My First Year in HOA

Do you remember when your children went away to summer camp for a few weeks or so? And, if you were lucky, your son or daughter may have written you a letter and it said something like:

"Dear Mom and Dad, I'm here at summer camp and I'm really having fun! We are having a great time, fishing, swimming, building stuff and we have ice cream and cookies every night! They let us have as much as we want too! Please can I go next year?"

Well do you remember? I'd like to say this, "My first year as a member of *Heart of America Chorus* has been like having as much ice cream and cookies as I want. I like ice cream and cookies, a lot." That's pretty much the explanation for the title, "At Large."

And then in an unrealistic expectation of myself, I wanted to be better than I could possibly be — yesterday! However, I almost quit when I listened to a recording of myself the first time. "That sound was not the sound I was hearing?"

A little background may be in order. In the beginning months, I stood on the risers mostly next to **Carl Turlin** and **Jerry Garrard**. Soon I began to think of them as saints for being patient with me, especially after the recording I heard. You see, when I was younger, I could do this with relative ease, and that recording almost scared me away.

And then something else happened. I talked to **Carter Combs**, and he had a reasonable explanation. I trusted his advice and his calming influence.

And then something else happened, The Holiday Harmony Show and then the Singing Caravan, and then the Spring Show and all of a sudden...there I was on the stage side of the curtain at The Sprint Center on an international convention stage. I thought of **Harry Carey**: *Holy Cow!*

Just a few hours ago this article would have been entitled *HOA Competes & Hosts Again!*, as that was the latest and greatest news from the home front. But all that changed yesterday when we received our official wild card invitation to compete in the 2012 Int'l Chorus Contest on July 6th in Portland, Oregon.

HOA's Performing Chorus (PC) members were promptly informed of the invitation and given an online form in which to answer survey questions about the chorus going to Portland. Within a few hours we had heard the voices of over half of the regular PC members which I thought was an excellent sampling. Many thanks to all those who responded in such a timely fashion; your input and comments were invaluable in the decision making processes that followed.

After the chapter meeting last night the Music Team, lead by Music/Performance Vice President **Mark Fortino**, met to discuss the issue. The chapter was given less than three days to make the decision, so it was now or never and could not be put off until the next scheduled MT meeting. The MT very systematically talked about the pros and cons of competing and a consensus was reached in short order. I gave the Board members the luxury of witnessing the MT meeting. When you get to hear veterans like Past President and Past Music/Performance VP **Keith Schweer** express his opinions and reasoning it's a real benefit to us on the current board who would ultimately be asked to make the final decision. After the MT meeting the Board was convened and considered the MT's proposal of accepting the invitation. I was very proud of the both the MT and Board for their service to the chapter last evening and am pleased to announce that the Board voted in favor of accepting the wild card invitation to compete in Portland next July!

LEAD'S CREED Submitted by Dave Jobe

- 1. We will not flaunt in front of others the fact that we have the best voice in the group (unless the music calls for it, which, come to think of it usually does).
- 2. We will do our best to stay in tune, but don't worry too much about that since the other guys have to follow us anyway.
- 3. As consummate gentlemen, we will continue to let the Basses feel like they're the most important part of the group, even though without the melody they would have nothing to harmonize.
- 4. As we focus on shaping and caressing the song, if we forget a word (or all of them), we won't worry too much since the other guys have to follow us anyway.
- 5. We will never allow a baritone to sing louder than us, even when we're on the seventh. The melody must be heard!
- 6. We will be sensitive to the Tenor's need to feel special. We won't overdo it, though.
- 7. In a chorus, although we will do our best to follow the director, we realize that we have to take advantage of all the opportunities in a song to show off our wonderful Lead voice. After all, that's what the audience has come to hear, right?
- 8. We will do our best to cover the fact that the Baritone has a weak, emaciated instrument, otherwise he'd be singing Lead.
- 9. When in doubt, pitch it up!!!
- 10. When a Coach/Director advises us that we are under pitch, or too loud, we will always nod appreciatively, all the while knowing that we were doing what the Composer/Arranger originally intended (even if the Director IS the Coach/Arranger).



You may have missed the performance of *Tone-Henge* at the CSD convention afterglow. If so, "Congratulations!" It wasn't what you might call "bad," but then it didn't have the normal sparkle that we're accustomed to, (Dan murmured with tongue imbedded in cheek.)

Anyway, a week or so later we set a new record that solved the problem; **two** actual rehearsals within a 24hour period! Well, the results caused us old coots to raise what's left of our eyebrows in amazement! Ringing chords? Well, bless our souls! Balance? Blend? Honest musicality? All them-there good rarities actually lasted all the way through **an actual performance**! I should mention that the performance was in a church. It helped to have the presence of the one who invented harmony!

We have another gig in mid-December. The chances of repeating that double-rehearsal record are about the same as the life of the proverbial snowball in a place with no churches. Anyway, we're living proof that you're never too old to learn how...to learn how! •

Reflections of CSD Convention Weekend

As I reflect back on the weekend I am so proud to be a part of this chapter. Hosting yet another convention in championship style and at the same putting a great performance on the stage was a great accomplishment.

I know you're not supposed to talk about your competition but I don't care, I always have because it helps me get better individually. I thought *Central Standard* sang beautifully on the Saturday night show. **Rob Mance** did a great job directing them and the guys responded well to his direction. As I was listening to them and loving the sound they were producing I couldn't help but take pride in the fact that we posted the exact same singing scores and the exact same presentation scores as they did. That is really awesome guys and it's just the honest truth!

I think it's sometimes very difficult to mentally do what judges do, tie a number to a performance. But when you hear or see one that you like, it's at least a good reference point to see what number was put on it and then compare it to what the same judges gave you. It's not an exact science but I think there are things to be learned. For example, the purity and clarity in *Central Standard's* tone is really awesome! The resonance and richness of HOA is our strength which is why we score as well as we do. After listening to our rehearsal on Thursday night, as well as comments from people I trust about our contest set, I'm excited to work especially on our leads. We have to bring more Central Standard-like clarity to our tone while singing through a still taller resonant chamber. While we sing with pretty good resonance, we haven't tapped even 50% of our potential.

Many of you know that I have been taking weekly voice lessons for just over a year now. Biggest change in my vocal production is the amount of space I sing with. I never knew my jaw could stretch, unhinge this much. Try singing with corks in your molars for 10 minutes a day and you'll feel my pain! :) **Mike Slamka** and **Brandon Guyton** have focused a great deal of their time on getting *Voices Unlimited* as a whole, but primarily **Shaun** (ed's note: **Whisler**) and me, to sing with more space. The comments from the judges and others this weekend was just how incredible the SIZE of our sound is. Now sure, our score improved a little from Internationals, when one would think it should have really taken a BIG step forward. However, despite what some believe, you can only make major changes in so many areas at a time, and while our sound was BIG this weekend, we weren't as musical as we know how to be, nor was our presentation at the level we know how to do. Why? We focused on what we know will pay dividends in the future. Our goal for the next year will be to maintain that space and get everything else up to that level. Only then will mid 80's scores and more be possible.

So what is the point of this long email? It's to simply say that I know from talking with some of you that you may be discouraged by our placement and score. I'm not! (ok maybe a little) But, I'm energized about what we can learn from this experience and improve!

Back in the mid 1990's when *12th Street Rag* was placing 36th, 36th, 37th, 43rd, **John** (ed's note: Mark's brother) asked me one night, "Why do we want to keep doing this? Do you ever think about throwing in the towel?" I will never forget my response. "As long as I am personally improving and getting better, I will never give this up." It may seem selfish, but I want to learn from the best, I want to try to be the best. Even if I never am the best, the journey of learning is what it is all about!" That is the FUN part. It's never been about the contest. That is a motivator and good measuring stick, but that's about it. The experience is what it's all about.

Had I given up after all of those contests that didn't turn out like I wished, I wouldn't have had the opportunity to win my third district championship this past weekend and be surrounded by all of you, a chapter that I love! I also probably would have dropped out of barbershop all together.

Never give up, embrace your competition, and learn, learn, learn.

Congrats to all Kansas City Area Choruses and their quartets! It was indeed a weekend to remember! 🎔

You see, we'll be behind the wheel making the trek across

I've flown to that region several times but have yet had the opportunity to drive it and take in all the wonderful sights in between. I can't wait to blaze my way through the Nebraska

On up "the 5" to Springfield where **Gossler Farms Nursery** is located, you'll find more conifers, trees & shrubs to your liking. It just keeps getting better. See, now we have to go on through Portland about 18 miles until we reach Scappoose. Did I say something about a convention? Here you'll find **Joy Creek Nursery** which has a delightful selection of

clematis, fuchsia and hydrangea. The view isn't bad either. It overlooks the confluence of the Columbia and Willamette Rivers.

Then just a few miles across the beautiful Columbia River Gorge is a little town called Battle Ground. WA. Collector's Nursery is there to show off their inventory of dwarf conifers, uncommon perennials and shade plants. So

what the heck – as long as we're still going north and Seattle is only another 125 miles or so, Chimacum is just up the road off Pudget Sound where **Naylor Creek Nursery** has lots more hostas. We can always use more of them.

And did I mention that **Little and Lewis** is just over there on Bainbridge Island? In this climate they grow gunnera as large as car hoods. They've got great statuary pieces in their gallery! Guess we should've brought the truck, huh?

As you see, I've got my hands full. These conventions can be a blessing and curse at the same time. As you've by now surmised, my wife – my Dirt Angel, does lead me via her strange sense of direction. Now where did I put that ticket agent's phone number? ♥
