Singing Valentine's: February's Hero's

Once again this year we were very fortunate to be the recipients of donations from: Bank of Blue Valley (headquarters), Russell Stover Candy (sweetheart candy), Helzberg Diamond (diamond pendant), Flowerama (fresh red roses), Kansas City Marriott Downtown, DoubleTree by Hilton and Residence Inn by Marriott (sweetheart packages). Without the support

of corporations such as these, our effort to contribute to Children's Mercy Hospital and our own message would be almost certainly fruitless.

There are also those other unheralded, valiant contributors that if not for them, this fund- raiser would be fruitless. They come in many varieties – male and female, retirees, those who work either full or part time, those who live close and far away, ones who have done this for many years and some that it's their first.

Have you ever considered the cost to these valiants for their devotion to this cause? First, we have the drivers who transport three other gents (or ladies) with them. This year with fewer deliveries and fewer delivering quartets, most drivers put several hundred miles on their vehicles. Conservatively, gasoline that day averaged about \$3.25. Not one complaint!

Next would be those who work either part- or full time. They have to schedule days off months in advance in order to participate in the delivery process. Some are able to take compulsory or vacation time off; others might loose a day's wages. However, they do get to deliver valentines.

Next may be the strongest of the lot. They are those who schedule the days off, then end up getting a phone call from me indicating they won't be needed this time around; not enough deliveries to make it worthwhile. First is the disappointment of not being able to participate, then perhaps the thought that they may have better used those scheduled days off some other time. Yet they keep coming back.

Then there are those who do the preparatory work many weeks and months in advance of the actual event itself; the untold hours of preparing a flier, procuring and coordinating radio/TV promo spots, quartets to do those promos, and making sure the computer programs are current, tested and ready to go. There are the ones who devote their time and expense to procuring and preparing the appropriate delivery supplies. Next is the difficult task of routing and assigning orders to the appropriate number of quartets while trying to make everyone reasonably happy.

To these valiants of all variations, I salute and commend you all! There is truly something magical in efforts such as these that reward and renew the soul -- a feeling that nullifies all effort and expense experienced. I know this because you return year after year to do it all over again. *You are truly February's Heroes.*

Later, we visited the home of *HOA* member **Dick Henderson** and his wife [Ed. note: **Bess**] in Liberty. (Some may remember Dick as the tenor in **Mark Fortino's** first competing quartet 20 years or so ago.) That was a wonderful time of reminiscing, but we had to cut it short after a half hour so we could make the rest of our stops! Later stops included **Brian Bellof's** wife [**Kim**] at North Kansas City Hospital and **Carl Turlin's** daughter at a firehouse near the Legends in Kansas City, Kan. (There we also serenaded about 10 male firefighters!)

We were able to make all the deliveries, but some were a challenge. We stopped at the Clay County Courthouse in Liberty only to find out that the lucky lady was on a remote campground on the north side of Smithville Lake. (We had a GPS and it found her there). Later, we were directed to go "just before 3 p.m." to a clinic on Barry Road. We arrived at 2:50 only to find out that the gal had left for the day, at 2:30. We were able to get to her home in Liberty later to deliver that one.

Every stop was a delight! Some of the ladies hugged us, most were the center of attention as others joined for the singing, one even donated \$15 (we agreed to let that go directly to Children's Mercy Hospital), and all agreed we did a good job singing together. Several times we did an encore ("Sweet and Lovely") for others in the area that missed the main event. Not bad for an unregistered quartet with a short repertoire that gets together only once a year!

Our last day was as great as the first and we ended our day with a rather small nursing home but while the residents were few, they were lively and we suggested that they should get a bus to bring them to the April program Their response: "By George, we might have to do that!"

We had the occasion to on the first day to eat lunch together at a Gladstone restaurant that was close to our next performance, and was asked by one of the patrons to sing a song for them impromptu, it was a group of maybe 35 to

We did two nursing homes and the church group on Tuesday, then two more nursing home stops on Thursday. **Tony Strub** said of the week: "My thoughts and feelings when we were singing to the residents of the nursing and rehabilitation homes: I had a profound sense of gratitude to these Americans for all that they have contributed in their lives to our country, our culture and to our freedom and security with which we are blessed." noticed her, initially, when we came into the room. Harmony Explosion: An Awesome Singing Experience!

Imagine yourself young again, in a chorus of 120 voices, surrounded by a sound you've heard only from the best, and you'll get a sense of what I and others in our chorus experienced Saturday, Feb. 19, as Harmony Explosion took over Olathe East High School for a day.

I have had the privilege of singing with some of the best over the years, including three International champion choruses, but this experience Saturday ranks right up there. What an exciting time it will be on our show April 14 if even half of these young voices are on stage with us for that closing song!

It was my first year to be around all day for this event. My, how I have missed out on a blessing these past few years! My hat is off to **Tony Strub** and others who organized everything for how it has blossomed into what it is today. Being the treasurer, I know. This year, we sold 248 registrations (lunch tickets) to middle and high school participants from eight or so school districts, including a contingent from Salina. Most of these were from Olathe, who had contingents from three of their four high schools and at least two middle schools. The group was about equally divided boys and girls, and the day's activities closed with a chorus presentation by each group, girls and boys. This was a 30% increase over a year ago, which in turn was 18% over 2010.

The boys gathered in the morning for an hour with **David Krause** directing and *Three Men and a Melody* as section leaders, and were introduced to our new patriotic song "America the Beautiful Medley." All were given a copy of the sheet music, and in

that hour, the group was singing that song reasonably well while holding the paper. The group met again in the afternoon for an hour, and by the end of that time it was sounding pretty good! For that hour, we were on the risers. Then, at the end, it was show time! Those kids sure learn fast! It was just awesome. You had to be there.

The main event was the quartet competition. This contest has rules more relaxed than what we are used to. One winning quartet sung a Gospel song. Some of the competitors were octets, not quartets. There was a competition in four divisions (middle school girls, middle school boys, high school girls, high school boys), where each group sung one song for four judges from our chapter in the preliminary round in the morning, after which the top five groups in each division were chosen for the final round in the afternoon. Most, if not all, of these groups sang the same song in the afternoon round for a different panel of four judges. All 20 of these groups were given medals, but scores were announced so you know who won out. Top scores were around 70%, but all in all, there were some pretty good groups up there that electrified the audience and had fun while doing it.

Now, imagine the potential there is in this area. Over half of these young people were out of Olathe School District. Imagine if we could have the same level of participation from other area school districts or any of the school districts on the Missouri side. There could be over a thousand voices out there, right in this area! Let's all help make Harmony Explosion really explode in the future! WOW.

I've said it before, but I really miss the camaraderie of singing with the chorus, but I certainly felt it today! I would be hard-pressed to say that our audiences were more blessed than I was!
