





Remember, phone me if something should be reported in this column. My phone number in the metro area is (816)320-3875, if you don't catch me at St. Peters at meeting time.


TONE-HENGE by Dan Henry

A LOOK AT THE PAST IN THE HARMONOTES

<u>Ten Years Ago— March, 1990</u>

Show chairman **Al Moritz** reported a good show on March 24th. I had forgotten that **Phil Youngs** and his piano virtuosity were featured with the chorus on one of the songs on the program and also during the intermission. Al praises **Burdett Tordoff** "who willingly accepted my last-minute request to stand out on a cold, windy 13th Street to pass out and affix parking permits to the windshields of the school buses."

Upcoming activities reported by Public Relations Chairman **Mike Mathieu** include an April performance in Clinton (at the time, we had four members from that city: **Mark Smith, Dave Marti, Buck Wilkins** and **Dick Pierson**), a show on May 13 (that was Mothers Day! Ouch) for the Plaza Merchants Association, another paid performance for the PMA on Grandparents Day (September 9), and a show with the Overland Park Chapter at the "Theatre in the Park" on August 18.

An article by **Linda Rusche** reported that the Heartbeats had adopted new bylaws at the meeting on March 6 at the home of **Ruth Sunder meyer**. **Connie Schweer** was president, and the bylaws were developed by **Jan Mathieu** and **Donna Lefholz** for approval by the Heartbeats membership.

<u>Twenty Years Ago-March, 1980</u>

Music committee chairman **Kent McClean** announced a reorganization plan to provide a section leader who would handle administrative duties for each section of the chorus, and a voice leader who would conduct section rehearsals and auditions, determine performing chorus qualifications, etc.

The formation of a new quartet consisting of three baritones and a bass was reported. Membership consisted of **Rod Rule** (tenor), **Rich Huyck** (lead) (bet you didn't know that Rich sang with the 1956 Johnny Appleseed District chorus champion from Toledo, Ohio), **Jim Davis** (baritone) and **Kent McClean** (bass). They called themselves the 12th Street Regulars.

Music director **Jim Bagby** announced the "very first" coaching session in preparation for the 1980 International chorus contest in Salt Lake City to be held on Sunday (!), May 4. Our coach would be **Darryl Flynn**, then Sound Category Specialist, later our International President, and currently our society Executive Director.

Under "NOTES," we find the announcement that **Manley V ance** was recently elected president of the Missouri Association of Elementary School Principals...At a recent meeting, the chapter board approved **Ross Lankenau** 's membership, appointed **John Stucker** the new co-chairman of the riser committee and approved **Marv Faulwell** 's membership on the board replacing **Joe Costigan**.

<u>Thirty years ago—March, 1970</u>

Editor **Dick Ham** writes about two recent performances by the HOA Chorus with the Kansas City Philharmonic Orchestra on February 1 and 13. Dick mentions the hazards of an amateur group performing with professionals. "Actually," said Dick, "we didn't come out too badly" with the critics. Dick's article includes a reminder of chapter policy that prohibited drinking prior to a chorus performance. He says, "This policy was not enforced... at the Philharmonic concert at the Plaza Inn... If you think about it, there is probably more than a little truth to the saying 'It's usually the drinkers who throw in the clinkers."

It was announced that the Kansas City Chapter would bid at the Atlantic City Convention for the 1974 International Convention to be held in Kansas City.


Have you ever looked up and down the risers and said to yourself "I wonder what he does for a living?" or "I wonder where that guy's from?" Well, you could look in your chapter/chorus directory. Each member entry has an indication of where they work. Although that's really a nice feature of the directory it doesn't tell you very much and it doesn't give you any background on where somebody comes from. A BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION


