Their scores should make them a medalist favorite in Denver, so let's get there and cheer for 'em along with dad **Bruce Marston**, who will be singing with us in Denver. \checkmark

Barbershop Quartets, Children's Book Join in Perfect Harmony

The four-part vocal harmonies of barbershop quartets have inspired Galena resident Mary Ann Watson in more ways than one.

Two years ago, Watson met her future husband, Chuck, while he was performing with an a cappella barbershop singing group.

Now, the 59-year-old freelance writer has dedicated her first published work to informing others about the traditions and customs of the musical genre.

The Watsons spend many of their weekends attending conferences and competitions of the Barbershop Harmony Society. The society's 30,000 members—and their children and grandchildren—are the primary targets of Watson's marketing plan for her book, Ethan's barbershop Singing Family.

"There are no other children's books on barbershop singing," said Watson. "I think it will be very successful overnight."

The illustrated story walks readers through the basics of barbershop music, led by a young boy named Ethan.

Barbershop music is a family tradition



in Ethan's household. His relatives help recount some of the history and customs of the music Watson loves.

Although Watson has been writing for six years, Ethan's story is her first published book. Watson dedicated the book to her grandchildren and the Southern Gateway Chorus, her husband's vocal group.

The book has earned Watson a reputation among barbershop singers. "I'm kind of the barbershop book lady now," she said.

At times, said Watson, the response has been a little overwhelming. "It

was like I wrote War and Peace or something," she said, laughing as she recalled one society members response.

"But it has obviously captured the love these guys have for barbershopping."

Although the Watsons share a love of barbershop music, it's mainly Mr. Watson who carries the couple's tune.

"We both love music," said Mrs. Watson, "but I don't sing at all. I'm more of a cheerleader."

Watson's book was self-published by a company called Booksurge. It is available online at amazon.com. ♥

The President's Fund —A Reminder

As we enter the final two months of chorus preparation for International, most of us are also making our travel plans and plans for other things to do or see in Denver or en route. All these plans require us to consider

our budgets and make decisions accordingly.

The Chapter Board has already announced that *HOA* will reimburse all who compete in Denver for the cost of an "early bird" registration and this will surely help with the budget of everyone who does compete. But it will be after the fact. So plan accordingly.

Another part of planning for Denver, for some, might be to consider the President's Fund. As I have written here before, this fund was created a number of years ago to provide modest assistance to men who otherwise might not be able to participate in contest. If you find that your budget plans are such that you are not planning go to Denver and compete, please visit with either **Carter Combs** (Music VP) or **Vince Perry** (Chorus Manager) about your situation and they and I will see what help might be possible. Over the years many different men have been helped by the Fund and many different men have helped the fund stay a viable source of modest support.

The ground rules are fairly straight-forward. If you get help, you are not obliged to pay it back—but many do when they are able. If you get help, it is expected that your budget will be "economy style"—car pooling, room sharing, etc., so that each dollar goes as far as it can to get you there to sing. The fund does not support social events. ALL requests must be submitted by mid-June so that we have a good idea of how much we may need to allocate. And, we try to keep the whole matter as confidential as possible within the process outlined.

Finally, a reminder to those who have helped the President's Fund and would like to do so again, we will need to replenish the fund as well. You can make your checks payable to HOA, designated for the President's Fund, get them to me and our treasurer will do the rest. Thanks in advance.

Progress Evident At New BHS Headquarters

Article appeared locally in Nashville

Barbershop quartet singing can be compared to beets, bagpipes and badminton.

You either like the music, or you don't.

Many folks aren't thrilled by the harmonizing of four men singing "Good-bye, my Coney Island Baby." Rather, the typical music listener would prefer hearing her or his favorite commercially palatable hip-hop, pop, rock or country tune.

But give barbershop singing a chance, and it may grow on you as fully as the moustaches that many practitioners of the craft once sported (and still do to a lesser extent).

Regardless, the genre cannot be overlooked - despite its perceived fringe popularity - as the Barbershop Harmony Society, currently based in the fine community of Kenosha, Wis., has a membership of about 30,000. On that theme, the society has bought the handsome McQuiddy Printing Building at 403 Seventh Ave. N. downtown and will relocate from cheese country to Music City. To accommodate BHS administrators, the society is having Nashville-based Tuck Hinton Architects give McQuiddy a full face-lift.

And what a beauty the old girl will be.

THA front man **Seab Tuck** says the design firm will reinvent both the façade and interior of the pre-World War II-built McQuiddy.

Of major interest, Hinton says the new-look structure (completion is slated for August) will incorporate four new circular columns that will be exaggerated and offer a spiral texture reminiscent of barber poles.

In addition, Tuck Hinton designers are moving the entrance of the building from its center to its right side and, in the process, creating a socalled "tag chamber" - that is, an external vestibule in which quartets can sing (in barbershop quartet singing parlance, a "tag" is a portion of a song).

"We've basically gutted the building and are giving it a new roof, new electrical and mechanical systems and new windows," says Tuck, who is being assisted on the project by **Mary Roskilly** and **Curtis Lesh.**

Adding a contemporary flare, THA will give the building exterior a black and white paint job (currently, the building's bricks are a light gray).

The updating of the McQuiddy Building is noteworthy on three levels.

First, it is one of the few remaining small, old brick buildings still standing in what is the central business district's western half.

Second, the society will have upwards of 30 employees toiling within the structure, thus generating pedestrian traffic for downtown.

Third, and perhaps most important, McQuiddy has a fine history. Designed by **Henry Hibbs**, the building lost about 12 feet of its original front when the city widened a segment of Seventh Avenue in the 1960s.

Tuck says the current building frontage is not as ornate as the original, making the recreation of that face all the more important.

Todd Wilson, the society's director of marketing, said the price tag for the renovation work will be between approximately \$1.5 and \$1.7 million. Already, the society has spent \$1.45 million to purchase the land and the building. That type cash outlay could spur members to pen a new barbershop ditty, perhaps.

"We chose the McQuiddy Building because it's in the middle of everything," Wilson says. "We wanted to be in a high-profile location."

And in a very cool old building, I might add. ♥

A slimmed down **Randy Weir** led us all on a journey of love as all the songs on the program focused on the beauty of love and the challenge of keeping it fresh.

The curtain opened with the men in their formal outfits on the risers with a bar set up at one side and a young lover commiserating with the bartender about love. The narration nicely tied together the several songs presented by the chorus, which together told the story told so often about love found, love relished, then sadly, love frustrated. All six songs in the first set were ballads, sung without planned choreography, with the emotions coming through the facial expressions and subtle body movements.

These fellows may not be a top-notch quartet on the contest scene, but they were thoroughly entertaining and the audience just loved it! It was noteworthy that this was the first show I can recall done in Des Moines where the *Jurassic Larks* did not appear. It's been 10 years since they won the Seniors quartet competition. 

The Songs We Sing

Whenever I hear the song, "Stardust," I wonder which is more popular, the song, or the guy who wrote it, Hoagy – his real first name is "Hoagland" – Carmichael. I like the song, but wonder



why I've never heard it performed in the barbershop style. Suppose **David Wright** has ever given it a try? I've read that at one time, during the early years of the twentieth century, it was the most frequently recorded American song ever written.

Hoagy Carmichael was born in November of 1899 in Bloomington, Ind. He graduated from Indiana University with a law degree in 1926. but decided to devote his talents and energies to music. However, he remained closely affiliated with his alma mater, and even composed the song, "Chimes of Indiana," which was presented to the university by the Class of 1935 and in 1938 became the school's official anthem. He was presented with an honorary doctor's degree in music by the university in 1972.

Other popular songs written by Carmichael were "Rockin' Chair," "Heart and Soul," "New Orleans" and "Georgia on My Mind." He also collaborated with **Sidney Arodin** on "Up a Lazy River," and with **Johnny Mercer** on "Lazybones," "Skylark" and "In the Cool, Cool, Cool, of the Evening" which won the Best Original Song Oscar in 1952.

Hoagy appeared as an actor in at least 14 motion pictures, along with Hollywood stars such as **Humphrey Bogart, Lauren Bacall, Kirk Douglas, Myrna Loy** and **Frederic March**, often singing and playing his own compositions on the piano. He died of heart failure in December of 1981 and is buried in Bloomington. ♥

TEN YEARS AGO: MAY, 1997:

This issue of *Harmonotes* is chuck full of informative, interesting, and in some cases, humorous articles. But I would consider myself remiss if I didn't remind those of you who,

like me, were around ten years ago, of the passing of one of our beloved *Heartbeats*, name of **Dixie**, devoted wife of our own Ron Abel, who succumbed after a long illness. Dixie was an active member of the *Heartbeats*, and served as president of the auxiliary during 1994, for which she was picked as the "Heartbeat of the Year." Our chapter was represented at her memorial service on March 27 by the *Rural Route 4* and a rendition of "I'll Walk with God" by as many *HOA* members as could make it.

We used to run a "Barbertrivia" item in each issue of Harmonotes back a decade ago. In an issue previous to the May edition, I asked a question something like, "Who was the first HOA musical director?" Getting no response from the membership, I offered my own answer, which I obtained from a special December 1955 copy of Harmonotes, that the first arm-waver we had was a fellow named Tom "Moonlight" Murphy. This led to a call from Frank Leone who told me that our answer was wrong, that 59-year member Orval Wilson had told him that Murphy wanted to be the director but couldn't handle the job. According to Frank, Orval told him that the first HOA musical director was one Jimmy Fern, who was a musician and an accomplished choral director who demanded a lot from his singers and was rather intolerant of inattention." Does anybody remember him?

TWENTY YEARS AGO: MAY, 1987

When it comes to winning, the Kansas City chapter can hold its own when the circumstances favor it. The *K.C. Connection* grabbed the top spot in the CSD international

preliminary quartet contest at Fort Dodge, and would be among the three quartets that would represent the CSD in international competition the following summer. Quartet members were **Rod Rule**, tenor; **Wayne Lankenau**; lead, **Rich Huyck**, baritone; and **Larry Wilson**, bass.

Then, for the second year in a row, 12 *HOA* guys walked away with the CSD *VLQ* (that's Very Large Quartet) Championship, also at Fort Dodge. Singers in this group were **Wayne Lankenau, Ed Sundermeyer, David Krause** and **Merlin Barcus** (leads); **Ron Abel, Bruce Wenner** and **Rich Huyck** (baritones); **Wade Dexter** and **John Stucker** (basses) and **Ross Lankenau, Lyle Wyly** and **Rod Rule** (tenors).

Finally, the Kansas City chapter won the 1986 International Achievement Contest for the Central States District in Plateau 6 (chapters with 100 or more members). This was the competition where, based on monthly and quarterly activity reports (which are no longer required) submitted by all chapters, points were awarded for such activities as our annual show, contest participation, performances, board meetings, quartet activity and the like.

FORTY YEARS AGO: MAY, 1967

Not much of interest in this issue of *Harmonotes*. The chapter was busy enough, with a performance in Bethany on April 21 and coming engagements in Higginsville on May 13 and Warrensburg on June 10. And President **Harold** "Sam" Solomon issued a plea for more member participation in these paid engagements. Bert Phelps wrote an article in which he referred to "our rededication ceremony" in the Muehlebach lobby on April 18. That must have been when we hung the plaque on the pillar in the hotel lobby. And someone, probably Editor Dan Thorne, mentioned that on December 23, 1963, the following men were guests at the chapter meeting: Joe Costigan, Dr. Sal Iannazzo, Warren Edmonds, Gil Lefholz and Jim Hillory. Quite a coincidental bunch, don't you think? But who the heck was Jim Hillory? ♥

FECAL POINT: Up Close and Personal!

THOMAS "TOM" S. MILLOT, Sr.

If you've been a barbershopper for awhile, chances are you've run into **Tom Millot** at one time or another. And if you were at the Membership Reunion night in January of this year, you may have met him.

He is a well-known 60-year member of the Barbershop Harmony Society, a two-time member of the Kansas City Missouri Chapter, a past president of at least three chapters and has served in all the chapter offices. In 1982, he became associated with the *Ancient and Harmonious Society of Woodshedders*, known by all barbershoppers as *AHSOW*. Over the years he's been Certifier and Chief Certifier in the Mid-Atlantic District, Central States District and served on the International Board of *AHSOW*.

Tom was born in 1919 in Pana, IL, a small town 30 miles north of I-70 and halfway between St. Louis, MO and Terre Haute, IN. His family moved to St. Louis when he was in the eighth grade and he attended and graduated from McKinley High School in St. Louis. Following WWII, he attended Washington University in St. Louis and graduated in 1949 with a Bachelor of Architecture degree. He worked for various architects and architectural firms and went with the U. S. Postal Service as an architect in the early '60s.

His military service began in 1938 when he joined the U.S. Navy and was assigned duty aboard the aircraft carrier USS Saratoga (CV 3). "After we were torpedoed in '42," Tom recalls, "I spent 18 months in Samoa and finished out the war on the converted Liberty ship USS Shaula (AK-118)." While attending Washington University, and as an active member of the Naval Reserve, he applied for and was commissioned an Ensign. His rank made him a prime candidate for active duty in the Korean conflict in which he saw duty aboard the attack cargo ship USS Alshain (AKA-55). He eventually retired from the Navy as a Lieutenant.

"I have no formal musical training," Tom says, "but I've sung all my life and have attended Harmony College 18 times." He joined the St. Louis #1 Chapter in 1946 and later joined the St. Louis Suburban Chapter as a dual member. In 1970, his job with the Postal Service transferred him to Kansas City to work with the Corps of Engineers and it wasn't long before he joined the Kansas City Chapter. "When I was in the #1 St. Louis Chapter," Tom recalls, "we held a yearly weekend getaway at Meramac State Park, a 7,000acre state park southwest of St. Louis. We called it a *No Fishing Trip*. A fair-sized contingent from Kansas City also came including **Barney Wasson**, Gene Bowers, Al Moritz and others, and one man, Herb Ives, who always came down from Chicago. "After I joined the KC Chapter," he says, "I organized a camping, fishing and cook-out weekend at Lake Perry. Sadly, the program was never continued."

Tom notes that the KC chapter has used **Jim Henry** on retreats and for other coaching. "It might not have happened," he says. "I worked with Jim's father, **Bob Henry**, and discovered that Jim was an above average singer. I thought he should be in barbershopping. It was a hard sell but I finally persuaded him to join me on the No Fishin' Trip which included woodshedding behind a tent 'til 4:30 in the morning. That did it."

In the late 1970s, his job transferred him to the Washington, DC area where he worked for awhile and sang with the Fairfax, VA Chapter. In 1998 he returned to the Kansas City and rejoined his friends in *HOA* and joined the Overland Park Chapter as a dual member.

He's been in many quartets over the past 60 years, the most memorable, he recalls, was the 3 Generation 4. "In that quartet, I sang with Floyd Lankenau and two of his sons, Gordon and Wayne. I don't remember if we ever competed, but we did a lot of sing-outs." Now, he has teamed up with three guys in the Overland Park Chapter in a new quartet venture. "We don't have a name yet," he says. "Every time we pick a name, it's either taken or its sound and spelling are too close to an active quartet--but we're still looking."

Tom is an active guy. Somehow, he says, he's managed to find time for hobbies in slide photography, boating, fishing, water skiing, cycling and gournet cooking. When asked, he says people would be surprised to know that "I was water skiing using a slalom well into my eighties." ♥
