WHITHER AWAY, HOA?

confess the day-to-day swings in the life of HOA produce similar shifts in my mood. We seem recently to have had a history of one great meeting and then one that's less successful. Attendance, or lack of it, is usually a key factor, but there are many others.

So I'm pondering how we can be more consistent; what I can do to

help, and what you can do.

Was anyone else surprised at the response when **Harry Stewart** asked a few weeks ago: "How many of you are doing the four minutes per day of work requested by Rosemary Calderon?" I shudder when I recall how few hands went up. This from a chorus that says it wants to be in the top 10 this summer? (Or as I said at the CSD Showcase performance: within 8 or 9 of St. Charles).

After another meeting, I got enthusiastic feedback about the new individual vocal coaching. We know this is a program that can and will make a difference—particularly if each member makes it his own

responsibility to apply what he learns in these sessions.

We went up and down all in the space of a few minutes at the latenight CSD performance. "Friends" was about as good as we can sing. "ALS" coughed and sputtered. What was the difference? I suspect it's application and concentration: staying in the moment. It was a somewhat artificial performance situation because (a) we were literally touching the audience and (b) they responded as if each hiccup had overtones—so perhaps we got a false sense of confidence.

But it was a good lesson about the importance of mental preparation and adapting to a different environment. Some of us did not sing the way we practiced—or sing to the feel. With minimal warmup time, we did not adopt the approach that allowed us to establish: this is where we were when we left off this song, and that's where we want to start with this performance. I take the responsibility. But sooner or later, as in any learning process, the responsibility must shift to you—each of you.

So let's use that as a learning experience, and be more ready, more involved, more attuned to the performance. That's going to be much easier when we learn (or re-learn) all the staging, and reach the point we don't have to think about mechanics or fundamentals in the

performance.

MEANWHILE, we owe a major debt to *New and Used Parts*, engineer **Mark Fortino** and our reproduction team for getting our new contest learning media (plus the HOA Tag) out in latest form. My fervent wish: that you will sing with your section leader, word for word, note for note, inflection for inflection—and then switch channels to sing the same thing with the other three parts.

We also owe much to the 17 members of six quartets who did double duty on contest weekend, singing with us Saturday

night at the end of a busy weekend. Four of those quartets made the top 10, *12th Street Rag* topped the field AND was named CSD Barbershopper of the Year to boot.

Barbershoppers of the Year? Whatever, it was a real highlight of the convention. Congratulations Micah, Mark, John and Barry!

MAKEUP! by Jim Davis

We know, most of you guys hate it 'cause it makes you look like a "sissy", etc., but here's the skinny on why it's necessary. Under the mega-watt, ultra bright stage lights, even the ruddiest of complexion gets "washed-out," and if vou're as pale as most of us are after being inside all winter, without it you look like a corpse (before the mortician makes you look "natural")! In other words, makeup adds life and expression to your face, even when you're NOT as involved as you should be (and we all have lapses, don't we Shawn?). Our intention is to brighten and liven your face by giving it color, and we try to do that while still making you look "natural." The base or pancake adds color, warmth and uniformity, smoothes-out some wrinkles, and hides some blemishes, and the rouge and lipstick adds the color your face would have after being outside in the cold, or after exercising or after taking a brisk shower. You've probably all heard or used the expression "looks like a fresh-faced kid."

Most everyone could learn to do his own makeup, but since that probably isn't practical, the Makeup Committee could use some additional help. John **McConnell** and I will teach you what you need to know, and I must add that it is the only time you really get upclose and personal with your fellow members, even the ones who stand next to you! I have learned more about most of you while doing makeup than I ever would have just sharing the risers. The next time we use makeup for a show or competition, remember, we're only trying to help each of us present a better "picture" to our audience, soooo, be cooperative, don't complain and DO show-up so we can all LOOK, as well as sing our best!



A special thanks goes out to all 29 men who participated. The competitors were as follows:





Ten Years Ago: May, 2004

HOA Music VP explained why the first-ever HOA "Spring Retreat," originally scheduled for the weekend of April 10-12 and to be held at the Elms Hotel in Excelsior Springs had to be postponed. Said Ron Abel.

"... with only 35 in attendance, it just wouldn't have been practical. But we been busy, and many of us just couldn't commit to another weekend right now." The event was later rescheduled for the second weekend in September.

HOA Music Director **Jim Bagby** announced a proposal for the organization of a "Day Chorus" to perform for daytime audiences. Said Jim, "I hereby volunteer to handle the initial organization and to serve, at least at the outset, as the primary musical director for such a group." Jim went on to explain "...the daytimers would try to take some of the performance offers other groups are too large, too busy, or otherwise unavailable to fill." Sounds as though this group would resemble the "Harmony Handful" mini-chorus that operated for a number of years from the Kansas City chapter. Wonder what ever happened to the proposal.

Thirty-Five Years Ago: April, 1969

The Heart of America Chorus, along with three chapter quartets, the Skyliners, the Merry Mugs, and the Implausibles, were booked to put on a show for the students at the school for the deaf in Higginsville, MO, on May 17. Someone who signed his name "Dave" (could have been Dave Ritz, then editor of Harmonotes, or Dave Larson) had this to say about this performance: "For those of you who have not yet been there, we can assure you of a wonderful time. We sing once in the afternoon for

the children and then in the evening, after some beer and barbecue (all free), we perform for a big audience of adults. The show is the chief source of income for the Parents' Association of the school. They use the funds to purchase equipment and materials for more and better therapy for the kids." I seem to recall that at one time, this was almost an annual affair. Wonder why it was discontinued.

Forty Years Ago: May 15, 1963

This edition of *Harmonotes*, edited by **Warren Edmonds**, contained a brief account of SPEBSQSA history by **Ray L. Koenig**. He first reports the death on August 15, 1953, of Society founder **O. C. Cash**. After starting a chapter in their own home town, O. C. Cash and **Rupert Hall**, with about 40 other from Tulsa, organized the second chapter in the Society right here in Kansas City.

The CSD quartet contest was held on October 17 at Pittsburg, KS (choruses were not included in competitive events at that time). The *Orphans* of Wichita won the championship.

The Ninth Annual Parade of Quartets was held on April 24 and 25 at the Music Hall. The theme was the lobby of the Headquarters Hotel in our convention city. Quartets and Society members are seen arriving and being greeted by old friends. Guest quartets included the *Clef Dwellers*, International medalists from Detroit; the *Barber Q Four*, Illinois District champs from Chicago; the *Orphans*, CSD champs from Wichita and the *Kernels*, International semifinalists from Omaha. Local quartets were the BMA Gamboliers, the *Hi-Powers*, the *Londonaires*, the *Rudy Fick Royalaires*, the *Mid-Americans*, with **L. Fred Stern** as desk clerk and MC, and the four *Hands of Harmony*. **Don Stephens** directed the Kansas City Chorus (it was

Recent Words of Wisdom

Bill Biffle: "Sing to the feel." It means fewer adjustments from one venue to another. Bill went on to say, whenever a coach or director says "that's it!, do it that way!", you should be aware of

how it felt to you when you did whatever it was that made him say that. That way, you can recreate the good sound regardless of where you are, dead stage, live stage, whatever

Bill Biffle: "Neck-free does not mean relax or roll the neck—just allow it to be free all the time." You don't eliminate tension by actively doing something. You eliminate the tension by not doing things that cause tension.

Rosemary Calderon and Bill Biffle agree: "You must build stamina, through giving your all to the performance, whether that comes at the first or the last of the rehearsal." You should also do this type of practice at home, by doing the complete contest set start-to-finish, with all the staging. The performance should be as entertaining and energetic as if there were an audience watching. Oh, and when you finish the set, do the whole thing all over again.

Rosemary and Harry Stewart agree: "4 minutes per day for working the visual is minimal", but so far, only a handful of HOA folks seem to be buying into that. Like most things in life, the more you put into something, the more you get out of it.

The Music Team has no doubt that we can achieve our goals for Louisville, but the greater the commitment, the greater the reward.

"E" IS FOR ENCOURAGEMENT by Jim Porter


was looking forward to the CSD Spring Convention for many reasons, but the biggest was the chance to meet a friend from St. Louis, one I sang with in the Ambassadors of Harmony in the early 90s, but who is now not with them any more, as the AOH leadership team included him with a group of men they judged were not up to the standards of their chorus. Gerry Mohr took this hard, as he was part of AOH for many years, since the days they were known for their afterglows much more than for their competitive singing ability. In time, Gerry sought out barbershop harmony in another area chorus, the Florissant Valley chapter. I was delighted when Gerry told me Florissant Valley had decided to come to the convention and sing in the competition, after 33 years out of the contest picture.

Saturday morning, I showed up at the hotel at 8:30, dressed and ready to sing with the Part of America group as the mic-tester chorus. I sought out Seattle 3, where the Florissant Valley chapter was gathering for their preparations to sing in the contest, first out of the box after HOA kicked off the day's activities. Gerry wasn't the only man in that chorus with AOH experience. Their assistant director, Rod Mehlberg, is also an AOH alum, and he was delighted to see me there, and introduced me to everyone in the chorus. After that, I was an audience of one as they considered adding a bit of pizazz to their first song, but in the end decided not to change the program (good choice!). They worked at it for about 45 minutes, then adjourned to get into their tuxes while I went over to the

school to join the rest of the HOA guys for our part of the program. Before we went out to sing, I dropped into their warmup room for a final bit of encouragement before they followed us onto the stage.

Later that day, I had a chance to meet with several of the Florissant Valley men, and they were pleased with their score, just a bit shy of 60%. Their expectations were, of course, much lower than ours would be, they only wanted to give a good account of themselves after 33 years out of the loop, and they accomplished that, finishing 7th out of the 10 choruses in the contest. I invited them to consider doing it again in Omaha, but most of them figured they would not be welcome at that competition. I let them know it was an open competition and any chorus that wanted to take part would be allowed to participate.

In the end, Gerry, who hasn't been to a District or International competition since AOH invited him off the risers, has decided to come to Louisville. I've invited him to look us up there and watch us prepare for the contest just as I watched them. Rod Mehlberg is ready to bring his chorus back next spring, and I've challenged him to set a goal of earning the *Most Improved* trophy then. Who knows, maybe they WILL come to Omaha after all. I am looking forward to seeing Gerry in Louisville, and maybe he'll show me that cluster of seven medals he has, something any one of us at HOA would love to be able to claim for our own, perhaps someday down the road.

TEN LITTLE WORDS by Carter Combs

You've all heard the story. It's the big game...half-time ...coach is giving the pep talk: "Boys, it all boils down to ten little 2-letter words...

IF IT IS TO BE, IT IS UP TO ME."

Excuse me? What's that? You say there are only nine items on the list? Glad to see you're paying attention! Item number ten is for you to decide.


We are all different, and different things motivate us, so, what works for you? Add it to the list.
