# HOA, You're the Greatest! — 2007 District Contest

What a convention! I hope you're all as pleased as I am with the great job that you all did in making this such a great time for all those that chose to visit our fair city. I haven't received the final results yet, but when they get all the numbers put togeth-

er, I think we'll all be pleased, both statistically and financially.

Thirty quartets strutted their stuff across the stage at the Music Hall on Friday and Saturday during the two sessions of the quartet contest. We had over 1,435 total full registrations for the weekend. We then had 16 choruses take the stage, including the "Three Men and a Chorus" mic-tester. 765 singers in those choruses represented their cities proudly. The Central States District is alive and well!

It's impossible to thank all of you great workers in a short article, so I'll just say that you all contributed magnificently to the overall success of the weekend. Special thanks to **Bob Burdick**, convention co-chairman, who did many jobs behind the scenes and certainly made my job much easier than it would have been otherwise. Additional kudos should go out to the individual committee chairmen on the steering committee.

I think we acheived most of the goals we set out to accomplish. We rented almost 500 rooms at the Downtown Marriott, which allowed all of our conventioneers to stay in one hotel, except for a few who had to check in next door at the newly refurbished Aladdin Hotel. This is the first time in my memory that we had the entire convention in one facility, and I think it worked wonderfully. Parking the car Thursday night and not having to get into it until almost noon on Sunday made for a hassle-free convention weekend.

The quartet contests on Friday went very smoothly and finished almost exactly on time. A condition on the microphones was fixed in time for the finals on Saturday night, thanks mostly to **Mark Fortino** and his marvelous microphones and placement expertise.

The chorus contest went very smoothly and finished within reach of our allotted time. The stage crew, headed up by **John Warrior**; the pattern crew chaired by **Mike** and **Linda Schumacher**, the house crew, and the ushers all performed admirably. The individual chorus warm-up rooms in Bartle Hall were the finest I've ever seen, and **Marty Oldehoeft** did an outstanding job in arranging those for the choruses. **Dale Neuman** and **Val Putzier** did a great job in coordinating the house, the auditorium and the Bartle Hall facilities.

The "Ladies' Breakfast" on Saturday morning served 89 breakfasts and broke the one-year-old attendance record by 19 people. Over 325 people attended our "Kansas City BBQ," and everyone raved about the quality and quantity of the food. Thanks to **Jon Gathright** for his "BBQ" efforts, and to **Jan Mathieu** and **Dessie Gathright** for their work as chairs of the "breakfast."

Vince Perry performed great service on the web-site, as the local contact for registrations, plus his efforts in arranging to have the registration booth at the headquarters hotel and at the Music Hall were commendable. If there is ever a job that you can't figure out how to get done, throw it at Vince and he'll have it done in an average of ten minutes. Vince also helped arrange for the mic tester chorus registration, shirt sales and any other things that no one else would tackle. Truly, what an asset he is to this organization!

### **High Definition Born - 2007 Central States District Quartet Champions**

When you start a new quartet with the aspirations of it being of international quality, the coaches whom you speak with for advice will ask questions such as: "Who are you guys? What is your image? What do you want people to think when they see you, and is that

image real to who you are as individuals?"

Many times the answers to these questions are difficult to put into words. However, it is easy to think of quartets that have distinct images: *Rural Route 4*, *Acoustix* and *OC Times*, for example. For a new quartet, the answers to these questions are not brought into focus until you have been together for awhile. But a blurry image should be well established initially when four guys are choosing each other as quartet brothers.

So for those who might think that *High Definition* is just a new version of *12th Street Rag* for brother **Mark Fortino** and me, I think you will realize as the quartet gets more exposure that it really isn't. Sure, you will see some similarities, but Mark and I are finding that we're not

the same performers in this quartet as we were in the old. It's not a better or worse kind of thing—it's just different.

Consider what happens when you bring to the table a talented young man (young enough to have been my son, by the way) who is very bright, a second-generation barbershopper, has great ideas about what makes music come alive, is handsome and has a golden bass voice that melts peoples' hearts. The expectation is that things WILL be different. Now, add to that another guy who also is a secondgeneration barbershopper, has a voice that would allow him to sing any part he would like, can sing sweet tenor melodies and can apply full-voice tenor down low. Your expectations are that even more drastic differences are going to occur.

In July, at the international convention, when all the members of 12th Street Rag were realizing that perhaps the time had come to go our separate ways, the good Lord stepped in again as he always does and pointed the Fortino brothers in a new direction. As the word traveled in Denver about 12th Street's retirement, people began inquiring and even suggesting new foursomes before we ever left the contest venue on Saturday night. At the time, it was frankly the last thing any of us wanted to think about.

Mark came back, hired a golf pro and played four rounds of golf in one week. A new quartet developing anytime soon was just not likely. Then, in very short order we found out that Adam was interested in quarteting and had been trying to form a college quartet, but just couldn't get three other guys to commit. Rob expressed interest in singing with us and wanted to at least hear what this would sound like.

None of us really thought anything was going to happen any time soon. How good could it really be? Mark and I weren't sure that we were ready to put in the time and effort to build another quartet from the ground up. Sure, we knew everyone had a good voice, but the key is how good would the match be among the four voices, and how well would the personalities gel with a 20-year-old, a 30-year-old and two old guys in their 40s?!

So on Aug. 3 and 4, we gave it a test drive. We even caught **Bill Biffle** on his way to the airport from Harmony University to listen to it to see what he thought. What happened that day was something I don't think any of us will ever forget. The raw sound was beyond anything any of us could have imagined, and we knew something very special was happening. After sending MP3 files off to various coaches and getting "WOW" comments and feedback, we made the formation of *High Definition* official and had our first rehearsal on Aug. 13.

If you count the Aug. 3 weekend, we had a total of 11 rehearsals prior to hitting the contest site. During that time, as we made audio and video recordings of ourselves, we guessed that we had moments where we

were singing in the 80s. My hope was that we would score in the 80s at the district contest. However, I knew, as did all of us, that with so little time to get used to each other, sustaining that level for two contest sets, or even one set or even one song was uncertain. When **Jim Bagby** called out our score of 2,940 or an 81.7 average, I knew we had accomplished what I had hoped for. After just 11 rehearsals, we had achieved a score that would have placed us 17th at this past International contest in Denver.

Our parents always told us: "for those who have been given much, much shall be expected!" We understand that with this kind of a start, there will be high expectations for this foursome. Rob, Mark, Adam and I are all very excited about

those expectations and know that with the Lord guiding us, and with the support of our brothers in the Kansas City and Springfield chapters, it's going to be an exciting new journey!

The success of any quartet depends greatly on the support of the families. The three wives have hit it off right from the start, and I don't think we could have asked for better families to be associated with. Many of you probably didn't know this, but Rob and his two brothers, **Rick** and **Joe**, with their dad **Mike**, were singing in *HOA* when Mark and I first joined the chorus back in 1988. In addition, Mark and I began our "Barbershop Journey" in the Joplin chapter back in 1984. We used to sing tags with Adam's dad, **Jeff**, every summer when many of the area chapters including guys from *HOA* would gather for "Tune's, T-Bones and Trotlines" in Shell Knob, Mo. The **Vetetos** are a wonderful family and, most important, their name ends in a vowel! Actually, so does **Mathieu!** All I can say is, restaurants beware when the Vetetos, Mathieus and Fortinos all come to eat at the same time!

We will do our best to represent you as well as we can for many years to come. *Thanks for your continued support!* ♥

# **Convention Bittersweet for Lame Duck HOA Arm-Waver**

**B**ack in my sportswriter days, I had a colleague whose daily column was titled "Last Look at

the Arena." I think that's an appropriate description for my musings in the wake of our recent venture into the 2007 fall Central States District chorus competition, and the entire convention so ably hosted by our Kansas City chapter. It was some weekend!

Getting the less-than-happy news out of the way, the *Heart of America Chorus* certainly didn't bring home the scores we had hoped for in my final outing on the contest stage. Our marks ranged from the mid-70s and the mid-80s, so you can take your choice as to whether we were underscored or overscored; obviously, everyone always likes to believe the high judges were right. After analyzing the DVD, I found things at each end to agree with, and things I wish I'd done differently as a director.

The good news for CSD, of course, was that our Missouri cousins, the *Ambassadors of Harmony*, cranked out a 93-plus average and are top-seeded going into Nashville. Now, they and we thought they should have scored higher, but that was the theme of the fall contests, it appears. Even with our almost-80 aver-

age, we outscored SIX district champs, so it was—for some reason—a low-scoring fall season.

There were extenuating circumstances, including a couple of high-scoring regulars who did not compete and a penalty of almost 100 points in another contest. So we can't get too excited by the fact that we've apparently earned another wildcard bid with much lower scores than we normally put up. But you can take some satisfaction that the *HOA* streak of qualifying for international competition continues, even though our effort for this contest was complicated by hosting and by less-than-spectacular chorus attendance.

But let's move on to the other good news and there was lots of it. The quartets that included our chapter members were very much in evidence, starting with new CSD champs High Definition. Lead Mark Fortino is an ongoing HOA regular and was onstage with us in the contest; other KC members in the quartet are former HOA assistant director John Fortino, who also sang with us in Denver, and tenor Rob Mathieu. The bass is Springfield member Adam Veteto. Placing fifth, with HOA veterans Tom Elefson and Jerry Garrard on tenor and lead, respectively, was Mighty Fine! The other half of the foursome are **Don Suffron** and **Guy Anderson** from Topeka.

Convention Chairman **Mike Mathieu** and his team, starting with right-hand man **Bob Burdick**, did a great job. And it was Mike, in cahoots with *AOH* Director **Jim Henry**, who provided me with what will have to rank as one of my all-time barbershopping highlights. And you know exactly what it was, because it seems that everyone who'd ever been a part of *HOA* was in on it.

First, Jim Henry started his flowery speech about me, slathering it on as only he can, playing fast and loose with the facts. Then maybe a couple hundred *HOA* members started pouring out of the audience—at 11 o'clock at night. Even **Dan Henry** was still there, although he couldn't be persuaded to go on stage. It would have been overwhelming enough if the combined choruses had just sung "Keep the Whole World Singing." But when Jim started "Friends," I was toast. Soggy, but toast. I should have had the presence of mind to decline when he motioned me over to direct halfway through, but by then I had almost no mind at all.

So, although I understand you guys didn't know exactly what was coming, but were instructed to "stick around until the end," I want to thank you for what had to be the most moving tribute I've ever received. It was an indescribable moment. I have tried to thank Mike and Jim, but it took all of you, along with our great CSD friends, to make it so special. I am grateful beyond words.

Since the surprise announcement of Jim Bagby's impending resig-

# CRAFT&CORNER

## **Chord Basics: Part II** by Bruce Wenner



Last month, in Part I, we discussed intervals of major and minor third and how they build triads.

The triads are three-note chords; to sing them in four-part harmony, one of the notes (usually the root) is doubled; i.e., sung by two parts. This time we will look at four-note chords that we could encounter in barbershop music. It would be good to have Part I available for reference, as well as OQ ("That Old Quartet Of Mine"). *Ready?* 

OK. The basic chords in barbershop harmony come in six varieties: (i) major triad, (ii) minor triad, (iii) barbershop seventh, (iv) minor seventh, (v) half-diminished seventh, and (vi) diminished seventh. We have already studied the first two – they are built with major-minor intervals and minor-major intervals, respectively. The other four are built with three major or minor intervals. We shall take them in turn.

Barbershop Seventh, also called the "dominant seventh," or just the "seventh," is the chord that defines the barbershop style. Every contest arrangement must consist of at least one-third barbershop sevenths. This chord is built from 1 as the root as 1-3-5-7b, so in intervals it is built as a major third, then a minor third (so far we have a major triad), then another minor third. Let's look for one in OQ, and use the following chart to help us — this chart looks like the half-step chart we had in Part I, but we expand it this time.

A A# B C C# D D# E F F# G G# A A# B C C# D D# E F F# G G#

Now for a chord. How about the first chord in measure 4? It sounds barbershop. Let's mark the chart with the four notes in the chord; from the bass up, the notes are G, B, F, and D. With these notes marked, the chart looks like this:

A A# B C C# D D# E F F# G G# A A# B C C# D D# E F F# G G#

Now look for a major third – that's 4 half steps. There's only one – G to B. Is that followed by a minor third? Yes – B to D is three half steps. So it's some kind of major G-chord. And – is this minor third followed by another? Yes again – three half steps from D to F. So this is a G barbershop seventh, or simply a G7 chord. It's spelled G-B-D-F as the 1-3-5-7b; the root is G, B is the superhuman 3, D is the high five, and F is the flatted seventh (we want to know all this so we know how to tune the chord).

**Just for fun, let's try another.** First chord of measure two. Mark the notes on the chart so it looks like:

A A# B C C# D D# E F F# G G# A A# B C C# D D# E F F# G G#

Four half steps? Just one place – from B to D#, so that's the only major third. It's followed by a minor third from D# to F#, and another from F# to A. So we have a B7, B-D#-F#-A; B is the root, D# the third (tenors tune it super-high), F# the fifth (basses tune this one high), and A the flatted seventh.

Minor Seventh. The remaining three chords occur less frequently in barbershop arrangements than the first three. This one is similar to the barbershop seventh, but it is built on a minor triad instead of a major triad. It goes 1-3b-5-7b, and it's built by intervals with a minor third, followed by a major third, and finally a minor third. Let's look

for one in OQ. They are somewhat rare, aren't they? We have to go all the way to the third chord in measure 21 (on the word "pray"; let's mark the notes on the chart, which now looks like this:

A A# B C C# D D# E F F# G G# A A# B C C# D D# E F F# G G#

Here we find the major third interval (C to E) is both preceded and succeeded by minor thirds. The preceding minor third starts with A, so we have an A minor seventh chord.

**Half-diminished Seventh**, or simply the Half-diminished chord, is the minor seventh chord with the fifth flatted, so it goes 1-3b-5b-7b. It is built by intervals as a minor third, another minor third, then a major third. The fourth chord of meas. 6 (on "and") looks promising; let's use the chart, which looks like this (remember that Bb = A#):

A A# B C C# D D# E F F# G G# A A# B C C# D D# E F F# G G#

The major third (four half steps) is A# to D. The two preceding minor thirds, G to A# and E to G, begin at E, so we have an E half-diminished chord.

Diminished Seventh, also called a Fully Diminished Chord, or just a Diminished chord, is the last of the basic barbershop chords. It is rarely used as anything other than a passing chord, and is built by minor thirds only – that makes it 1-3b-5b-7bb – you analytical types will notice that you get to the diminished chord from the half-diminished chord by "diminishing" (i.e., flatting) the flatted 7th. Let's look for an example in OQ. Try the passing chord on "of" in meas. 7, and mark the chart thusly (remember that the key signature tells us the lead note is F#):

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A A# B C C# D D# E F F# G G# A A# B C C# D D# E F F# G G#

Every interval is a minor third. So it's an A diminished chord. Or is it a C diminished? Or a D# diminished? Or an F# diminished? The answer is yes. Every note in a diminished chord can be considered the root.

These are the basics. A few other chords are worthy of mention. Sometimes barbershop music uses the sixth chord, 1-3-5-6, which actually has the same notes as a minor seventh (note that the A minor seventh we found in OO could be looked at as C-E-G-A, a C sixth!). We also use the minor sixth chord, 1-3b-5-6, which has the same notes as a halfdiminished chord; the E half-diminished chord we found in OQ can be spelled G-Bb-D-E, a G minor sixth. We could go on with more of this, but it's beyond the scope of this article. Could be material for a future article? If you're interested, just let me know. ♥

# **HOA** Qualifies for International in 2008 by Jim Porter

When the *Heart of America Chorus* finished second in the Central States District contest with a score of 79.8 percent, it was disappointing at the time. That was below last year's 82.1 average and left us thinking we had failed to qualify for a wild card bid to the international contest in Nashville. Last year, the lowest wild card chorus scored 80.1.



However, when all district scores were in, *HOA* emerged with the 19th seed (10th of 12 wild cards), compared to the 16th seed last year, and is eligible to compete at International. *[Ed. note: the]* 

invitations have not gone out, and the board had not discussed by Harmonotes deadline if the chapter will accept].

What happened? Three choruses (two of which would have been wild cards) that certainly would have scored higher than HOA chose not to compete this year. Five choruses that were wild cards last year also scored lower this year, behind HOA. Just three choruses that were behind us last year finished ahead of us this year.

Overall, the average score last year for the 29 choruses that competed in Denver was 83.1. This year, the average for the 16 district champions and top 12 wild cards was 82.3. The judges were tougher this year Society-wide.

Some choruses, however, bucked the trend and showed significant improvements. The Most Improved Chorus award for choruses that made the cut goes to Bloomington, Ill., which increased its score by more than four percent and qualified for the International for the first time. Three percent or higher gains were shown by Bay Area Calif., Phoenix and Ottawa, Ontario. Gains of two percent or higher more were shown by *Heart of Texas, Atlanta Vocal Project* and Tampa's *Heralds of Harmony*. Denver, *Ohio Alliance* and the *Saltaires* registered gains of one to two percent.

In the quartet competition, *High Definition*, with Kansas City's **Mark and John Fortino** and **Rob Mathieu** singing with **Adam Veteto** from Springfield easily won the district championship with the second-highest score (81.7) among all quartets competing in the fall district contests. Rob duplicated the feat of fellow *HOA* member **Grant Hunget** by winning the district contest in consecutive years with two different quartets. *Glory Days* in Southwestern was the only quartet scoring higher than *High Definition* (85.5), a number that places them in the hunt for a medal at Nashville.

# Strategic Plan Report Reveals Success in All Four Initiatives

This is the first progress report on the *HOA* strategic plan that was completed in March of 2007. The report contains information about activities and progress, or lack thereof, on each of the four strategic initiatives.

**Strategic Initiative No. 1:** The music team has created a vocal education and development curriculum designed to improve the quality of our singing in order to meet the more stringent qualifications for the performing chorus. Increased use of video, small group coaching and private home sectional rehearsals are part of our new efforts. The marketing VP and the chorus manager are working to schedule additional chorus performances.

**Strategic Initiative No. 2:** Efforts are under way to create a small chorus of *HOA* senior members to entertain, educate and spread the word about our music, our Society and our chapter. We believe that informing our community about who we are, what we do and how well we do it will be an effective strategy to recruit new members and market our fundraising activities. The new member mentoring program is going well. We have had no success in achieving greater diversity in our membership.

**Strategic Initiative No. 3:** The "Friends of *HOA*" campaign has been a great success. Efforts are under way to invest the funds for the future of our chapter. Our *HOA* golf tournament was very successful and is now being scheduled as an annual event. We continue to recruit new sponsors and establish connections with local foundations.

Strategic Initiative No 4: The "Singing Valentines" program planners have organized the operations portion of their project in June and will start the promotional work in early November. The "Holiday Bell-Ringing Caravan" organizational activities will also begin in November. The "Harmony Explosion" campaign has established an e-mail and FAX communications network with vocal music teachers in public, private and parochial schools in Missouri and Kansas. Vince Perry has setup "Harmony Explosion" on the HOA web site making an advertisement poster, an information document and a registration form available as downloads for teachers. We hope that this new communications network will increase the number of schools that participate in 2008. ♥

# A LOOK PASTIN-HOUNDONOISE

#### TEN YEARS AGO: NOVEMBER, 1997

At this time, ten years ago, *Harmonotes* was going through a period of transition. As the result of his heart attack, which was followed

by two weeks in the hospital for triple by-pass heart surgery and the insertion of a defibrillator, along with the deterioration of his devoted wife's general health, our editor—that was me—found it necessary to hang up his glue stick and turn over the editing job to—yup, you guessed it—the guy who's always ready to step in and carry the load until a new editor can be found, old reliable **Dale Neuman**. **Joyce** and I had moved from Lawrence to Liberty in order to be closer to **Paul** and his family in the event of a real medical emergency. With lots of help from **Todd Anderson**, the guy with all the design and layout experience turned out the first edition of a totally revised and improved issue of our chapter bulletin. Gone were the days of cut and paste.

Since there was no November issue, I referred to the December edition for something to report at this point. On the front page, Chapter President **Don Young** reminded the membership that the chorus would be representing the district at the international contest in Atlanta the following summer. He announced a couple of new developments in the preparation for this event, to wit, the chorus contest would be on Friday afternoon of the convention, instead of Saturday afternoon, as in the past, and also the unhappy news that each member would have to pay his own reg-

istration fee, with the possibility that the payment might be refunded later, depending on the financial success of the holiday harmony spectacular. More on that next month.

#### **TWENTY YEARS AGO: NOVEMBER, 1987**

As Music Director **Jim Bagby** put it, the Proud Image of Waterloo, Iowa, "did something at the Central States District convention in Des Moines...that no other chorus has been able to accomplish in 10 years—finish ahead of Kansas City." *The Heart of America Chorus*, all 74 members, had to be satisfied with a nine-point difference in second place. And our two competing quartets didn't fair too well, either. *Sound Alternative* sang up a storm and came out in a very respectable 12th place. And 4 Ever Pals finished in 15th place and took top honors among the novice quarters.

About the only interesting occurrence for *HOA* was the presentation of the 1987 CSD "Award if Merit" to **Wade Dexter** for his accomplishments as editor of the CSD *Serenade*. Since Wade was absent from the district convention—the first time in 18 consecutive years—the award was accepted by his son, Paul, who sang the tenor with the *Chairman of the Chord* of Lincoln, who finished in seventh place in the quartet competition.

#### **FORTY YEARS AGO: NOVEMBER, 1967**

Not much of interest in this issue. New officers for 1968 were **Ed Rooker** (president), **Dave Larson** (VP, Membership), **Gerrie Kelly** (VP, Program), **Bernie Geier** (Secretary) and **Joe Costigan** (Treasurer). **Don Thorne** was the *Harmonotes* editor.







# Rooles for Correct Speling, Gramer and Useage

- 1. Don't abbrev.
- 2. Check to see if you any words out.
- **3.** Be carefully to use adjectives and adverbs correct.
- **4.** About sentence fragments.
- **5.** When dangling, don't use participles.
- **6.** Don't use no double negatives.
- 7. Each pronoun agrees with their antecedent.
- **8.** Just between You and i, case is important.
- **9.** Join clauses good, like a conjunction should.
- **10.** Don't use commas, that aren't necessary.
- 11. Its important to use apostrophe's right.
