Metro KC Records Historic Victory: Skyline Tops Quartet Field CSD Barbershoppers Mob Lincoln for Fall Convention, Ripper Gold Medal Tribute Show

For the first time since the Central States District established the plateau system in 1990, a Plateau A chorus contestant has claimed the CSD championship. *Central Standard*, with 32 singers on stage, became the

first non-AAA winner Oct. 10 in one of the highlights of a busy, entertaining and highly successful CSD fall convention at Lincoln, Neb.

It was a championship sweep when *Skyline*, representing the same Metro Kansas City Chapter, Kansas City and Greendale, Wis., claimed the 2009 CSD quartet title. Members of the new champs, top down, are **Jake Pirner**, **Tim Zielke, Josh Umhoefer** and **Mike Louque** (rhymes with duke).

Fremont, Neb., was runner-up in the chorus contest, claiming the first AAA title in the Pathfinder history, close behind Central Standard and just ahead of *HOA*. **Mike Neff's** winning group averaged 81.5, **Pete Stibor's** Fremont forces 80.3 and *HOA* 79.3, putting both in line for possible wildcard bids to the 2010 Society convention next July in Philadelphia.

Other honors during the weekend included the Novice Championship being claimed by Indigo Nights from Mason City. The quartet is anchored by veteran *River City Chorus* director **Jayson Ryner**, showing his range on bass, but with three of his students competing for the first time: **Charles Carrier, John Chambers** and **Brad Willman**. The quartet finished 10th in a field of 31 competitors to top a field of eight novice quartets.

Qualifying tops among eight senior foursomes and earning the right to represent CSD at the January 2010 Society Mid-Winter Convention in Tampa, Fla., was a brand-new and widespread quartet, *High Mileage*, composed of Lyle Wyly, Kansas City; Gary Drown, Kearney, Neb; Jim Bagby, Kansas City, and Dale Comer, Lincoln.

The 2009 Hall of Fame inductee announced by last year's honoree, **Bill McLaurine** of St. Charles, is immediate past CSD president **Don Fuson** of *HOA* and Overland Park chapters. Don continues as district events and financial review chairman, but even a partial list of his chapter, district and Society accomplishments would take many more pages than this bulletin offers.

The weekend built to a logical and thundering conclusion that was the brainchild of District President **Don Blank**, who wanted to present and honor the St. Charles gold-medal tandem of the *Ambassadors of Harmony* and *Crossroads*, following their historic victories on the same day and night this July in Anaheim. That meant compressing the Saturday competition schedule in Lincoln, which was complicated by the large number of quartets in the Friday field (even after two scratches).

But the judges soldiered gamely on. Given the opportunity to rest up Saturday night before the final quartet evals or take in the lollapalooza show, every member but one of the triple panel showed up to join the repeated standing ovations for the gold medalists. (*Continued on page 2* \clubsuit)

Vocal Spectrum, the third member of the *AOH* "Four Horsemen" musical attack, joined brilliantly in the performance piece de resistance. (Basso/ arm-waver **Jim Henry** alone can be considered the fourth Horseman, and I'm sure **Frank Leahy** would be delighted to have him!)

The show featured three separate sets by *AOH*, sandwiched around dazzling five-song performances by *Crossroads* and *Vocal Spectrum*, plus the championship shots by *Central Standard* and *Skyline*. The 2,300-seat Lied Center was virtually full, including a few hundred Youth in Harmony guests of the hard-working host Lincoln Chapter.

Rounding out the top five in the chorus contest were Mason City, which took home the Plateau AA trophy, and Linn County Metro in fifth place. Fremont also claimed the most-improved title in AAA. In AA, Davenport was the most-improved winner by an eyelash over Kearney.

Des Moines was just six points back of Linn County in sixth place. And from my perspective as the C&J guy, the best news was that none of our 14 choruses scored lower than a 61. That's a solid B. I go to other districts with a comparable size chorus field and know that there will be at least several C-level (or lower) choruses. And we don't have any qualifications for our fall contest.

The same can be said of the quartet field. The average scoring range from top to bottom, 31 quartets, was 79.5 to 49.8. That's just under an A to no worse than mid-C at the lowest. The law of averages says there ought to be a train wreck in there somewhere. Mid-C is the judging rule of thumb for a quartet you'd be generally be glad to have on your chapter show. In other words, although we probably can use more coaching in CSD, the judges were happy with the scoring level and the response of all our competitors.

District history ace **Jim Nugent** confirms one other note of interest: *Central Standard* is the smallest chorus to qualify for international since the *American Barberboys* earned a wildcard berth in 1997. The St. Joseph chorus had 28 on stage, then went to Atlanta with 37 singers and placed 11th. \clubsuit



"After five years, over 250 rehearsals, 14 appearances on a competition stage (including a district championship and five trips to International) the release of a recording, a lot of fun

TWENTY YEARS AGO: NOVEMBER, 1988

He contacted the vendor, picked up promotional literature and other data, negotiated for an acceptable (to the chapter board) price, and then took the whole package to the board for approval.

FORTY YEARS AGO: NOVEMBER, 1968

Harmonotes Editor **Don Thorne** announced that the featured quartet for this issue was a foursome known as the *Missouri Pewkes*. This quartet was formed away back in 1967 when three members of the Kansas City chapter attended the inter-


national convention in Hawaii. They were joined by another chapter member, a tall bass named **Joe Costigan**, and were invited to attend a meeting of the Honolulu chapter, where they participated in a pick-up quartet contest and, surprisingly, finished in second place.

About that name, the *Missouri Pewkes*...Here's the way Don explains it: "The name 'Missouri Pewkes' has a very authentic and historical meaning. During the 19th century, many families took the advice of **Horace Greeley** to 'Go West, young man, go West." The migration was on. People from Indiana were nicknamed the 'Hoosiers.' From Illinois, the 'Suckers.' From Kansas, the 'Jayhawks,' and the migrants from Missouri were nicknamed the 'Missouri Pewkes.' What more significant name could these four Barbershoppers from Missouri, visiting our newest state, select for the name of their quartet." (Yeah, but what the heck is a "Pewke?" I've looked everywhere—even the Internet, where all I could find was something about a woman named Zulah. E. Pewkes—with no success. Anyone got the answer?)

Don goes on: "After returning to Kansas City, Joe Costigan looked to greener singing pastures and joined up with the *Heights of Harmony* quartet. After many, many applications had been examined...a new bass was initiated into the group."

Don said that, "Every one of the present foursome is a past president of the *HOA* chapter. Every one has achieved the "Man of the Year" Award. The total years of barbershopping of the four add up to a staggering 93 years. Let's not add up their combined ages!"

The members' names were **Bill Wall** on lead, **Ed Eichman** on baritone, Don himself on tenor and **Orval Wilson** singing the bass. Quite an illustrious group, don't you think? **•**

The Lines Are Open!

Since the CSD Convention in Lincoln, there has been a renewed emphasis on recruitment. I wish I could say I was the driving force behind it, but I certainly was not. Actually it began at the most likely of all plac-

es: within the membership itself. And that's as it should be. When a spark ignites a flame, the flame only remains alive with substance to feed upon mixed with the oxygen surrounding it. In this case, the substance is the product we have to offer, and the oxygen is the membership surrounding it. As the flame is nurtured to stay alive, become

brighter and increase its reach, so does the excitement, action and results of the membership.

Today there are so many ways to communicate with friends, relatives, business contacts and neighbors that it's difficult for me to envision the need for them all in the competing market place, much less understand them. That's the "old guy" in me. It's also difficult for me to accept that we no longer have front porches or gather around a lake and picnic area on Sunday afternoons. That's also the old guy in me. But here we are with My Space, e-mail, Blackberry, Face Book, snail mail, HOA business cards, Space Book, Twitter, HOA blue informational cards, and once in awhile a "Howdy" and a handshake. I guess I like the last two the best, as they seem to



compliment each other and produce pretty good results.

Okay, so now I have to admit it. There's a whole lot of that new-fangled stuff I don't know much about yet. That doesn't mean it isn't useful. The thing is that whichever method you use you are opening the lines of communication to grow the flame, and that's what's important. Now is the perfect time to recruit like crazy, as we are beginning to work on our Holiday Show music. Now is also the time to make sure we're able to stay close to our guests, insuring they come back to join our ranks. Some of our recent ones have indicated that they wouldn't return until after we finished rehearsing for the district contest. They enjoyed our singing, but didn't want to commit their time until they felt like they could be more a part of the group. One was pretty intimidated by having to memorize the music, as he's always been in organizations where they held it. Guess what? We had both scenarios back as guests the following week.

So here we have several things to consider and give our attention to. **Chuck Greene's** seminar that some of us attended, "Compellingly Attractive Chapter Meetings," addressed some of these challenges. You may have noticed subtle changes during our meeting time: face coaching by chorus members out front, arc or circle singing for blending, changes in the way announcements are given, restarts with a five-second coaching comment, the director personally calling each new guest. If you missed Tuesday night, Oct. 20., we had a 12-minute

breakout session where the chorus broke into VLQ's and found a room in the church and just sang tags or Polecats as it must have been done back in the day. I found myself in the boiler room with a couple of guests. We introduced ourselves to a riser mate and shared a little background about ourselves, learned a very long tag by Freddie King and even applied a gentle massage to our neighbor. The idea here is to make each rehearsal a bit different, yet accomplish the same desired results while having fun. Having fun is the key to a new guest and for the retention of current members.

Whether we are a performing and competing chorus or one that prefers to gather each week and sing for the fun and camaraderie, the challenge is the same: to attract viable guest candidates and retain current members,

all the while having fun doing it. The challenge is to do this at whatever level we are performing or rehearsing at, and be able to keep the intimidation level low or nonexistent so that regardless at what point they join us, they'll want to come back. I believe that recognition is there among our leadership, and that we are beginning to make progress.

Do you have ideas as to how to change up the pace and rhythm of our rehearsals? I'll bet your PVP, Music Team or director would be glad to hear from you. How do we make guests feel comfortable and wanting to return when we are in a contest or performance mode? Fun, with variety, yet with purpose may just be the answer. How can we do this? Perhaps that is one of our larger unsolved tasks. How can you – we -- keep that flame reaching higher? Remember: *it's your chapter*. ♥

FOCAL POINT by Ron McIntire

I had the great fortune to room with Frazier Allen at the 2009 district contest in Lincoln, Nebraska, Over the three-day weekend, we talked about barbershopping, flying military airplanes in WWII, and a few milestones in his life. During our interview, I was surprised to learn that he enlisted in the Army Air Corps at Strother Field, an Army air field near my home town of Arkansas City, Kansas. I was six years old at the time.



Frazier Allen and his friend **Bill Rose** heard the Orphans (1953 CSD Champs from Wichita) sing one night in 1954 and

thought it was the most beautiful sound they had ever heard. That prompted them to check out a meeting at the Broadview Hotel in Wichita and, not long after, they both joined the Wichita Chapter. Frazier sang in two or three short-lived quartets after that but in late 1956, he, Bill Rose and Byron Bittain sang a few songs with Monty Duerksen, then in the Newton, Kansas Chapter. They all liked what they heard and, though it took some arm twisting and cajoling, they convinced Monty he should be in a quartet. They called themselves the Four Cavaliers. Since both Frazier and Bill Rose worked at Boeing, many of their rehearsals were in the men's room, lunch room and hangar at Boeing during the lunch break. Monty sang with the group until mid 1958 and competed at district twice, taking second place in '58 but he left in 1958 to finish his college degree. That's when Jay Bond, from the Wichita Chapter stepped in. The new quartet went on win the 1959 CSD quartet contest in Wichita then went to International where they missed fifth place by one point.

The *Cavaliers* stayed together until 1960 when Frazier was transferred to the Boeing facility in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Work got in the way then and he dropped out for a time. He resumed his barbershop career in the Frank Thorne Chapter in about 1989 and eventually joined the Kansas Chapter in 2001, singing tenor in HOA until it became easier to sing lead.

Frazier was born on a farm not far from Udall, Kansas in 1924 and, with four brothers and a sister, grew up in the Udall area. He attended his first six years of school in a one-room school house called Bushnell School close to the farm then enrolled in the seventh grade in Udall. "There were three students at the school when I left Bushnell," he recalled. He graduated from Udall High School in 1942.

In 1943, he was drafted into the Army and he and a brother went for their physicals. Because they had already enlisted in the Army Air Corps, their paper work was changed to reflect Aviation Cadet but during the physical, the doctor said his brother had a heart murmur so Frazier went alone.

Frazier never saw combat but spent the last two years of WWII stateside, flying AT-6's, P-40's, P-51's and the "Jug," the popular name for the P-47. Toward the end of his enlistment, he was an AT-6 instructor pilot. He mustered out of the service in 1947.

Frazier is not a name one hears a lot. When asked how his parents chose it, he said his father was a core driller for Shell Oil in the 1920's and he named Frazier after a good friend whose last name was Frazier. If there's ever a constant, it's Frazier Allen. Yeah, he's retired after 41 years at Boeing (1948-1991) but what does that mean? A betting man would lose if he said Frazier would slow down anytime soon, or miss a Tuesday rehearsal a district contest or an International convention.

Asked about his most memorable barbershop experience, "It was the night the *Orphans* won the International quartet contest in Washington, D.C. in 1954," he said. "It was fantastic."

Frazier and his wife **Patricia** married in 1945 and have four grown children. They make their home in Leawood, Kansas.

His friends would be surprised to know that although he doesn't fly now, except commercially, he still holds a valid pilot's license issued in 2001. ♥

Caroling Caravan to Ride Again on December 19


