HOA Financial Corner

When I began this column in 2007 the title of the second article was "Why Didn't the Rest of us Know?" The article explained that all expenses a member incurs by going to contests – travel, lodging, meals, etc. – are tax deductible as a charitable expense, if you itemize deductions. I mentioned

that based upon the results of my very informal poll, perhaps 80 to 90 percent of you were not aware of these deductions.

Recent discussions indicate that new members would like to know about the deductions and that older (longevity) members may need a refresher.

You may deduct the expenses because you are being educated. Section 5.4 of the Chapter Treasurer's Manual says: "...IRS regulations state that an educational organization is one designed primarily for the "improvement or development of the capabilities of the individual."...The main part of a chapter's activity is directed toward improving and developing the capability of the individual to sing barbershop harmony."

These expenses are deductible because barbershop chapters fall under Section 501C(3) and are only deductible as charitable expenses. They are limited to 30% of the amount on Form 1040, line 38 (adjusted gross income). You must itemize deductions on Schedule A to use them.

You may deduct expenses associated with public appearances including contest, shows and other public appearances, and attendance at inter-chapter, area and district meetings (but not including chapter meetings unless you are specified officers). You may deduct expenses connected with travel such as travel fares, meals, lodging and expenses incident to travel unless you are only a spectator.

You must have very good records of your expenses in case you are audited. Also the IRS sometimes has trouble locating our organization in the IRS Code. The Chapter Treasurer's Manual gives explicit instructions on how to locate it (it is listed as SPEBSQSA). •



Oly's Angels Find SV Thrills Again, **More Quartet Fun and Growth**

For the third year in a row, "Oly's Angels" got together to deliver Singing Valentines to grateful ladies (and one fellow) in various places across our area (400 miles in two days). We delivered 14 Valentines on Friday and 11 more Saturday, and each stop was its own story.

We gloried in the acoustics inside the Centropolis underground complex. We sang in schools, shops, restaurants and homes, from William Jewell University in Liberty to the Legends in KCK; Parkville to Independence, Excelsior Springs to Lee's Summit, Grandview to Johnson County (two successive house parties, four couples each time). We made such a hit in a Gladstone bank singing for all the tellers that the bank manager who ordered the Valentine placed a second order for his wife, which we fulfilled later in the afternoon.

All in all, it was a wonderful experience. We got our share of hugs, kisses and invitations to do more. It was such a privilege to be ambassadors for Heart of America Chorus, I only wish we could do this more often than once a year.

Our quartet has Kevin Trisch on lead, Marty Oldehoeft on bass, Rod **Flater** on bari and I sang tenor. After three years, we are getting to know one another pretty well, and we are singing together pretty well. We spent an evening with **Jon Gathright**, who coached and helped us considerably. He asked us why we didn't sing together more often. In most of our stops, we were honored by the compliments we heard about our singing. That is really encouraging, since none of us sing regularly in a quartet, nor are we recognized as "quartet singers." Our repertoire is limited by the fact that I am outside my usual part and Rod is not active with the chapter. Except for our younger lead singer, we'd be a "senior" quartet. Bottom line: four guys, two from the northland and two from Olathe, have found fellowship in song and it's been a wonderful experience.

I really believe more of you should seek to have the experience of quartet singing. I encourage you to give it a try. The big step, of course, is finding three other guys to sing with who can agree to meet together at a particular time and place to practice. Once that hurdle is overcome, you have the opportunity to really get to know three other guys in a way you could never do just seeing them at chapter activities. Chances are you'll find someone who is knowledgeable enough to take the lead while the group is practicing. (Rod is the man with our group.) It'll make you a better singer as well. You can't really say you know a song until you can sing it in a quartet.

It is a challenge to sing in harmony with three other guys, as our human nature is such that we tend to sing for all we're worth, as if we were doing a solo, and not pay much heed to what the other guys are doing. Give it some time and patience, and you'll see the difference. If most of us were to do this, then I am sure the level of performance of the chorus as a whole would improve significantly, and we could once again be planning on International appearances each July. •

Heart of America – Annual Spring Show by Brad Dawdy, Marketing & PR V.P.



TEN YEARS AGO: MARCH, 1999

Anyone who missed out on this fun opportunity has really missed a major thrill our hobby can provide. She happened to be in town with her husband. Some of his associates at one of our delivery locations noticed our attire and music and inquired whether we could sing for her at dinner. Thanks, **John, Dick** and **Darrel**l."

TWENTY YEARS AGO: MARCH, 1989

The 20-page March 1989 issue of *Harmonotes* was chock full of good stuff, which is not surprising for a large and greatly active chapter such as the Kansas City bunch. The late **Gil Lefholz**, who was the chairman of the 1989 International convention to be hosted by Kansas City had an excellent article that described in precise detail the entire program for this highly important event. The convention headquarters were to be in the Westin Crown Center, and the quartet and chorus contests were to be held in the Kemper Arena. One of the events was a dinner hosted by International President **Jim Richards**, with lots of help from First Lady, **Ebie**. Editor **Don Thorne** reminds all of the chapter ticket sellers that the program for the annual show will feature the *Nighthawks* of London, Ontario, Canada; the *Vigortones*, of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and our own *Skyliners* and *Merry Mugs*. Quite an interesting program, don't you think? Also, Don includes a very brief note as follows, "The Rudy Fick Royalaires," after 15 years, had "finally gotten their picture framed and hung in the sacred halls of Harmony Hall at Kenosha."
