And in Lincoln last week, associate Lincoln Continental director Jon Peterson came up to me after the meeting and said he was very familiar with the CD, because a member of our chorus, one of his former music students, had sent it to him with a note that said simply "Thanks for getting me into barbershopping."

Oh, that member was bari Doug Brott, one of our newer, better singers. Is there a better hobby anywhere? Do we tell people that enough? We sure have the chance now, following up on the super-successful quest night orchestrated by Exec Veep Steve Carruthers. I know of at least a half-dozen good singers we're going to realize from there, and I suspect more.

And we have to accomplish in Omaha what I think is always the ultimate in competition: not beat someone else.

not achieve a certain score, not even achieve a certain rank. My wish for you and me and all of us is to have the curtain close and know-not just say, but know-that's as good as we can sing now. We can ask for no more. I can't wait! 🖤

Another consideration in the question of being a participant or a spectator in these contests is the District contest experience.

What is the District contest to you, in light of our recent experience as a chorus?

- 1. A wonderful opportunity to get away and spend a weekend with friends.
- 2. An opportunity to show others in the District how great our chorus is.
- 3. A necessary first step toward the really big show at International.
- 4. An added burden on my time, resources and energy I could do without.
- 5. Please spare me! Not this time. Call me next spring.

Then, I suppose a valid question would be "If a Webcast were available for the District contest, would you tune in?" Would it have an effect on your decision to compete with the chorus or stay behind?

With these thoughts in mind, consider the original premise, posed by Mike Mathieu just after our return from Louisville. Since the Webcast makes it possible for you to enjoy the competitions at home on your computer, does that make it less likely you would travel to the convention, or would you be willing to pay for having the Webcast available to you?

#### Consider that:

- 1. There is no need to travel, no costs for hotels, or any of a hundred other things.
- 2. Your vacation days are available for other things. Your family will appreciate that!
- 3. You can eat when you like, where you like, and not worry about the crowds.
- 4. You get to sleep in your own bed, and don't have to worry about your house.
- 5. You can sing along with the contestants to your heart's desire!

6. You know the scores well before anyone at the convention does.

7. And last but not least, you don't have all those practices to endure ahead of it!

However, after a most exciting week at Louisville with friends near and far, consider this:

- 1. Really, it's true with any sport or other event-watching it on TV is NOTHING like being there!
- 2. When things happen that are exciting, you are part of the excitement!
- 3. You meet some of the most interesting people at a convention, besides friends from all over.
- 4. This is the World Series of Barbershop, and YOU are one of the PLAYERS!
- 5. It is a fitting reward for all that hard work you have done in the practices!
- 6. You get a chance to explore another part of the country, perhaps one you haven't visited before.
- 7. You get a chance to build friendships with barbershoppers from all over by singing tags with them.

So, the question is a difficult one, and you need to balance the joy of the experience against the cost. It comes down to the more fundamental question of "Why are you part of the Heart of America Chorus?" Our chorus offers a greater challenge to excel than do other choruses in the area, but that has its price as we work harder to perfect our craft than other choruses might. The contests are only part of the total experience, but they are a substantial part. There is no doubt that the experience is meaningful to you only if you are part of it. It isn't worth your time on Tuesdays to just come and watch!

As to helping to share the cost of the Webcast? Why not? It's something of value to me, I should be willing to give something of value for it. Most of us pay a cable bill every month and think nothing of it.

In conclusion, my thoughts on the matter are that this past summer was one of the most memorable times of my life, and it was because I was able to be with you all in Louisville, and not sitting on the sidelines. It was, of course, very special to me as a former member of the Ambassadors of Harmony. Being there for that was certainly priceless, and watching it on TV would have been like finishing last in comparison.

Thank you all for your hard work which made it all possible, and let's see if we can possibly top it, first in Omaha, then in Salt Lake City next July. ♥

### **"WITHOUT A SONG"**

"Without A Song" was introduced in the 1930 Broadway operetta *Great Day!...* and yes, before you ask, the same show gave us "Great Day" that was recently recorded and released by Gas House Gang. It is extraordinary that this show, that also produced the popular hit "More Than You Know" ran a mere 36 performances. The fault, in part, was that of the composer and show producer, Vincent Youmans. The show had so many pre-opening problems and postponements that it became know as The Great Delay. At various times before its opening, Great Day! was to have featured Duke Ellington, Louis Armstrong, and Fletcher Henderson. None ended up in the show.

Vincent Youmans' professional songwriting career spanned only 13 years, from 1920 to 1933, and in that time he published fewer than 100 songs, working for 13 Broadway musicals and two musical motion pictures. Among his best-known shows are The Wildflower and Hit The Deck, as well as the first Fred Astaire-Ginger Rogers musical film. Flving Down To Rio. Perhaps his biggest hit was "Tea For Two" for the show No! No! Nanette!

Our arrangement, by the inestimable **Walt Latzko**, has a rich barbershop history, having been recorded virtually unchanged by such gold-medal giants as the Buffalo Bills. Suntones, and Keepsake (who embellished the tag) over a span of five decades.

As musicians, we can relate directly to the lyric of this lovely song...our love of music, of finding and sharing the story in each piece we perform, strengthens the unique bond among us, and adds emotional depth to our lives. But in a broader sense. I believe this song is about anything that gives our lives meaning, be it our faith, our families, our careers... it is for us individually and collectively to find and share that spark.

I hope you enjoy sharing this wonderfully inspiring song, just as I have enjoyed listening to, and now performing, it with you.

If you've always wondered what SPEBSQSA means, but were afraid to ask, you're in four-part-harmony luck. It stands for Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America. Today, the organization has been renamed The Barbershop Harmony Society.

Interestingly enough, the initial organization of the singers began one evening in 1938, downtown in Kansas City's Muhlebach Hotel, when two men began talking about the joys of singing harmony. Since both gentlemen were visiting

Kansas City from Tulsa, they agreed once they returned home, they would write to their respective friends about forming a group of singers. Between the two men, they sent out over 40 letters inviting other men to join together for fellowship in singing. Amazingly, 26 singers responded positively to the invitation. They had such a grand time, they decided to form an organiza-

tion. From that small organization the SPEBSQSA spread across the nation and the world, with over 800 chapters in North America today.

Fifteen years ago the barbershop quartet singing bug arrived at Lake Quivira when resident **Bill Lucas** recruited several other men to sing with him in the Overland Park Chapter of SPEBSQSA. Included in the original group of LQ singers were **Cliff Knox**, **Klaus Frank**, **Paul Walter** and **Bob Lee**. **Don Peck** and **Harry Stewart** joined a bit later. Both are still active in the fine art of barbershop singing.

For Don Peck, barbershop choral singing is not just a joyful hobby. The singing has led to improved health and vitality after he suffered a mild stroke a year ago last June. Shortly after returning home from the hospital, we remember seeing Don and his wife, **Donie**, walking along Lakeshore. He was not walking very well and his speech was somewhat difficult to understand. When asked when he might play golf again, Don said, "What I really miss is my singing." Not quite two months later when we saw Don out walking, he said he was singing again and playing golf "... but not too well." He explained that he was eagerly following his voice therapist's recommendation to return to singing as soon as possible. Don is living proof today that singing therapy can be a wonderful blessino.

Harry Stewart was recruited into SPEBSQSA in 1988 after stopping to listen to a group singing for the Salvation Army bell ringers in a local mall. During the break one of the singers said, "You

seem to be enjoying this. Why don't you come to one of our rehearsals to find out more?" That's exactly what he did, and except for a few years' break, Harry has been singing with The Heart of America Chorus every since.

Barbershop singing has developed into two divisions. One division sings for personal

pleasure and to provide local entertainment. The other adds a competitive element by entering into various levels of competitive singing with 284 competitive choruses worldwide.

When preparing to compete, each chorus is responsible for understanding the contents of the 109-page contest rulebook covering all details of a competition; song selection, skill of singers and harmony, choreography, costumes, appropriateness of moves to music and many other details. The most important rule, however, is that the singers must have a great time while performing.

Every year the competitive groups compete in 18 district events. Winners from the district events, plus four wildcards, gather for the annual competition at the International Convention for Barbershop Singing. The Heart of America Chorus that Don and Harry sing with finished thirteenth in the worldwide competition this last year.

To really appreciate the special sound of barbershop singing, you need to hear it. There are many concerts in the area throughout the year. Of course you could hang around Don's home and listen to him practice along with online music, lyrics and harmonizing parts which enable members to practice at any time at home.

Each year the *Heart of America Chorus* raises money through their paid concerts and with singing valentines and singing telegrams. Additionally, it has CDs available for purchase. Songs include "Auld Lang Syne," "It's A Grand Night For Singing," "16 Tons," "Paper Moon," "I'll Be Seeing You," "Old Cape Cod," "When The Roll Is Called Up Yonder," "America the Beautiful with Overlay" and "I Have Seen The Light!" The 2004 Holiday Harmony Concert is scheduled for December 4 at Unity Village.

Any age can participate. *The Heart of America Chorus* has three generations of one family involved. The youngest member is nine, the oldest in his 80s, and two teenagers participate as well.

HOA has 24 songs on their regular repertoire and is always adding new ones. In addition they have thirteen Christmas songs and sixteen on their old song list, including "Kansas City My Hometown."

Their magazine is the *Harmonizer*. These favorites are a few of the songs on the SPEBSQSA Jukebox currently, at the website (http:// www.spebsqsa.org): "By The Light of The Silvery Moon," "The Sweetheart of Sigma Chi," Alexander's Ragtime Band," "Let Me Call You Sweetheart" and "Beautiful Dreamer."

If you want to listen to the great Barbershop sound on your own computer go to the http:// www.spebsqsa.org site and click on the "Listen" button on the upper left portion of the home page. Scroll down to "Jack Baird Vintage Barbershop Era Music Library" and click to find hundreds of old and new barbershop favorites.

If you want to sing call Don Peck, 268-3194– he can tell you it's good for your health–or Harry Stewart, 268-7982. They might even give you a ride to one of the practices.

### PICKPOCKET PICKED THE WRONG POCKET!
