Please Don't Try For The Home Run

Let me relate a recent experience I had with a member of a service club to which I belong.

I learned that this member, actually one of the officers and a person very dedicated to the organization, knew

of two people who could be potential members but was reluctant to invite them to a meeting. Sound strange? Well, after further questioning, he admitted that he was concerned, for different reasons in each case, that the two would not make the decision to join. He wasn't concerned that they would make good members, just that they may not join. He then said, "I'm always going for the Home Run," meaning that he didn't want to invite someone to a meeting unless he was pretty sure they would join.

Folks, we just don't have the luxury of going for the Home Run. In the first place, most of us are not perceptive enough to prejudge whether or not someone will join – in barbershop that translates to trying to figure out if they'll be a good enough singer to contribute as well as trying to figure out if they'll like barbershop singing enough to want to join.

Take the pressure off of yourself <u>and</u> your potential guest. Tell them that you would like them to sit in on a practice and then allow them to *make the decision for themselves*! Leave it to the Music Team to decide if they qualify and leave it to the guest to decide if he wants to try!

You'll never know unless you invite them – but what's worse is that <u>they</u> will never know – because <u>you</u> made the decision for them.! ♥

The tournament could not have happened without the help of many, many chapter members, spouses, and their families. We extend our thanks and appreciation to all who helped. •







As I write, count'em, seven weeks from tomorrow and we'll be on the International stage in the Pennsylvania Convention Center singing in front of hopefully 10,000 barbershoppers. For you veterans it's still a big deal. For you rookies it will be

a day to remember for the rest of your lives. Going to International is "the dance" in the barbershop chorus world. And the bracket only has 28 slots. I hope everyone is as excited as I am to be going to the dance in Philadelphia.

During the past few weeks I have received many questions about going to Philly. I will attempt to address the most asked here.

When is the first rehearsal in Philly?

Wednesday, June 30 at 9:00 pm

What is our hotel in Philly?

The Downtown Courtyard by Marriott

Is our hotel close to the contest venue?

Absolutely, only a short two blocks away.

How about the Headquarters hotel?

It's midway (well, kind-of) between our hotel and the contest venue!

How about parking, is it really \$43 a day?

Yep, sorry to say. However there is a subway that runs from the airport to downtown which provides a nice option.

What's the cost of our hotel?

\$119 a night plus 14% of total taxes.

Will HOA have a rally t-shirt this year?

Yes, it is being designed as we speak.

What's new this year?

Probably lots of things but CSD having a pep rally again after not having one for many years is huge. The schedule is very tight so it's being squeezed in at 3:30 pm on Thursday in the Headquarters Hotel. With three competing choruses plus the *Ambassadors* plus three competing quartets it will be interesting to say the least.

If I have to make a change to my hotel reservation, do I contact the hotel?

Depends upon when you need to make the change. Up until about a week before the contest, you should contact me and let me make your change. This is because I will change it online through the Convention & Visitors Bureau. After our final rehearsal in KC you will be on your own. A room may be canceled up to 72 hours before the arrival date without charge. After that it costs one day's room charge plus taxes.

When do I get the registration tickets I purchased through the chorus?

I will hand them out during our last KC rehearsal.

Will there be a "Bible" this year?

This is term of endearment I hope used by our Director Emeritus **Jim Bagby**. It refers to my informational handout with nice-to-know and really need-to-know information concerning the upcoming convention. At this point we will have a handout. Because of time constraints this year's will not approach the biblical status earned in years past. Sorry.

What is the rehearsal schedule for HOA while in Philly? Please check it out on the HOA Calendar Page on our website: http://www.hoachorus.com/calendar.htm

Will each chorus member receive any special funds to help with Philly expenses?

Good question. As this point the Board has not authorized any funds but I'm sure our President and Board will be considering this very soon. Stay tuned.

How about the send-off, when and where will it be?

It is will be June 22, Westin Crown Center, Century Ballroom C. We meet at 7 pm for closed rehearsal, public is invited at 8:30 for our performance.

What's this about working in the booth in Philly?

Since *HOA* is hosting the 2011 Convention in KC, we will have a Pre-registration booth this summer in Philadelphia. It will be in a prime location with thousands of people passing by it each day. *HOA* volunteers will need to "man" the booth throughout the convention week. We need your help. **Melladee** and I helped in 1999 and really had fun. The job is to assist people in obtaining information about the 2011 convention and help them in purchasing their pre-registrations. Please sign up with **Mike Mathieu** and **Bob Burdick**, our convention co-chairmen.

Will there be a chorus dinner?

Maybe, it's still being considered; but time limitations may keep us from getting together this year.


How about chorus pictures, when will they be sold?





Are We Becoming A Change Agent?

Given the recent economic climate of the last few years, there have been many changes in our personal lives that reflect on our attitudes of deciding what is really important to each of us in our daily lives. It may be downsizing

our homes, renting vs. buying, making better use of what we already have, less driving and spending more time with neighbors, perhaps looking again for stability and more carefully choosing meaningful relationships.

Then I think, what can be more meaningful, more simple and stable than this craft of barbershop music that we cling to and that for so many years other generations have also experienced. How can we spread the news of what we and

they have personally experienced to others in our respective communities and make it attractive and lasting. How can we direct the focus of this craft to draw them in and immerse them to such a saturated point, that they actually become a part of the craft?

During the last 35-40 years, our lives have sped up dramatically and become more complex with new innovations in technology and

increased options for spending our time. Our ability to grasp and nourish one or two social activities or connections has diminished and our choices have increased. Those of my generation and those before, came together to socialize while helping others. That generation is almost past. Each successive newer generation has become less involved in community affairs than the last.

So the puzzle to solve it appears is how we integrate my generation with the newer generations, and for us all to know and understand that change is a mandatory requirement for our survival; that we somehow have to become adept and embrace change.

It's been documented that in the '60s and '70s many organizations (Kiwanis, Lion's Club, Rotary, etc) failed to turn membership loss around because of the lack of a wider perspective and understanding of social change already in progress around them, and without adaptive leadership. It hasn't been until recently that there has been a glimmer of hope.

It has also been documented that a little-known organization called the Girl Scouts, has made a successful turnaround.

They accomplished it in part by incorporating external influences such as ethnicity, population and immigration trends into the organization. They adopted strategies whereby prospective members could look at their organization and envision themselves based on those trends as an integral part of it. Then they took up the task of infusing every part and every level of their organization with a leadership culture of insightful transformative changes.

"To survive and succeed, every organization will have to turn itself into a change agent. The most effective way to manage change successfully is to create it. But experience has shown that grafting innovation on to a traditional enterprise does not work. The enterprise has to *become* a change agent. This requires the organized abandonment of things that have been shown to be unsuccessful, and the organized and continuous

improvement of every product, service, and process within the enterprise... The point of *becoming* a change agent is that it changes the mind-set of the entire organization. Instead of seeing change as a threat, its people will come to consider it an opportunity." — Peter Drucker

Starting to sound somewhat familiar? It seems to me that we are, although still finding our way, beginning to explore this avenue of change. We

have seen leadership innovation and evolving processes changes and we've just scratched the surface.

As we experience "change," the idea appeals to me that this is a time we should continue, and explore the integration of perhaps what is a wake-up call to this intermingling of our generations. Perhaps this is where we can direct the focus of which I spoke earlier.

We are each and everyone leaders. So what are *our* external influences? Our challenge is to be aware of and implement these external influences of the last three generations with that of the fourth; to become as visionary, smart and adaptive as any "change agent" or organization in existence; and make it attracting and lasting. Wouldn't that help us extend the stability of past, proven and meaningful relationships? I can almost see the front porch again, gas lit street lights and hear something magical coming from somewhere out there...

John Erwine went in to have his defibrillator replaced because the leads had deteriorated over time. It was supposed to be an outpatient procedure but turned into something quite a bit more. Several hours into the procedure, something went wrong and John coded on the table. He was successfully revived after some difficulty. He said it took a couple of hours for him to wake up from the

anesthetic and he was 'out of it' for a while after that. Finally around midnight the breathing tube was removed and he tried some food. He was unable to hold anything down which was probably due to the drugs he had received. That situation eventually resolved itself. There were tests needed to be performed on the new defibrillator (his third in 13 years) which involved more anesthesia. Finally after four days in the hospital he was allowed to go home. He says he's doing fine but still feels a little weak.

ignate up to 30% of the fund to chapter activities such as Harmony Explosion.


As of May 12, after 16 drawings (6 since last report):

in the HOA chorus. Jonathan lives in Lawrence, with his wife Vanessa and their four children where he is an insurance agent and financial advisor.




Ray Young





ROSS LANKENAU



Ross Lankenau was named after a family friend, Gen. Willie Ross, he was the family photographer and handyman, and he was active in his church choir. Some might say he had grumpy exterior but most remember him as being a quiet guy with a ready smile. Unless someone told you, you might not have known, or expected,

that he had been a Lance Corporal in the U.S. Marines and worked with heavy artillery.

Ross, his brothers, **Gordon** and **Wayne**, and their father, **Floyd**, joined the Kansas City Chapter in 1974. Except for the service and a break or two, Ross sang in the *HOA Chorus* for 22 years, both tenor and later as a lead. For years, until Floyd got sick, the Lankenau's shared the distinction of having the most family members singing in the *HOA* chorus at one time.

Ross had a heart attack while working in the yard and died at home, April 29, 2010. The following 31 members of *HOA* sang "Friends" and "I Believe" at his memorial service, May 4.

Analysis of the Spring Prelims Based on Scores Alone by Jim Porter

With results from all 16 districts and Sweden in, the draw for International is set with 51 quartets. Of these, 44 qualified with a score over 76%, and 10 others were added as wildcards or as the best quartet in their respective districts. Three of the 44 have scratched and are not included in the lineup of 51 quartets.

The average score for all 54 competitors (including the scratches) is 78.75%. The top 10 average is 84.51% and the top 20 averaged 82.32%. In last year's prelims, the top 10 averaged 85.38%, and the top 20 averaged 82.98%. The average for the 51 quartets with scores shown was 79.56%. It therefore appears that this year's field is not quite as strong as last year's field.

Seven of last year's top 10 quartets are singing this year. The other three are *Crossroads* (champion), *State Line Grocery* and *Glory Days*. Eight of the next 10 are singing this year. *TKO* and *The Crush* are not appearing in Philadelphia. Of the remaining 30 that sang in Anaheim, 12 are back this year. Total repeat performers: 27 of 50.

Two of this year's top 10 are new quartets, *A Mighty Wind* and *The Nashville Singers*, both from the Dixie district. Two of the next 10 quartets are also new, *Forefront* (Cardinal district) and *Catcher Block* (Far Western District). Six other quartets in this year's lineup also are new (not seen in any competition in 2009). Six quartets qualified for this year's competition after failing to qualify in 2009.

Looking at the 27 repeat performers, average scores in this year's prelims are 1.76% less than averages in Anaheim last July.

Just one quartet posted a gain over 2% when compared to their most recent 2009 competition. *Expedition* (Land of Lakes), up 2.6% to qualify for International for the first time with 77.75% (27th seed).

Among close, maybe next year, quartets (those not qualifying but over 72% and at least 2% improved) are: *Breakaway* (Northeastern), *The Cutting Edge* (Ontario), *Varsity* (Southwestern), *On Air* (Northeastern), *Frequency813* (Sunshine), and *The Buzz* (Johnny Appleseed).

Quartets most likely to finish better than their seeding (based on previous results): *Men in Black* (steady progress over several years), look for them to medal. *The Pursuit* (an up-and-coming quartet) should make first cut. *Eureka!* (steady progress over two years), may make the first cut. *Expedition* (as noted above), may make first cut.

Quartets most likely to fail to measure up to their seeding (based on previous results) *Masterpiece* (performance well below their Anaheim score), may surrender medal to *Men in Black. 3 Men and a Melody* (both 2009 performances were superior). *Lucky Day* (all 2009 performances were superior), may miss the first cut.

Looking at the districts, the competition program varies greatly from one district to another-some districts, like Central States, have a wide open competition with over 20 quartets competing, while others have a more restricted program and have fewer than 10 quartets competing. Scores for college and senior quartets are maintained separately, but all are judged by the same panel (usually), and for the sake of measuring the strength of a district, all quartets are included. (College and senior quartets may compete in the main event if their scores are high enough.) About the only measure that can be applied equally to all districts is the strength of the top five quartets that compete for a position in the International contest, and that measure is considered below.

Last year, with *Crossroads*, 3 Men & a Melody, and High Definition in the mix, Central States scored the highest top-5 average of all districts (81.31%). Not so this year. With two new top-10 quartets replacing State Line Grocery, Dixie district scored highest this time, with 79.93%.

Central States managed only 76.71%, sixth among the 17 districts (including Sweden). The overall average of all districts in this category was 74.70% compared to 75.67% last year and 75.93% in 2008.

Dixie district qualified 6 quartets, 2 in the top 10, a 3rd in the next 10. Far Western District qualified 5, 1 in the top 10, 2 in the next 10. Johnny Appleseed qualified 5 quartets, 1 in the top 10, 1 in the next 10. Mid-Atlantic also qualified 5, 1 in the top 10. Land of Lakes qualified 4 quartets, 1 in the top 10, 1 in the next 10. Central States qualified 3 quartets, 2 in the second 10.

As for the collegiate competition, it's very possible the trophy may wind up in Sweden this year, as their quartet holds the #1 seed. The top 10 this year averaged 76.18% and the top 20 averaged 73.71%, both slight improvements over last year's averages (75.95% top 10, 73.61% top 20). It is clear that this is a growing program in some of the districts while it has not taken hold at all in some of the other districts. Few collegiate quartets compete more than once in this contest, so comparisons of scores over years have no significance. If a quartet competed in the main competition this year and the college contest in 2009, comparisons were based on those 2009 collegiate competitions. >
