

## "THE END OF AN ERA" by David Krause

Just returned from the funeral service for **Orval Wilson** and thought you would all appreciate a report. In case you happen to be someone who didn't know Orval very well, he was the last member of SPEBSQSA who had joined during the first year of its existence. He would have been 86 on February 20 and has been in very bad health in the last couple of years, so in many ways his passing was a blessing.

Orval was a retired Kansas City Policeman and an active Shriner. He loved singing baritone and was a two-time Central States District Champ in '52 and '57. One of his quartets was also an early performing group on the first TV station in Kansas City.

His quartet recording by the "Gamboliers" was played before and after the service. Letters from **Greg Lyne** and **Darryl Flinn** were read by **Dan Henry Bowser** and myself. The RR3, with me subbing on tenor, performed their version of "The Lord's Prayer" and a double quartet of the "Old Guard" sang Orval's version of "Sweet 16." The service concluded with at least 60 or 70 barber shoppers singing "I Believe" and "Keep the Whole World Singing."

The best of the shared stories by his three daughters was the one pertaining to his last words. Orval had been in very bad shape recently and often unaware or unresponsive to visitors. When a hospice volunteer, who'd become close to him, visited for the final time a few days ago, he was unable to get a response from Orval. As he prepared to leave he bent down and whispered in Orval's ear that he was sorry he'd been unable to ever hear him sing. Orval soon opened his eyes and sang "Do, re, mi, fa, so, la, ti, do." According to his daughter, those were his last words.

As Greg said in his letter, "His passing marks the end of an era, as Orval was the last of our founding members of the Barbershop Harmony Society. Thank goodness we've had the chance as an Organization to honor and recognize **Orval Wilson**. I'll miss him very much.

## A SOCIETY BIDS FAREWELL

About 75 Kansas City barbershoppers, past and present, took part in Orval Wilson's funeral on February 19—one day before his 86th birthday.

Almost 60 of those were part of the HOA chorus that concluded the service with a rich rendition of "I Believe" and an enthusiastic version of "Keep the Whole World Singing." At the request of the family, former director **Jim Bagby** was out front.

The Rural Route 4, with David Krause on tenor, sang "Lord's Prayer." The RR4 then were joined by two of Orval's former quartet members, Barney Wasson and Nile Abbott, and Dan Henry for Orval's "signature" song, "Sweet 16."

Orval's three daughters, **Anne**, **Linda** and **Charlene**, and Linda's husband, **Steve**, handled the eulogy. They provided warm recollections of Orval's humor, his one-of-a-kind personality and his love of singing. There was a wonderful story of how the last sound from Orval was a scale, and what his first words would be when he saw the Pearly Gates: "Well, I'll be damned!"

Krause, filling in for pneumonia-ridden past Society President **Gil Lefholz**, read a letter from **Dr. Greg Lyne**, the Society's director of music education and a Central States District native from Wamego, Kansas. Greg recalled singing with Orval as a teenager, and how then police officer Wilson once bailed out his impounded car.

**Dan Henry** read a tribute from Society Executive Director **Darryl Flinn**, noting the passing of the last original SPEBSQSA member, and how much quartetting meant to Orval.

A flashing-light police escort of seven motorcycles and four patrol cars whizzed the funeral procession from the chapel to the cemetery, blocking off all three southbound lanes of Interstate 435 in the process—during rush hour!

Prominent at the visitation, funeral and grave site was a large floral basket from HOA, adorned with the one-foot, shiny Society logo. Orval wore a SPEBSQSA lapel pin and his CSD quartet championship tie clasp, with his Ararat Shrine fez propped nearby.

Darryl's letter concluded with "Long live Orval Wilson!" To that let us all add: Amen!

## THE PASSING OF *ANOTHER* GREAT BARBERSHOPPER

It is with great sadness that I report the death of Lou Perry, one of the greatest barbershoppers of all time. He succumbed to ending leukemia, and he was ninety years old. How privileged I am to have known him. In ensuing messages, we will all hear from sources all over the country about his contributions to barbershopping.

He was of the most prolific arrangers of the barbershop style, and he emblazoned trails for all of us to follow. Having played trumpet in jazz bands in tin pan alley, he brought a rich understanding to this musical curio known as barbershop. He understood the essence of our improvisational style better than most.

Even before we knew he was so deathly ill, the AIC (Association of International Champions) had decided to do our annual AIC show featuring the music and arrangements of Lou Perry. What a fitting tribute it will become in Nashville.

Just last weekend. The Boston Common, '80 champs, Val Hicks, Howard Mesecher, and I went to see Lou at his home in Tucson. On behalf of the Society, I took him his 50 year pin. He recognized us all in turn, and he was, as always, deeply appreciative of our visit. The "Common" sang many of Lou's arrangements, and we all sang to our wonderful friend. He even sang along at times. We didn't stay too long so as not to tire him.

I overheard him say to Terry Clark, bass of the "Common", who's idea was this? Terry said, "Freddie King's". Lou retorted, "I might have

That, my friends, was the last thing I was privileged to hear him say. I'll carry that recognition until I meet him again.

Raise him up in your prayers, and let's remember him this weekend at the Woodshed Convention.

## **SHOWTIME 2001**

On Saturday, March 24th, the Kansas City Chapter will present its 55th Annual Show at the Music Hall. We got a late start organizing its administration this year so now we have to work overtime to make up for lost time. The Music team has given us some wonderful new songs to perform and **Jim Davis** is employing his creative talents to stage an entertaining show. **John Warrior** is still looking for someone to assist him in technical production matters. **Dick Korek** designed the flyers we mailed and is handling the program as well. There will be some other advertising—based in part from what we found out from responses to a questionnaire included in the Holiday Show program.

Paul Winans reports that ticket sales are strong but we need to make sure they are overwhelming! He assures me that he can handle the task. Tickets may be ordered by phone at 816-537-0038.

It was not too long ago that we averaged over 1,600 tickets sold for each performance on our show date. One year we even went over 2,000 for each show. This year's budget requires us to sell at least 1,000 for each performance to meet its goals. If every man sold at least 10 tickets for each performance while Paul was selling to our subscribers and those who respond to our ads, we would be back to the sales levels of previous years. So, I challenge each man to sell 20 tickets (or buy some and give them to those who have not attended a previous show. You can bet they will come back next year on their own!)

Everyone is pretty much aware that *Gas House Gang* and *12th Street Rag* are to be featured. What is new is that the original *Special Touch* (1984 CSD Champions: **David Krause**, **Matt Moore**, **Bud Clark** and **Rick Kready**) will open the show as part of our radio days "live studio show" theme for the first half. Chorus members are aware of the new choreography because they have been sweating through the learning of it but others need to know that **Sheri Watts** has put together a show stopping package for "Puttin" on the Ritz." This may be the most exciting song we've done in years.

We are still planning a cast party in the rooms above the Music Hall for chapter members and those who have helped in the Music Hall or performed in the show's production. There will be a modest charge that will be collected BEFORE the party—to keep within the city's rules on such matters. See

## A LOOK AT THE PAST IN THE HARMONOTES

#### Ten Years Ago -March 1991

HOA members extended condolences to the **Dan Jacobson** family on the occasion of Dan's passing on February 15 at the age 93. Dan was a well-known professional artist who operated his own advertising art studio for 46 Years before he retired. He served as president of the Kansas City Chapter in 1954-55 and was among the 22 past chapter presidents who were recognized at our installation banquet last December.

Dan was the editor of *Harmonotes* for a period back in the 1950's and was an early editor of the CSD *Serenade*. Indeed, he took credit for suggesting the name of that publication when it first appeared nearly 50 years ago now. He was a frequent contributor of artwork to both newsletters.

General Show Chairman Marvin Blakeman warned us all that there would be lots of competition for parking space at the Municipal Auditorium during our annual show on March 16, with the Home Show in Bartle Hall, the Police Circus in the Arena, the Great American Train Show in the Exhibition Hall, and a wedding reception in the Little Theatre, all at the same time!

There was a photo of **Mike Schumacher** holding the plaque he received from the Salvation Army in recognition of HOA's contribution to the SA's Christmas bellringing program back in December. Our collections totaled \$1,278.44, which earned us the fourth place trophy at the Victory Dinner following the campaign. Mike was our coordinator of this activity and deserved a big hand for his hard work.

#### Twenty Years Ago - March 1981

Editor **Al Benz** put out an eight-pager that included lengthy articles by Show Production Manager **Lance Heilmann**, Music Committee Chairman Lance Heilmann, and Corner Quarter "Image Coordinator" **Don Kahl**. That seems to be the way it goes for a bulletin editor. Most of the time, you have to hustle like the dickens to get the articles you need, but occasionally you get almost more than you can use.


**Kay Sutton** and the other gals that pitched in working nine hours on Tuesday just putting the boxes and supplies together—couldn't do without that!


Our recognition night, this year, will be Tuesday after the show. I will properly thank all who took part.
