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HOA GOLF FUNDRAISER

After the first annual Heart of America golf fundraiser last year I wrote these words, "Cold and

wind and rain, Oh My!" because it was very cold and windy and rainy. This year one week before the second annual *Heart of America* golf fund raiser the forecast for the day of the tournament, Saturday, April 26, was 65 degrees and sunny. So I wrote an e-mail to all participating saying, "The weather forecast for Saturday is 65 degrees and partly sunny. That's a whole lot better than last year!"

Then came Friday's forecast, which was changed to 61 degrees, sunny in the morning with possible rain and an occasional thunderstorm beginning late afternoon. It was, "Oh My" once more.

Well, I am happy (make that <u>very</u> happy) to report that the weather held off. The day was partly sunny and cool, but comfortable. All who participated were pleased with the weather, the golf, the food, and the fellowship. The day was a great success.

Like last year, the entry fee (\$90) included green fees, cart, range balls, player gifts, door prize tickets, flight prizes, hole prizes, and a burger buffet. Last year counting hole prizes, door prizes, and raffle prizes participants in our 2007 tournament walked away with over \$1,400 in prizes. I do not yet have the final tally for this year's event but I know that it easily exceeded \$1,000 and may have been more than last year's total! Golfers who I know play in quite a few scrambles had great things to say about both the quality and the quantity of prizes and promised to spread the word for next year.

It was a great day and a great event. We had 14 teams and 55 players, which was slightly less than last year. The format was a scramble, in which each player hits a tee shot, the team selects the best one, and all players then hit from that spot. They continue in this fashion until the ball is holed.

The day started about 11:30 am with registration. Players could visit several tables to purchase mulligans, raffle tickets, skins, barbershop CDs, and

sign up to get information about *HOA* and our upcoming events. Television sets were showing DVDs of different International contests

After a shotgun start at 1:15 p.m. the tournament finished about 5:45 p.m. Dinner was started, during which we were entertained by some great quartet singing from Command Performance, one of *HOA's* fine quartets. Hole prizes, door prizes, flight and skin prizes, and raffle prizes were awarded.

The tournament was a wonderful success and it could not have happened without the help of many, many chapter members, spouses, and their families. The list includes most of the *Heart of America* Chapter in one way or another, so I cannot possibly include all of the names, but we extend our thanks and appreciation to all who helped.

TEN YEARS AGO: MAY, 1998

I couldn't believe my eyes! And it wasn't that I'd forgotten it; I just don't ever remember seeing it in the May 1998 issue of *Harmonotes*. In his recurring article, "Armwaver's Out-

look," Music Director **Jim Bagby** announced that he'd submitted his resignation to the chapter board, effective at the conclusion of the trip to the international convention in Atlanta! And get this! The board had accepted it, and on page three of the same issue, President **Jon Gathright** had already appointed a "Director Search Committee!" What the heck happened?

Well, anyway, there must have been a quick reversal of any such action. I checked the July 1998 issue of *Harmonotes* to see whether there was any further discussion of the matter. Unfortunately, there was no report from the June chapter board meeting. I found a letter to the chapter membership by the late **Manley Vance**—I don't want to highlight it in this column—in which Manley very explicitly covers—with a generous application of sarcasm—a number of factors that may have prompted Jim's resignation. Suffice it to say, it's apparent that, for some good reason, Jim withdrew his resignation and let us enjoy another 10 years of singing and working with one of the most renowned music directors in the entire Society.

Referring to the "Ten Years Ago" segment in this column in the April *Harmonotes*, where I asked about the whereabouts of the Founders' Plaque that once hung in the lobby of the Muehlebach Hotel, Jim tells me that both plaques—the one that was presented on the chapter's 25th anniversary and the second one that arrived 25 years later—are both still hanging in the hotel lobby. *Check out the 1998 article on page 7!*

TWENTY YEARS AGO: MAY, 1988

It was a good thing that Program VP **Ed Ward** and Music VP **Jim Bagby** (**David Krause** was our music director at that time) had arranged for the 50th anniversary of the founding of the Society to be held at the Ranch March Shopping Center at 95th Street and Mission Road for our combined SPEBSQSA/Kansas City Chapter celebration on Monday evening, April 11. The room was large enough to accommodate some 300 chapter members and their spouses —mostly "Heartbeats," who provided refreshments that included a silver candelabra complete with candles and a crystal punch

bowl. It turned out that a large number of our guests had come as a result of an invitation extended during our annual show in March. We understood that hundreds of other chapters throughout the world were also observing the Society's golden anniversary on that same evening.

By the way, Jim Bagby tells the story about how the late **Orval Wilson**, one of the original charter members of the Kansas Chapter of the BHS sang "Old Bones," as a solo with the "Harmony Handful" mini-chorus during the 50th anniversary show, and the chorus sang, "I Love Life, I'd Like To Do It Again." Jim says that this song was a **George Burns** song in which the lyrics included a line, "If I have to run, I simply don't go," and the chorus sang, "I love life, I'd like to do it again.." **Ron Abel** tells me that **Clarence Bond's** article in the same issue called Orval's performance "a real show stopper." Both Ron and Clarence were members of the *Harmony Handful*.

FORTY YEARS AGO: MAY 7, 1968

And the 30th anniversary of the Society and the Kansas City chapter was celebrated at the Muehlebach Hotel because our regular meeting place, at the World War II Memorial Building at Linwood and The Paseo in Kansas City had been taken over by the U.S. Army for its headquarters during the 1960s rioting that was so well-reviewed in a recent issue of *The Kansas City Star*. A lengthy program was presented in the hotel lobby, and KMBC-TV put the *HOA Chorus* on the air that same evening. And a good coverage appeared in *The Kansas City Times* the next morning. I was not an *HOA* member at that time, but it was just as well, because **Joyce** would not have let me drive from Lawrence through downtown Kansas City because of the riots. President **Ed Rooker** revealed that only 48 brave members showed up for the celebration.



There's been a question recently as to whether the two plaques celebrating our 25th and 50th anniversaries that are displayed in the lobby of the Muehlebach Hotel are still there. You may be assured that they are! Ron Abel provided Wade Dexter an interesting historical item that appeared in our 1998 annual show program, during the year we acknowledged HOA's 50th anniversary. Ron McIntire, who wrote the original piece, scrambled to resurrect the text from the hard copy, since your Harmonotes editor's backup proved faulty. Our thanks to Wade Dexter for supplying the scan of the original photos from the page. The resolution isn't as sharp as the first printing back in '98, but the faces are still pretty discernible.

BARBERSHOP HARMONY SOCIETY RESTORES FOUNDER'S PLAQUE TO MUEHLEBACH HOTEL, SITE OF 1938 FOUNDING by Ron McIntire

A snow storm closed the airport one night in April, 1938, and two men from Tulsa, tax attorney Owen C. Cash and investment banker Rupert I. Hall, were stranded. Both men took a room at the Muehlehach and, while they stood in the lobby, struck up a few chords with a couple of other guys (they had to tip the bellboy to find a tenor). As the evening of singing wore on, they bemoaned the decline of the barbershop quartet and when they returned home they set about to reverse that decline. The result was the beginning of SPEBSQ-SA, the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America, Inc. Twenty five years later, in 1963, representatives from the Kansas City Chapter, co-founder Rupert T. Hall and International Board Member Chet Fox installed a plaque in the lobby of the hotel commemorating that night.

While the real story of the plaque began in 1963, the events that followed began in the 1970's when Kansas City underwent an accelerated period of growth and modernization. During those years, the Barney Allis Plaza was remodeled, Bartle Hall was built and later expanded and, in 1975, the Muehlebach Hotel was closed for remodeling. Much of the hotel was gutted and its interior furnishings were dismantled and discarded.

Soon after, longtime Kansas City Chapter member. Gil Lefholz, realized that the plaque had not been removed for safekeeping. Hurriedly, he secured permission from the hotel management to enter the structure to see if he could find it. As Gil recalls, he and his wife, Donna. and the hotel manager at the time arrived at the back door some time around 9:30 p.m. "I'll only be about a half hour." he told Donna. then the

pair disappeared into the darkness to begin their search. A half hour turned into an hour then an hour and a half. Together they dug through debris, peered into empty rooms, crept down long hallways and tripped over boxes.

Finally, half-hidden beneath a dusty mound of paneling and scrap lumber, or as Gil puts it, "in the bowels of the hotel." a beam of light reflected off the name plate. Success!

Gil kept the plaque at his home for several years, not having a more suitable place to store it until, on April 30, 1988, the International Society opened the doors of the Heritage Hall Museum of barbershop history in Kenosha, Wisconsin. Gil was on hand, as Past International President, to present the plaque to the Society as part of the museum's permanent collection. It has remained there ever since—until now, that is.

On Saturday, April 4, 1998—sixty years and hundreds thousands of members later—the Society celebrated its birth by returning the commemorative plaque to its place in the lobby of the newly reopened and renamed Muehlebach Tower of the Marriott Hotel. With the help of Master of Ceremonies, **Dan Henry Bowser** (also a long-time barbershopper and former director of the *Heart of America Chorus*), the plaque was rededicated to the memory of the founders who first met there on that stormy April night. Among the dignitaries present were the Executive Director of

SPEBSQSA, **Darryl Flinn**, and Society Board President **Ed Waesche**, longtime members of the Kansas City Chapter, some of whom knew O.C. Cash and Rupert Hall, Kansas City Mayor pro tem **George Blackwood**, and the Society's only living 60-year member, **Orval Wilson**.

Highlights of the presentation included Kansas City's *Heart of America Chorus* singing the songs that O.C. Cash and Rupert Hall sang that night. They also sang a song originally written by the first Kansas City Chapter President, **Joe Stern** (rewritten) by **Bob Doherty**... "Gee, But it's Great To Be In Kansas City."
