fling and the Bush League quartet contests for several years. But easily the most significant contribution was Monty's collaboration with Mike in the organization in 1990 of the annual Singing Valentines campaign. Their initial effort resulted in the sale of seven Singing Valentines at \$25 per delivery. But it wasn't long before the annual sale brought in several thousand dollars in revenue.

When asked to describe his single most vivid barbershopping memory, in typical Monty Duerksen style, our subject came up with FIVE!. They are: Organizing a Christmas Spectacular in 1973 that involved all Kansas chapters coming together for a performance on the Emporia State University campus, with the revenue from ticket sales going to the Institute of Logopedics (I remember those mile-high risers, Monty); the wedding in 1983 of Monty's daughter, Angie, who had her sister, Jill, (currently Mrs. **Matt Bostick**) arrange the *Love Song* in the barbershop style to be sung by all of the Kansas chapters who attended the wedding; hearing the contest administrator announce that the Gentlemen of Note would represent CSD at the international seniors quartet contest; hearing the international seniors contest administrator report that the Gentlemen of *Note* were bronze medalists; and being inducted into the Central States District Hall of Fame in 2004.

One more story. Monty was very active several years ago in the organization of the annual Kansas Division chorus contest. One year, the Emporia chorus went to the contest as a group of "old" men—from a nursing home. According to Monty, "The contest judges laughed so hard, they forgot to give us a score!" That was Monty, all right.  $\P$

# Where Are They Now? by Wade Dexter



You might think that the reason we haven't seen much of Fred Whisman over the past few years is that he's lost interest in the Kansas City chapter and barbershopping in general. But when I visited with Fred a few days ago, he told me that if a helicopter were to pick him up at his place every Tuesday evening and set him down in the parking lot at the church, he'd be

there for every meeting. I daresay there are a lot of us old-timers who feel the same way.

A local boy from the beginning, Fred was born, raised, and attended elementary and high school in Kansas City, KS. Upon graduation from Central High School, he entered the Navy's flight training program. Three years later, he qualified for his wings just as World War II ended.

Like most of the rest of us, Fred has an interesting story of how he became involved in barbershopping. It was back in the late 1960s when Fred was a traveling salesman covering a five state area for a propane gas distributing company. He'd made a stop in Springfield, IL, and planned to spend the night in a local hotel. He had prepared for bed when he heard the sound of male voices singing loudly, coming from somewhere near his room. Knowing that it was probably a case of "if you can't lick them, you might as well join them," Fred got dressed again and went down the hall and found that the music was coming from the local chapter of SPEBS-QSA that met regularly at the hotel.

He got a chance to sing with them and found that he enjoyed it. He asked if there was a similar outfit in Kansas City and was told that they had one of the oldest chapters in the Society. He was so impressed with what he had heard that on the following Tuesday evening, he attended a meeting of the Kansas City chapter, which was at that time meeting in the American Legion Hall.

But initially, Fred was disappointed. It was during the period in our Society's history when greater emphasis was placed on quartetting, rather than the choruses, and most of the members there were engrossed in singing with one quartet or the other and paid no attention to him. However, in time, then Chapter President Ed Rucker noticed him and "assigned" him to none other than Ron Abel. And Fred insists that had Ron not taken him under his wing and made him feel more comfortable as a guest, he'd probably never have joined our chapter. Close call, huh?

I'm sure you old-timers will agree that Fred was certainly one of the most dedicated members during the years he was active in the chapter. He served as chapter president in 1979 when the CSD champion *Heart of America Chorus* competed in international competition for the first time at Minneapolis. **Jim Bagby** recalls that Fred bought every member a billfold engraved with the date of the achievement. Jim says he still has his. With nearly a hundred singers on the risers, that must have cost Fred a pretty penny. In 1987, Fred was selected as *HOA* Barbershopper of the Year.

Fred recalls with great fondness his involvement with the formation, at the suggestion of Jim Bagby, of a minichorus called the *Harmony Handful*. It's purpose was to provide a group to perform at times when it would not be practicable to assemble the entire *HOA* chorus. As Jim, who was the director, describes it, "We did mainly church services when the choirs were out in the summer but also a lot of other performances." Jim tells how, with a membership of around 15 singers, each member had to be able to sing more than one voice part in order to cover for members who couldn't be present. According to Fred, the group would frequently take over the complete music program of a church service, including the anthem.

Ron Abel, who was a member of the group, tells how Fred wrote a "Harmony Handful Proposed Organizational Format" addressing (a) Objective, (b) Chorus Size, (c) Performances, (d) Rehearsals, and (e) Music. Fred describes the difficulty in maintaining a proper distribution of voices, which ultimately led to the group's demise. I understand there were similar groups that preceded and followed the Harmony Handful, but were short-lived.

Fred assures us that he's in good health and fairly "active for an 81-year-old." He's currently engaged in the property rental business. He and his wife, Jean, live comfortably in their home on Hiway 92, almost exactly halfway between Kearney and Excelsior Springs. Their address is 25217 Hiway 92, Excelsior Springs, MO 64024.
