Myers, Jr. The other two were **Jim Clark**, a member of the Lincoln Chapter, and a four-week-old newcomer to barbershoppIng, **Don Bowlds.** These guys surely went on to make a name for themselves, didn't they?

New members included Veteran barbershopper and former HOA member, **Tom Shadley**, who sang bass with the K. C. Connection, our 1986 CSD champions; **Jim Beutel**, another old-timer with 27 years experience in the Society's Contest and Judging Program; and **Dave Boger**, who had held membership in seven chapters dating back to 1957. (Wonder what happened to these guys.) Then there was **Al Higgins**, and we all know what his record has been, particularly with HOA. What a contribution to our group and the Society in general this man has made. And he's still at it!

And after eight years of banging out each issue of *Harmonotes* on "Old Faithful," a several-years-old Smith Corona portable typewriter, your editor revealed the purchase of a brand-new Brother WP-760D word processor. He's still using it, too, to type copy for this column as well as the "Bulletin Browsing" column for the *Serenade*. And after a hundred bucks worth of reconditioning, the old Smith Corona is still doing its job. And I still don't own a computer.

Twenty-Five Years Ago: October, 1978

Reproduced in the October 1978 issue of *Harmonotes* is a clipping of a column from one of the local newspapers entitled "About Town," by columnist **Ray Brown.**

Except for a couple of relatively insignificant inaccuracies, the second paragraph contains a bit of KC Chapter history you might like to know. Here's what it says:

"(Bert) Phelps was elected secretary-treasurer of the first chapter, organized here in August, 1939, at a meeting at the University Club. The late Joseph E. Stern was elected president. The quartet in which Phelps sang baritone appeared on the Bob Hope Show (and) the Ted Mack Amateur Hour, and won the Central States championship in 1949. The late Landon Laird, who founded and wrote this column for years, was a strong booster of the organization and used to attend its meetings regularly for a little harmonizing with the singers—Phelps was presented a bound volume of letters and other memorabilia in 1958 on the 20th anniversary of the association. The volume contained letters of congratulation from **Bing Crosby, Bob Hope,** and other celebrities. During World War II, Phelps' quartet toured training camps and army hospitals to entertain troops."

Fifty Years Ago: November 20, 1953

There's an article with no by-line (Dan Jacobson and Ham Meisinger were the editors) describing a trip by the chorus to Ottawa for their new chapter's charter night. Also on hand was the Topeka Chapter, the new chapter's sponsor. Russ Gentzler MC'd the meeting and presented the charter to a Mr- Irvin, their president, witnessed by A. 'Ross Neville, Topeka Chapter president and our own Don Thorne. In addition to performances by the new Ottawa chorus and the Kansas City and Topeka choruses, there were five quartets on the program, Among them were Kansas City's Gamboliers, who were quite a sensation, according to the author, with their rendition of "The Little Red School House." "Ed Schliebs rang the bell and looked very much like an old schoolmaster. In came Orval Wilson with short pants, as did Jim Byrne. Then came Owen Fuller with short pants and cap, licking a big lollypop." Other performers from Kansas City were Perc Franks and Joe Sterns as "Four Hands of Harmony" who "received a tremendous ovation after the audience warmed up to their ivory burnishing." wonder how many of those present that evening are still around and singing today?

ROB HENRY: I STILL CAN'T SAY GOODBYE by Jim Porter

When my wife and I saw the news of Rob's passing in our E-Mail, there was no doubt in our minds we would go to show our respects. Rob was more than a great singer in a great barbershop quartet. He was a friend. For four years, I had the privilege of singing with his chorus, learning from him and his brother, and sharing in their success. That evening, we got out the *Gas House Gang* tapes and played their songs once again. Rob's tribute to his father was especially poignant and brought forth the tears. Rob lived and died almost exactly the same way his father did two decades before. Now, Rob's song would be a part of the legacy he would pass on to his son, **Ryan**.

My wife and I arrived at the funeral home around 4 p.m. Sunday, and waited our turn with the Henry family. You could sense the sadness, of course, but you could also sense the spiritual strength that was sustaining them in this difficult time. Each of them, Rob's wife Sue, his mother Rose, his brother Jim, Jim's wife Geda, received each visitor with love and thanks. It's so difficult to know what to say at such a time, but then again, you don't really need to say much. Just the fact you are there is saying enough. I could only bring myself to say "thank you," thank you for allowing me to have a share of Rob's life, his love, his talent, his energy, his success.

We took some time to review the things of Rob's life, all of which were there-the trophies, the medals, the photo albums, the thick binders with all the letters and E-Mails they got, and more. Gas House Gang music played softly over the PA system. We were about to go on our way when we noted more and more Ambassadors guys were arriving. They were coming to sing their final tribute for Rob, so we decided to delay our dinner and take it in. Just let me say I've sung "Friends" many times, but never have I heard it sung with such genuine emotion and feeling. The hundred or so men were lined up on both sides and the rear of the crowded room as they sung this and "I'll Walk With God," a song I knew from my days with them 11 years ago. In this time, I had the opportunity to meet and greet many of my old friends, now looking older than I remember them, but I suppose they would say the same about me.

As we left, I realized that, indeed, a barbershop chapter is very much like a large family. We were all family at that point, saying farewell to a dear brother. I have every confidence to believe that should we in HOA have to do a similar thing, we will be family just as the *Ambassadors* were family that Sunday. We left with a warm glow of belonging that competed with our grief over Rob's passing.

The funeral service was Monday morning at a large church in St. Charles. This wasn't the Henry's own church, that church would not hold the crowd. We arrived early, but there were already more than 100 present. Before the service started, the 400-seat auditorium was packed. The service lasted 90 minutes, but no one was

anxious about the time, as the whole time was a celebration of Rob's life and his dedication to his music, his work, the *Ambassadors of Harmony*, and the community. The service opened as the *Ambassadors*, seated together in the rear of the auditorium, rose and sang "I'll Walk with God" with a sound that filled the place and spilled out into the street, and an emotion that led me and many others to tears as the reality of the occasion surrounded us. As the last chords died away, **Rev. Derks** was led to exclaim "Wow!," which was also the response of all the rest of us.

It was then testimony time, as one by one, members of the family, or the chorus, or others, came forward to give their stories of their life experiences with Rob. This is what took the time, and there were times of laughter and mirth as they related these experiences to us. The occasion was one of celebration more than it was one of mourning, as we knew

that God was welcoming a new voice into His choir, not just any voice, but one of the best baritone voices He could find. **David Wright** took his turn and stated that he had been through this before, burying his parents and others, but that he never felt as close to another as he felt to Rob.

David broke down as he said this and struggled to finish his presentation.


Jim Henry was the last to speak. His strength through this ordeal was something to see, and it remained evident at this point. Jim held up the two thick binders with the many E-Mails and thanked us all for our support of the family through the summer. He spoke of what went through Rob's mind when he received the diagnosis of cancer in late May, how Rob realized that he needed to get right with God and


rededicated his life to Christ. He spoke of the spiritual support he received from his family, his pastor and others, then challenged us all to get right with God so that we could leave that place with the same confidence of faith that he and Rob had, since sooner or later all of us would face death as well.

After the service, we formed the funeral procession and made our journey to the gravesite. I've heard it said that one mark of the success of a man is the size of his funeral procession. If that is true, **Rob Henry** was a very successful man, indeed. Rob was committed into the hands of God as a hundred or so stood by on a beautiful late summer day in a peaceful setting by a small pond. The crowd then began to filter away, one by one. **Rick, Kipp** and **Joe Fink** were among the pallbearers, and at this moment, their professional look dissolved into genuine tears. Rob's mother Rose was bent over the coffin weeping loudly, and Jim was at her side giving her support. This is the image we took with us as we, too, returned to our car and began the long trek west across the state towards home.

Thank you, Rob Henry, for being a part of my life experience, for sharing your talents and your love of Christ. Rejoice now in His presence, I look forward to meeting you again in Paradise.
