

That's what we heard all Saturday evening in Topeka—"*Heart of America* is Back". Our colleagues all over the district told us that we did what we came to do. I've sung in a lot of second-place choruses before, and never heard the heartfelt compliments that we got this time. Be proud of yourself, guys—you earned the right.

It felt great on stage, didn't it? We knew we had two wonderful songs, and that we understood how we wanted to present them. That's when a contest is really fun. We know we sang our hearts out, especially on the ballad. How often do you hear an audience break into applause before the end of the last chord of a ballad? We had them, and we knew it.

We had the judges, too (at least part of the time), and that's a tougher sell—they're paid the big bucks to be critical. A third of the chorus stayed for the evaluations. That says something about the morale of this bunch. These guys told us more good things than bad, especially considering that the weak spots they identified were what they called "nit-picking". We learned that we had a good plan, and that we were working on the right things in our preparation. The small things we didn't get done on stage were all things we have been working

on. No surprises. The main avenue to getting better is to carry out our plan consistently, for a full five minutes—maintain the energy throughout, and the intensity, and the attitude!

Meanwhile, let's savor the memories. Most of us competed two years ago in a fourth-place chorus, and we didn't like that feeling at all. We cruised past two of the three choruses that beat us then, and scared the other. In the last few weeks these sixty-nine guys came together emotionally as well as vocally, and I have never felt better about being a member of *Heart of America* than I was for those magic moments on stage.

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
### FROM THE TOP OF OUR HEART

#### FROM COACHING SESSIONS...



The *Heart of America Chorus* return to respectability and the excellent representation by our four chapter quartets were part of a larger, encouraging picture at the fall CSD competition in Topeka.

Among the largest field of quartets in years – 34 – and 16 choruses, there was not one D-level performance. Let me say that again: 50 competitors, and no D's. For a district that has no division contests or minimum qualifying scores, that's an amazing statistic. Ask any judge you know if he remembers a similar experience.

To put it in perspective, a C-level performance is from 41 to 60 points. On a triple panel, the minimum C would be 123 points. The 34th-place quartet averaged 141 for its two songs. A B score is 61-80, or a minimum of 183 for the triple panel. We had quartets who scored B down through 23rd place!

In the chorus contest, only Society medalist St. Charles (with another brilliant performance) had all A scores. But the next 11 choruses achieved B-level scores, ranging up to the 76.5 average of HOA.


# **TOPEKA HIGHLIGHTS**

Our first time out of the gate and a 17th place finish was in the range we hoped for but not what we expected given the fact that we had to change our approach during the last week. Why would we change anything in the last week? The answer is that Carter Combs, our tenor, developed a severely painful back problem that left him with no feeling in his left leg and hence he was barely able to walk, let alone stand. Our planned

routine with tuxes had to be scratched for an old-clothes-bythe-lake-watching-the-sunsetand-moon-rise routine with Carter sitting in a chair and the rest of us clustered around him. We had one rehearsal on Wednesday the 10th before taking it on stage on Friday, the 12th! (We even forgot to spray some WD-40 on the chair which creaked in the

wrong key as I opened it for Carter.)

We want to thank Jim Bagby for his help and encouragement and for being back stage as we left the stage to hug us and share the excitement we felt as we soaked in the warm feelings that had just come to us from the cheers of our friends in the audience. I have been singing for over 30 years now, and with the possible exception of how I felt during the audience reaction in Detroit after HOA finished singing "That Old Quartet of Mine" in International, I can remember no feeling like the one I had Friday night as we finished—and for hours after. I suspect the other guys had similar emotions. We also want to thank 12th Street Rag whose best wishes card left for us at the photographer's station in the pattern as we were leaving to perform was a nice touch from good friends. And to all of the men, wives and friends of HOA, St. Joe, Overland Park and other chapters that stopped us Friday night and Saturday to congratulate us, we say a special thanks. Even more special is the thanks that Charley, John and I owe to Carter for

toughing it out so that we could compete. One last word for those who have not competed because they are concerned about how well they might do or worry about being too nervous. We approached this as a chance to perform rather than as a challenge to succeed. We think it worked. Competing is fun; it has many rewards; it does take some focused work—and we'd have benefitted from a lot more of the latter as our scores and the judges' comments told us. But above all, it was one more chance to sing to an audience that wanted to listen. (And it was a lot easier to sing

there than in front of the Chapter!)





#### Ten Years Ago -November 1991

HOA ran its string of CSD championships to 10 with a victory at the 1991 fall contest in Kansas City. And get this! We outscored our closest competition, the Ambassadors of Harmonu from across the state, by 57 points! And two of our chapter quartets, the K.C. Chord Company, with Gene Bowers (tenor), David Krause (lead), Wesley Yoder (baritone), and **Matt** Moore (bass), and the Sound Impression, with

New HOA members were **J. B. Witham, Jim Morris** and **Martin Oldehoeft.** 

#### <u>Twenty Years Ago - November 1981</u>

For the first time ever, the CSD chorus and quartet championships were won by two KC groups. And it was a rare occasion, indeed, when the our success was covered by an article in the *Kansas City Star!* A copy of the piece was reproduced on the front page of Harmonotes by then Editor **Al Benz**.

The quartet trophy was brought home by our own Corner Quartet. The membership is not mentioned in *Harmonotes*, but as I recall it, **Don Kahl** sang tenor, **Lance Heilmann** carried the lead, **Steve Leone** was the baritone and **Stan Grossman** handled the bass.

**Jim Bagby** provided a stirring eulogy in *Harmonotes* for **Don Stewart**, who had passed away recently. *The Harmony Handful* (remember them?) provided the music at Don's funeral. (*Continued on page 9*) →

There had been a flight schedule change that precluded Steve Jamison from being able to make it into Kansas City until 10:00 p.m. on Friday, which would have precluded him from judging the quartet contest. Other judges were unavailable for various reasons...and, while the C&J community tries diligently to use out-of-district judges, the baton was being passed to me. Luckily, I hadn't coached or interfaced with ANY of the competitors during the previous 30 days due to the amount of time I've spent up in Chicago lately, taking care of my parents.

So, instead of attending and having a great time enjoying the convention, I was forced to work AND enjoy the contest!!! What a terrible thing to have to endure! <insert BIG GRIN here>

And what a contest it was...34 quartets...16 choruses...120 songs...hundreds of competitors AND the added attraction of 49 guys from 15 chapters who participated in the CSD Mike-Tester's Chorus who got the opportunity to perform on the contest stage (including going through a 90-minute rehearsal and the entire pattern) just like the other choruses. And the overall quality of every performance was wonderful! No one "crashed and burned" on stage (although we did hear some MAJOR clunkers coming from the hotel lobby AFTER the contest)!!! Congrats to the other HOA quartets...good to see Dale Neuman and John Stucker walking the boards again...and a great surprise to see Phil Hunget (Grant's dad) onstage in a quartet (his first time competing since the 60s I think he told me)...great to see a lot of other "first-timers," too...always good to see new faces enjoying this wonderful hobby.

Congrats to HOA for one of the most consistent performances I've seen you give in years...way to go, **Gordon**...looks like the guys are taking ownership of their performance and enjoying themselves, too.


# INSTALLATION/AWARDS BANQUET by Dick Irwin

At the recent Central States District House of Delegates Meeting in Topeka, I was "sworn in" as the CSD Vice-President for Member Services. Rumor has it that I can thank Jim Bagby for tossing my name in the hopper and Byron Myers for pushing it forward. Since both of them will have to serve with me on the CSD Board, I appreciate their votes of confidence. Bill McLaurine, the district president, is from the St. Charles Chapter and I'd worked with him on chapter matters when I was HOA president. He explored with me some needs that I might be able to help with if I took on the job. So, I decided to accept.

What does all this mean—except that I've now traded in a little more of my 'retirement spare time'? In truth, I can't really answer that in detail until I attend the Society's Leadership Training Forum in Racine, WI. Oct. 31 through Nov. 4. There we will meet with the committee that has been working on membership recruitment and retention strategies over the past year and develop a game plan for the next several years. There appear to be a number of items on the table for consideration – from support for existing chapters efforts to get new men to help for start-up chapters in areas that do not have the barbershop opportunities we all take for granted. Getting new members seems more likely than getting former ones back that we've lost in some fashion. But getting new members that will stay is another issue. And getting new members who can bring both interest in the music we sing with a willingness to do the non-music work associated with successful chapter organization and administration is also important. We are a "graving" organization like many other service-hobby organizations founded in the mid-20th century. We tend to recruit from our own age cohorts, which adds to the "gray." We

need to figure out some other approaches if we wish to see this hobby stav viable. Total membership was recently reported at below 32,000, down





CSD is fortunate in that its membership has held fairly constant – but good fortune is no substitute for good plans and effective programs. I hope to be able to contribute to the latter in my tour of duty as CSD VP for Member Services. I may well call on a number of you for help.

# UPDATE ON HELPERS FUND by Dale Neuman

Several issues ago I reminded folks about the **Presidents' Helpers Fund** that provided financial assistance to members whose cash flow situation created problems for them in attending our retreat, going to contest or getting a tux for contest. I want to thank the several men who made contributions after that article appeared. Now I want to provide an update on the fund.

We provided a little over \$525 in assistance for those two events. We have received \$375 in contributions since the article appeared. We started the period with about \$800 in the account. If my math is correct, we have about \$650 remaining. While this seems like a lot, we've usually tried to have closer to \$1,000 minimum available to address the variety of chorus-related needs that can arise for men who may need some short-term assistance.

Last month I announced the liquidation of the **Building Fund** come this next July, and some of those contributors have already notified the President of their desire to transfer their contribution to the "Helpers Fund." We thank them and

# FORMER RR4 MEMBER TO SING WITH UPTOWN SOUND
