John Landry worked many hours to convince *Russell Stover* management to participate in our campaign with a complementary supply of candy.



Some of the new guys heard a version of the *Cross*town Four preview part of their Singing Valentines set on Feb. 10 while the more veteran guys recall several different foursomes under that name. Actually, the Crosstown Four is more like the Crosstown Six right now. Let's see if I can keep this simpler than I did in my attempt to involve our audience in singing "America The Beautiful" (while we did the "Overlay") at our pre-Valentines performance for the Volunteers of CASA on Feb. 9. After looks of total confusion appeared on the faces of the audience. engineer Gordy stepped forward, explained succinctly (no professorial contingency statements included) what was expected, and it actually worked out fine! He also broke them up at a later point using Marty Oldehoeft's Installation Banquet joke about the lady returning home from bible class and apprehending the man who burgled her house by merely citing scripture—when the burglar misunderstood her citation of "Acts 2:38" to mean that she had an axe and two thirty-eights.

The current regular members of CT4 are Gordy Coleman (lead), Ron Abel (bari), Val Putzier (bass) and I (tenor). But because Val is wintering in Texas and has been dealing with a medical problem, Bob Rutherford is and has been our Singing Valentines bass for two years now. Prior to that Win Cady filled in when Val went south. Well, Gordy and Mary Lou are leaving on a driving trip to Florida on the 21st so the performance we have set for the evening of the 20th will find Mike Schumacher singing lead in place of Gordy at an event set up by Bob Rutherford in Lee's Summit.

Over the now more than 20 years that the *Crosstown Four* has existed, we have changed all the parts but one—I am the original tenor. **Dean Trapp** (now barbershopping in South Dakota) was our first bari. **Fred Whisman** was the original bass and **Ed Sundermeyer** was the original lead. We have delivered singing valentines every year that HOA has done them and that goes back some years. But substituting for one or another has been common.

When Ron was unable to sing a few years ago, Jim White was our bari. And to keep things simple, we asked Jim to do what Ron had always done—hand the card to the recipient at the segue between the "Intro" and

"Heart of My Heart." We all had our respective items in hand as we approached the office we were to enter but Jim stopped in the men's room en route. We waited for him and when he came out he was very agitated and his face was red. He said he supposed that the recipient probably would not be impressed with a wet valentine's card and did we have any extras in the car? It seems that Jim did not have as good a grip on the card while attending to matters in the men's room as he had thought. Luckily, our driver had parked nearby, we had more cards, and we were only a minute or two behind schedule. Needless-tosay, we had much fun at Jim's expense for the rest of the day. Jim Buetel also sang bari with the quartet one year in a shuttle system where I would stop off at UMKC to teach a class (Ron Abel would move over to tenor), then at the end of my class they'd come by and get me, we'd turn Jim loose to be with another guartet for while and then when I had another class. we'd meet up with him again and Ron would once more be the tenor.

We've also had some great??? drivers—yes, they were because they always got us safely to all of our appointed rounds and on time. I probably will not remember all of them over the years—but they've included Manley Vance, Bob Rutherford, Marty (backwards on I-435) Oldehoeft driving Ron Abel's car, David Miller, Tony Strub and Ken Thompson (with the Lincoln that was 45 feet long). I have been the route planner over the years and our routes have covered every part of the metro from KCI to Paola to Edwardsville to Independence to Lee's Summit to Cleveland (and a number of times the neighborhoods east of Troost and north of 47th Street. Ken was a very literal person and more than once he would ask: "Turn Left here?" and I'd say "That's right"—and of course we'd turn right-more than once. So, now SOP on responding is "That's correct" or "No."

We've had more hugs and tears than I can recall in singing to some ladies as young as two weeks and as old as 101 years. And, we've even been heard to say

that when the time comes that they suggest to us that we should no longer sing on stage with the Chorus at the Music Hall, we hope they will still let us sing for valentines. It is now the highlight of the CT4 (plus or minus) year.



Ten Years Ago: March, 1994

"NEW 'SINGING VALEN-TINES' RECORD SET AS HOA GROSSES NEARLY \$10.000!" That was the headline of Chapter President John Pennington's article on the front page of the March 1994 issue of Harmonotes. John reminded us that "Three vears ago, we sold only eight Valentines. Two years ago it was 25. And last year, we did 220. This year our total was 290!" John gave much of the credit for our success to "all the work and planning by Monty Duerksen, our most famous singing TV celebrity.

and **Gordon Coleman**, our Valentine hot line phone man." And our editor paid an additional tribute to **Mike Mathieu**, also one of the leaders of the endeavor.

In his "Armwaver's Outlook," Director **Jim Bagby** was looking forward to the performance of the "Ode... (that was a fantastic barbershop arrangement of the "Ode to Joy" from the Choral of Beethoven's Ninth Symphony in D minor) on our annual show on March 19 which would feature the HOA Chorus and our quest quartet, the *Acoustix*, 1990 International Champions. Jim also announced that the program would include "one of the best new quartets to come along in some time," the *12th Street Rag*, and the final HOA show performance for the *Rural Route 4*.

And **Lud Einess** announced the official selection of Kansas City to host the 2000 international convention. Lud would serve as general convention chairman.

Twenty-Five Years Ago: March, 1979

The *Heart of America Chorus* was preparing for its first annual show as Central States District Champions. **Fred Whisman** was chapter president. **Gene Bowers** was show producer. Featured quartets would be the *Friends of Yesterday*, international medalists; the *Rural Route 4*, international finalist, and the *K.C. Chord Classiques* in their premier performance on a chapter show.

MVP Frank Lasta presented a review of fund raising efforts engaged in by HOA. One of these was operating a concession stand, which had produced \$1,092 in revenue to date. Frank said that 36 people had worked a total of 377 hours. It appears that each member of the crew needed a liquor license.

Fifty Years Ago: March 5, 1954

Harmonotes Editor Austin Thames provided a report of Chapter President **Don Thorne's** efforts to put together a program for an appearance at the Roanoke Christian Church. The Chordialaires were hastily recruited, and a foursome called the What *Notes Four* consisting of **Dennis Taylor** (tenor). Arlo Moore (lead), Frank Leone (baritone) and Bob Gall (bass) sang "O'Brien Has No Place To Go" and another song which was not identified. A rather inexperienced quartet (Austin wrote that they needed "more appearances for confidence") from the Independence chapter was Glenn Classon (tenor), Dr. W. H. Mowder (lead), Jack Boetjar (baritone) and Orvil Martin (bass). Austin goes on, "Then, with some hurrying and scurrying to get **Bob White** fresh from the mail car. the *Rudu Fick* Roualaires were presented to the audience, who liked them and kept them singing." Don Stephens and LaVerne Cable were codirectors on the show.



COMMON QUESTIONS ABOUT STREP THROAT

What is Strep throat? What are the signs of Strep throat?

Strep throat is an infection caused by bacteria. It is called "Strep" because the bacterium that causes the infection is called Streptococcus. Adults with Strep throat may have a sore throat, a fever and swollen neck glands. They usually don't have a cough or a runny nose. Children with Strep throat have a sore throat and may have tummy pain or a red rash with small spots. The rash is worse under the arms and in skin creases.

How is Strep throat treated?

Your doctor may give you or your child an antibiotic. Antibiotics kill bacteria, which helps Strep throat go away a little faster. It can also prevent a few rare but serious conditions that people with Strep throat might get. It is important to take all of the medicine your doctor gives you.

Should all sore throats be treated with antibiotics?

No. Not every sore throat is Strep throat. Bacteria only cause about 5% to 10% of sore throats. Viruses or other problems cause the rest, and antibiotics will not help. Your doctor can do a test to make sure it is Strep throat.

What tests can tell I have Strep throat?

Your doctor may use a test called the rapid Strep test. For this test, the doctor uses a long cotton swab to take some material from the back of your throat. The results of this test can be ready in about 15 minutes. Your doctor may also do a culture of the throat material. A sample of the throat material is sent to a laboratory. This test is called a throat culture. It takes more than 24 hours to learn the results of a Strep culture. The rapid Strep test and the culture can tell your doctor if you have Strep throat. If something else is causing your sore throat, these tests do not tell what it is.

Can other people catch my Strep throat?


Yes. You can give the infection to other people until you have been treated with an antibiotic for 1 to 3 days. Children with Strep throat should not go back to school or day care until their fever has gone away and they have taken an antibiotic for at least 24 hours.

What can make my sore throat feel better?

- Taking ibuprofen (brand names: Advil, Motrin) or acetaminophen (brand name: Tylenol).
 Children should not take aspirin. Aspirin can cause Reyes syndrome—a serious illness—and in some cases, death when it is used in children under 18 who have the flu.
- Gargling with warm salt water (1/4 teaspoon of salt in 1 cup [8 ounces] of warm water).
- For adults and older children, sucking on throat lozenges, hard candy or pieces of ice.
- Eating soft foods, drinking cool drinks or warm liquids or sucking on Popsicles.

Can people get Strep throat from their pets?

This could happen, but it is very rare.

past chapter, district and Society president (twice) had been struck with Alzheimer's and complications, and was suddenly gone, at age 71.


