FREE STUFF! Podcasts & Barbershop by Carter Combs

Wait! Don't turn the page! Read just a bit before you decide about all this **FREE STUFF!**

OK, if you are into tech, or are comfortable on-line, you may have already delved into podcasts. If not, you are

probably thinking "oh no, I don't want to have to learn more of that tech junk!" But here's the deal... there is a LOT of great information available on the internet FOR FREE via podcasts. You just have to know how to find it and use it.

First, what are podcasts? You can think of them as on-demand broadcasts. Someone makes a series of recordings, and puts them out on the internet for distribution. They may add to the series daily, weekly, monthly, or just whenever they feel like it. They may be experts in their field, or amateur enthusiasts. They may choose to keep all their prior content available, or just the most recent or popular episodes. The individual recordings could be anywhere from a minute to a couple hours long. Most are audio only, but many are video as well. You download them from the internet to review at your leisure.



FREE STUFF! Podcasts & Barbershop



There seem to be podcasts for every conceivable topic. I wouldn't be surprised to find some dedicated to left-handed Lithuanian lumberjacks. Heck, there are even podcasts about (gasp) barbershop!

I had heard about podcasts for years, but never really

paid much attention, until I heard about some for barbershop. That's when I decided to check it out. The only one I found "way back then" was a quasi-monthly series of interviews with some barbershop notables, mostly talking about that year's International Convention. Since then, the podcast universe has exploded, and there are many available, covering barbershop from a variety of angles. There are interviews, CD reviews, singing techniques, tags, etc. Most of the ones I have reviewed so far are informative and entertaining, and well worth your time.

Of course, you may wish to broaden your search beyond just barbershop. The list is practically endless, with new content being added continuously. I have found and tried out series covering singing lessons, home-brewing, history, cooking, trivia, nutrition, motivation, gardening, etc.

If I have piqued your interest, and you have decided to dip your toe into the podcast pool, probably the easiest way to experiment is to use iTunes. Yes, that is the program for loading music onto iPods, iPads, iPhones, iTouches, iDogs, iCats, iEverythings. It also allows you to search and download a vast collection of podcasts, for **FREE**.

- 1. Download & install iTunes (it's FREE) onto your PC
- 2. Set up an account (it's FREE)
- 3. Start up iTunes, click **Power Search**, select "Podcasts," key in the word "Barbershop" (or any other topic of interest) and click **Search**.
- 4. You will be presented with lists of podcasts and individual episodes. Most of them are **FREE**.
- 5. Download the ones you want, and try them out. If you like them, you can "subscribe" to that podcast, which means iTunes will automatically download additional episodes for you.

You can listen to podcasts on your PC, or load them to your portable players, and listen "on the road" if you so desire. I've started bringing some of them in the car with me, and find them a great way to enhance my drive-time.

Podcasts are also available without using iTunes, but that tends to get a little more complicated. If there is interest, we might cover other "podcatcher" applications in a later issue. We could also share information about specific podcasts that we find.

Did I remember to mention all this is FREE? 🎔

HARMONDTES



Thirteen *HOA* members arrived in St. Charles Sept. 23 to spend an evening with the *Ambassadors of Harmony*. They were prepared for us, giving each of us a special pre-made name tag for the occasion. I've been there many times before, and some of the others (including **David Krause**) have also visited before, but for most of the guys, it was their first visit to our brothers in harmony across the state.

I encouraged all to grab a guest book and get on the risers with them. That is the best way to get the feel of what it is like to be practicing with one of the best choruses in the world, under the direction of Jim Henry, one of the best chorus directors in the world. Some did for a while, and Rich Huyck and I stayed all evening, even when they broke off for a section rehearsal. Others came to observe, especially David and Jerry Garrard, seeking to understand what makes them who they are, and perhaps some insight as to how to lead HOA down that same path to growth and success.

Much of the evening was given to preparing for their holiday show. Since this is their sabbatical year (no contest to prepare for), they have that luxury. They started with their first song, and I was left adrift as there was no music in the guest book. As they sang, I could pick up on the notes, but the words seemed to make no sense whatever! In time, as they repeated sections, I could match notes with them, but was singing vowel sounds with no idea as to what words I was supposed to be singing. Now, *AOH* does some songs like that, so it wasn't a total surprise, but it was an interesting trial. Later, I learned that the song was in the Russian language!

Other than that, their holiday music is at least somewhat familiar to me since I am a regular at their shows. I was able to participate much of the time, except perhaps in the faster sections of "Go Tell It On The Mountain," I don't think I was ever very good getting through those parts. When they broke off for section rehearsals, it was to work on "O Come, O Come, Immanuel" that I recall singing when I was with them. I noted that the arrangement was by Kevin Keller and dated to 1991. By the end of the evening I was pretty much off the music with that one.

When you are up there with the best, your challenge is NOT to be noticed! If you mess up, people will look toward you — then recognize you as a guest, shrug their shoulders and smile. So -- if I was pretty sure I knew the notes, I sang with them, but if not, I sang under my breath! You have nothing to fear, really. They are capable singers, but so are you if you are in the performing chorus, and most of those guys really aren't any better at this craft than you are. I even had times when fellows near me were smiling my way as I was on target. We all came for the purpose of observing Jim Henry in control of his chorus. I've said this before from my previous visits — Jim Henry loves his men, tells them he considers it his sacred privilege to be their leader and knows they have the ability to excel. He is efficient, he demands the best and will keep his guys repeating phrases and sections until they get it right. But he is able to do that in a way that the guys don't feel put down, don't feel beaten down and never feel they are unable to please Jim. They respond to that. They may have to go over a section 3, 4 or 6 times, but in time they get it right and Jim smiles and says "That's it! I knew you guys could do it!" In a nutshell — those guys also love Jim, and they would willingly go through hell for him. That is why they are willing to work as hard as they do to excel.

I do hope we can organize another trip like this one, and that others who could not do it this time will then. Take the challenge to come and SING with them. As a guest, you are always welcome! Yes, it is a bit of an endurance contest (we arrived back at Independence Center at 2:15 a.m. and still had to get home from there), but you don't have to drive (unless you're Carl Turlin or David Krause). Our *Heartbeats* made sure we were well-fed, and we had fellowship with our friends all the way over and back. We even worked "Anthem" for a while, so we have a leg up on the rest of you for that song! (Maybe next time we'll have a tenor with us.) **•**

Reflections on the Visit to AOH

(Ed. Note: Rich Huyck is a 40-year Society member and first sang in a BHS chorus contest in 1957. This is his reflection on the trip taken last month by 13 members of the Kansas City Chapter to a rehearsal by the

two-time international champion Ambasadors of Harmony across the state in St. Charles, Mo.)

The men on the risers at *AOH* are generally no more talented than the men on the risers with *HOA*. It seems that their culture has inspired a high level of commitment to consistent effort to sing and perform at their best.

However, the musical leadership out front during warmups and rehearsal emphasized the same approach to quality singing and artistry that *HOA's* music team has been promoting for more than a year (tall, open inside, forward pingy production, etc.)

The warmup session was executed with good pace and very positive feedback when the men on the risers produced the desired result.

I don't know if all of their rehearsals are managed as it was last night, but Director Jim Henry was out front the entire time after warmups, and his approach was quite similar to the gentlemen who managed the warmups: consistent reminders about the basic singing fundamentals and very positive feedback to the chorus, interspersed with some appropriate humor, when he got what he was asking for. Also, none of the music team leadership on the risers offered to interrupt Jim with their own observations about what they might have heard around them on the risers. Jim Henry was obviously in command!

I was on the risers the entire evening, and never once felt any negative chastisement when the chorus needed reminders for good singing.

Riser discipline at *AOH* could be described as a little better than what we have achieved at *HOA*, but not significantly better. But when Jim Henry turned his back to the chorus in preparation for performing a song, the men instinctively were in performance posture and ready to sing when he turned to face the chorus.

To sum it up: I was impressed with the very positive environment that the *AOH* music team obviously strives to achieve. \clubsuit

Do Singing Valentines? Nope. But then, we rarely do in September.


Have one of our typical unproductive fun rehearsals? No again, sadly enough. But we came close on this one – see below. And – we do have one scheduled for later this week.

Through This Window...

We've all at one time or another used the expression "window of opportunity." In looking back over the last many months,

there is no doubt that a commitment to excellence has been present. In my last couple of articles for this publication I've mentioned that each of us seems be progressing at taking responsibility in the investment of personal effort necessary to

improve. I think we've bought into the idea to "make the last time you sang it your worst," whether it be a phrase or an entire song.

We've had tremendous coaching from our own HOA music team, the terrific experience of our Lake Doniphan retreat, our recent taping audition and as a result, increased personal responsibility. I don't know about you, but this last taping session I had to take much more seriously; not just from the qualifying aspect, but from a "critically listening" point of view. Perhaps for the first time since this process started early in the year, I really listened to how I sounded. And trust me; you really don't always know what that is while you're singing with all these other guys around you on the risers. At least I don't.

I'm just now beginning to realize that this danged recorder may be my new best friend. Sure, I've got those around me (what do they know; they're from Kansas and Missouri and I'm from Iowa), the director and section leaders. But the best thing I've got, beyond my memory, is something I can listen to later. I can very quickly hear when I go flat beyond the upper range of the note. I can very quickly hear that I didn't sing that phrase as emotionally as I thought, or even finish it properly. I can hear that I didn't turn that diphthong, even though I thought I did. I can hear that I unintentionally took a breath at the wrong time. And you know what? I can't always hear those things while I'm singing.

Now, do you know what else? I wish this was my idea, but it's not. During our recent visit to the *Ambassadors of Harmony* this week in St. Charles with 10 other guys, guess who mentioned the taping process (sound familiar), although I only saw a couple of recorders out of about 120 guys...**Dr. Jim Henry**. His primary



message was to use the recorder to *help you retain* what we just corrected...what we just learned. How easy is that? We don't have to tape the entire evening, just be smartly selective in our taping.

Why did I spend so much time on taping as a tool and individual responsibility? I absolutely believe in this chorus. I believe we are on the right path. I believe each of us can and should improve. I believe there are those who think they can't, that absolutely can. I believe this chorus is demonstrating what it takes to accomplish Job 1...Membership. We are demonstrating that we have become a change agent. We are demonstrating that our number one public relations tool is a quality product. I think we've created a window of opportunity here to help brush aside the age old question as to why it's difficult to attract new members and retain those we have. We just have to promote it based upon our recent proven and continuing positive results.

> Through this window we offer a whole new world to potential singers. We have many events in the upcoming months to peak and hold their interest: the Holiday Show, Singing Valentines, the Spring Show and we are hosting the 2011 International Competition. How much more can one person who is new to our organization endure? From the old guys like **Dan Henry**, "you ain't seen nothin' yet!"

> Is there a good time to become a member with so many events with lots of music to learn? For any worthwhile and challenging hobby it can be difficult, but this is probably the best time. There is time

to learn the Holiday music and then to participate in Singing Valentine's. How special would it be for a rookie to participate in a quartet for this event? And then how special to be involved with the 2011 International Barbershop Convention right here in our home town? So take a hard look at your contacts, even people you know that don't sing but may just know someone that does. You never know in what undiscovered place a new talent may be awaiting.

Gents, there isn't any question. You have and are continuing to make a difference. \heartsuit

NELCOME, CENTS!



Last weekend, I got to take part in one of my favorite barbershopping activities: a festival. The premise is simple -- chapters from all over get together for a day to share in fellowship and song.

In this case, the chapters were mostly from western Nebraska, with a couple from eastern Colorado participating. They do it every couple of years, with different chapters hosting on a rotating basis. This time it was the *McCook Prairie Statesmen* doing the organizing, under the watchful eye of District President **Don Blank**. He's a McCook member who cooked up the idea for the first such festival back in 1994. I was there for that one, and we made so much noise we even wound up singing a tag on national teevee — the "Good Morning America" show.

This time we picked five songs, ranging from easy to as difficult as "Can You Feel the Love Tonight." The guys had the music and learning media in advance, and most had done a pretty good job of studying before they showed up at 9 o'clock Saturday morning. I got section leader help from various chorus directors, and the learning turned into performance mode almost before our lunch break.

In the afternoon we crowded more than 60 guys onto the three-step risers and went at it again, encouraging them to get out of sections. Kearney arm-waver **Fran Wilson** suggested those singing Chorus 1 of "Fun in Just one Lifetime" oughta stand on one side of the chorus and the Chorus 2 guys oughtta be on the other side of the formation. Now why didn't I think of that?

Veteran quartetter and arm-waver **Gary Drown** suggested we sing some tags; believe it or not, I did think of that. And pretty soon it was time to break for supper. The rehearsal area was cleared away and chairs were set up for family, friends and townsfolk who wanted to drop in. We had a small but enthusiastic crowd for the free night concert, which began at 6:30 and was over in plenty of time for folks to drive back home Saturday night.

The Ogalalla and McCook choruses performed, along with two better-thanaverage chapter quartets, one from Hastings and one from Ogallala. Then our mass chorus hits the risers, most without music, for the five songs we'd worked on that day. If the singers and audience had as good a time as I did, it was a highly successful day.

And what do they call this gathering? That's the part I like best: **"Sing and Have Fun."** That really says it all. 


The Tip O' The Hat is recognition to both members and non-members who have made a recent contribution in time and effort to the betterment of the Kansas City, Missouri Chapter.


